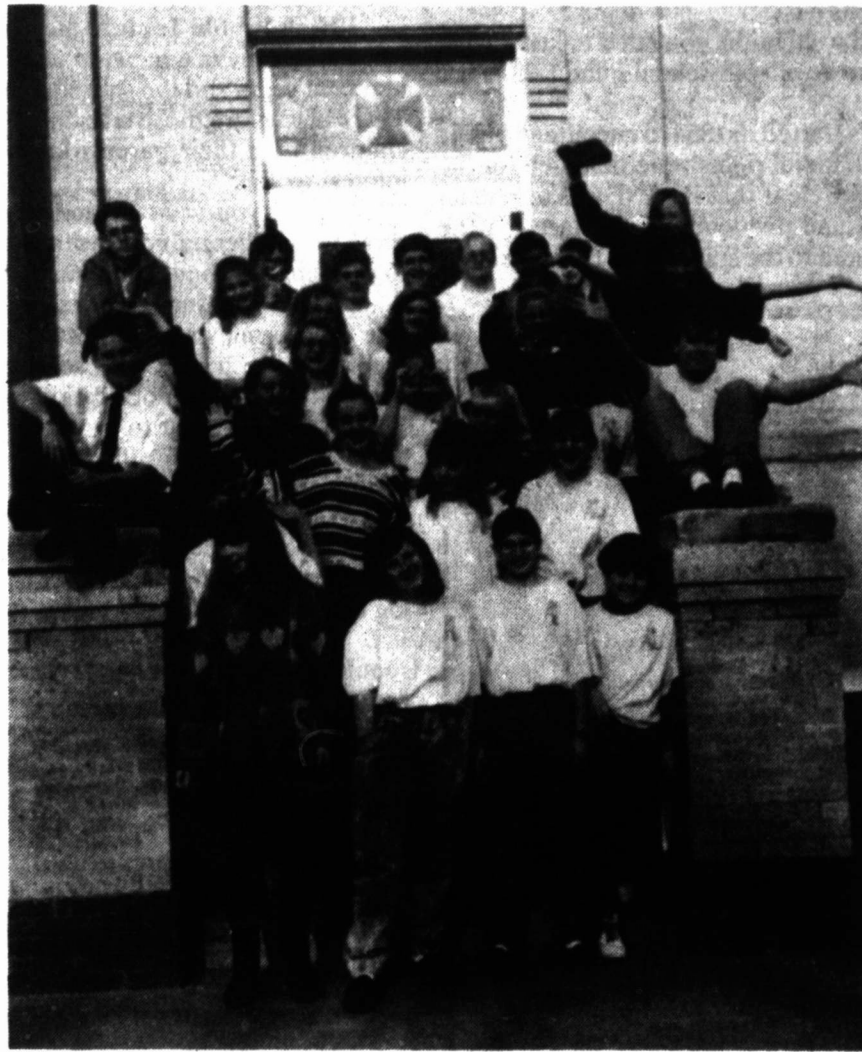
Angel Tree Planned

The Donley County Soil Conservation office has received information from the Forest Service regarding the trees that will be available for the following year.

In Evergreens we they have available the following: Afghan Pine, Arizona Cypress, Austrian Pine, Ponderosa Pine, Eastern Red Cedar, Rocky Mt. Juniper, Colorado Blue Spruce, Pinon Pine, Scotch Pine, S.W. Pine. In Hardwoods they have the following: Catalpa, Cottonwood, Desert Willow, Green Ash, Honeylocust, Little Walnut, Osage Orange, Pecan (native), Red Oak, Russian Olive, Siberian Elm, Golden Willow, Hackberry, Lombardy Poplar, Lacebark Elm, Bur Oak, Mulberry (fruiting). The following Scrubs are available: Nanking, Cherry, Native Plum, Sandcherry, Skunkbush Sumac, Caragana, Cotonaster, Honeysuckle, Chokecherry, Lilac, and European Sage.

You probably have already noticed that they are offering a new type of evergreen this year, which is the S.W. White Pine. This pine looks somewhat like a Ponderosa Pine. When this tree is mature, it makes beautiful wreathes with a bushy type bough. It is also very heat and drought tolerant.

Some of the trees sell out very quickly, so they urge you to place your order now. Payment and delivery will not be until March of next year. If you have any questions please call the Donley County Soil Conservation office, 874-3576.

Clarendon FFA Begins Fruit Sales

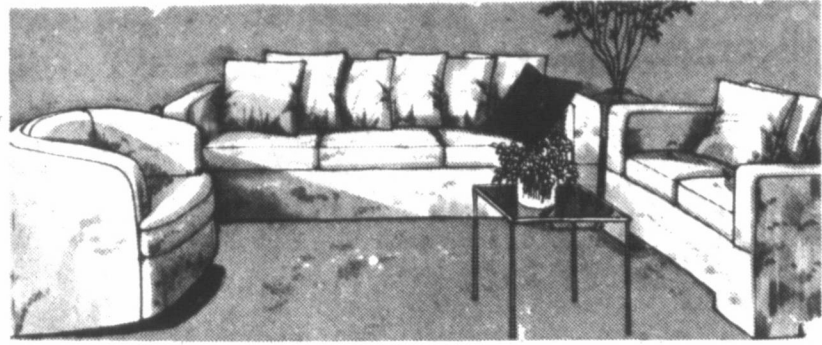
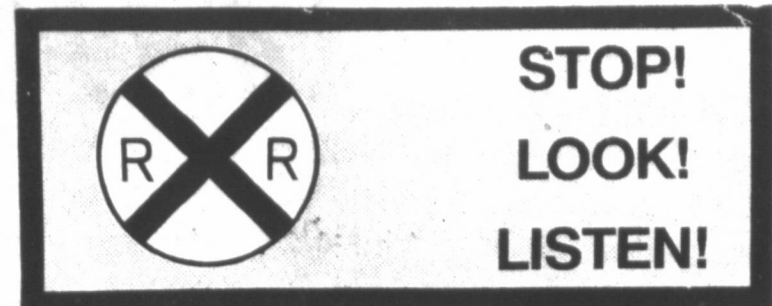

Dear Editor,

It would be inappropriate for me to begin this article without first acknowledging the group of outstanding Legislators represented West Texas and the Panhandle areas. Today, our hope of protection from big city factions is the strong positions held by State Board of Education District 15 state senators and representatives looking out for us in Austin.

With that in mind, let's look at what has happened to the overall state budget recently:

Year	State Population	State Budget
1972-73	12,019,000	7,900,000,000
1990-91	17,400,000	46,900,000,000
1992-93	17,810,000	62,000,000,000*

* Allowing for inflation and population growth the state budget for 1992-93 should be about \$30 billion, figuring from 1971-72.

According to Forbes Magazine, Texas leads the nation in new state-level jobs, a total of 14,000 in the last 12 month.

What we can see from the above table is the Texas state budget for the last biennium increased nearly one third. The increase for the last biennium was nearly twice the value of the total state budget in 1972-73. These figures do not include "mandated without funding" laws which have required school districts, cities and counties to implement and fund with local tax dollars. Apparently, spending is out of control at the state level. Our hope is that our legislators will protect us from undesirable proposals.

Having said that and realizing the culprit in state finance certainly is not public school finance, what happens next?

To help you better understand the situation, you need to know what the permanent School Fund (PSF) and Available School Fund (ASF) are and how they affect you.

The Permanent School Fund was started in 1854 to encourage public education. In 1876, certain lands and mineral rights were designed for the PSF. Our founding fathers made it quite clear that the PSF was to remain intact. They required that all interest and dividends to be placed in the Available School Fund and be distributed to the students in Texas on a pro rata basis.

The first raid on the PSF came in 1861 when funds were used to purchase railroad bonds to support the war effort. It nearly broke the fund.

Then, in 1991, Comptroller John Sharp organized another raid by attempting to take all the capital gains from the fund to solve to school finance problems. This attack was repelled by a State Board of Education compromise.

The government has a plan in the summer of 1992 which included taking the ASF and redistribution it according to those with "good" schools. Today, this fund is distributed equally to all school districts on a per student basis. Frankly, we would rather see the ASF untouched because our section of the state's experience with redistribution has not been good.

If any of these raids had worked, it would have been another method of moving the cost of public education to the local taxpayer. The PSF must be protected. If it is lost, the following table indicated a sampling of how local taxes would be increased in some selected towns:

Abernathy	+ 12.5
Amarillo	+ 23.5
Lubbock	+ 22.9
Big Spring	+ 26.8
Plainview	+ 35.0
Odessa	+ 21.1
Hale Center	+ 44.0

So, the message is that we must do all we can to protect the PSF, or if we do not, local taxes will increase substantially. The other message is that with a 33 percent increase in state spending in the last biennium, the obvious way to pay for school finance needs is through decreased spending in other areas.

High Profile Topic in November

Everyone in education understands what has happened to the family in recent years and the subsequent effect on the education of our children. There always are those who believe they know more about what is good for children than their parents know. The following questions should be of interest to you:

1. Do you want community and school based clinic mandated to provide confidential contraception, sexual counseling and abortion referral to your child without your consent?

2. Do you want the Texas Education Code amended with a "sneak rule" to permit excused absences of your child requesting or receiving "reproductive health care services" and to prohibit the requirement of parental consent or notification regarding these school absences?

3. Do you want to promote statewide acceptance of an "adolescent bill of rights" which affirms teens' rights to sex education, confidential contraceptive services and abortion without parental knowledge?

4. Do you want the Texas Education Agency and Education Service Center around the state to use your tax dollar to provide "technical assistance" emphasizing "dealing with the opposition" with "opposition" meaning caring parents?

Regardless of political philosophy, your answer to these questions should be an emphatic "NO!" If your answer is "NO!" then you need to be concerned about what is coming before the State Board of Education in November. You, as parents, want to be responsible for your child. You do not want a state agency or bureaucratic system to take over. This is a local problem that should be handled by local citizens, in cooperation with parents.

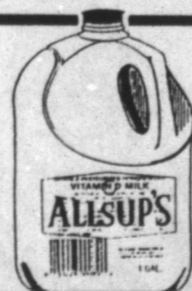

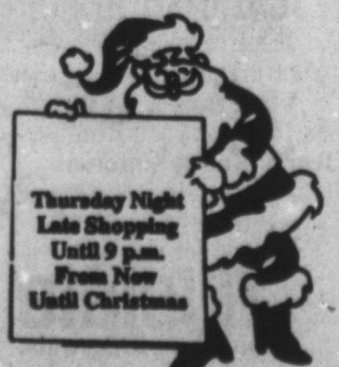

DS1 Service

DS1 Service is an intraLATA Private Line Service which provides a dedicated, high capacity channel which may be used for simultaneous two-way transmission of voice data or other digitally encoded customer information signals. DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts. If the customer selects an OPP, additional DS1 Local Loops may be ordered and installed at the Additional DS1 Local Loop rate between any SWC and CDL covered by the OPP, at any time during the term of that OPP.

DS1 Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DS1 signal between Serving Wire Centers. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

DS1 Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DS1 Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DS1 Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the DS1 Transport.

Digital Data Service

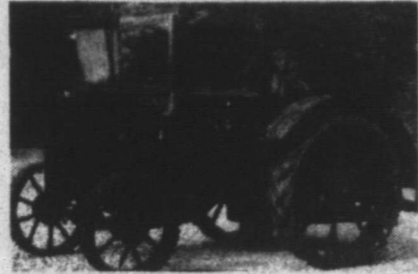

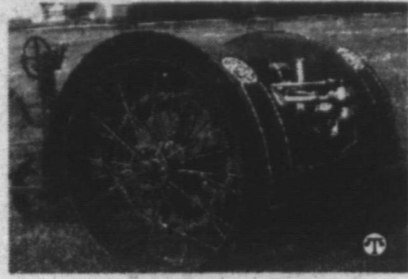
