MS-DOS Class On Tap

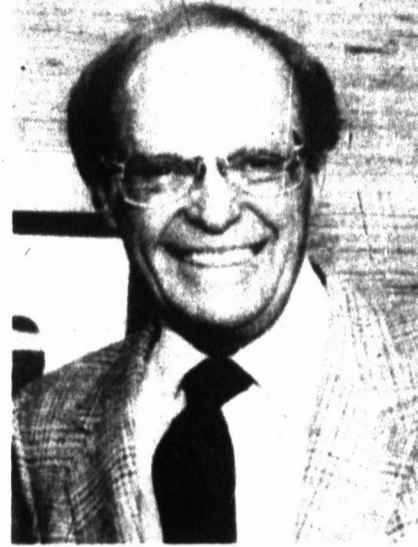

Bob Izzard will be the speaker at the meeting of the Clarendon Archaeology Society on November 9 at 8 p.m., College Library.

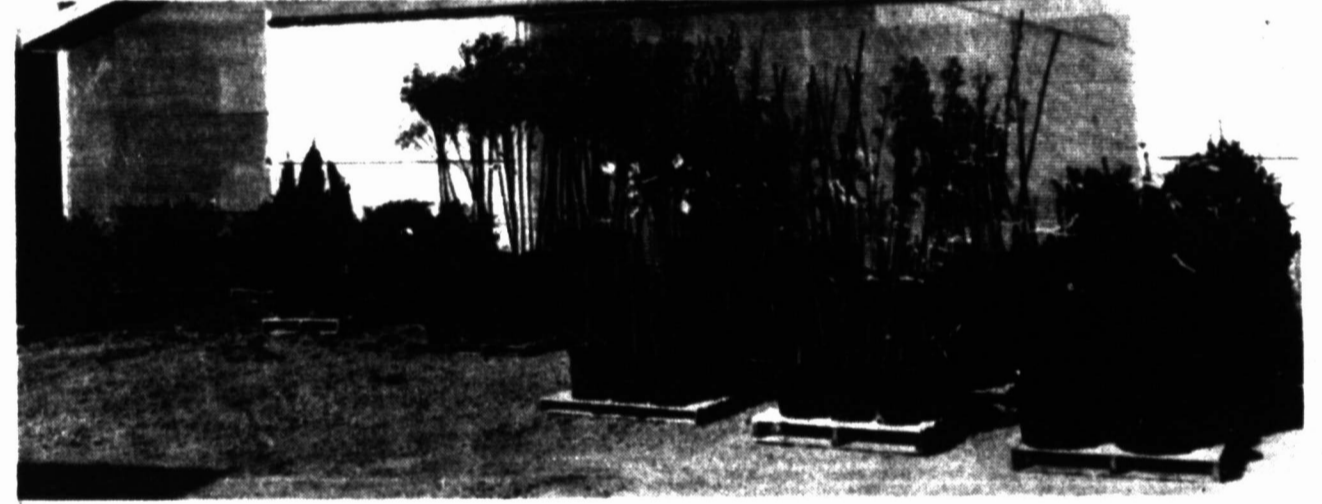

Funeral services for Mrs. Suvania Julia Sanders, age 93 were held at 11:00 a.m. on Friday, October 29, 1993 in the First United Methodist Church in Claude with Rev. Buddy Payne, Pastor, officiating. Interment was in the Claude Cemetery with arrangements by Robertson Funeral Directors, Inc. of Clarendon.

Mrs. Sanders died at 10:20 a.m. on Wednesday, October 27, 1993 in Palo Duro Nursing Home in Claude following a lengthy illness. She was born at Sunset, Arkansas on August 11, 1900 to Rosa Evaline French and William Robert Shepard. She traveled with her parents as a six month old baby in a covered wagon to Weatherford, Texas where they made their home, settling in the Monument Community near Loving, Texas in 1906.

She married Willie Minkley and gave birth to two children, Willie Mae and Billy Charles. Willie and Willie Mae preceded her in death. She then moved back home with her parents and five brothers.

In 1931, she married Walter Sanders and two children were born to them, Nolan Lee and Dorothy Faye. She and her husband and their children three children moved to Armstrong County in 1935, making their home in the Malden Community until Walter's death in 1976. Six years later, she moved from the farm into Claude where she maintained her own home until illness struck about a year ago. Since then, she had been a resident of the Palo Duro Nursing Home in Claude.

One brother, Joe Shepard and a granddaughter, Barbara Minkley, preceded her in death. She was member of the Claude First United Methodist Church and the Malden Harmony Club.

Postal employees are often asked by customers how best to prepare parcels and letters for mailing.

When holiday messages or parcels are delayed or damaged, no one is happy. The odds favor timely, safe delivery of holiday mail, and with a little extra care, customers can help the United States Postal Service complete its appointed rounds.

Mailing early is the best way to get important holiday cards and gifts to their destination on time. But there are several other mailing tips that will help speed your mail safely to delivery.

Customers really appreciate it when they receive advice on how to best mail their packages, letters and cards.

As a first step, customers should properly address cards and packages with the name, house number and street (or post office box number), and the city, state, and ZIP Code reserved for the last line. Including the apartment number is especially important during the holiday season.

Postal customers are reminded that some holiday greeting cards may not be acceptable for mailing at standard rates. Letter standards require that envelopes be at least 3 1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to meet minimum mailing standards. On the other hand, a surcharge must be paid on pieces which exceed any of the following dimensions - 6 1/2 inches high or 11 1/2 inches long or 1/4 inch thick.

Getting your cards, letters, and parcels delivered on time for the holiday season is our goal this year. With your help, our job becomes easier.

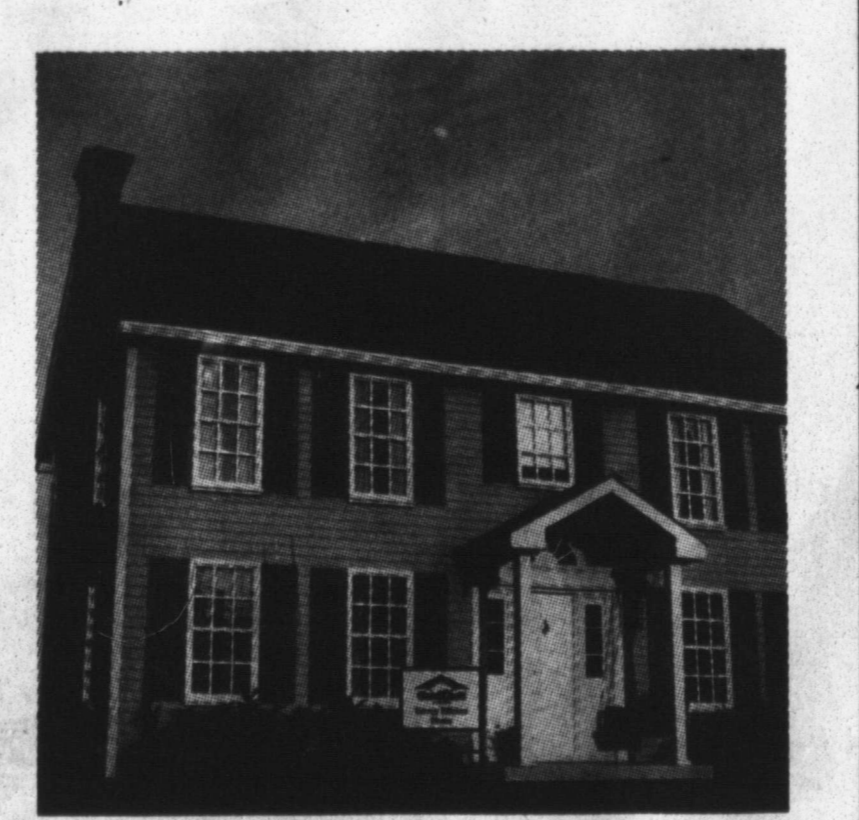

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Ag News

Farmers and ranchers who haven't already culled open, late calving and poor performing cows should do so soon.

There's no need to put expensive winter feed into cows that are unproductive and inefficient. Culling the cow herd now will also help you more effectively plan on feed supplies for the winter months.

The culling process should also weed out unsound cows with bad eyes, udders or feet and legs. Also, pregnancy testing cows this fall may be a more profitable tool than ever before. Since it's difficult for a cow to produce a calf large enough to pay her annual maintenance bill and leave some profit for the producer, an open cow is surely losing money. In addition cows calving late and during the summer months wean calves 30 to 90 pounds lighter than their herd mates which calve at earlier times. For this reason it's advisable to cull cows which will calve late next year and purchase pregnant replacements which will calve early.

Whoever does your pregnancy diagnosis will be able to estimate the calving date on each animal and make it easy to identify next year's late calving cows. Work toward a 60 day calving season or one that's certainly no longer than 90 days.

Remove barren and late calving cows from the herd will increase both the herd's reproductive potential and pounds of calf weaned.

Companies Promote Farm Safety

Tour Kelton Elmer Country

Most things "Western" are as fake as a Hollywood set or trendy boutique clothing. But occasionally something comes along that is the real thing.

Elmer Kelton is the real thing. He looks at West Texas like it is (and was). His descriptions are loving, but painfully accurate, whether the subject is an onery old codger or a perennial water shortage.

Kelton's fiction is not as glossy as Larry McMurtry's. But his values ring true. They are a precise reflection of the land he was raised in and writes about. And his non-fiction is straightforward.

Elmer Kelton Country is a selection of the news and feature stories—essays almost—that Kelton did during his years as a reporter, first for The San Angelo Standard Times and later for the West Texas Livestock Weekly.

As would be expected by reader's of Kelton's novel The Time It Never Rained, there is a classic report on the drought of the early 50's. But there is more. Kelton reported on the status of the chuckwagon in an era when it is used more at cookoffs than on roundups. A section entitled "The Way It Was" should be required reading in history classes.

To be a good reporter—or a good novelist—a person must be a good story teller. Kelton is. J. Frank Dobie reportedly said that he never let the truth get in the way of a good story. But as an ethical, practicing journalist, Kelton allows himself no such luxury. His pieces are as accurate as sharply focused photos, and like good photos, they reveal more than just the surface. Kelton's honest. And thorough.

"Honest" in some quarters today is a misapplied word for "X-rated". Not here. Elmer Kelton was raised in a world that was modest and polite. If that world has largely disappeared, then it is all the more refreshing to read a writer who can entertain and inform with no need to titillate or shock. This is prose that is honest and modest.

Like his subjects, Kelton is neither self-important nor self-deprecating. Indeed, he seems unselfconscious. He is a man with an assignment, a story to investigate, understand and report. Critical analysis is as natural as reporting the facts. But with typical West Texas modesty, there is no preaching, no posturing and no pretense. Her it is.

Perhaps if there is a single characteristic that permeates Texas west of 98°, it is a irony. Sometimes it is a bittersweet, biting irony. More often it is a bemused, quizzical, irony. But this is the region that nicknames a 280 pound man "Skinny" or a dust storm as "West Texas rain". William Sydney Porter (O'Henry) understood it a hundred-odd years ago. Kelton and a few others feel it today. Whether whimsical or sharp, it is a consistent antidote to boredom.

Somewhat, though, Kelton tempers his writing, both fiction and non-fiction, with a welcome dollop of compassion. Our frontier ancestors took a "live and let live" attitude to their neighbors. Their value system included the parable of the good samaritan. If they knew their neighbors' faults, they usually seemed to be able to like him anyway. Yes, it was partly a survival technique. But there seems to have been more to it than that. In Kelton's case that heritage meant that portraits come out as a living image. The warts are there. But Elmer Kelton likes people and respects them. And therefore, the reader likes his characters, whether fictional or living. And maybe, just maybe, the reader learns a little self-respect in the process.

"Education is the key to preventing children who live, work and play on the farm from becoming morbid statistics," said Adams, founder and president of Farm Safety 4 Just Kids. "To reduce the number of childhood injuries and deaths, resources must be easily accessible for community people to provide education. Friendly and accurate farm safety curriculum material is appreciated by both

professionals and community farm safety advocates."

Kelton's figures are every-day people. Some are characters. Some are colorful. But all are real and all are interesting.

Kelton's fame as a novelist has overshadowed his lifelong living as a reporter. These non-fiction works show the author's other life. Both are worth reading.

Plan Ahead For Christmas Mailing

Local postmasters serving the four-states of Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Texas have a quick quiz for postal customers. What's the connection between October 1 and Christmas? No, October 1 wasn't the date to start thinking about doing your holiday shopping.

If you're sending a gift by surface delivery - the least expensive way - to someone in Australia, Africa or Southeast Asia, that's the date the parcel needed to be in the mail to assure delivery before the holiday.

The October 1 "mail by" date was the first of a number of deadlines or suggested mailing dates for packages and cards being sent to civilians and U.S. Military personnel in foreign countries.

There are no comparable "mail-by" dates for domestic mail, because the United States Postal Service has the same delivery standards during the Christmas season as the rest of the year-despite a substantial increase in daily volume.

The earliest "mail-by" date for military parcels is October 12, for those going by surface delivery to servicemen and women stationed in Europe, the Far East, or Australia.

Other suggested surface mailing dates for military parcels range from mid-October through late November, depending upon the destination. For surface delivery of civilian parcels, the latest date is November 1, to Europe, the Caribbean, and Central and South America.

Of course, you can mail later if you plan to use Express Mail or Priority Mail to get it there faster.

The fastest choice is two-day Express Mail Military Service to most APO and FPO addresses in Alaska, Hawaii, Iceland, and the Caribbean. The same rates apply as for domestic Express Mail Service. They start at \$9.95 for up to eight ounces, \$13.95 for up to two pounds, and \$15.95 for three pounds, with a 70-pound weight limit.

In addition, regular Express Mail International Service provides expedited delivery to 96 countries.

Postal customers have a choice of several other services that are between Express Mail and surface mail in speed and cost. These include Parcel Airlift Mail.

PAL parcels go by air to a gateway airport in the United States, then overseas by air on a space-available basis. Regular Parcel Post rates are charged, plus an air service fee ranging from 35 cents to \$1.40, based on weight.

SAM parcels can weigh up to 15 pounds and measure up to 60 inches in combined length and girth. They go by surface transportation to a US gateway airport, then by air on a space-available basis to the overseas destination.

SAM packages should be mailed by dates in early and mid-November. Regular Parcel Post rates apply.

With Priority Mail, packages weighing from 12 ounces up to 70 pounds receive the same handling as First Class Mail to any APO or FPO address. Suggested "mail-by" dates for both Priority Mail and civilian International Air Parcel Post range from November 21 to December 9, depending upon the destination.

Don't Miss the Holiday Season

It's never too EARLY to mail your Christmas cards and packages to/from military addresses overseas and to International addresses. So beat the last minute rush and bring your holiday packages to the U.S. Post Office or APO/FPO military post office by the suggested dates listed below.
