Local Man Featured in **Area Papers**

A Clarendon resident has been featured recently in two area publications, the Amarillo Daily News and Accent West.

The article in the Amarillo paper features a four column color picture of the programmer sitting at his computer.

Bernabe has worked for about 2.5 years on the program. It was recently approved by UPS National Headquarters for use by any of the thousands of shippers who use UPS. The program maintains a data base of customer information, so that a shipper does not have to re-enter the same information over and over again. It automatically calculates the cost of sending a package of a given weight from point A to point B.

List price for the software is \$799, although it will be available for a limited time at an introductory price. Bernabe says he is shipping out software packages daily--by

Congress to Reorganize Agriculture Programs

A bill currently under consideration in Congress would reorganize the way all agriculture programs are administered and could have unforeseen consequences for residents of Donley County.

The bill is HR-3171, Department of Agriculture Reorganization Act of 1993. The Agriculture Committee is holding hearing on it at the present time. If it passes as presently structured it will make many changes is present

A Farm Service Agency (FSA) will be established through the collocation of ASCS, FCIC and programs administered by FmHA except for the rural development program. The FSA will carry out programs relating

* Price and income support and other related programs

* Supervision of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation * Agricultural credit programs, formerly assigned to FmHa, and scheduled for Saturday, December other lending programs for persons engaged in the production of agricul-

Not included in the function of the Farm Service agency are Conservation Programs (ACP, CRP, ECP, etc.) which are to be assigned to the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

* ACP approval authority will be taken away from producer elected county committee.

In each county or area the Secretary may establish a county or area committee in which activities of the Farm Service Agency are carried out. The committee will consist of five members who are fairly representative of the farmers in the county or area. Three of the members shall be elected by the farmers in the county or area under such procedures as the Secretary may prescribe. Two members shall be appointed by the Secretary. The members shall service for terms not to exceed three years.

WET WINDOWS MEAN TROUBLE. Condensation inside windows can result in rotting windows and facings. It is also an indication that there is a large termperature difference between the inside and outside surfaces of the glass. Storm windows-either permanent glass type or "shrink to fit" plastic sheeting-will reduce condensation, but they will also cut down on the load on the heating and cooling systems.

Wet Windows Could Mean Wall Damage

Those little beads of condensation gathering on the windows this winter may be trying to tell you something.

"Because window glass is denser and colder than surrounding walls, water vapor seeking cooler, drier outside air stops and condenses on the glass surface," said Mark Wilson, Sales Representative, Willard Boswell Company. "Window glass acts as an indicator, a warning of possible unseen damage inside the wall caused by excessive moisture."

Wilson said unless steps are taken to reduce moisture levels in

the home successive treezing and thawing of this moisture could cause deteriorating sidewall insulation, rotting wood structural members and blistering exterior paint.

"A solution may be replacing older windows if they have damaged seals or deteriorated surfaces," said Wilson. "Today's quality wood windows have overcome many of the trouble spots that resulted in condensation on older windows. Because quality wood is a natural insulator, it can also increase the home's overall energyefficiency."

Wilson offered these simple checks to identify minor problems with existing windows: Wood surfaces should be finished with gloss paint or polyurethane varnish; breather holes in the edge of the sash should be clear of debris; and interior glass panels should be tightly clipped into place with gaskets flush against the sash.

Mailing early is the best way to get important holiday cards and gifts to their destination on time. But there are several other mailing tips that will help speed your mail safely to delivery.

Customers really appreciate it when they receive advice on how to best mail their packages, letters

As a first step, customers should properly address cards and packages with the name, house number and street (or post office box number), and the city, state, and ZIP Code reserved for the last line. Including the apartment number is especially important during the holiday season.

Postal customers are reminded that some holiday greeting cards may not be acceptable for mailing at standard rates. Letter standards require that envelopes be at least 3 1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to meet minimum mailing standards. On the other hand, a surcharge must be paid on pieces which exceed any of the following dimensions - 6 1/2 inches high or 11 1/2 inches long or 1/4 inch thick.


Mrs. Roy Estherbel Clampitt



Since it's difficult for a cow to produce a calf large enough to pay her annual main-tenance bill and leave some profit for the producer, an open cow is surely losing money. In addition cows calving late and during the summer months wean calves 30 to 90 pounds lighter than their herd mates which calve at earlier times. For this reason it's advisable to cull cows which will calve late next year and purchase pregnant replace-ments which will calve early.

Also, pregnancy testing cows this

Whoever does your pregnancy diagnosis will be able to estimate the calving date on each animal and make it easy to identify next year's late calving cows. Work toward a 60 day calving season or one that's certainly no longer than

Remove barren and late calving cows from the herd will increase both the herd's reproductive potential and pounds of calf
