## Chimney issue slows progress on courthouse

Work on the exterior of the 1890 Courthouse continues at a slow pace as Donley County representatives negotiate chimney heights with the Texas Historical Commission.

Stephen Dodge of Phoenix I Restoration said in a construction conference last Wednesday that rebuilding a chimney on the northwest side of the building is keeping the roof from being completed.

"The roof has to be put on left to right, and we can't go further until the temporary bracing on the chimneys is removed and this other chimney is finished," Dodge said.

The northwest chimney was missing prior to the current restoration project, which restored it to a height of 23 feet above the roofline.

But the poor condition of the original supporting masonry and unknown original construction conditions caused the chimney to collapse in November, knocking a hole in the roof and sending an 8,000 lb. section crashing into the scaffolding around the courthouse.

A subsequent report from the structural engineer on the project has recommended the chimney and its twin on the northeast corner be lowered from 23 feet to 17 feet to reduce weight load and wind load on the structures. The Texas Historical Commission, however, has not approved the design change.

"The THC believes this to be a restoration project, and we're going to require the chimneys to be put back like they were," said THC's Lyman Labry.

County Judge Jack Hall said the county was not in favor of the

chimneys being the original height due to safety concerns. It was a point echoed by project architect Chris Hutson of Volz & Associates.

"We've all learned now that masonry deteriorates over time," Hutson said. "We're not going to put our professional license at stake here."

Labry said the THC was not unsympathetic to the county's position but that his agency believed the engineer should be able to come up with a design that meets the original height and is safe.

Judge Hall said this week the engineer has a new plan to allow the chimneys to be rebuilt to 20 feet. That plan is pending THC approval.

Meanwhile, work is progressing on the interior of the building. Dodge said last week the ceilings are 75 percent done and the carpentry work is 96 percent finished. Staining of woodwork is "substantially completed" with only touch up work remaining.

Replacement tiles for the main corridor are being manufactured now, and painting of the interior walls and ceilings are coming along well.

Dodge also said workers are ready to proceed with bricking the third floor of the tile. Much of the new stonework is also now on site. Some of the stone is manufactured, and real stone quarried in Kansas will be used near the entrance.

County officials are still waiting for pricing information to determine what formerly deleted work to add back to the project. A completion date cannot be set until all change orders have been issued.

## City officials consider supporting area marketing plan

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen considered a regional marketing plan when they met in regular session last Tuesday night.

Dee Dee Autry of the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation and Seth Davidson of the Panhandle Tourism & Marketing Council presented the Texas Prairie Rivers Marketing Plan to the board.

"Donley County has a set of wildlife resources that is unique to Texas," Davidson said, noting that 70

million people a year like to look at wild birds according to the National Audubon Society. "Donley, Hemphill, and Wheeler counties are the best areas for this."

Davidson asked city officials to support the Texas Prairie Rivers plans with money from the Motel Bed Tax fund. The aldermen took no action, but they indicated they would be willing to support the plan if the county and the CEDC would each contribute a third of the cost.

Also during last week's meeting, the aldermen considered the proposed donation of the old TxDOT building to the city by Walt Knorpp. The city would be responsible for the cost of moving the building, and one contractor has quoted a price of \$15,000 to relocate the building to land near the recycling center. The aldermen tabled this issue pending further information.

Proposals for municipal engineering services were opened and

reviewed. OJD Engineering submitted the only proposal, and it was accepted by the board. OJD will serve as the city's engineers for a three-year period.

Alderman Janice Knorpp discussed grant consulting services and expressed her desire to allow the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to administer a future grant application.

The Classic Cable franchise taxes were discussed, and the board

directed consultant Colby Waters to contact the cable company regarding this matter.

The board discussed the position of city administrator and agreed to hold a workshop next Thursday at 1 p.m. to discuss what duties an administrator would perform.

Librarian Carolyn Blackerby reported 1,796 people per month visited the Burton Memorial Library in 2002. She also discussed the library's upcoming 80th anniversary.

## Kidd wins award from Texas Press

Ashlee Kidd of Clarendon High School was named a winner in the small school division of the Lone Star Journalism Writing Contest last Saturday in Irving at the Texas Press Association's 56th Midwinter Conference & Trade Show.

Kidd, the daughter of Doug and Nancy Kidd, received a certificate and a \$75 check for her feature article "A Warm Heart and A Gentle Touch," which was published in THE CLARENDON ENTERPRISE last October.

TPA and the Interscholastic League Press Conference have teamed together for the second year to present the Lone Star Journalism Writing Contest that pairs students and local newspapers. The awards were expanded this year to include

a category for both small schools (A-3A) and large schools (4A to 5A). Local newspapers around the state had students write features, published them, then entered the work in the contest. The winners were chosen by the judges in the ILPC office.

Other winners in the small school category were Mandy Countryman of Scurry-Rosser High School and Ryan Keser of Wylie High School.

Winners in the large school category were Victoria Williams of Duncanville High School, Kristy Gilentine of Santa Fe High School, and Meaghan Owens of Westlake High School.

Kidd was joined at the conference by her mother and ENTERPRISE editor Roger Estlack.

Also attending the TPA convention was former local publisher William Dean Singleton, who gave a report from the Newspaper Association of America (NAA) and his views on the current state of the newspaper industry during a luncheon on Friday.

Singleton, who is currently serving as the NAA president, established THE CLARENDON PRESS in 1972 and was its publisher for several years. Today, Singleton is vice chairman and CEO of MediaNews Group, Inc., which publishes 49 daily newspapers and 94 non-daily newspapers. The company's largest paper is THE DENVER POST, of which Singleton serves as the chairman of the board and the publisher.

## Thriftway supermarket making renovations to serve Clarendon customers better

but not without injury. I got shampoo in my eye and cried for a really long time.

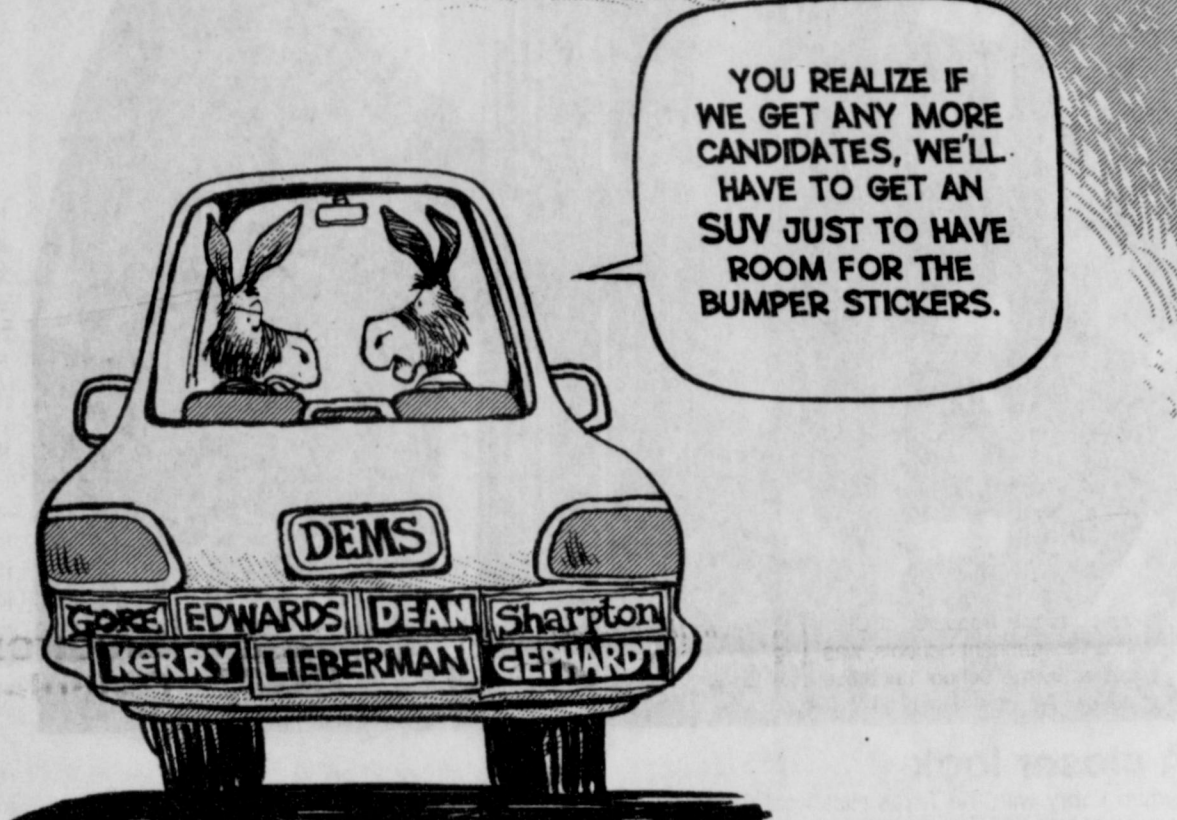

Time to pull the plug on federal 'I Do' tax

What if I told you we discouraged something that could reduce instances of poverty and child abuse; lessen the likelihood for children to be depressed or have developmental problems; dramatically cut adolescent drug use; and decrease instances of domestic violence?

Unfortunately that's exactly what happens in our country every day. The benefits of marriage are well established, and research shows us that the host of societal ills mentioned above are far less likely to occur in a married household. Yet our country's tax code penalizes couples for saying "I do," placing an added tax burden on those who choose to marry.

Americans should not have to choose between love and money. Yet poorly conceived tax laws force them to do just that. Fortunately, in 2001, Congress took a step in the right direction, passing sweeping tax relief, including lowering the marriage penalty, for all Americans at just the right time. No one could have foreseen the economic downturn that followed the terror attacks on our nation, and the tax relief helped create jobs and grow the economy.

Congress eliminated the death tax, lessened the marriage penalty, increased retirement savings limits, and boldly reduced the tax burden for every taxpayer. Unfortunately, because of procedural rules in the Senate, this tax relief will "sunset" after 10 years. In 2011, all of that relief will vanish. One of my highest priorities in 2003 is to accelerate this tax relief and make it permanent. The American people deserve to have consistency in the tax code so they can adequately plan and prepare for their retirement and for their family's future.

That's why in January I introduced a bipartisan bill in the Senate to provide immediate and permanent tax relief from the marriage penalty, effectively ending this inequity for most couples.

The bill is simple, straightforward, and effective. It would immediately increase the standard deduction for married couples

with Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison

filing a joint return so it is twice that of the basic standard deduction for single individuals. The bill would also widen the 15 percent tax bracket for married couples, effectively placing some in a lower tax bracket. For 2003, the threshold would jump nearly 20 percent, from \$47,450 to \$56,800. With these changes, a couple earning \$30,000 could keep \$800 they now pay in taxes, while a couple earning \$80,000 could pocket more than \$1,300.

The bill also would increase the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) phase-out levels for married people. The EITC, which is given to people whose wages are too low to pay taxes, is an important benefit for some of our nation's poorest citizens. By increasing the phase-out level, we help reduce the risk that low-income workers will lose their benefit simply by

getting married.

This is a surefire way to put money in people's pockets and will help give the economy a needed boost. Nearly half of all married couples in America currently pay a marriage penalty, and on average they pay \$1,400 more each year in taxes than they would if they were single. The legislation I introduced would benefit an estimated 35 million married couples by increasing the standard deduction by an average of \$1,500 for married couples filing jointly this year. In Texas alone, this bill would benefit an estimated 2.4 million families.

I have introduced this bi-partisan legislation along with my colleague from Indiana, Sen. Evan Bayh, because we want to ensure this issue is quickly addressed by Congress. In the current economy, it is critical we enact immediate tax relief so couples can spend more of their hard-earned money to meet their needs - not the government's. I look forward to working with my colleagues in Congress to make sure the dreams and hopes of couples across the country no longer help line the coffers of the IRS.

Following a closed session, the board voted unanimously to extend the contract of Superintendent Monty Hysinger through the 2005-2006 school year.

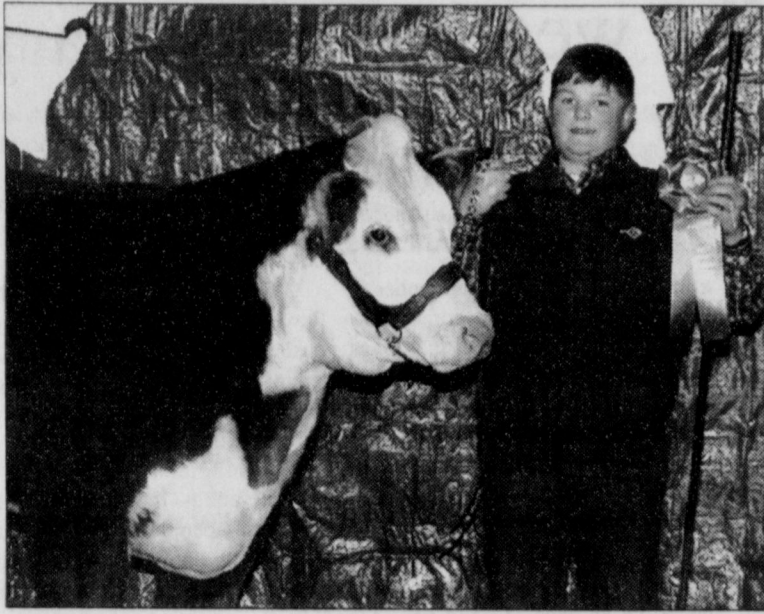
Todd Baker shared his plans to sponsor and promote a Spring Band Trip.

**Commissioners meet in regular session**

The Donley County Commissioners' Court met in regular session last Monday, January 13, in the Conference Room of the Courthouse Annex.

Johnnie O'Dell and Christy Brooks presented a proposal for purchasing new traffic control and safety signs for county roads. Commissioners took no action.

The court reviewed and approved proposals for construction services to make repairs to two county residences through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs HOME program. Following the signing of a contract, repairs will be made to the homes of Missy Speed and Bob Bell for damages relating to the heavy rains two years ago.

The court approved a motion to declare county officers ineligible to serve on the county grievance com-

mittee. Nine citizens were selected from the grand jury list to serve on that committee, and each has been sent a letter asking for their service.

Commissioners reappointed the current members of the County Historical Commission with the exception of Leon and Sue Church and Wayne Riggs. Letters have been sent to possible replacements for those individuals.

The court approved changing county judge's secretary Rhonda Aveni's pay schedule from a salary basis to an hourly basis.

Bonds for local elected officials were approved, and a Notary Public application was authorized for Kasi Keown, who works in Judge Jimmy Johnson's court.

The court also voted in favor of joining the National Association of Counties.

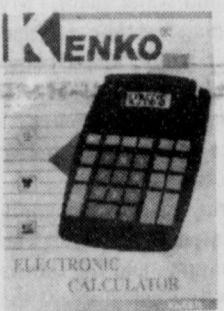

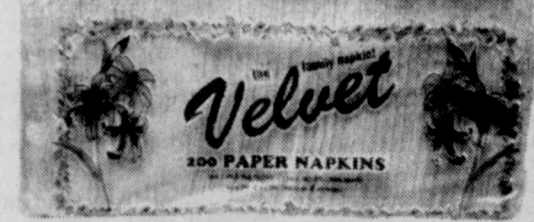

# Early stimulation spurs infants' brain development

Brain cells are designed for making connections. Each cell sends signals out to other cells and receives input from other cells. The signals, as electrical impulses, travel down the length of the nerve cell. With the help of special chemicals (such as serotonin), they travel from cell to cell, creating connections. Repeated activation of networks of neurons strengthens these connections.

These connections are some of the wonders of the human body. But to understand their power, you have to multiply this wonder by trillions. A single cell can connect with as many as 15,000 other cells. The incredibly

complex network of connections that results is often referred to as the brain's "wiring" or "circuitry." Experience shapes the way circuits are made in the brain.

From birth, the brain is rapidly creating these connections. By the time she is three, a baby's brain has formed about 1000 trillion connections—about twice as many as adults have. A baby's brain is super-dense, and will stay that way throughout the first decade of life. Beginning at about age eleven, a child's brain gets rid of extra connections, gradually making order out of a thick tangle of "wires." The circuitry it ends up with

is more powerful and efficient.

Experience tells the brain which connections to keep. When a connection is used repeatedly in the early years, it becomes permanent. In contrast, a connection that is not used at all, or often enough, is unlikely to survive. For example, a child who is rarely spoken to or read to in the early years may have difficulty mastering language skills later on. By

the same token, a child who is rarely played with may have difficulty with social adjustments as she grows.

What does this mean for your child? Basically, the more experiences your child has early on, the more "connections" your child will have. These early connections are the reason child that speak two languages can speak successfully. They made the connections early on and the connections were repeated often. Read, speak, and play with your children. Build connections and strong minds.

# Women should balance medical studies with dose of skepticism

HOUSTON — Modern women are probably more aware of their bodies, and their health, than any other generation of women.

Countless newspaper articles and television segments bombard us with news from the latest health studies. Magazines devote entire issues to breast cancer and constantly remind us of the need for self-breast examinations and mammograms. And after reading article after article on "How to Lose Five Pounds by Friday," most women can easily recite from memory the calorie difference

between a tall and grande latte.

But even armed with so much information, it's easy to be confused about how to stay healthy. For example, most women mistakenly think that breast cancer, not heart disease, is the leading cause of death in American women.

Even experts have a hard time judging which information to trust and which to discard, especially when new studies challenge long-held beliefs. A recent example is the Women's Health Initiative (WHI) report that combination hormone therapy increased women's risk for heart attacks, stroke, breast cancer

and blood clots in the legs and lungs.

To many health professionals, this was startling news. Most previous hormone studies suggested that hormones prevented heart disease. The WHI findings were different because the WHI is the first long-term, randomized, clinical trial examining the effect of postmenopausal combination hormones. Previous studies were observational in nature, meaning they observed and compared the health of women who happened to have been on hormones with the health of women who had not been prescribed hormones or had chosen not to take them.

While observational studies are useful for generating hypotheses, only clinical trials can put them to the test. In a clinical trial, study participants are randomly assigned. By randomly assigning women to treatment or placebo, the problem of bias common in observational studies is controlled.

Clinical trials also have flaws, but they are the best way to test the effects of drugs on our health. The next time you see news about a new wonder drug ask yourself, "Where's the proof?" A little skepticism can go a long way into making you more knowledgeable and healthier.

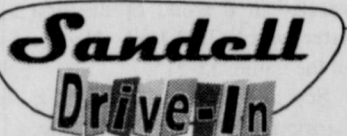

## PIP program promotes esteem, ball handling through basketball

The spider, the coffee grinder, and the star along with discipline and self-respect are what Clarendon kids are learning through the PIP program.

Many Clarendon and Claude residents witnessed this program first hand last week when 42 students from Clarendon performed during the half time of the Lady Bronco basketball game.

In its first year in Clarendon, PIPs (People In Progress) has had an enormous response from the kids and from the parents.

"The support is great, and the kids are doing really well," said Teresa Dronzek, who help start the program in Clarendon. "Most of our kids are in kindergarten, first, and second grade, but we also have a few third, fourth, and fifth grade students."

The national PIP program was started in 1987 by coaches David and Brenda Land of Midlothian with one group in an effort to improve basketball skills through a positive program. The program has grown to include groups in Texas, Oklahoma, Idaho, Arkansas, Ohio, Missouri, and New York.

The Lands created an organiza-

tion that promotes an early interest in basketball and encourages the development of ball handling skills. But PIPs is more than just basketball. Kids learn to improve agility, physical skills, and general fitness along with stimulating an individual work ethic and self discipline. Participants build self assurance and self esteem.

Dronzek said that she had seen a performance about two years ago and was very interested in getting the program to Clarendon

"I had seen my niece and nephew in a PIP performance in Dallas," said Dronzek. "We also went to the festival in Abilene last year which was amazing. It has taken us two years to get this organized in Clarendon."

Festival, which is held in Abilene each year in March, is a year end competition between other PIP groups and gives awards to kids for different skills they can perform.

When Dronzek approached the Lands about the program, they told her she needed to get at least 20 students interested before they could come for the four-hour initial training camp. Forty-five Clarendon students responded to the call, and the camp was held in Clarendon in September. Dronzek is not the only leader

of the team. Tammie Johnston, Che Shadle, Dee Perryman, and Gina Archer have chipped in as coaches and have helped the program rise to an early success.

The Clarendon group will perform several more times this year before the Festival, which marks the end of the yearly program. They will perform during halftime of the Clarendon College Bulldog game Thursday night and during halftime of the Broncos game on Friday night. Game time is 7:30 p.m. on Thursday at the CC Gym and on 8:00 on Friday in the Bronco Gym.

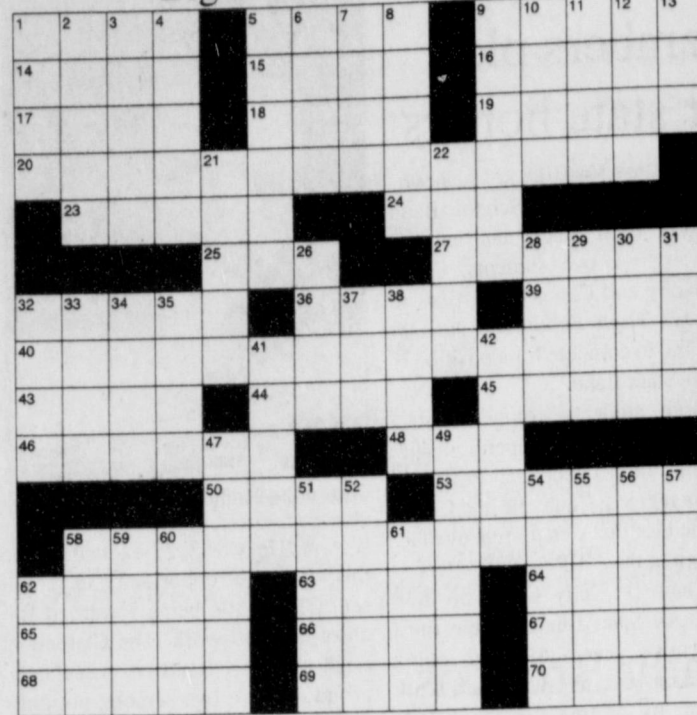
The PIPs have purchased new uniforms to perform in that are the CHS colors of maroon and silver.

A commercial customer receiving a bill for 30 mcf would have a bill of \$ 179.35 per month under the proposed rate. The proposed new rates could result in a customer's bill increasing no more than \$34.26 for 30 mcf of consumption depending upon a commercial customer's current rate and locale. Information on the change in any specific area can be obtained from GreenLight Gas. The proposed rate changes will affect about 3,035 residential and about 431 commercial customers. The rates for unincorporated areas will not become effective until similar changes have become effective within the nearest incorporated city. A statement of intent to change rates for natural gas distribution service to be charged to all residential and commercial customers in the City of Clarendon was filed with that city on December 12, 2002. In addition GreenLight is requesting that the Railroad Commission establish a city gate rate for purposes of calculating utility tax liability.
