Onion and Bean Growers Will Meet

Onion producers and others interested in looking at onions and pinto beans as an alternative crop are invited to meet on Friday, September 18. The meeting will be held at Mary's Country Kitchen at 7:30 a.m. in the east room of the restaurant. The meeting is sponsored by the Donley County Extension Crops Committee.

Kenneth Gray from Lorenzo, TX with the Texas Seed Improvement Association and vegetable

consultant will visit with producers about fresh onion production and pinto bean production. As we found out this year Donley County producers can grow an excellent onion but we need to look at different handling procedures and varieties to make them profitable. Also, the pinto bean market continues to grow and there is a possibility that some producers can work that in to their current cropping systems.

If onions are to be grown next year now is the time producers

must decide and get good quality onion sets started in Arizona. Contact the Donley County Extension Office for more information.

Additional Disaster Assistance

President George Bush announced an additional \$755 million in emergency funds for crop losses incurred in 1990, 1991 and 1992.

The application period for disaster claims on fall-seeded program crops planted in 1991 and harvested in 1992 will begin September 8th and end October 2, said Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASCS Committee.

The application period for producers with losses on other 1992 crops, and for producers with losses from 1990 and 1991 crops who did not previously receive disaster payments for those losses, will begin on October 13th and end February 12, 1993.

"Disaster assistance is available on a per-farm basis for any two years of 1990, 1991 or 1992," Harris said. "The original program provided \$955 million for either 1990 or 1991. Now, relief will also be provided for fall-seeded program crops planted in 1991 or 1992 crop losses; however, if producers received assistance for any of those years they may not receive further assistance for that crop year. Producers who receive payments for fall-seeded program crops will only be eligible for assistance for 1992 crop losses."

Producers with qualifying gross revenues of less than \$2 million per year may file claims for losses of participating and non-participating program and non program crops.

"Producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," Harris said. "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 percent. Producers with 1992 crop losses are required, under certain conditions, to purchase crop insurance for 1993."

Producers should contact the Donley County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office for additional information.

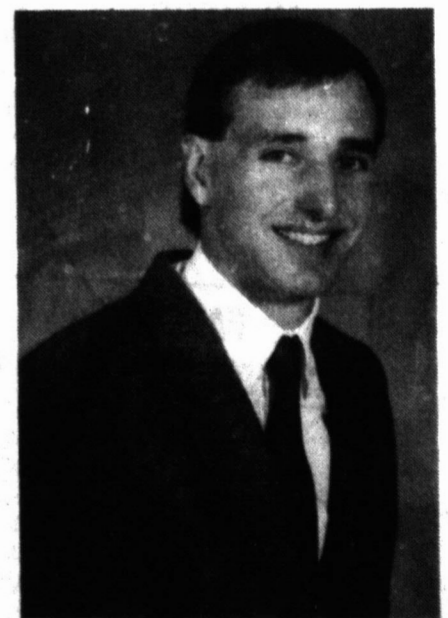
Degree Received

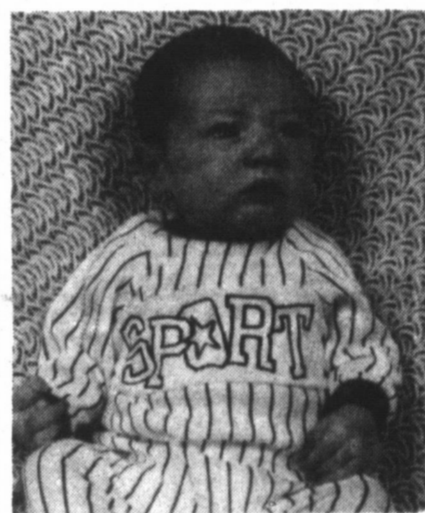

Preventing and Relieving Angina Pain

During the mid-1700s the term "angina" was first used to describe chest pain that resulted from exertion and was relieved with rest. Today angina refers to pain which results from a lack of oxygen in the heart. The delivery of oxygen from the lungs to the heart can be interrupted by blockage in heart blood vessels or by vessel spasms. If oxygen demand is great, heart tissue can be destroyed, and might lead to a heart attack.

Risk factors that may contribute to angina include smoking, lack of exercise, obesity, excess stress, high blood pressure, and high blood cholesterol. Bypass surgery may be necessary if lifestyle changes and medicines are not effective in controlling or preventing angina pain. Angina medicines include:

Nitrates: Nitroglycerin prevents and relieves chest pain by relaxing the muscles that surround blood vessels in the heart. Nitroglycerin is available as a sublingual (for under the tongue) tablet, oral tablet, oral capsule, ointment, skin patch, and a spray.

Calcium blockers: Nifedipine, nicardipine, verapamil and other calcium blockers reduce the demand for oxygen and improve blood flow in the heart.

Beta blockers: Propranolol, timolol, and other beta blockers reduce the workload of the heart and thus decrease oxygen demands.

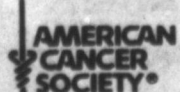

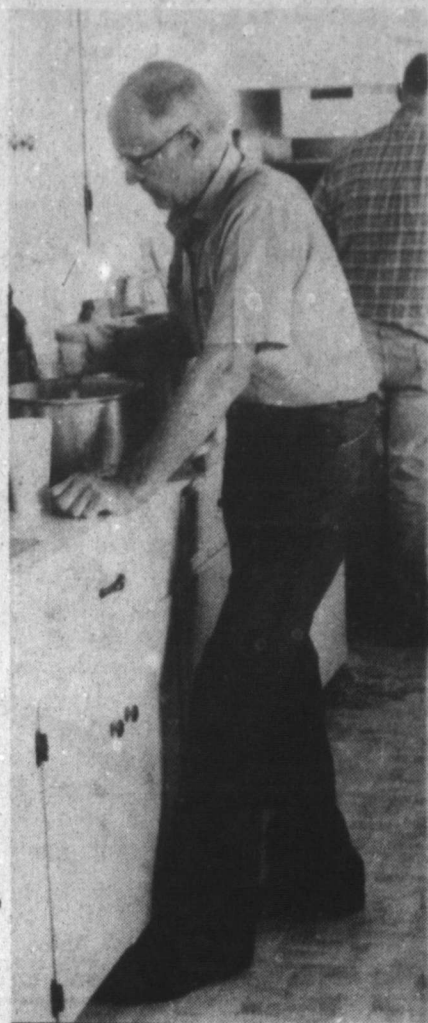

anyone to join them here at the Center from 7 till 9 p.m. every Monday evening.

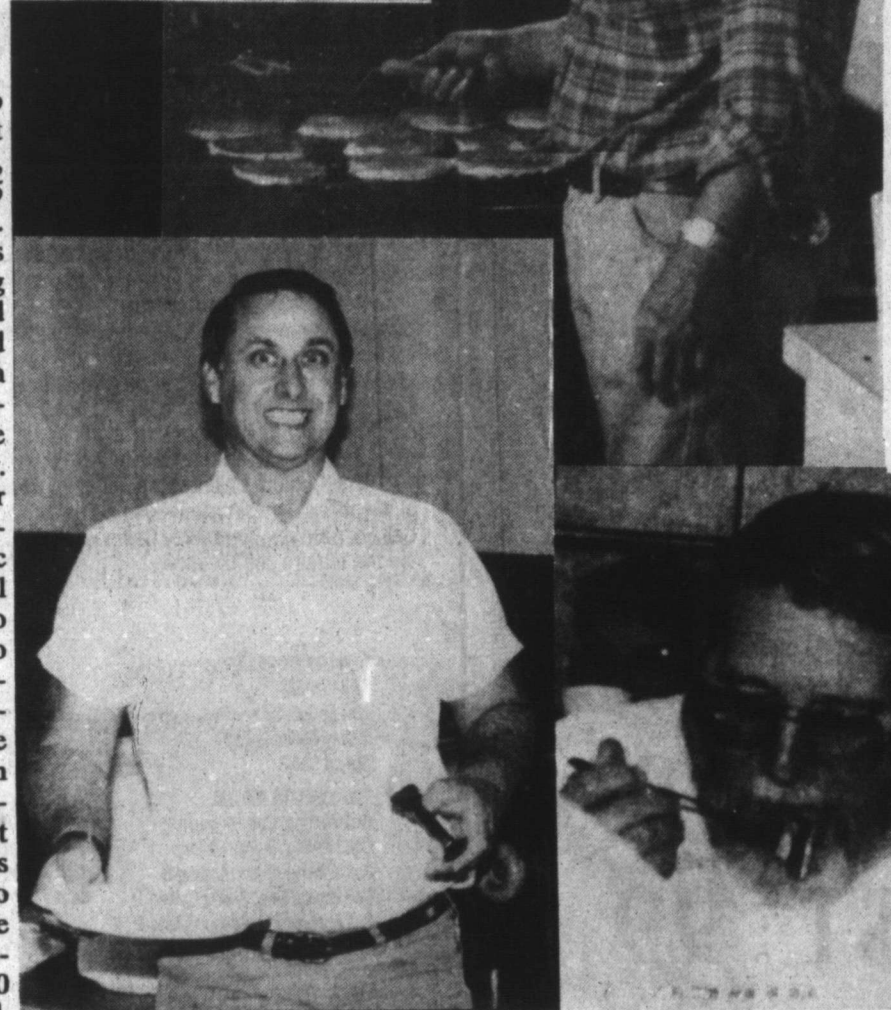

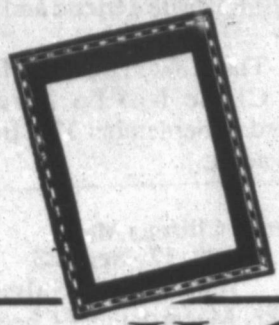

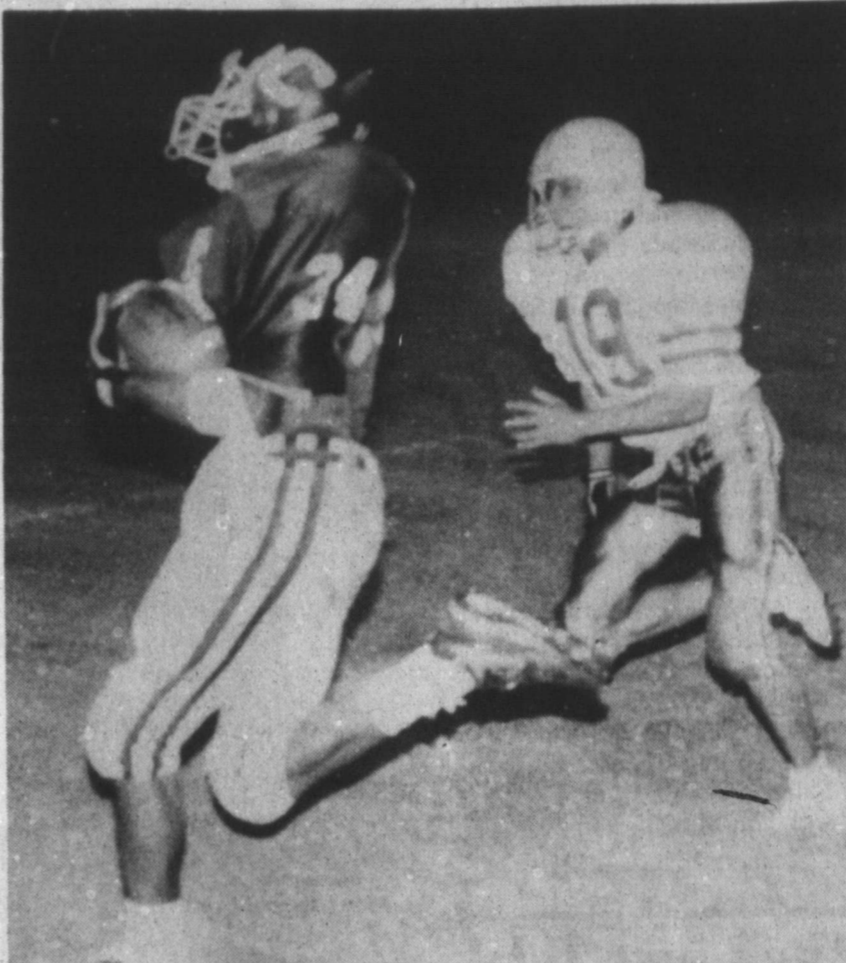

The Custom Calling Services affected by the Company's application are optional telephone service arrangements that provide the following features: Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three Way Calling, Speed Calling-8 and Speed Calling-30. Most of the Company's residence and business customers who subscribe to Custom Calling Features and Touch-tone service will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring.

It is expected that the restructuring of Custom Calling Features will result in a rate increase for approximately 2.9 million residence customers and 280,000 business customers. The reduction in rates for certain Custom Calling Services and Touch-tone Service will affect approximately 4.3 million residence customers and 1.7 million business customers.

This rate restructuring is expected to have a "revenue-neutral" effect on the Company's annual revenues. The proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$19.8 million; while the reduction in Touch-tone rates will decrease the Company's annual revenues by \$19.8 million.

This proceeding has been designated Docket No. 11382. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in this proceeding should notify the PUC as soon as possible. 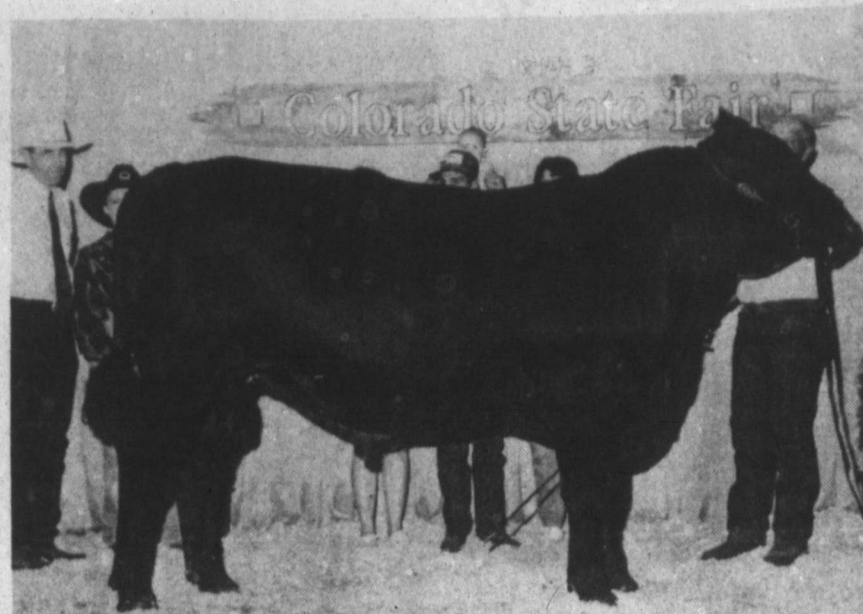

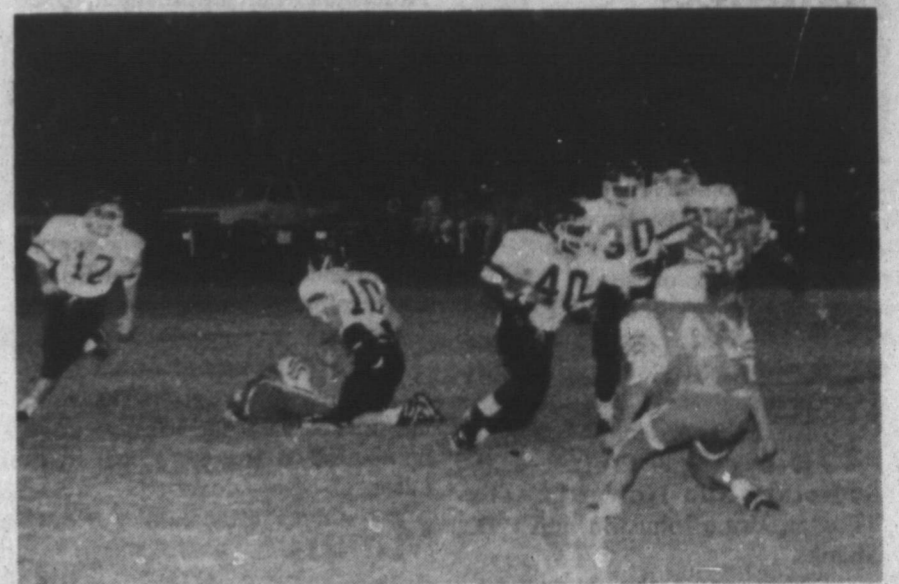

Crop Report

By Tim Trimble

Much of the cotton in the county has cutout with shedding of small bolls, flowers and squares. But, there is still some fields that are in full bloom or in the later stages of bloom. These fields are most susceptible to worm damage. Bollworm moth activity was fairly high last week which would indicate a possible hatch and worm damage for the next few weeks. Eggs and small worms are being found in fields. Again young, lush cotton is most susceptible. Many fields around Hedley seem to be in the stage mentioned above.

Aphids have crashed in most fields with the help of an excellent beneficial insect population. These beneficial may help with any worm outbreaks. Determining when and if to treat will be tough. This late in the season thresholds should be raised to 8000 to 10,000 worms per acre before treatment.

Peanuts continue to make progress. With continued changing weather patterns - protective fungicides for leaf spot may still be needed but be sure to check label for harvest interval time. Some fields are showing signs of spider mite problems. These can become big problems if conditions are right. Spider mites spread very rapidly and cause foliage and plants to die.

Headworms have been a problem in some sorghum fields. Heads should be checked until soft dough stage is reached.

Greenbugs infestations in early planted wheat have been reported from most areas of Texas Panhandle. Early infestations appear to be worse than past years. Infestations of 25 to 50 greenbugs per foot of drill row in seedling wheat may warrant treatment.

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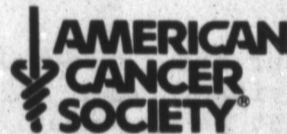
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Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has asked the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer new optional call management services called Caller Identification Service (Caller ID) and Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR).

Caller ID is a new optional phone service which allows subscribers to see the phone number and/or name of most local calls before they answer the phone. Caller ID also allows the recording of the date, time, name and/or phone number of calls. Currently, Caller ID would work only on most local calls, not long distance calls. It would also require that a separate display unit be connected to the telephone. These units that attach to the telephone will be available from various retail vendors, including Southwestern Bell, at a cost starting at approximately \$50.

Southwestern Bell is also proposing that all customers be able to "block," or stop their name/number from being transmitted and displayed on a Caller ID device, free of charge. You would have this option of "blocking" your name/number on each call free of charge. There would be no need to subscribe to this service. All customers would have this capability when Caller ID is introduced in their area.

If you want to block your name or number, you need only press *67 on your touch-tone pad (or dial 1167 from a rotary phone) before dialing the telephone number. The person you're calling would see displayed a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on their Caller ID display unit.

Southwestern Bell also proposes that qualified domestic violence and law enforcement groups have the option of free per-line blocking, or free per-call blocking.

Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR or "block the blocker") allows subscribers to automatically reject all calls that have been marked anonymous, or "blocked" by the person calling. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID Name/Number to subscribe to ACR. With ACR, your telephone will not ring if the person calling you has "blocked" his/her name or number. The person calling whose identification is blocked will receive a message to hang up and call back with caller identification unblocked. Following are the proposed monthly rates for Caller ID and ACR.

* These rates are in addition to the initial installation charges and monthly basic service rate. For residence customers, installation charges are \$2.70 per feature, with a maximum charge of \$5.40. For business customers, the charges are \$5.40 per feature, with a maximum charge of \$10.75.

** Anonymous Call Rejection is \$3 per month if purchased without Caller ID and is \$1 per month when purchased with Caller ID Name or Number.

This proceeding has been designated Docket No. 11362, and a hearing on the merits has been scheduled for November 16, 1992. The PUC has jurisdiction to consider this matter pursuant to Sections 16, 18, 37 and 38 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA). This application was filed pursuant to the provisions of the PUC's Substantive Rule 23.24. Among the issues that will be addressed in this proceeding is the legality of the Caller ID device and service under Texas wiretap laws.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. The deadline to intervene is October 26, 1992. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757.
