MERCHANTS TO PAY THREE YEARS TAXES UNDER TEXAS' CHAIN STORE LEVY

Merchants of Donley county as Precinct Elections Judges Are well as other sections of the state, must begin payment of a new form of tax, the chain-store levy, this month. And they must pay three years back taxes accumulated since January, 1936.

A recent supreme court decision law to be constitutional The law provides for compulsory licensing of every store in the state not included on the "excepted" list. A store is defined under the law as "any place where goods are offered for sale."

Exemptions Listed Merchants exempted include the following:

Lumber firms handling nothing except building materials. Supply houses selling only drill-

ing equipment. Filling stations selling nothing

except petroleum products. Gasoline stations handling accessories, tires, drinks or candy must pay the

Light and gas companies handling only their principal products. They must pay if they sell stoves, refrigerators or fixtures

Manufacturers selling their products, not in competition with other firms.

Firms selling dairy products exclusively

Penalty for violation of the law is a fine of \$25 to \$100 for each day of violation

Agent's of the state comptroller's office of Austin will collect the \$337 for 10 stores, \$1842 for 20 stores, \$8,102 for 40 stores, and \$13,757.50 for 51 stores.

While this law is generally referred to as a chain-store tax, it applies to all stores.

LAND MONOPOLIES AND WAR.

"Colonial expansion" is the excuse being given for what wars are in progress, and for threatened invasion of other nations at this time when the horrors of war loom vividly upon the horizon of millions who live in fear and dread. France, England, Belgium and the Netherlands each have extensive colonies to which they expect to hold with a firm grip. On the other hand Japan, Germany and Italy having little colonial territory, make it quite plain that they expect more if it need be taken by force.

Very few colonies are administered in the interest of the natives, or of the newcomers settling there. Those to derive direct benefit from colonies are chiefly those who can profit from exploitation of the natural resources, and the labors of the captive peoples.

Japan gave as her reason for taking over Manchuria and now North China, that she needed more room for her people. Actually thousands of Japs have been settling Brazil for almost a century. The trouble there is that Japan cannot control. At home, the density of population in Japan is less than half that of Belgium. The "Japan Year Book" for 1936 shows that 1½ percent of the inhabitants of Japan own approximately 90 percent of the land. Some 20,000,000 of her people are land tenants on less than 2 acres each.

Italy claims over population. Yet as a matter of fact, six tenths of one percent of the Italians own 47 percent of the land. In Germany, it is shown that a third of the richest domain of the nation is owned by the aristocracy that ex-

We found all of them in splendid health and the best of spirits. All the Texas Congressional delegation are quite busy especially Senator Connally and Senator Sheppard in their fight against the Anti-Lynching Bill and for the Farm Bill. While here I am trying to look after several pending matters in which the State is interested.

Before leaving Austin the past week, I requested the Attorney General to file suit to cancel one of the Land Commissioner's famous leases on Gulf Coast lands. The requested cancellation was based on two grounds, first, because the small cash consideration with no drilling obligations was so unconscionable on its face as to amount to legal fraud and, second, because thes receiving the lease had implied with the law requiring the mto drill offsets where pro duction has been secured within one thousand feet of State lands.

The Attorney General promptly advised me that he would file this suit on the grounds set out in my letter thereby confirming my contention that these leases ought to be cancelled. I then officially requested him to file suit to cancel eight other leases, but he has been quoted as saying that he would have to study the facts in each case and that he would probably file only one suit as a test case. Of course, if he waits on a case to go through all the courts, then the State's rights in the other tracts cannot be protected. They will be proved either dry or productive before the one suit can be disposed



As soon as the sick depart this life the friends and relations are sent for and on entering the house are placed near or around the body of the deceased. There are many women who attend as mourners and ask the deceased "What was the cause of the death" and many other such questions. The body is then well washed and dressed in ily celebration of any kind around fine linen and shod with Russian leather. The body of the deceased is kept as long as possible before burial, as these people believe that the longer the body is kept the happier it will be to reach the other world.
