#### Local cities see higher tax rebates

AUSTIN - Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn this month sent \$283.1 million in monthly sales tax payments to local governments. Sales tax allocations are down one percent compared to January 2002, but local communities shrugged off the state trend.

Clarendon's rebate was up more than 12 percent over last January to \$16,114.38. Hedley's rebate of \$332.16 was up from \$148.70 one year ago, and Howardwick received \$720.23, up from \$479.49

January sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in November and reported to the Comptroller in December. The state's share of sales tax reported during this period was down 1.3 percent compared to a year ago.







# Common sense almost appears in McLawsuit

For a while last week, it seemed common sense had broken out in the legal system when on Wednesday a federal judge threw out a lawsuit filed against McDonald's on behalf of fat kids. Then hope dimmed with closer examination of the dismissal.

The case was filed last year in New York on behalf of several tubby teenagers, claiming they didn't know Mickey D's greasy, salty, nasty fast food was bad for them. One of these lard-butts was a grossly obese 400pound 15-year-old who claims he's got diabetes now because he's eaten at McDonald's everyday since he was

I submit that fatso didn't get to his current state of high gravitational attraction by eating Big Macs alone. I'm sure he was munching Pringles, inhaling Twinkies, slurping turkey legs, and taking soda pop intravenously, and there certainly is no way he was just eating one meal a day anywhere. Where are the parents of this poor slob?

Anyway, US District Judge Robert Sweet threw out the lawsuit, but he did so mostly on technicalities. Predominately, Sweet... (Hey, aren't sweets bad for you?) Predominately, Sweet said the plaintiffs had not shown that the defendants did not know exactly what was in

Reuters reported Sweet called Chicken McNuggets a "McFrankenstein creation" that was made with elements not used by home cooks. "[Sweet] said the plaintiffs could re-file their case with information backing their claim that diners have no idea what is really in their food or that the products have allegedly become more harmful because of processing," the news service reported.

Still, I don't think just the not knowing the ingredients should be grounds for a lawsuit. Only an idiot - or a trial lawyer - would claim to be stunned when presented with the fact that fast food is not healthy. We all know

But this sort of common sense just doesn't apply in the world of lawsuits. From the suits against Big Tobacco to the fast food cases, personal responsibility is being thrown out the window in favor of collective blame.

In a recent panel of the cartoon "Non Sequitur," Danae brought home a bad report card and determined that she should sue the school system. But her Uncle Bob, an attorney, taught her the important lesson "Go for the deep pockets," and so she tried to sue the state.

A similar, less humorous, situation is playing out now in Washington state where relatives of last year's D.C.-area sniper victims have filed a lawsuit - not just against the shooters but against the gun store where the rifle came from and the manufacturer of the gun - the deep pockets if you will.

The suit alleges Bull's Eye Shooter Supply was negligent in letting the suspects acquire the gun, that Bushmaster - the gun maker - was negligent in selling a "combat" rifle to Bull's Eye, and that both have contributed to a public nuisance (i.e., the availability of guns). Lawyers from the anti-gun rights organization set up by perennial crybaby Sarah Brady are backing the lawsuit and serving as co-counsel.

But who shot those people? The suspects did. Likewise, who ate the fast food? The tubby teenagers did. Only greed, grief, or the combination of the two could see it any other way.

We desperately need tort reform, folks. It's time to stop punishing those who have nothing to do with other people's actions. Personal responsibility must be made commonplace again, and that will not be achieved until the lid is slammed on these frivolous lawsuits.

The Associated Press reports that a compromise has been proposed to a vexing controversy in South Carolina, where in 2001 the legislature approved offering license plates with the slogan "Choose Life."

Planned Parenthood sued the state claiming the plates provide a forum to only one point of view, and then a US District Judge ruled against the state, saying the plates violated the First Amendment.

This spurred Rep. John Graham Altman to propose legislation offering a forum to the other side of the abortion debate. He wants to give them the opportunity to buy plates with the slogan "Choose Death."

As you can imagine, the pro-choice crowd was not

"It is unfortunate that Mr. Altman apparently doesn't understand the First Amendment or the judge's decision," attorney Peter Murphy told the AP.

No, what's truly unfortunate is that Mr. Murphy doesn't realize free speech goes both ways.

# Economy, health care, war lead agenda

With a new Congress sworn in and the President preparing to give his State of the Union Address, now is a good time to look at some of the issues Washington must deal with in the coming year.

The top priority for the federal government remains national security, including waging and winning the war on terrorism. We've gone 15 months without a terrorist attack against our country. This success is good, but it is not a reason to get lulled into a false sense of security. We are fighting a war against a sophisticated enemy who is extremely difficult to detect and extremely patient. We cannot let our guard down.

One of our biggest challenges this year will be to get the Department of Homeland Security up and running. Congress created this Department last fall. It is the largest reorganization of our federal government since the end of World War II. It is also the most significant. Under this plan, 22 federal agencies with responsibility for keeping our nation secure will be brought together under one roof to better coordinate their actions.

As we prepare for a possible war in Iraq, it is also important that we make sure our military has the training, equipment, and resources it needs to succeed. After several years of shrinking defense budgets in the early to mid-1990s, Congress has increased defense spending the past few years. Another increase is likely for our forces in 2003. While these increases are important, we have also got to make sure that we spend this money wisely and in a way that keeps our troops safe and our forces modern and up-to-date.

In addition to waging the war on terrorism and preparing for a possible war against Iraq, Congress must also take action in two other key areas, including:

Strengthening the Economy - The President recently proposed an economic growth package intended to give our economy a boost. While it is still unclear whether Congress will vote on this plan as it is currently written, it does contain several elements which should be considered. For instance, under the President's plan, a



married couple with two children and an income of \$40,000 would see their taxes decline by \$1,133 (from \$1,178 to \$45) in 2003, a decline of 96 percent.

I have always believed that one of the keys to economic growth in America is to let people keep more of what they earn. Proposals like this particular one would certainly help achieve that goal.

Making Health Care More Affordable and Accessible - The Wall Street Journal recently reported that the federal government spent an average of \$5,035 per person on health care in 2001. Last year alone, spending on health care grew by a rate of 10 percent. This kind of increase is clearly putting a dent in people's pocketbooks which is one of the reasons why Congress and the President will hopefully be able to reach agreement this year on a plan to strengthen and reform Medicare. This plan
