#### **CC** opens Fitness Center to public

The public can now take advantage of the new Fitness Center at Clarendon College.

The CC Board of Regents last Thursday approved the fees and guidelines for public use of the facility located north of Knorpp Hall in the old Vo-Tech Building.

Individuals can buy a membership for \$100 per long semester and \$75 for the summer semesters. Family memberships will cost \$200 per long semester and \$150 for summer semesters.

The Fitness Center's hours will follow the regular college calendar, and it will be closed between semesters and during college holidays. Summer hours will be dependent on the number of memberships sold.

#### Clarendon VFD obtains \$54k grant

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department recently received a \$54,000 grant from the Texas Forest Service to purchase a new fire truck.

The grant, proposed by David Pitts and Fire Chief Delbert Robertson, will require a 10% local match and will be used to purchase a new 1-ton pick-up type brush truck with a 500-gallon tank.

"We're in the process of trying to find a truck now," Pitts said. "We're looking around for the best deal we can get the most out of the grant money."

There is a possibility that the new truck may replace a 1980's fire truck.

'We may retire the older fire truck, but we'll just have to wait and see," Pitts said.

#### Judge sentences man to 12 years

Ronald Miller was sentenced to 12 years in prison on February 6 for violating the terms of his probation.

District Judge David McCoy handed down the sentence after District Attorney Stuart Messer filed a motion to adjudicate the guilt of the defendant.

Miller was placed on probation on September 16, 2002, for indecency with a child. He violated the terms of his probation less than a month later. During an unannounced home visit by a probation officer, the defendant was caught drinking alcohol.

"As a result of close supervision by the probation department, a child molester will not be in our community any longer," Messer said.



## French help not needed to deal

I think I speak for most Americans when I say this: I am growing very weary of the French.

with Saddam

As a people, the French are useless. Oh, yes, they did help us out back in 1776 (mostly out of hatred for England), and they did give us a lovely copper statue. But other than those two contributions, the French are generally more trouble than they're worth.

For months, the French have been at the forefront of stalling any American-led action against Iraq. I wonder if French economic interests tied up in Saddam's totalitarian regime might have something to do with that. Whatever the reason, one thing is certain - France is more interested in protecting Saddam than in helping the United States. With friends like them, who needs al

Earlier this month, a group of ten Eastern European countries - Albania, Bulgaria, Croatia, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Macedonia, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia - all signed a letter in support of the US position regarding Iraq. The thing these countries have in common is a shared history of living under oppressive, undernocratic conditions. The people of those nations still have the very recent memory of tyranny.

These nations said, "The trans-Atlantic community, of which we are a part, must stand together to face the threat posed by the nexus of terrorism and dictators with weapons of mass destruction.... The clear and present danger posed by Saddam Hussein's regime requires a united response from the community of democracies."

This letter was followed this week by an endorsement by Eastern bloc countries of a statement issued by the European Union (EU) which warns Saddam has "one last chance" (again) to disarm before all hell breaks

France was outraged by this, and French President Jacques Chirac blew his top and went on an irrational tirade against his supposed allies. He berated the smaller European countries, accusing them of exhibiting "not well brought up behavior" and threatening to block those countries' efforts to become members of the EU.

"They missed a good opportunity to keep quiet," Chirac said of his neighbors.

Well, he ought to know. The French have missed every good opportunity to shut up for the last 60 years

What evidence will it take to get the frogs on board a coalition to take out Saddam? I don't think any intellectual argument will persuade them.

Everyone agrees that Saddam is a bad dude. (Well, everyone except the maggot-infested, communist peaceniks who think Bush and Cheney are more dangerous than Saddam and bin Laden combined.) Most rational people know that Saddam has weapons of mass destruction. It's common knowledge that Saddam has a hatred for the West in general and America in particular. It is a fact that he has assisted al Qaeda (which, for those of you with short memories, was the organization responsible for killing thousands of Americans on 9-11). It is well established that he sponsors and supports terrorism and actually pays thousands of dollars of reward money to the families of Palestinian suicide bombers.

## NASA deserves better funding, support

On July 20, 1969, Neil Armstrong stepped on the moon and into the pages of history. As a reporter in Houston, I was privileged to cover that historic event which defined a generation. That moment also embodied the greatness and unlimited promise of America's space program.

The tragic fate of the Space Shuttle Columbia confronts us with a choice: renew our commitment to space exploration or continue cutting NASA's budget and diluting its mission. The story thus far is bleak. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration's budget has been cut to the bone in the last decade. In fact, the space shuttle budget has decreased by nearly 40 percent over that period. Year after year, we have watched the numbers dwindle and projects suffocate because of inadequate funds

People have asked me why we still need a space program. We sent a man to the moon more than three decades ago...

Space exploration and research have improved our quality of life in ways that many Americans take for granted. The work conducted by NASA astronauts, researchers, and engineers has yielded more than 30,000 developments in technology, medicine, and defense.

From satellites, which allow instant access to news and information around the globe, and cell phones, which forever changed the way we live, to every day amenities such as cordless appliances, Velcro and Teflon – all were developed through our space program.

NASA research has been an integral part of our nation's military efforts as well. Space-based and satellite imagery, as well as global positioning systems, have been critical to helping our Armed Forces pinpoint the enemy on the battlefields of Afghanistan, helping to bring a swift end to the Taliban and to chase al Qaeda out of the country. NASA is also helping to develop the next generation of the unmanned aerial vehicle, the Predator, which allows us to see the battlefield, find the enemy, and send in precision-guided munitions - all without putting our troops



in harm's way.

Perhaps our greatest achievement has been in the field of medical science. CAT scans and MRIs are revolutionizing our ability to detect tumors early and save lives. Neither technology would be possible without NASA research.

The crew of Columbia was conducting experiments - human and scientific - in fields ranging from biomedicine to microbial physiology to yield new pharmaceuticals, treatments, and research. Studying the effects of medicines on human bodies in space enables NASA to make greater

advances in how we treat people on earth. Yet despite these developments and innovations, NASA's funding has fallen

In February, President Bush proposed a budget that, thankfully, begins the long process of reversing this trend. He is asking Congress for \$15.47 billion - a 3.1

percent increase. While that is progress, it is merely a drop in the bucket. It will take more than a one-year increase to turn the tide and bring our space exploration program back from the brink.

Few things Congress has done have reaped greater rewards than supporting NASA's mission. But just as important as adequate funding is that NASA defines a clear vision for the future.

The tragic loss of the seven astronauts aboard Columbia was a wake-up call to Congress and the American people. We must renew our commitment to space exploration. We know that the cost of progress can be high, but the cost of complacency is far greater.

In recent years, NASA's mission has become muddled. In the new millennium, NASA must set forth a distinct mission that outlines clear objectives and goals. Congress must ensure adequate funding to support that mission, and the American people must continue to support our nation's quest for space exploration. We owe it to the heroes who lost their lives and to the loved ones they left behind to continue their journey and discover the mysteries that lie hidden in the universe.

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





#### **LEGAL NOTICE**

On February 6, 2003, VALOR Telecommunications of Texas, LP (VALOR) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish surcharges to recover lost revenues and increased costs associated with seven hundred thirteen (713) Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) routes implemented in and between VALOR's Texas telephone exchanges and in many instances, exchanges of other local telephone companies. The application is filed based on the Commission's Substantive Rule 26.221 titled, "Applications to Establish or Increase Expanded Local Calling Service

ELCS expands a local calling scope to include one or more additional telephone exchanges, if customers in a petitioning exchange approve by ballot, the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. The costs and lost revenues asso-

In the application, VALOR proposes to implement on an interim basis a monthly per line surcharge of \$.99 for residential customers and \$1.98 for business customers beginning with the April, 2003 bill cycle. This proposed surcharge will apply in addition to any monthly ELCS fees. If rates at or above the level of the interim surcharges are not ultimately approved by the Commission, VALOR will refund all or part of the interim surcharges, as directed by the Commission. Ultimately, VALOR seeks approval of monthly surcharges of \$3.38 for business lines and \$1.69 for residential lines to replace the interim surcharges. Additionally, the application proposes that customers currently billed ELCS fees lower than \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line, will have those fees raised to \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line.

The net annual effect on the revenues of VALOR will be zero since the requested surcharge replaces lost revenues and reimburses VALOR for the increased cost of service associated with ELCS. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs VALOR seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$7,601,145 annually.



The Bulldogs are 6-2 for the year and hope to extend their record at Seward County Junior College in Liberal February 22. They travel to Albuquerque February 25 to take on El Paso and the University of New Mexico JV. The Bulldogs' next home game will be March 4 against Seward County beginning at 1:00 p.m.
