

Local Software Approved for Nationwide Distribution

On Monday, October 8, the national corporate offices of United Parcel Service (UPS) notified a local company that their software had been approved for use by local shippers throughout the country.

Terry Bernabe, head of Kiowa Creek Resources Corporation, said

that the company had notified him of the approval. "There are 1,700 shippers in Amarillo alone who could use this program," said Bernabe. Apparently no one knows-not even UPS-the exact number nationwide. The company adds new shippers each day.

The software makes it easier to ship a UPS Package out. Even a shipper who puts out only one or two packages per day, can use the program easier than manually filling out the necessary forms and looking up rates. But it can also help shippers who handle 100 to 1,000 parcels per day.

The program has been in operation at eight Beta test sites for some time. Suggestions by these shippers and from UPS headquarters have led to numerous revisions in the program. But both UPS and the programmer feel that the package is now ready for sale.

The program maintains a database of customers, so that labels can be generated without re-typing names and addresses that are already on file. It computes charges based on zone information and generates the necessary forms. It is currently available for all domestic shippers, and allows for overseas shipment, too.

"We expect to sell at least 200 sets of software in the remainder of 1993," said Bernabe. The program is available to any UPS shipper. Retail price is \$799. Bernabe started the program for his own use when he was shipping out computer hardware. When other

shippers wanted a copy, he began to look at commercial production of the software. "I first thought that we could finish the program in 90 days," Bernabe grimaced. "That was in November of

But the program has helped Kiowa Creek Resources shift its emphasis from hardware to programming. Other

programs are in the works. Bernabe will have to turn some of his efforts to marketing now. He has an appointment with one shipper who has 27,000 "pack- and-ship" outlets.


There are perhaps 100 shipping programs on the market, but none have caught on throughout the market. Bernabe says, "Our is unique in its database provision." He estimates that there are probably less than 100 shippers in Texas who are computerized. Naturally, he hopes to change those numbers-and quickly.



More Markets For U.S. Beef (NAPS)—Americans concerned

about the country's economy as well as their own may be heartened to hear about opportunities for foreign trade that will increase

One significant new market for recent study by the U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF), that country is looking more and more for outside sources of quality beef products. The USMEF is a national trade organization responsible for developing foreign markets for U.S. USMEF's foreign activities are funded by an industry checkoff probeef industry to make significant inroads into the Japanese and Mexican markets.

"The current economic boom and, more importantly, the growth in private enterprise and local autonomy have opened the doors for exporting countries to market beef directly into China," says Philip M. Seng, USMEF president and CEO.

The study also found: · Demand for high quality beef in China's tourist hotel and restaurant sector will easily exceed the size of the Hong Kong and Taiwan market combined by the end of the decade, reaching as high as \$30 million in sales.

market will create a major export target for U.S. suppliers. Seng estimates an initial market size of 200 million consumers in China for U.S. beef variety meats and sales of \$60-\$70 million in beef by the turn of the century.

During the 1980s, "Discretionary income [in China] was used largely to buy televisions, video recorders and basic home appliances," said Seng. "Today, incomes are channeled into purchases of gold, cosmetics and food."

The proliferation of supermarkets, fast food restaurants, family style restaurants, steak house chains and theme restaurants in the region are all expected to have a positive effect on U.S. beef sales







The recruit can choose his field of training, and can request assignment to a geographical location which is usually honored if training in his chosen field is available there. Seventy-five percent of the recruits tuition can be paid for college cour-ses he takes while in the Army, and up to \$30,000 in tuition payments are available after he is discharged.

The Army is much more selective than it used to be. Ninetynine percent of its recruits are high school graduates. A criminal record may, in some instances, make a person ineligible. Drug use can result in ineligibility for enlistment, or in discharge after enlist-
