Sales tax rebates up in Clarendon

AUSTIN - Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander recently sent a total of \$175.8 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,097 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 1.2 percent increase over the \$173.6 million allocated in October 1998.

Locally, the City of Clarendon gained 28.67 percent for a rebate of \$17,346.13. Hedley slipped 3.86 percent to \$102.09, and Howardwick dropped 55.69 percent to \$323.47.

For the year-to-date rebates, Clarendon is up 4.64 percent, Hedley is down more than 11 percent, and Howardwick is down more than 36

Total payments statewide are 5.8 percent ahead of last year.

"Though the first annual Sales Tax Holiday on August 6 through 8 suspended state and local sales taxes on clothing and shoes, the Texas economy is so strong that August sales tax revenues increased in more than half of Texas' cities," Rylander said.



Way to go, **Bronco Fans**

Some people in Clarendon apparently are not happy with the recent Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals ruling barring prayer before football games. And they've decided to do something about it.

When the moment of silence was called for Friday night in Bronco Stadium, some true Texans up in the stands broke out in rebellion: "Our Father who art in

Others quickly joined in and recited the Lord's Prayer as well.

As far as I know, no one was greatly offended. Officially, Clarendon CISD still has a moment of silence before each home game. We can't really blame the school board for that. They are in the ultimate "damned if you do, damned if you don't" situation. On the one hand, they represent the people of "Saints' Roost" - a community established by Christian Colonists. On the other hand they face a federal court, the ACLU, and terrible liability of a possible lawsuit.

Hopefully, the US Supreme Court will overturn the Court of Appeals ruling, and Texans will be able to get about running their high school ballgames as they see fit.

Until then, more Bronco fans should join their voices with those courageous few from last week. Let everyone who visits Bronco Stadium know that this community does not approve of the court's ruling and that we will pray when we want to, not when the court

FCC will review 'modem tax' idea

An FCC official announced that this year the federal agency will review a proposed fee on Internet service providers (ISPs) for using local telephone networks.

According to a recent article by Brock N. Meeks on MSNBC's website, local phone companies have complained because modern users can tie up telephone capacity for hours and have argued that they (the phone companies) should be compensated.

But aren't modern users paying for their telephone service any way? Why should someone who connects to the Internet for long periods of time be charged more than someone who "ties up capacity" for hours at a time while talking to Aunt Mildred?

That analogy is just one of the difficulties facing the FCC when considering access charges for modern users. There is no way to tell when a person is making a phone call and when he is calling an ISP.

The solution to that problem would likely be to impose a flat access fee on ISPs, which would then be passed on to Internet users. Another solution could be a per-minute charge for access which might cost up to 10cents per minute.

This would all be bad news for the millions of people who use the Internet and World Wide Web on a daily basis for information, research, entertainment, and communication. And it would be particularly bad news for commerce on the Internet.

Currently, Internet transactions are exempt from most taxes. The result of that laissez faire approach has been huge growth in web-based businesses. The prosperity of Internet commerce has been a good example of entrepreneurial spirit and free enterprise. But that could all come to an end.

Governments at all levels have been looking at sales on the Internet as a virtual gold mine in potential tax revenue. Allowing telephone companies to collect a perminute fee for connecting to ISPs could be the first step toward taxation of Internet commerce.

Rather than trying to regulate and tax the online economy, government should be taking steps to make the real economy more like the one in cyberspace. Everyone benefits from the wealth and convenience created by a free market system.

"The 'modem tax' is now officially classified as an urban myth," Meeks writes. "However, the idea is not completely dead inside the FCC; it's just on long-term hold."

Meeks' article notes that the FCC originally exempted the online industry from access fees, claiming it would kill the data industry. While access fees might not kill the industry now, it would certainly throw a wet blanket on things and throw up a barrier to further growth in the online economy.

Internet users and freedom lovers should keep an eye on this one. Let us hope the FCC will continue to put off the phone companies' demands and protect Internet users from being "double charged" for their phone

Internet users are safe from the "modem tax" for now. With any luck, things will stay that way.

Tabacco suit an affront to Texas taxpayers

When US Attorney General Janet Reno announced the federal government's lawsuit against "Big Tobacco" last month, the announcement came with all the usual platitudes about the need to punish big corporate evil doers. But the fact is that this lawsuit doesn't go after big business at all - the only harm that will done is to small businesses and even smaller taxpay-

Consider the following facts: In Texas, the state and federal government collect more than 60 cents in taxes on every pack of cigarettes sold. Tobacco companies, according to a recent article in The New York Times, make a profit of 28 cents per pack.

· The tax payout to the state does not include the direct payments of some \$17 billion (scheduled over the next 20 years) as a result of the settlement between Texas and the tobacco industry. According to published reports, however, the tobacco companies actually are making more money as a result of the \$246 billion national settlement, due to the resulting increase of 45 cents in the average cost of a pack of cigarettes.

 The Congressional Joint Committee on Taxation reports that 53 percent of federal cigarette taxes are paid by people making under \$30,000 per year - and only seven percent by people making more than

The federal government's tobacco policy takes hypocrisy to absurd levels. The government pays subsidies to tobacco farmers. The federal government collects taxes on tobacco products. The federal government requires cigarette makers to post a health warning on each pack. And

now the federal government is suing the tobacco industry. Go figure.

Can the government sue itself? If anybody has profited from the tobacco business, it's the United States government. The irony, or course, is that the tobacco companies aren't going to feel the brunt of this attempt at government extortion. The pain will be passed on to wholesales, retailers, and consumers.

Apparently the lawsuit isn't enough for our federal government. Right now Congress is considering a measure to add an additional 50 cents per pack tax on cigarettes - this time to pay the cost of prescription benefits for senior citizens. What is the overall objective here, to tax tobacco out of existence, or to utilize it to make smokers pay for every project the government can think of?

Small business makes a tiny profit on the sale of tobacco products. More importantly, tobacco sales generate traffic and additional business in many convenience stores, service stations, and quickstop establishments. Small, independently owned businesses, count on the sale of this legal product to help keep them viable.

As the president of Small Business United of Texas, I can assure you that the federal government once again missed its target if it truly was going after big business. The livelihood of many small businesses is directly tied to tobacco sales. It is not fair to jeopardize hundreds of thousands of jobs and put legitimate businesses like ours at risk.

The overwhelming majority of small businesses in Texas take every precaution possible to avoid selling tobacco products to minors, but we are perfectly within our rights to sell them to adults who choose to smoke. Like it or not, tobacco is a legal product.

This lawsuit is an assault on all businesses, shareholders, and consumers. It clearly demonstrates that our government is prepared to attack any company that sells legal products that become unpopular with its "politically correct"



Technology has brought the world to our fingertips — and that's a good thing. But it's also brought a few problems, of which we should to be aware.

For instance, over the past year, I've had over 3,000 people contact me about two specific rumors they read about online. Both rumors have to do with Internet access, and both rumors are completely false.

The first has to do with a Bill 602P supposedly being considered by Congress. The bill is supposedly being sponsored by a Congressman Schnell, and supposedly

will give the Postal Service the authority to tax the Internet. Well, first of all, there is no Bill 602P

in Congress - bills don't have letters, they only have numbers. And secondly, there is no Congressman Schnell. It's a rumor. The same can be said about a purported plan by the FCC to allow long distance companies to tax our Internet access. I've contacted the FCC, and it's simply not

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
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


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## Bronco defense defuses Rockets
