### Local cities see higher tax rebates

AUSTIN - Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn this month sent \$283.1 million in monthly sales tax payments to local governments. Sales tax allocations are down one percent compared to January 2002, but local communities shrugged off the state trend.

Clarendon's rebate was up more than 12 percent over last January to \$16,114.38. Hedley's rebate of \$332.16 was up from \$148.70 one year ago, and Howardwick received \$720.23, up from \$479.49.

January sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in November and reported to the Comptroller in December. The state's share of sales tax reported during this period was down 1.3 percent compared to a year ago.

## Sheriff's office arrests five on felonies

Four local men and one juvenile female were arrested here Monday on organized criminal activity charges following a three month investigation by the Donley County Sheriff's Department.

Darrell Ray Thomas, age 34; David Ray Tolbert, age 35; Timothy Don Lockeby, age 23; and Joshua Lamar Allred, age 23, were booked into Donley County Jail. A 17-year-old female was also arrested but was charged as a juvenile since she was

16 at the time of the offense.

According to Sheriff Butch Blackburn, the five suspects allegedly engaged in organized criminal activity between October 1, 2002, and January 9, 2003, during which time seven deliveries of methamphetamine were made to an inmate in the Donley County Jail.

The inmate cooperated with local law enforcement, and the suspects were indicted by the Grand Jury last Friday. The charge is a first-

degree felony, which could carry a life sentence, Blackburn said.

"These arrests are part of a continuing effort to rid the county of drugs, and we're by no means through," Blackburn said. "This ought to show that no one is untouchable."

The suspects were arraigned Tuesday by County Judge Jack Hall. Bond was set for Thomas at \$250,000, for Tolbert at \$100,000, and for Allred and Lockeby at

\$50,000 each. According to Blackburn, a district court hearing is set for Thursday to deny bond to Thomas.

The juvenile was released to the custody of a guardian on Monday, and the other suspects remained in jail at press time.

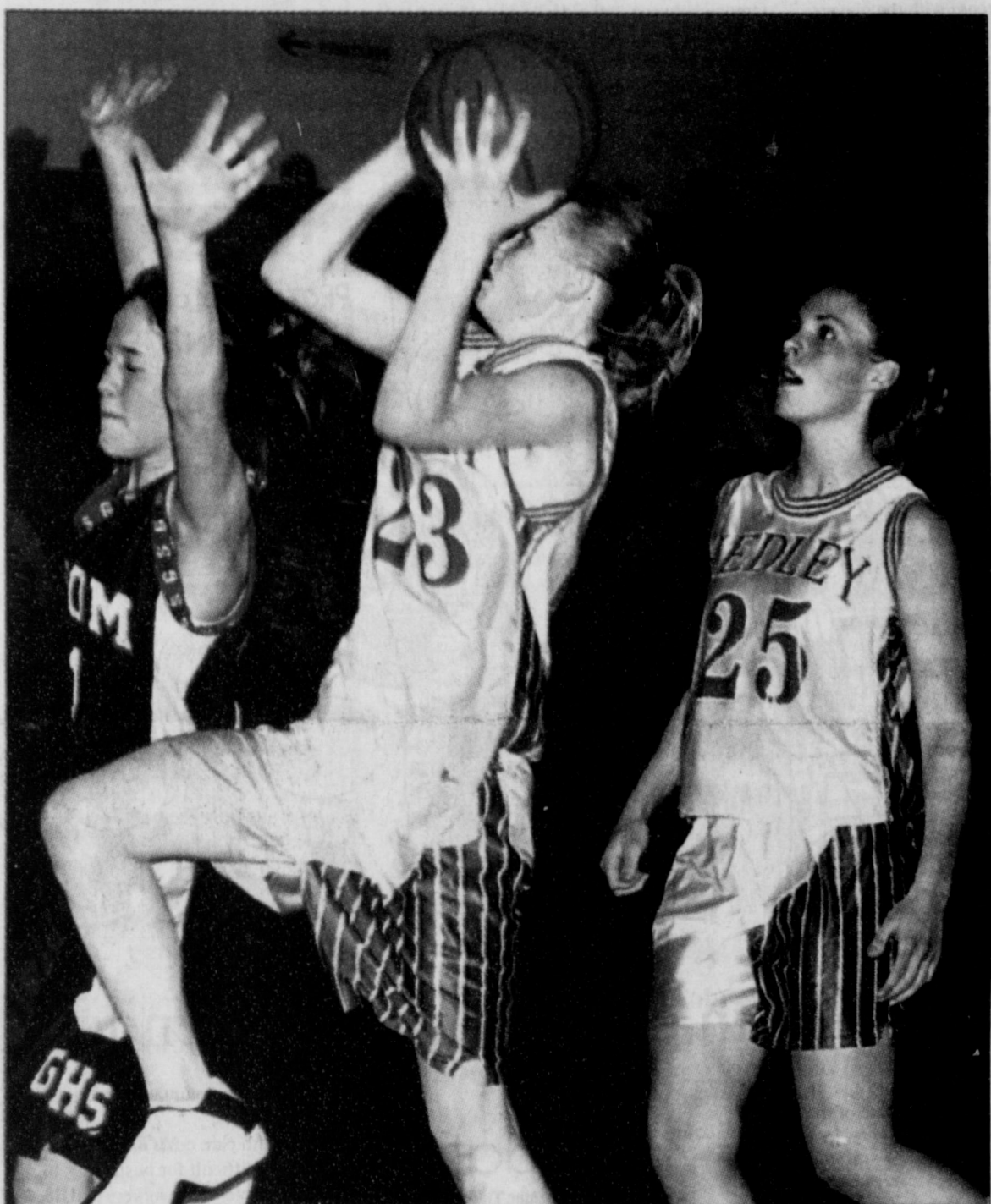
The drugs in question have already been tested by the Department of Public Safety lab in Amarillo and were determined to be methamphetamines, he said.

The sheriff said the five sus-

pects did not have lengthy criminal histories, although Tolbert was on probation for possession of methamphetamine, and Thomas was out on bond for a prior felony theft charge.

District Attorney Stuart Messer said he appreciated the hard work of the sheriff's office, and Blackburn also recognized those involved.

"I want to thank all the officers and the district attorney's office for helping this case come together," Blackburn said.

## Wireless Internet arrives in Hedley

Busy signals and painfully slow connections can now be a thing of the past for computer users in and around Hedley. High-speed, wireless Internet has finally arrived.

Thanks to the Donley County Community Network (DCCN) and AMA-TechTel Communications, a new transmitter has been installed on the KLSR tower northeast of Hedley, which expands the availability of the southeastern part of the county.

The DCCN acquired a \$250,000 TIF grant last summer, which funded new computers for several local entities as well as assisting AMA-TechTel in bringing Internet services to rural residents. In return, AMA-TechTel has contributed financially to the project and donated the expertise and services of its employees in providing Web designs and wireless networking for the DCCN.

The company, formerly known as AMA Wireless, has been servicing customers in Donley County since January of last year, but it has been limited to a ten-mile radius of Clarendon. Now, the transmitter near Hedley, along with a new tower on the south side of Greenbelt Lake, has expanded wireless service to previously hard to reach places in northern and southeastern parts of the county.

"We're extremely excited about serving all the residents of Donley County and look forward to continuing to assist Donley County in spanning the digital divide," said Douglas Campbell, Chief Operations Officer of AMA-TechTel.

The wireless service boasts download speeds up to 50 times faster than ordinary phone lines and operates from a microwave signal

beamed continuously by towers, then directly into the home or office. A small antenna is mounted outside the home or office. The signal is then carried to a subscriber's computer via coaxial cable, a wireless modem, and a CAT 5 computer cable.

The system does not require a phone line, meaning customers can save money by eliminating their second phone line or can free up their existing line.

With the wireless service, files download faster, Web pages pull up faster, and productivity is increased.

AMA-TechTel's service costs as little as \$44.95 per month for residential customers and \$59.90 per month for businesses. Installation fees vary from nothing for residential customers who will sign up for three years to \$150. Customers will also need a network card installed in their computer, and those can be purchased separately or from AMA-TechTel.

"This service is a great benefit to people engaged in e-commerce and businesses that communicate via e-mail as well as casual surfers," said local AMA-TechTel agent and newspaper publisher Roger Estlack. "It is an asset to Donley County to have this service available when trying to attract new residents and businesses."

"If you're frustrated by busy signals, poor connections, and no connections when trying to get online, then wireless Internet is what you need," Estlack said.

## Messer reports 81 sent to prison in 2002

District Attorney Stuart Messer this week filed his annual report on the activities of his office for the year ending December 31, 2002.

Eighty-one people were sent to prison from the 100th Judicial District for a combined total of 630 years. Twenty-nine of those were convicted of first or second degree felonies.

Eighteen persons were convicted of felony driving while intoxicated charges and were imprisoned for an average term of seven years. In addition, 209 other people were placed on probation for a variety of crimes. Many of the probated sentences were conditioned on the defendant

completing intensive residential substance abuse and anger management programs offered by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Fines assessed by District Court Judge David McCoy for the year totaled \$245,200. Defendants were ordered to pay a total of \$67,616.75 in court costs to the counties, and restitution of \$73,506.08 was ordered to be paid to victims across the district.

Locally, 15 people were sent to prison for crimes committed in Donley County. Those crimes ranged from aggravated assault to attempted murder to sexual assault of a child.

District Attorney Stuart Messer said local cooperation was a great

help to his office.

"The prosecution of crimes committed in Donley County is made so much easier for me because of the terrific cooperation I receive from the sheriff's department, the local office of the Department of Public Safety, and all other law enforcement officials involved in any given case."

"It also helps to know there are good citizens in Donley County who are willing to step up to the plate and do their civic duty in serving as jurors. Without good jurors, the criminal justice system does not work."

The 100th Judicial District includes Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, and Hall counties.

## Deadline for federal farm program approaching

Bruce Ferguson, County Executive Director for the Donley County Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds area farmers and ranchers to make an appointment to sign-up for the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP).

The deadline to apply for DCP is April 1, 2003. This date is outlined in legislation, and no extensions or exceptions will be made.

Ferguson commented that sign-up is averaging at least one hour per

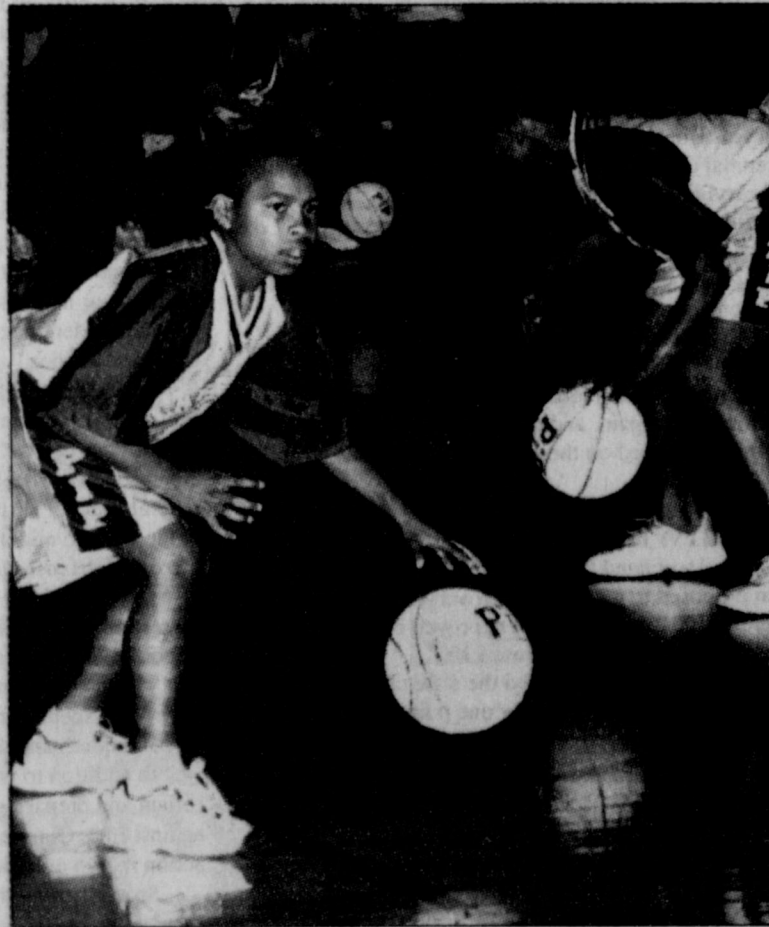
farm. He encourages producers to avoid procrastinating. If a producer is planning to update bases and yields, Ferguson encourages using the Base and Yield Analyzer Internet tool available at [www.fsa.usda.gov/pas/farmbill/tools.asp](http://www.fsa.usda.gov/pas/farmbill/tools.asp).

If electing to update yields, producers will be required to provide all production records for 1998-2000. For cash leased land, FSA requires a copy of the lease agreement if available and proof of lease payment. If

no lease agreement is provided, the landowner must sign for zero shares.

Producers who have dropped, added, purchased, sold or otherwise changed their farming operation need to report these changes to the FSA office. Also, producers must certify any 2002 crop plantings or land use changes not previously reported.

"It is unfortunate that Mr. Altman apparently doesn't understand the First Amendment or the judge's decision," attorney Peter Murphy told the AP.

Economy, health care, war lead agenda

With a new Congress sworn in and the President preparing to give his State of the Union Address, now is a good time to look at some of the issues Washington must deal with in the coming year.

The top priority for the federal government remains national security, including waging and winning the war on terrorism. We've gone 15 months without a terrorist attack against our country. This success is good, but it is not a reason to get lulled into a false sense of security.

One of our biggest challenges this year will be to get the Department of Homeland Security up and running. Congress created this Department last fall. It is the largest reorganization of our federal government since the end of World War II.

As we prepare for a possible war in Iraq, it is also important that we make sure our military has the training, equipment, and resources it needs to succeed. After several years of shrinking defense budgets in the early to mid-1990s, Congress has increased defense spending the past few years.

In addition to waging the war on terrorism and preparing for a possible war against Iraq, Congress must also take action in two other key areas, including: Strengthening the Economy - The President recently proposed an economic growth package intended to give our economy a boost.

For instance, under the President's plan, a

married couple with two children and an income of \$40,000 would see their taxes decline by \$1,133 (from \$1,178 to \$45) in 2003, a decline of 96 percent.

I have always believed that one of the keys to economic growth in America is to let people keep more of what they earn. Proposals like this particular one would certainly help achieve that goal.

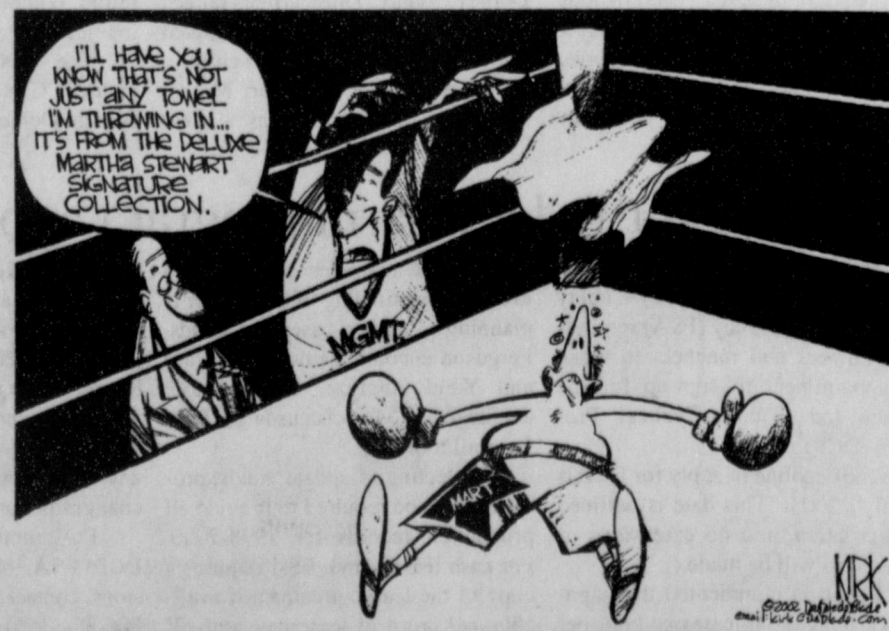
Making Health Care More Affordable and Accessible - The Wall Street Journal recently reported that the federal government spent an average of \$5,035 per person on health care in 2001. Last year alone, spending on health care grew by a rate of 10 percent. This kind of increase is clearly putting a dent in people's pocketbooks - which is one of the reasons why Congress and the President will hopefully be able to reach agreement this year on a plan to strengthen and reform Medicare. This plan

will likely include a voluntary prescription drug plan for seniors.

Rising health care costs are also making it more difficult for businesses to provide coverage to their workers and doctors to provide care for their patients. It is important that Washington do all it can to get these costs down and make health care more affordable and accessible. Reforming the Nation's medical liability system is a good place to start.

I've heard from many doctors who are having trouble finding malpractice insurance and are either retiring from medicine or are no longer performing certain medical procedures as a result. That is just wrong. While you never want to take away a person's right to hold negligent doctors accountable, you also don't want to keep good doctors from providing care.

From waging the war on terrorism to strengthening the economy to providing better health care for all Americans, Washington faces a number of priorities this year. It is my hope that Congress and the President will be able to work together to meet these priorities and keep our country secure.

# Kelly wins Amarillo Symphony Guild competition

This past weekend, Chantelle Kelly won the winds and percussion division of the Amarillo Symphony Guild's Young Performer's Competition.

A clarinet musician, Kelly played Carl Stamitz' "Concerto in E Flat" to win over students playing instruments ranging from trumpet to tuba taught by some of the finest instructors in the Texas Panhandle.

This was the same concerto Kelly played for State Solo and Ensemble Contest last spring. She also performed it for local audiences at one of the Clarendon High School band concerts last spring.

Kelly is a dedicated musician. When she first moved to Clarendon, in the late spring of her freshman year, it was too late in the school year for her to participate in any solo

performance events. In the fall, she began studying clarinet with Jennifer Willison, a woodwind player.

In those early months, Kelly says, she practiced three to four hours daily, laying down the fundamentals of clarinet performance. The band directors had to "kick her out" of the band hall almost every day.

Now, she practices around ten hours a week, learning new music and maintaining skills, with both Willison and band director Todd Baker instructing. Kelly also travels to Lubbock about once a month for lessons with the clarinet professor at Texas Tech University.

Each competition Kelly enters will have an approved list of music from which the performers may select. She says that she tries to choose pieces she can play for more than one occasion, but by the end

of this school year, she will have learned three major full-length compositions.

Kelly says she is particularly proud of her win in the Young Performer's Competition because the other students were all from big, 5A schools who study weekly with university professors, rather than small-town band directors. "It made us feel pretty good," said Willison and Baker.

"She wouldn't let me go home till she knew how we did," Willison, who accompanied Kelly to the competition, said.

"I was starving, because I was too nervous to eat," Kelly said. "But six hours later, we had the results." She said that when she came off the stage, she told Willison that she knew she had played well, so no matter who won, she would be satisfied.

Apparently, the judges thought she played well also. Comments on the critique sheets filled out by the judges included things like "Really first Class" and "very mature playing."

Chantelle Kelly is the granddaughter of Bob and Shirley Kelly and the daughter of Robert Kelly. When she's not practicing her clarinet, her activities center on her family.

In upcoming weeks, Kelly will be heading off to All-State, where she will have to audition for chair position. Her goal is to make one of the first five spots in the clarinet section. She'll also audition for a scholarship to Texas Tech. She's already been accepted into the studio of the clarinet professor, which is sometimes more difficult. She plans to become a band director.

## Easy to follow tips for tidying up all year long

### Daily Cleanup

Start by enlisting the entire family to take part in everyday pickup. Here are some ideas, courtesy of The Soap and Detergent Association. It may be difficult to implement all of them but even if one or two new procedures are established, it will make things easier. Consider confining snacks to specific areas of the house. Teenagers love to take food to their bedrooms. But those left-behind empty food containers not only add to the mess, but can also serve as an invitation for bugs and other unwanted pests. Dishes should be washed or put in the dishwasher immediately after meals or snacks. Children who are too young to do this can at least learn to leave them in or next to the sink.

Children are notorious for leaving coats and jackets around the house. Re-evaluate where coats are stored. Coat racks or door hooks might supplement closet storage. Likewise, a bench or table near a door could make a good repository for book bags. Mail - junk or other-

wipe - can account for a lot of countertop clutter. To get it under control, sort it near a trash container so the unwanted pieces can be discarded immediately.

Try to assign tasks that are age appropriate to family members. Preschoolers can put away unbreakable dishes and playthings. For the latter, try setting a timer (make it a realistic time frame), then reward the child with a special story or a sit-and-cuddle if he or she gets it done "under the bell." Older children can clear the table, help load the dishwasher, and make their beds. Easy-care comforters, rather than fussy bedspreads, make the latter easier. Teenagers can clean their own rooms, assist with the laundry, and help out with dusting, cleaning, and kitchen chores.

A nightly "sweep" of the household will do wonders for keeping clutter under control. Doing it just before bedtime means a fresh, clean start the next morning.

make the bigger cleaning tasks easier. Carpets should be vacuumed at least weekly - more often if there are pets in the home or if a family member suffers from allergies or asthma. At least 20 seconds back and forth over each area will remove the dirt and dust that hide between carpet fibers. When dusting, use the vacuum attachment or a soft, clear cloth and a furniture dusting product. The goal is to capture the dust, not to re-circulate it into the air.

Using a shower cleaner after every shower will help prevent soap scum and mildew growth. Leaving the shower curtain or door open so the area can thoroughly dry will also help control mildew. A toilet bowl cleaner to sanitize the toilet and a spray cleaner for tubs, tiles, and sinks should be part of the weekly

cleanup.

### Monthly Cleanup

Monthly cleaning includes disinfecting trash cans. Use a disinfectant cleaner or a solution of three-quarters cup of bleach to one gallon of water. Rinse and dry with a clean cloth. In warm weather, turn the cans upside down, prop one edge of the rim up, and let them air-dry.

The refrigerator should also be cleaned monthly. Discard fruits, vegetables, and leftovers that are no longer fit for consumption. Remove and clean each shelf, working one shelf at a time, so food isn't left out at room temperature for a long period of time. To clean the shelf itself, place it on a towel and let it adjust to room temperature. Then clean with a solution of warm water and hand dishwashing detergent. Scrub gently with nylon brush or sponge. The Clarendon College Board of Regents accepted letters of retirement from two longtime faculty members during their regular meeting January 16.

Ag instructor and judging coach Jerry Hawkins will retire at the end of July, and ag instructor Curtis Schaefer will retire at the end of the current school year. Hawkins has been with CC since 1968, and Schaefer has taught since 1978, according to college officials.

"It's a critical time for the college as we look for someone to replace these instructors and continue the good work that Curtis and Jerry have done," said CC President Myles Shelton.

The board also accepted the resignation of Financial Aid Director

Marian Giesecke, who will be taking another job with West Texas A&M University.

In other CC business, the regents approved purchasing three computer kiosks with money from the community TIF grant. The kiosks will be placed in convenient locations around the county for use by tourists and others as part of the Donley County Community Network. More information on the network will be made public next week.

The board approved holding their February meeting on the 13th at the Pampa Country Club. Following the meeting, the board will conduct a walk-through of the CC Pampa Center.

The new dormitory was reported to be on schedule with the foundation

already poured on the east wing. The slab for the west wing is scheduled to be poured this week. The regents discussed possible names for the new residence hall but took no action.

The regents approved preliminary plans for the softball field and final plans are to be presented at the February 13 meeting.

Likewise, the board considered preliminary plans for the Equine Center and will consider final plans next month. Bidding for both projects is expected to follow the February meeting.

In the president's report, Shelton said early enrollment figures were up five to six percent over the spring of 2002. Final numbers are expected this week.

Shelton also told the board the

purchase of 3.34 acres from the Fletcher estate had been finalized. The land is adjacent to the west side of the campus and could possibly be used to locate future horse stalls.

The board was given a schedule for faculty and staff use of the new Fitness Center, which is now open to students 61 hours per week. The administration is working on a proposal to allow the public to use the facility.

The board of regents was also given an update regarding the need for a new library facility. Shelton says the college is closing in on a time where it will have to do something to address the library issue so it can respond to accreditation officials, who are coming to visit the campus in 2005.

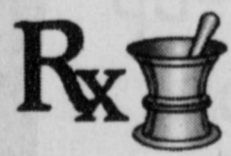

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## Hospital board takes a look at equipment needs

The Donley County Hospital Board met in regular session January 21 in the Conference Room of the Medical Center Nursing Home.

District Administrator Alan Graham reported the ambulance authority responded to 44 calls in December, including 23 no-transport calls and seven trauma calls. Total billing was \$26,575.50, and Graham said the rate of collections was up and accounts payable were less this month. He also reported the authority to be operating at a deficit six months into the fiscal year. A new software billing program is expected to enhance collections and streamline other office reporting procedures.

Graham reported the authority received a \$6,000 grant for the purchase of three Stryker stretchers and a cardiac defibrillator. RAC funding was also approved for one stretcher. The authority is currently borrowing a defibrillator from a vendor in order to stay TDH compliant, and bids are being accepted for the purchase of a new defibrillator, which will cost about \$15,000. Funding for this purchase may be done in one of the following ways: financing on a five-year equipment note, reducing the note with grant monies as they are received; funding from the hospital district; or funding from the state's tobacco settlement income.

A resolution was adopted regarding authorized signatures on a credit card through Herring National Bank.

In the administrator's report, the census of the nursing home was reported at 46 with two planned admissions in January and February. Graham also reported receiving two new computers for the nursing home and one for the ambulance service through a community TIF grant. Wireless Internet is also being installed through the grant.

In the indigent care report, Holly Eads said two applications had been approved during a six-month review and reported indigent care expenses to be up for this month.

## Howardwick Aldermen hold regular meeting

The Howardwick Board of Aldermen met in regular session January 14 in the Howardwick City Hall.

Fire Chief Joe Zeyen gave a report for his department and said they are checking on the availability of a tanker trailer.

The board discussed a resolution regarding plumbing license laws affecting small communities. The resolution was approved 3-0 with Alderman Sam Grider, who is a licensed plumber, abstaining.

The board also voted to have the carpet in City Hall cleaned.

## Trees for sale at local soil conservation office

Trees offer short-term and long-term benefits that few other cover plantings can match. You can order a variety of trees at the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District office.

Trees are as effective, and in many cases more effective, than other types of vegetation for keeping soil where it belongs because of their extensive root systems. Trees also provide shelter for many kinds of birds and animals.

In addition, trees offer another benefit, one that is gaining more attention as people grow increasingly

concerned about the greenhouse effect and global climate change. Changes in global climate are caused, in part, by the buildup of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Because tree use carbon dioxide in the photosynthetic process and store carbon in their wood, large-scale reforestation may be one way to counteract the greenhouse effect.

Trees provide these benefits for decades because once farmland is planted in trees, it tends to stay in trees.

Taxpayers benefit from trees, too. Government expenditures to

promote tree planting will "buy" decades worth of conservation on planted acreage. In addition, those programs that foster tree planting on cropland are expected to shave billions of dollars from the US Department of Agriculture's agricultural support program expenditures, because the Government will not need to make price and income support payments for surplus production of crops like wheat, corn, sorghum, barley, and oats.

The family requests that memorials be to the First Baptist Church in Claude or the Claude Volunteer Fire Department.

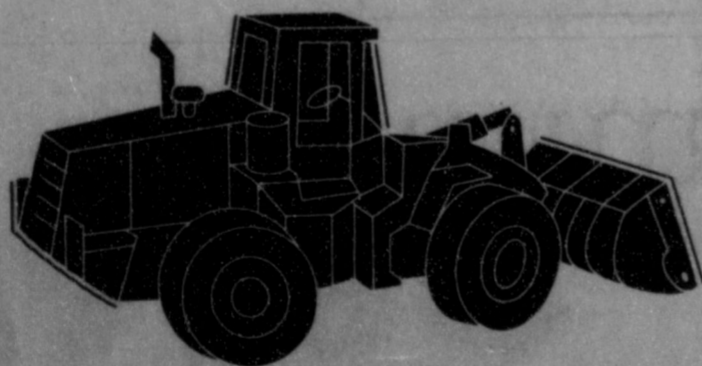
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## The Lion's Tale

rivals. After a close game, The Lady Cyclones walked away with the 58-56 win.

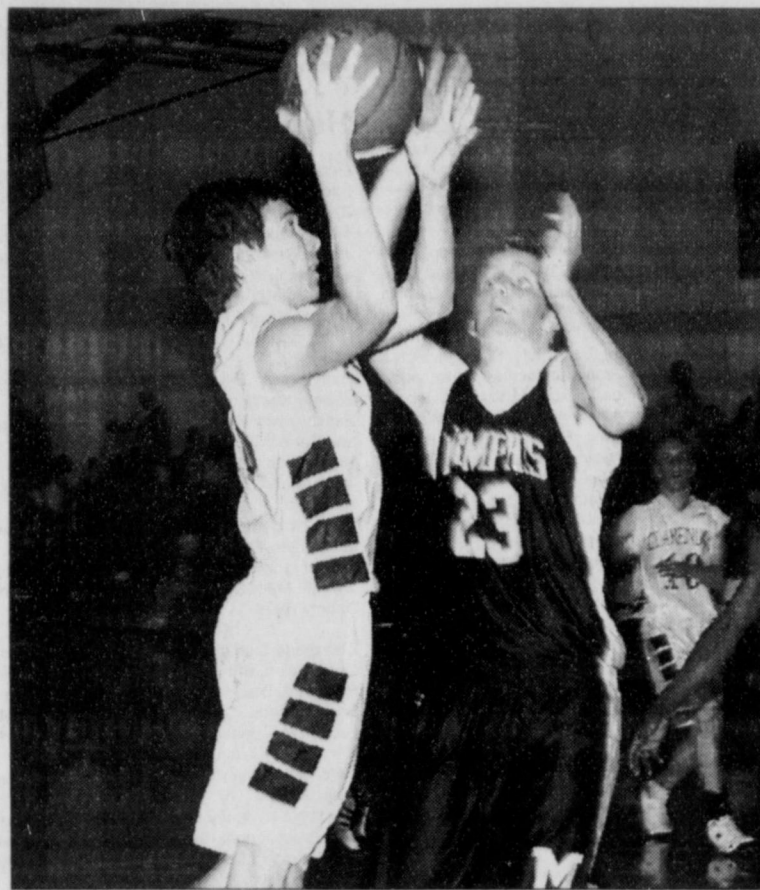
The Lady Broncos trailed at the end of the second period by three points and continued that lead as they took a one-point advantage into the locker room.
