# **Hawkins Honored**

Dean Hawkins, a reproduction physiologist from Colorado State University began work this semester work this semester as an assistant professor of animal and range science at New Mexico State University's College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Hawkins will teach physiology of reproduction and animal physiology techniques. He also will continue his research in ovarian function in livestock.

The Clarendon native come to NMSU for a two year National Health Institute post doctoral position at CSU's animal reproduction and bio-technology lab, where he studies ovarian and anterior pituitary gland functions as they affected reproduction processes.

Hawkins is a 1980 graduate of Clarendon High School, a 1982 graduate of Clarendon College, a 1984 graduate of Texas Tech University. He completed his masters of science degree in animal reproduction from Texas Tech in 1986 and his doctoral degree in physiology of reproduction and growth from Texas A&M Univer-

sity in 1990. While at Texas A&M, he received the 1990 Dr. A.M. "Tony" Sorenson Award for outstanding teaching and research by a Ph.D. candidate. He also was named outstanding agriculture senior and outstanding animal science at Texas Tech.

Hawkins is the son of Jerry and Glenda Hawkins of Clarendon.

# **Cotton Marketing Meeting Set**

The Donley County Extension Crops Committee is sponsoring Cotton Marketing meetings starting September 24th for local cotton producers. These meetings will be informal, coffee shop type meetings, which will be held the second and fourth Thursday of September and October at the Paymaster Gin, ADM in Lelia Lake. These meetings will include a teleconference with Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension Cotton Economist. Each meeting will start at 7:30 a.m. and last approximately 1/2

The Second meeting will be Thursday, September 24th at 7:30 a.m. at the Gin in Lelia Lake. Producers interested in learning more about marketing and that plan to attend one are more of the meetings need to come by the Extension Office to pickup a packet for prior review to the meetings. The packet will help producers understand terminology and basics which will be used at the meetings. At the meetings we will be discussing why the market is where it is, what is likely to happen in the future, hedging, puts and calls, and answering producer questions.

The dates for the meetings, which will all be at Lelia Lake, starting at 7:30 a.m. are: September 24, October 8 and 22. These dates are subject to change.

This is the start of an emphasis by the committee on marketing. Beginning in 1993 the committee plans to start a marketing club to help producers become familiar and more comfortable with the use of marketing techniques.

# **Crop Report**

The potential for a good cotton crop continues to increase with the mostly warm temperatures in September thus far. For the most part insect problems are still unusually light and have been most of the summer. Some Fields already have open cotton. Heat units for cotton planted between June 1 and June 15 ranges from 2150 to 2050. When cotton reaches 2300 heat units 95 percent of the bolls should be mature bolls.

Spanish peanut harvest has started in the county and by next week harvest should be in full swing. No report of yields.

Wheat is showing signs of moisture stress and some dryland foot rot has been noticed. A good general rain would help wheat conditions at this point.



# **Wage Complaints** Filed

66More than 33,000 wage complaints have been filed against Texas employers since the Texas Employment Commission took over enforcement of the Texas Payday Law in 1989, and that is just too many," TEC Commissioner Mary Scott Nabors said. "Obviously too many Texans don't understand the law."

Nabers said she believes that either Texas employers are unaware of the various aspects of the law or employees are confused about what the law provides. "Either way, the current statewide awareness campaign initiated by

The statewide campaign by the TEC labor law division started last month with a new toll-free information line: 1-800-TEC-WAGE. The labor law division's existing phone number (1-800-342-3836) will be phased out and permanently disconnected by the end of October 1992. The awareness campaign also provides a series of educational materials pertaining to the law for employers and employees.

The outreach to workers and employers alike is necessary because so many Texans are not aware of the law and its provisions. For some time now the law has been misunderstood and this new program should resolve some of

The Texas Payday Law was created in 1915 to resolve wage disputes between employees and employers. In 1989 the Texas Legislature transferred payday law enforcement responsibility to the TEC. Since then the labor law division has received 33,061 claims. and more than 12,000 of them were filed from July 1991 to July 1992.

The labor law division has collected a total of \$ 3.9 million in unpaid wages since 1989. In the past 12 months, more than 2,000 liens have been placed on employers' properties, and today, approximately \$ 1.3 million in wages have yet to be collected.

"These statistics indicate employers might not be fully aware of the state's payday law provisions," Nabers said. "There is an obvious need to educate everyone about the law to reduce the number of claims filed and to ensure that employees are treated fairly in respect to payroll issues."

Nabers said new brochures and informational material are available to employers and employees alike. One booklet titled Surviva! Guide to the Texas Payday Law, is designed to inform employers about the wage complaint process. It explains the law in simple terms and includes a stepby-step guide for dealing with wage complaints.



Stimulant Medicines for ADHD Treatment

ADHD or attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder is a condition that affects approximately three percent of all children in the United States. According to an article in Patient Care, a child must display some difficulty with three dimensions of behavior in order for ADHD diagnosis to be made properly. These are hyperactivity, inattention, and impulsivity. All must be present for a minimum of six months and must have started before the child turned seven. Studies have not shown a direct relationship between hyperactivity and consumption of food additives or refined sugar. Some evidence suggests that there may be a genetic link between ADHD children and their parents. According to the Patient Care article, significant exposure to alcohol or cigarette smoke prior to birth may increase a child's risk for ADHD.

Stimulant medicines such as methylphenidate, dextroamphetamine, and pemoline have been used with success in many ADHD children. In some children these medicines have decreased impulsiveness and aggressiveness. Some children also have experienced an improvement in attention span, handwriting, and compliance with instructions from adults.







Most of the Company's residence and business customers who subscribe to Custom Calling Features and Touch-tone service will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring.

It is expected that the restructuring of Custom Calling Features will result in a rate increase for approximately 2.9 million residence customers and 280,000 business customers. The reduction in rates for certain Custom Calling Services and Touch-tone Service will affect approximately 4.3 million residence customers and 1.7 million business customers.

This rate restructuring is expected to have a "revenue-neutral" effect on the Company's annual revenues. The proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$19.8 million; while the reduction in Touch-tone rates will decrease the Company's annual revenues by \$19.8 million.





# ANNOUNCEMENT OF DIRECTOR ELECTION

An election of a soil and water conservation district director to serve in Zone 4 on the Donley County Soil & Water Conservation District is scheduled for October 5th in the Soil Conservation Office announced Dick Bode, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 7:30 p.m.. Bobby Boston is currently holding this position.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil & water conservation district director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal Qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil & water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents and be actively engage in farming or ranching. Soil & water conservation district directors serve four year terms of office.

Zone 4 of the district includes the area east of F.M. 291 to its intersection with F.M. 1260; then south and west to its intersection with F.M. 1755; then south to its intersection with U.S. Highway 287; then north along S.H. 70.



The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and has the authority to enter into working agreements with these agencies to carry out its purposes.







# Local ASCS Staff Meets With Presidential Counsellor

Clayton Yeutter, Counsellor to the President for Domestic Policy, met with local employees of the Agricultural Stabilization and conservation Service and agriculture leaders from across Texas. Mr. Yeutter coordinates all domestic policy activities for the President through the operations of a new Policy Coordinating Group (PCG). The PCG is the domestic equivalent of the National Security Council. Prior to coming to the PCG, Yeutter served as Secretary of Agriculture. While at Agriculture he was actively involved in farm legislation and in negotiations to open export markets for American farm products throughout the world.

Secretary Yeutter met with the group at the Texas State Conference of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service recently held in Lubbock, Texas. The training conference was designed to train local employees in program administration and to improve the effectiveness of the farmer-elected County Committee System.

Jerry D. Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee, stated that Clayton Yeutter has consistently worked to expand the role of U.S. Agriculture in the world. Domestic policy involves agriculture in every way. Secretary Yeutter's visit with ASCS committees and employees demonstrates the place farm programs have in our domestic policy.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is the United State Department of Agriculture agency that administers farm programs passed by Congress. This includes programs that effect many local farmers and ranchers.

Chairman Harris noted that this meeting brought together local agriculture leaders and Administration policymakers for training and evaluation of the effectiveness of current programs. The conference helped find ways to improve the service provided through policy decisions and improve the knowledge of ASCS employees.

# For Safety-Sake

66If only." Two words. Two tiny, simple words. "If only he'd had a role bar on that tractor," a wife laments. "If only our boy hadn't been playing in the grain bin." a father cries. "If only, if only, if only .. "Say it 1,000 times or more and you begin to grasp how much farm related fatalities cost our nation in one year alone.

President Bush has proclaimed that September 21-28, 1992, as National Farm Safety Week, the 49th annual observance.

You don't have to die. Know your machines limitations, know your physical limitations, use the buddy system, and use common sense. Hardly one farmer can say he hasn't done something that he knew wasn't safe when he did it, in the interest of saving some time or effort. For many families the moment of risk turns into a lifetime of heartache.

Please be careful - we need you! All the safety seminars, instruction manuals, and warning labels in the world can't influence a farmer as much as a simple, sincere plea from his young child or concerned wife. We, the Clarendon FFA Chapter suggest you sit down and write a letter to your busy farmer in your family. Tell him, how you feel about him and why it's important that he be especially careful this harvest season, and in the seasons to come. Words don't always come easy, so we have prepared a suggest letter. Just fill in the blanks and tear out the letter, and hand it to your loved one as he heads for the field.

# **Emergency** Loans Available

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rain and hail are being accepted at the Farmers Home administration (FmHA) office located in Clarendon, FmHA County Supervisor Morgan said. Donley County is one of 24 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the excessive rain and hail.

Morgan said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$ 500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Morgan said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans

under this emergency designation will be accepted until May 10, 1993 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Morgan said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which the U.S. citizens hold a majority interest. The FmHA office in Clarendon is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through



Many more farm and ranch residents and workers were killed or seriously injured in home, recreation and roadway accidents. An undetermined number of people involved in agricultural work suffered job-related illnesses known to cause disability or death; and





In conjunction with National Farm Safety Week, September 20-26, 1992, the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture, has again selected the Farm Safety for "Just Kids" program as its public service project for 1992-1993, through its public service project for 1992-1993, through its Wellness Program's Public Safety Campaign, according to Jacqueline Morgan, FmHA County Supervisor for Clarendon, Claude and Wellington.

Farm safety for "Just Kids" is a non-profit organization dedicated to educating parents and children about farm injury prevention. This organization stresses raising awareness levels regarding on-farm hazards.

Each year, farm accidents result in the death of 300 young people and 5,000 serious injuries. The primary age group effected is 5 to 14 years old.

Educational material, including a film, warning decals, and children's workbooks will be distributed by FmHA personnel throughout Texas. Over

13,000 FmHA employees nationwide will help spread the farm safety message to schools and the general public.

A Cornell University study reveals that children bear the brunt of farm accidents when the injury rate is adjusted to account for the time each worker is in the workplace. In 1988, 35.6 percent of farm accident victims were children raging in age from 5 to 14 years. There are three factors today which may be aggravating the dangers for children: (1)Increased mechanization; (2)New safety hazards-50 percent of the ATV accidents (900 deaths over five years) have involved children; and (3) Stressful economic conditions.

"We believe Farmers Home Administration in Texas can make a tremendous contribution to this organization in reaching thousands otherwise been missed." Morgan said.
