Program Scheduled on Drugs

Twenty-one Minutes can make a difference," says Jerry Pipes when referring to his program. Pipes, based in Lewisville, Texas, and serving as a part of the President's War on Drugs, has spoken to more than two million students and parents throughout the United States and in foreign countries. His humorous, entertaining, but hard-hitting approach speaks clearly to his audience, this putting him in constant demand for assemblies, banquets and various conferences.

The vital question addressed by Pipes in his presentation is: "How much is it worth to me, how much am I willing to pay to be accepted?" His target group covers those in middle school, junior high and high school. It also includes parents, administrators, teachers and the business community.

During the day Pipes focuses his attention on the students. Evenings are given to gatherings of parents and other interested adults. To these he speaks regarding their role in fighting the war on drugs, understanding students in the 90s and building self-esteem within young people.

Following a program in San Bernadino, California, the *San Bernadino Sun* contained a story featuring quotes from some of the students who attended. Response was positive. "I think he gives you a lot to think about. Like when you and your friends you and your friends are doing something, you don't realize you're doing it to be accepted," said a 15-year-old. "Really made me think about how my future will end up if I follow my friends," commented another.

Some acknowledged that the presentation taught them to accept their individuality. "It makes you realize you should be yourself all the time and not give in to what other people say," said one.

Pipes, 35, hold a BS and MA degree in education. He will present his program at 1:00 p.m., October 22, at the High School auditorium.

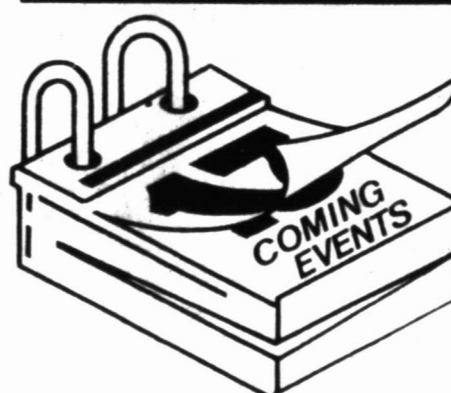

Halloween Safety Tips Given

"Trick or Treat" are familiar words that will soon usher in another Halloween season. Halloween is a time when children will be distracted by the excitement of the season, a time when parents should take steps to ensure their children's safety by instructing them in the do's and don'ts of Halloween.

Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, says, "It's a good idea to insure costumes fit well, not too tight or too loose, causing a child to trip and fall. Painting the child's face with make-up is preferable to wearing a mask, which obstructs vision. Make sure all costumes are made of non-flammable material, especially wigs and masks. Young children should always be accompanied by an adult. If you do not accompany your child, instruct him to go out with a group and not to stop at homes which are dark. Costumes should be reflective or a piece of reflective tape placed on the costume and bags. Everyone should carry a flashlight."

Major Cawthon went on to say that all candy should be taken home and checked prior to anything being eaten and if a suspicious treat is found contact the police. For those who plan to participate in handing out treats, turn on your porch light to let children know they are welcome and remove obstacles from the front yard that could cause a child to trip and fall.

Keep lighted jack-o-lanterns or candles away from steps or the front door where a child's costume could be ignited by a flame.

Major Cawthon advises motorists traveling into residential areas, to drive with extreme caution and be watchful of children darting into the street.

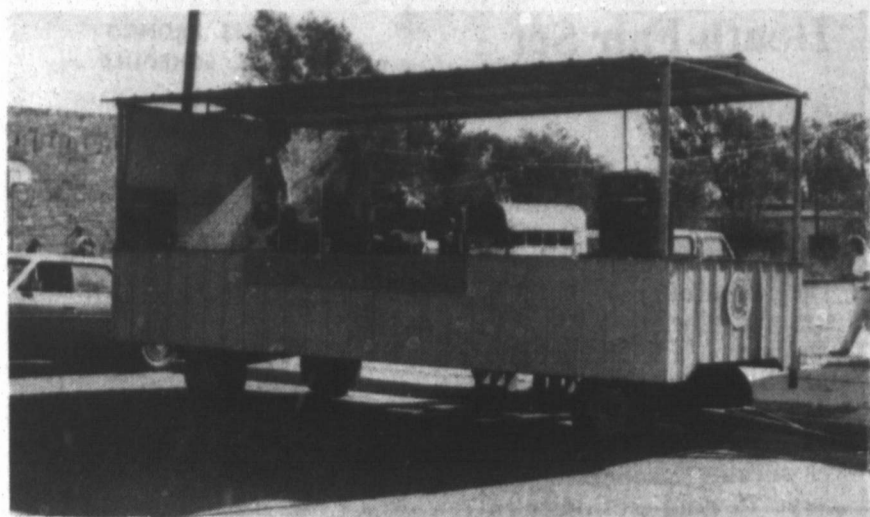
Exercise Caution With Stimulant Laxatives

There are five types of laxative products commonly used to prevent and/or correct irregularity or bowel movement problems. These types include the saline laxatives, bulk-forming laxatives, stool softeners, lubricant laxatives, and the stimulants.

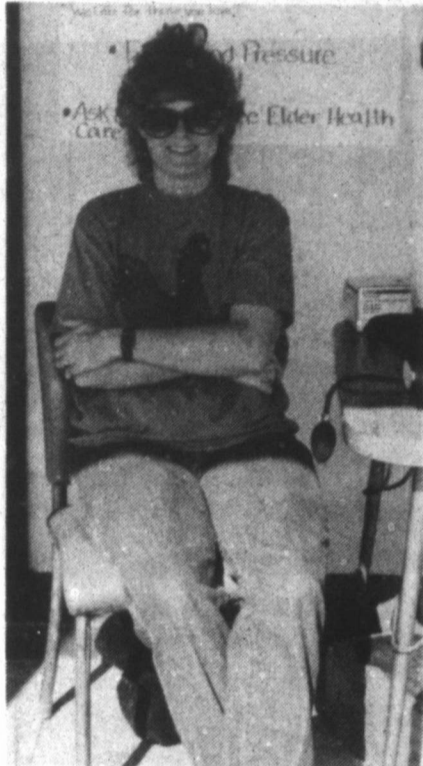
Stimulant laxatives, as their name implies, stimulate or irritate specific nerves located in the intestinal tract. The stimulation usually results in bowel movements within 6 to 12 hours, although some stimulants, such as bisacodyl suppositories, may produce results in 15 to 20 minutes. One of the most common uses of stimulant laxatives is to prepare patients for surgery or x-rays by evacuating the large intestines.

Stimulant laxatives which are extracted from plants include cascara sagrada, rhubarb, and senna. Rhubarb and senna contain an acid which causes an acid urine to turn yellow or brown and an alkaline urine to turn red or violet. The discoloration usually is harmless. A popular over-the-counter stimulant laxative is phenolphthalein. This laxative is sold in the form of candy and chewing gum. Excessive use can decrease calcium and vitamin D absorption. Excessive use of stimulant laxatives can result in severe cramping, dehydration, decreased absorption of protein, and a loss of certain body minerals, which can result in disturbances in metabolism.

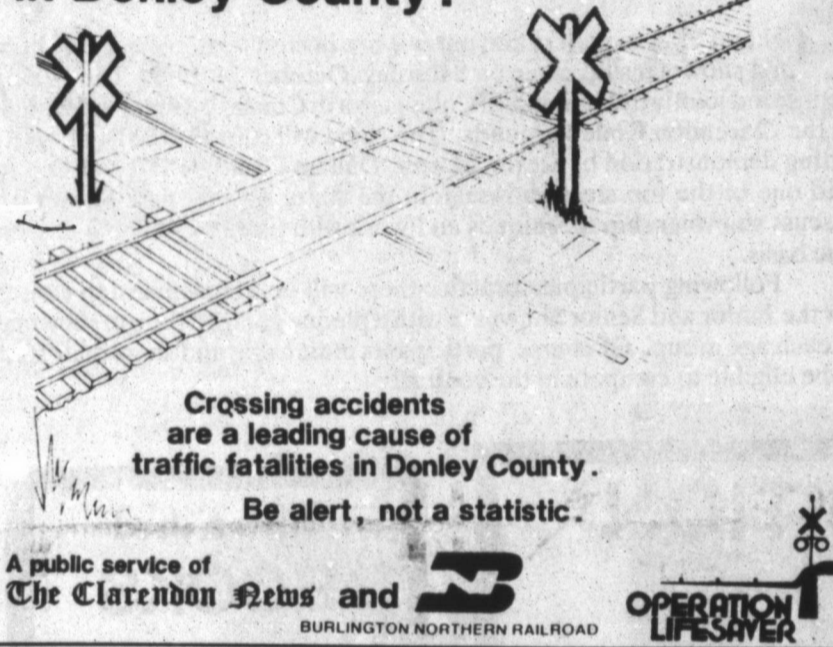

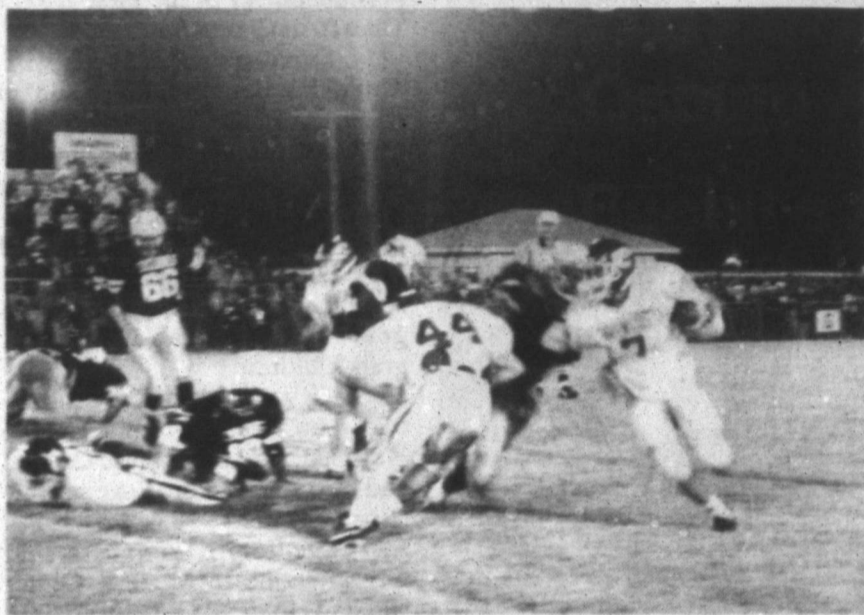

Marketing Cotton Using Farm Program

By Tim Trimble

As the Adjusted World Price (AWP) continues to fall, contracts start being offered and the cotton market begins to show some strengthening. Producers should be studying local ASCS options very closely for opportunities to increase price received for cotton. Producers have the option of contracting cotton, putting it in the loan, receiving a POP payment, or selling cotton on cash market. The last few weeks the AWP has continued to drop which in turn is increasing the potential POP payment or loan Deficiency Payment. This could be as much as \$1.15 the next few weeks.

This along with other strategies will be discussed at the fourth and final marketing meeting at the Lelia Lake Gin on October 22. The meeting will start at 7:30 a.m. and will again include a teleconference with Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension Cotton Economist; Dr. Jackie Smith, Lubbock area Extension Economist and Drew Thornberry, County Director of ASCS office will be on hand to answer producer questions. Dr. Smith will also discuss a new Extension Computer program that can be used to help make marketing decisions.

Producers need to be working with the ASCS office very closely right now, not only to make sure they are in compliance but to take advantage of the best options for marketing cotton.

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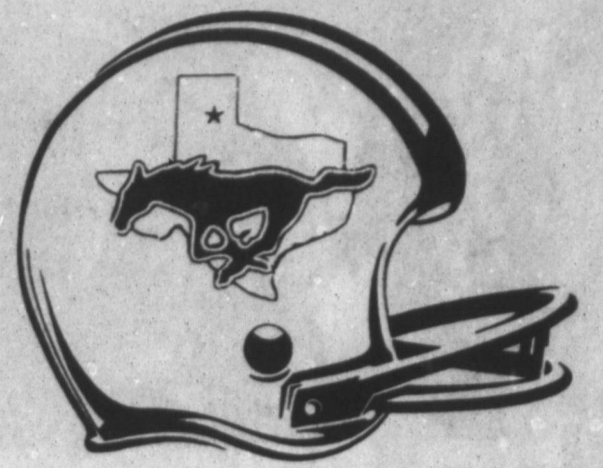

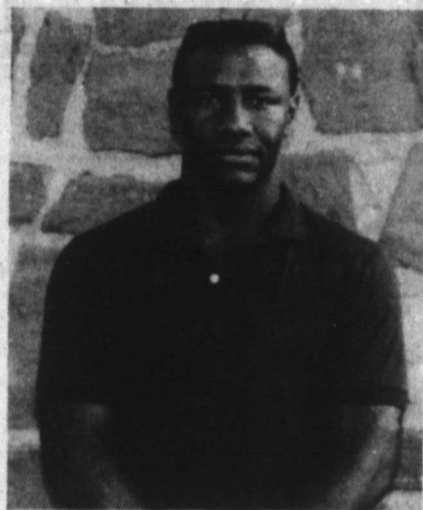

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The Guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.

Age:
35 to 40-One Baseline mammogram
40 to 50-A mammogram every 1 or 2 years
Over 50 -Yearly mammogram

FHA Rural Rental Housing Assists Rural Texas

Neal Sox Johnson, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), is pleased to announce that the Texas FmHA used 105 percent of the State's 28 million dollar allocation for new construction multi-family housing to assist the housing needs of rural Texans in the 1992 fiscal year.

These funds will make available approximately 1031 new multi-family housing units and approximately 184 repaired apartment units for families and elderly persons living in rural areas of Texas.

The Texas FmHA also obligated labor housing grants in the amount of 473 thousand dollars to complete renovation to 246 existing labor housing apartments located in McAllen and 289 existing units in Weslaco, Texas. This is in addition to previous loans and grants made to these projects totaling more than 10.5 million dollars in previous fiscal years.

Housing preservation Grants (HPS) totaling over 1 million dollars have been obligated to benefit approximately 201 households of low and very low income home owners in rural areas of Texas. These grants will allow rural house owners to bring their homes up to minimum housing quality standards and aid in energy efficiency.

Also, a Self-Help Technical Assistance Grant totaling more than 112 thousand dollars was obligated to assist 15 families in the construction of their own homes in Mission, Texas. President Bush's budget for fiscal year 1993, as recently approved by Congress, has authorized 326 million dollars nationally for multi-family housing to continue to provide funding to meet the housing to continue to provide funding to meet the housing needs of rural Americans. Texas FmHA looks forward to an allocation of approximately 30 million dollars for assisting rural rental residents in their housing needs in fiscal year 1993.

The Farmers Home Administration assist rural America by guaranteeing private sector loans and by providing temporary, supervised direct loans to farm and housing borrowers who have a reasonable chance for success, and whose current needs cannot be met at reasonable rates and terms by commercial sources. The Agency is committed to excellence in providing its services.

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Ag Lenders Announce New Rates, Programs

Austin- For nearly 30,000 farmers, ranchers and rural homeowners in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas who do business with Federal Land Bank Association (FLBAs), October brought good news: the third rate reduction in their variable rate FLBA loans this year. The 8.50% rate became effective October 1 on both existing and new variable rate loans.

"The favorable interest rate climate and the FLBAs' strong performance this year combined to make the reduction possible," said Michael R. Davis, president of the Farm Credit Bureau of Texas.

Interest rates for new fixed rate loans of 3, 5, 10 and 15 years will also fall later this month. In addition, a new 7-year fixed rate loan is scheduled for introduction this fall.

The FLBAs have also announced new fixed rate financing for rural property improvements. Under the "improvement loan program", borrowers can finance such things as home construction and remodeling, fencing, pasture improvements, land clearing, irrigation and sprinkler systems, and repair of livestock, poultry and fish-producing facilities.

"Many rural property owners

have told us they've put off making improvements to their property due in part to lack of affordable financing", said Davis. "We hope this new program will encourage the enhancement and development of rural real estate."

Priced weekly, improvement loans were offered at 7.45% during the week of October 5.

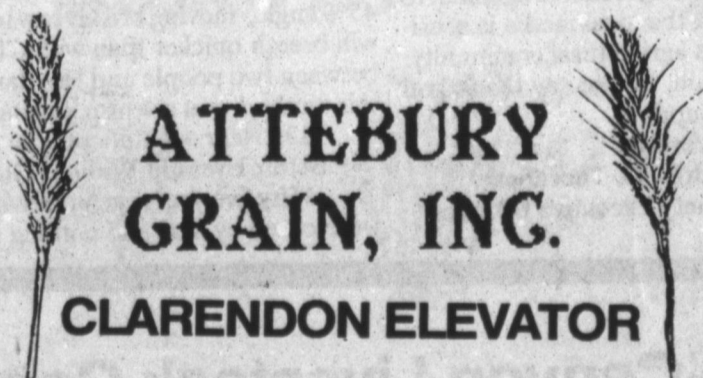

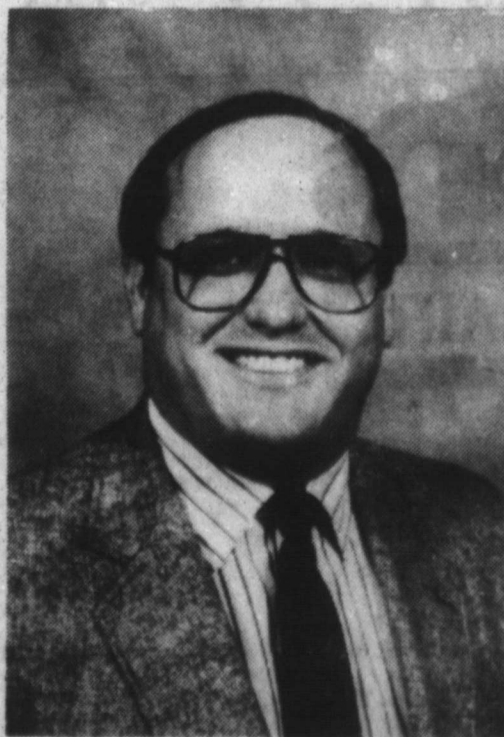

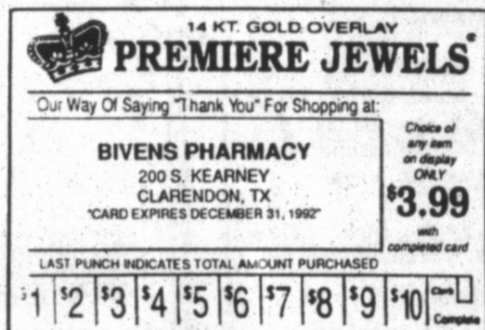

Bourland Visits

Jimmy Bourland, an old time resident of Clarendon, visited in the newspaper office last week. Bourland graduated from Clarendon High School in 1936.

The Bourland family established their home in Clarendon in 1913, one block south of the Catholic Church. William M. Bourland (Jimmy's father) married Elizabeth Witt, January 1, 1900 at Duncan, Indian Territory, Oklahoma. Children born to this union were William, Neva L., Lacy N., Ralph, Lotta, Albert (Jack), Joe, Fred, George and Jimmy.

Jimmy served as a Chief Pharmacist Mate in World War II. In 1940, he received his R.N. degree from Belview Hospital in New York, City. Later, he received his B.S. from North Texas State. He received his doctor of medicine from the University of Mexico. After receiving his degree he practiced medicine in a small village in the mountains one or two miles beyond the airport at Cuernavaca Morelos, Mexico. Jimmy told of many hardships he had while in the villages, of long hours and of some of the not traditional medicines and techniques that were used while in Mexico. In 1988, he began writing a book on the remedies which were not traditional medicines. If his book is ever published it will be called "Acid Addict" by Ned Home Patch. Bourland said that he will not sell his book for profit, it is only being published to benefit the public. The book will be dedicated to the mother of Bill (Willie) Ray. Ray worked many years for Clifford's Grocery Store.

Some of the remedies that will be in his book are:

1. Mother of Vinegar (water & sugar, boiled and brewed from apple peels, potatoes, rice, or raisins) is good for dressing on open sores or wounds. Place a thin layer of mother of vinegar on wound, milk out air bubbles, be careful and stick good. It will kill bacteria underneath and won't slide. Also excellent for diapheria, put in baby bottle, will not harm child.

2. To wash a wound, use no soap, use 1 part hydrogen peroxide and 9 parts water, or even better, clean or boil water with teaspoon of bleach in water, pour two feet up and let it flush wound out, and if its a minor thing, sprinkle a ground up aspirin on it and keep it dry, with no dressing.

If it is a more serious wound rinse clean rags, to be sure no detergent is in them. Boil rags and dry out by drying or putting them in microwave and bundle around the injured spot and keep it wet day and night with diluted vinegar (one part vinegar and nine parts boiled cooled water) Bourland has used this for 38 years.

3. Instead of trying to lower fever, find the cause and heat that part of the body.

4. For infections of the urine, take 2 - 500 mg Vitamin C tablets, three times a day with food, but none of Vitamin C that is fixed up to not hurt the stomach.

5. Infection of the throat - get a 2 oz. dark glass bottle with eye dropper cap, and put pure glycerin in bottle, put 6 drops of tincture of iodine, shake like paint, let stand over night and protect from extra light, moisture and dust. This can be used to the last drop.

Lying down on your back, head way back, put 3 drops on the throat, gargle as long as can (don't get on tongue or teeth) splash up behind the nose and adnoide. Then swallow if not bother by stomach ulcers. Do this four times a day if you have very much infection. Taper off as throat improves.

6. For puncture wound - make it bleed as much as you can, then heat under hot water facet or heat lamp without burning. If object was dirty, heat at least thirty minutes.

7. For bruises - apply constant pressure over entire area for a least 5 minutes, if blood slow to clot, keep on longer; then massage toward the heart - not a single stroke in the opposite direction.

8. For dust in eyes - boil a pint of distilled water, cool it in 1 drop vinegar. Use two or three drops in eye to wash dust out. This solution can also be used as nose drops.

9. For Varicose veins in pregnancy - do daily bicycle exercises and whatever the situation, as long as there are no tender spots in the veins, massage upwards from ankle to groin several times a day.

10. For toxemia of pregnancy - Vitamin C and penicillin has always worked nicely. If already started in labor, block with Demerol.

11. For Any child that is not breathing - instead of mouth to mouth respiration, grab the child by the nap of the neck in the palm of left hand, index finger on one mastoid area and thumb on the other, nest the lower end of the thighs in your right hand, run a finger or two between the legs, use other fingers to clap around each leg, turn the kid with head down at a 45% angle. Start toward the floor briskly then turn head up, butt down at a 45% angle, moving briskly toward the floor. Each time stop abruptly, child will breath quicker than with CPR with less danger of transferring germs between two people and less danger of too much pressure on tiny lungs. By this method, you are also moving blood.

12. Near sighted people read book by William Horation Bates, "Better Eyesight Without Glasses".

Fifty five years ago at Belview in New York, City, nearly all infections were cured by heat and nothing else and it will still work.

Make Plans For Winter Driving

According to local safety officials, now is the time to think about winter snow and ice and the fact that they pose special problems for even the most experienced driver.

Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock, stated, "Winter driving is treacherous because it's so unpredictable. Fog could be over the next hill, a patch of ice on an overpass, or someone in front of you on a snow-packed road goes into a skid. However, if drivers are armed with a few basic rules for winter driving, the risk of collision can be lowered."

Probably, the most basic driving rule of all is to adjust your driving to the current conditions. If all drivers follow that one rule, collisions year round could be reduced dramatically. Major Cawthon advised there are two general winter driving rules which could help keep drivers out of trouble on hazardous roads: **Rule No. 1 - Drive smoothly.** Anytime you are on a slick surface you must maintain traction. Any jerky movement can upset that traction causing loss of control. So every touch of the brakes, every turn of the wheel, every move to the accelerator must be gentle and gradual. **Rule No. 2 - Stay Alert.** The slicker the surface, the farther down the road you must look, because it will take you longer to stop. Here is a good rule-of-thumb. Generally, allow double your normal stopping distance for wet roads, triple it on snow-packed roads, and even more on ice.

Winter driving problems, if they do happen, usually arrive in the form of a skid. First, it should be noted that skids don't just happen, they are caused. Hit the brakes or accelerate too hard, turn the wheel too fast and suddenly you have lost both traction and control. This is a scary, helpless feeling that most of us have felt, at sometime.

When asked about skid recovery, major Cawthon explained, "Back off the accelerator, stay off the brakes, and steer the car in the direction you want the car to go. Use gentle, steady motions when turning the wheel. Turning too much or too fast can worsen the situation. Remember, on wet or icy roads, your brakes can be your worst enemy."

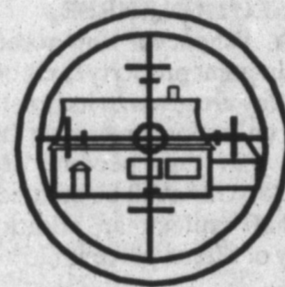
When the road is wet or icy, it takes more time and distance to do everything. So allow more time to

stop, turn or whatever else you want to do. It's critical that you increase that space between you and the vehicle ahead. Major Cawthon said, "You need to allow two to three times more following distance when the road is hazardous than when it's dry. This additional distance gives you time to react safely to a situation once you have identified it."

Finally, from what we've seen, winter driving demands that drivers use common sense and change our regular driving habits to an "easy does it" way of driving. We need to allow plenty of space around us and plenty of time to get to our destination. With these thoughts in mind, together we can make winter driving safer.

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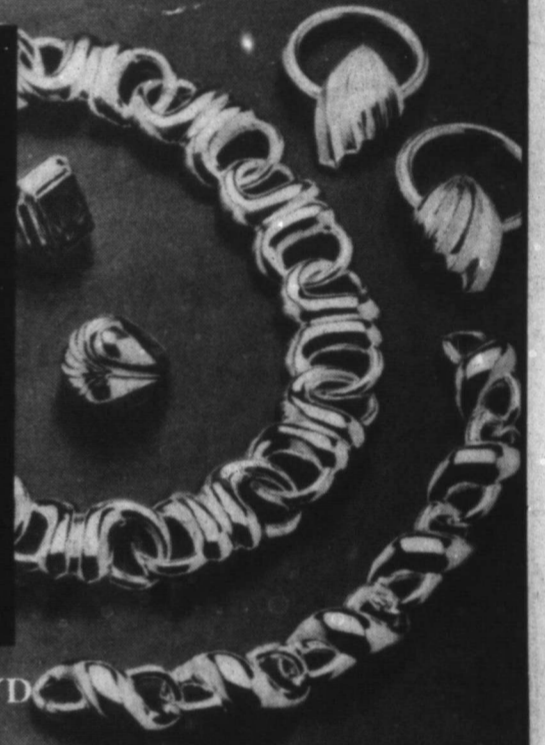
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Violence Awareness Set

October has been designated Domestic Violence Awareness Month, according to Janet Watts, Executive Director of Tralee Crisis Center.

Each year in the United States about 3-4 million women are physically abused by their mate. Because understanding the problem is the first step toward solving it, Tralee is sponsoring a ribbon campaign in honor of those women who have lost their lives at the hands of their partners. Everyone is asked to wear a purple ribbon, which Tralee is providing in each community served, during the month in support of this cause.

During the last year in the eight counties served by Tralee, services were provided to 335 adults and children. Sexual assault cases accounted for an additional 20 victims.

Tralee Crisis Center is a non-profit organization whose belief is that every person has the right to live free of violence. The center offers a 24 hour hotline manned by volunteers, a shelter open 24 hours a day, advocacy for crime victims and various support groups. If a woman a woman chooses not to stay at the Shelter but is subjected to an abusive partner, there is a counselor who provides help for her. Recently, a children's program has been formed for residents' and non-residents' children who have been emotionally and/or physically subjected to the abuse.

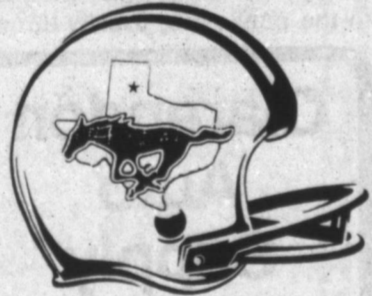

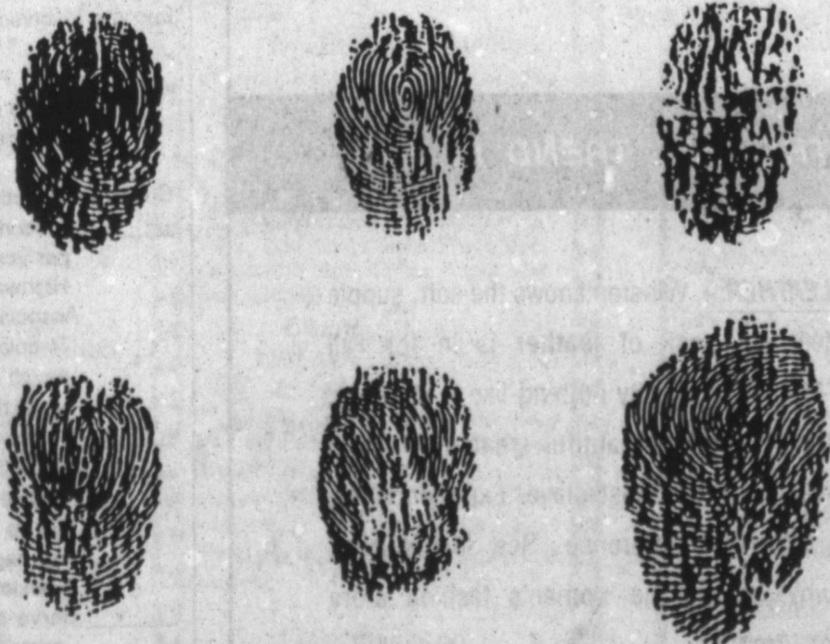

ORDINANCE NO. 63
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE INITIAL LEVYING, ASSESSING, AND COLLECTING OF AN ANNUAL AD VALOREM TAX FOR GENERAL REVENUE PURPOSES, IN THE SUM OF TEN CENTS ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLAR VALUATION, AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTY AND INTEREST AS PROVIDED BY LAW, IN THE CITY OF HOWARDWICK, DONLEY COUNTY, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, an ad valorem tax is necessary for the proper conducting of said City's general business and for the construction, upkeep, repair, and maintenance of the streets, roads, alleys and bridges of said City; NOW THEREFORE BE IT OR-

DAINED AND ENACTED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF HOWARDWICK, DONLEY COUNTY, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION ONE
Under and by virtue of Article XI, Section 4, of the Texas Constitution and Section 302.001 of the Texas Tax Code Annotated, an initial ad valorem tax, in the sum of ten cents (\$0.10) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) valuation of the taxable property of said City, real, personal, and mixed, be levied, assessed, and collected; and that the initial collection be effective the 1st day of October, 1993, based upon the market value of such taxable property located within the City as of January 1, 1993; and that the City Council shall, on or before the beginning in the year 1994, fix by ordinance the amount of ad valorem tax to be assessed and collected for such year.

SECTION TWO
The property taxes levied by the City each year shall become due on the 1st day of October of each year for which the levy is made and shall become delinquent on the following 1st day of February. Penalties and interest for delinquent taxes shall incur in accordance with section 33.01 of the State Property Tax Code.

SECTION THREE
A. Whenever any accounts for delinquent property taxes owed to the City are given to its tax attorney for collection, on or after July 1 of the year they become delinquent, the City shall be entitled to, and shall collect, an additional penalty of fifteen percent (15%) of the delinquent taxes and penalty (including any interest owed) due on each delinquent property at the time of collection, either before or after suit and/or foreclosure sale, as provided by Section 33.07 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

B. In addition to the collection expenses provided for in Subsection (A) above, whenever a delinquent tax suit is filed, the City shall be entitled to recover reasonable expenses, subject to the approval of the court, that are incurred by the City in determining the name, identity, and location of necessary parties and in procuring necessary legal descriptions of property on which a delinquent tax is due, as provided by Section 33.48 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

SECTION FOUR
A. A taxpayer will be given a discount for early payment from the amount of current City property tax due. The amount of discount shall be as follows, provided tax bills are mailed before September 30:

- (1) Three percent (3%) if paid in October;
- (2) Two percent (2%) if paid in November; and
- (3) One percent (1%) if paid in December.

B. The amount of discount shall be as follows if tax bills are mailed after September 30:

- (1) Three percent (3%) if the tax is paid before or during the next full calendar month following the date on which the tax bills are mailed;
- (2) Two percent (2%) if the tax is paid during the second full calendar month following the date on which the tax bills were mailed; and
- (3) One percent (1%) if the tax is paid during the third full calendar month following the date on which the tax bills were mailed.

SECTION FIVE
If any provision in this ordinance be found or be held to be contrary to the laws of the State of Texas, such finding will not affect any other provision of said ordinance but relate only to that provision which is found to be contrary to the laws of the State of Texas.

Finally, whereas, because of the press of time, there is an emergency creating an imperative public necessity that the rule requiring ordinances be read on three separate days before final passage be suspended; and that such rule is hereby suspended, and it is ordained and enacted that this ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 62
AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE DUMPING OF TRASH OR OTHER WASTE MATERIAL EXCEPT IN DESIGNATED AREAS AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOWARDWICK, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the City Council has designated certain areas within the city limits for the dumping and disposing of trash and other waste materials.

SECTION 2: That it should be unlawful for any person to dump or leave or cause to be dumped or left any trash or other waste material at any location other than at the designated dump areas.

SECTION 3: That any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined a sum of not less than \$200.00 nor more than \$500. Each and every violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 4: That an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of the general welfare of the public that requires this ordinance to become effective immediately; therefore, it shall be effective and after the date of its passage, and it is so ordained.

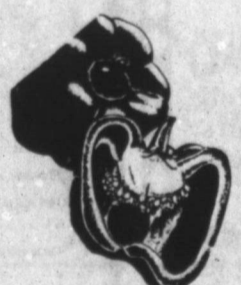
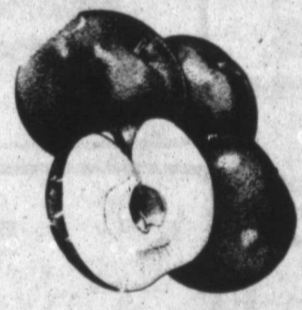
