First of all, it is a sincere expression of our appreciation to those who are subscribers, advertisers and readers of the Callahan County Star. Though like so many, we don't say it often enough, we do appreciate our faithful customers. (A little confession might be appropriate here: secretly, we wish that the newspaper's name were still the Baird Star, but it was changed many years ago by a previous owner.)

And then an apology for the slip-ups, errors and goofs that the paper has suffered during an assortment of local managements. The Star became a part of our little group back in the '80s, at the end of what we all like to recall as the "little boom" era. We acquired the put a halter on him. He's paper because we and the previous owner felt that its best chance for survival would to be continued as a local, hometown paper as a part of a united program. That was sound thinking then, as it is today, because in this day, a small-town newspaper cannot normally bear the tremendous expense of a press and other assorted

printing expenses alone. The Star's problem evolved as a result of personnel who did not truly have the "local spirit" and/ or the personal or professional qualifications to make the grade as smalltown community newspaper editors. This is not to say that all were unqualified; just the opposite: those who were, served well and moved on to bigger things in their careers. And corporate management must also bear a large share of the responsibility in not more carefully evaluating some who were sent to be the Star's editor. Perhaps our philosophy, which is that everyone is a "straight arrow" until he or she proves otherwise, didn't always send the right person for the right job. Personnel mistakes were made. Things happened over which no one had control. Newspapering is and want.

This is one of those all a day in-day out business, tion to detail, a demand for patience and a willingness to overlook the faubles of others, as one strives to record the news whether it be good or bad, of great magnitude or of little significance. An editor has to be mindful of what is important to the people for whom the paper is being edited.

Right now we believe

we have in the young man Lupe Garcia, a trained journalist, who wants to be the best Baird editor he can be. He is truly dedicated. He recognizes that he has much to learn, and is willing to labor in this vineyard in order to become proficient in every area of the newspaper business. We are impressed with his enthusiasm, and though he, like most of us, sometimes stumbles over it, we would be remiss to rein him in or made mistakes. He's occasionally left your articles out of the paper. But he's learning to be more mindful of the little details, knowing that the big ones will take care of themselves.

And he has the team spirit. He's willing to work within the environment that he finds himself. He knows that tearing down other individuals and/or businesses through word or deed never elevates the one doing the tearing one iota. He knows that much more can be accomplished by recognizing and accepting the frailties of others without finger-pointing and dwelling on the negatives. To capitalize on the positives is the young man's goal. He, like all of us, must depend on his readers and customers to guide and direct him, through encouragement and motivation to provide the sort of local paper we all want.

The Star needs you Baird and we would like to think that Baird needs the Star.

# FSA accepting emergency loan applications

Callahan Co. -Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson, Marilyn S. Richer said

Callahan County is one of 16 in Texas recently named by Secretary Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Marilyn Richer said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the inter-

est is 3.75 percent. "As a general rule a farmer must suffered at least a d30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan, Ms. Richer said. Farmers participating in the Crop Federal Insurance program

will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.





Jones said the building was in surprisingly good shape and would not need as much work as was first though. She said an elevator would be needed to make the upstairs fully accessible and an estimate of \$35,000 was mentioned for the project.

Jones said they had looked into applying for grants and Mitchel asked if they had talked to the Texas Department Transportation.

Hardwick said the city would be receptive to any ideas the committee had.

Buddy Bouldin met with the council concerning a land dispute. Bouldin explained to the council that he had been trying to replace his eastern fence line along Walnut Street in northern Baird when the neighbor across the street objected to his cutting down the trees required to clear a fence line. The trees in question actually are on city property and Bouldin asked the city for a ruling on the matter.

Mayor Hardwick said he had spoken to the neighbor, this date, and though that the matter was resolved. He said after a lengthy conversation the neighbor seemed to fully comprehend the settlement and there should be no more problems.

Bouldin was satisfied with this arrangement and after some discussion thanked the Mayor and council for their consideration.

Darin Jennings, representing Jacobs and Martin Engineers, presented the council with the three bids on the Sludge Drying Beds at the Baird Sewer Plant. The low bid was R.L. Carroll, Inc. of Eastland, beating out bids by Joe Moore Pipeline of Abilene and Decker Construction of Abilene.

The bid could not be awarded for lack of a quorum.

Jennings told the council that the Abilene Water Line bids would be opened April 30th and construction would possibly begin about 60 afterward. Completion of the water line project was estimated to be about 9 to 12 months depending on the weather.

Hardwick then declared the Council Meeting never open at 9:30 p.m. due to lack of attendance Councilmen.



Education Funding voted last week to send a tax reform bill to the Texas House. The measure wouldcut homeowners' property taxes and shift the financial burden that Texas public schools now carry.

Following the unanimous vote, Gov. George W. Bush — who first proposed the property tax cut posed for photographs with Rep. Paul Sadler, D-Henderson, who chairs the tax committee.

If the reform package passes both houses, school property taxes that homeowners pay would be cut by as much as 50 percent. That will result in the state paying 80 percent of the cost of public schools, compared to 47 percent

But businesses and consumers will pay about \$2 billion a year in new taxes to pay for those cuts. Under the plan, homeowners would pay a lower local school

property tax while businesses would be charged a higher, statewide levy. School taxes for maintenance would be capped at 70 cents per \$100 valuation for homeowners and at \$1.05 for businesses.

Soon after the committee vote, Bush, Sadler, House Speaker Pete Laney and Rep. Tom Craddick, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, began meeting with small groups of House members to push the bill.

"I am going to urge the House to act on the legislation so it can get to the Senate," Bush said. "I am anxious to get this done prior to the end of the legislative session."

The tax bill will need a two-

thirds majority (100 votes) in the House because it requires a constitutional amendment.

Many professionals oppose the measure because it would broaden the franchise tax to include partnerships, affecting physicians, attorneys, engineers, accountants and lobbyists.

The 394-page \$4 billion (over two years) bill may be too large to please the Senate leadership. Sen. Ken Armbrister, D-Victoria, chairman of the special Senate tax committee, said he wanted to raise about \$2.5 billion in sales and business taxes in the two-year budget cycle.

Morales complained that some senators told him they would vote against the bill, sponsored by Sen. Chris Harris, R-Arlington, in exchange for a softer stand on two hot issues: affirmative action and Senate redistricting. But decisions on those issues, Morales said, "need to be based on the law, the Constitution and what is right for the state."

It took the Senate just minutes to pass the bill 27-2, without debate. Harris hurried off the floor after the vote, only pausing to say the Senate "worked its will and did what it thought was best."

Though many lawmakers have said they are frustrated with slow collections of overdue child support, Morales, a Democrat, defended his child support collection division's record and indicated the bill was politically motivated.

Last year, Morales' office collected \$619 million in child support. That figure may seem a pittance compared with the \$35 billion the federal government says Texans owe in unpaid child support, but collections have increased 243 percent in the six years Morales has had the job, he said.

Official: Morales Was Correct U.S. Assistant Education Secre-

tary Norma Cantu said Morales is correct in his interpretation of a federal appeals court ruling that struck down a race-based admissions policy formerly used by the University of Texas Law School.

The Hopwood decision was issued last year by the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of appeals in New Orleans and later was upheld by the

U.S. Supreme Court. In February, Morales interpreted the circuit court's decision as applicable to any race-based affirmative action policy at any public or private Texas university, the Dallas Morning News reported.

Black and Hispanic lawmakers, upset with Morales interpretation, asked Cantu's opinion. She first said Hopwood applied only to the UT Law School's policy, but later said she was advised by the U.S. Justice Department that the decision is not limited as she had believed, but applies to all institutions in the 5th district.

Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, said he was disappointed at the reversal of opinion.

### Commerce Bill Passes Senate

The Texas Department of Commerce would be renamed and face some new requirements under a bill approved by the state Senate last

The new Department of Economic Development and Tourism would be required to upgrade the current agency's information and referral program and would privatize some economic development programs and services.

The bill by Sen. David Sibley, R-Waco, also would give the agency's board the authority to hire an executive director. The executive director currently is appointed by the governor.

### Health & Nutrition by Judith Sheldon

It's getting warmer around the country, and that means more young people will be indulging in water sports, with water tubing quickly becoming one of the more popular pursuits of late spring and summer.

Water tubing is also becoming one of the more dangerous activities of childhood and early teens, injuring more young people than almost any other water sport.

For those who don't know what water tubing is, the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons describes it as similar to water skiing. However, the participant sits on a rubber inner tube pulled by a power boat.

Many of the injuries sustained by the water tubing youngsters involve a glaring lack of respect for basic safety rules by the boat driver. As a result, children are injured when the boat strikes a dock, for example, or when the boat driver runs into shallow water or hits a submerged rock or other object. The children may be thrown out and become entangled in the tow rope, or be in danger of drowning if they are not wearing life vests.

Some injuries are caused when the inner tube explodes. or if the tow rope breaks.

Injuries may range from painful bruises to serious fractures requiring surgery. To prevent, or at least, minimize the yearly toll of

injuries, the AAOS recommends: 1. The power boat driver must know the shoreline and the shallow areas in a lake where the inner tube is being pulled. The driver should also be aware of obstructions in the

2. Two people should always be in the boat: the driver. and someone who acts as a spotter for the inner tube rider and regulates the rope length from rope to inner tube

3. The rope must be checked. If fraying is found, it must

be replaced.

For the past ten years, large pension payouts have been subject to a 15% penalty tax. For the next three years, this tax will be suspended. Taxpayers are rarely presented with such an attractive planning opportunity - and the issues are seldom so complex.

CAREFUL PLANNING

In 1996, the 15% penalty tax applied to retirement plan payouts of more than \$155,000 per year, and lump-sum distributions in excess of \$775,000. For example, say you received retirement income of \$195,000 in 1996. Since this was \$40,000 more than the threshold of \$155,000, you would have paid a penalty of up to \$6,000 (\$40,000 x 15%), plus regular income tax on the entire amount. What happens if you receive the same payout through 1997? You'll still pay regular income tax, but the penalty will be waived.

The 15% penalty tax is scheduled to resume in 2000, so you might be tempted to withdraw as much as possible during this three-year window. In some cases, this will be a good strategy, but in other cases it could be a costly mistake. As a very general rule, retirees over age 70 are most likely to benefit from accelerating their withdrawals. People with a relatively short life expectancy could also benefit, since there's an estate version of this penalty tax that isn't suspended. But many younger people will still be better off taking the minimum from their retirement plans and letting the balance grow tax-deferred, even if they end up paying the 15% tax



Survivors include his wife of Baird; one son, Larry Newton of Baird; one daughter, Candyce Newton Perkins of Clyde; and five grandchildren.







# Fact

I was in the grocery store the other day and overheard a couple "discussing" the running tab on their groceries. The wife put a jug of milk in the shopping cart while her husband shook his head saying, "Can you believe the

No telling what that same guy would have said had he been shopping in Tokyo where - on average - that same jug of milk sells for around \$6 a gallon. The fact is no one in the world pays less of their disposable income for food than Americans.

Sure there are some food items on every grocery aisle that will cost you a little more this year than last. But compared with the rest of the world, a trip to the supermarket in the U.S. is a downright bargain. Consumers in Japan would probably stock up on steak if they could pay \$4 a pound like we do in this country. Truth is they're paying \$26 a pound for that same sirloin.

In fact, of nine items normally found on our supper tables, shoppers in Paris pay close to \$30. Japanese residents pay almost \$60. While here in Texas and the U.S., that same supper will cost you \$16.91.

So before anybody starts fretting about the high cost of eating, we might want to stop every once in a while and think about that high quality, abundant food supply that American farmers and ranchers have allowed us all.

Just remember: it's hard to complain when your mouth is full.

# Teen suicide is a statewide tragedy

Suicides in 1995: Ithough teen suicide is perceived as an urban 1 or 2 concern, the problem is 3 to 10 stutewide. Many rural areas and small towns lack more than 10 community services. In 1995, 152 youths between 12 and 17 took their own lives; 124 males and 28 females. Teens contemplating suicide become increasingly isolated and sometimes talk about harming themselves.
