## Spence appoints Thornberry to head nuclear panel

WASHINGTON, DC - US Rep. Armed Services Committee Chairman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) was appointed Tuesday as Chairman of a special oversight panel to monitor the
establishment and development of the establishment and development of the
National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA).

The new panel - which will be
alled the Special Oversight Panel on Reorganization of the Department of Energy - will be part of the House Armed Services Committee. Thomberry serves on the committee and is a principal architect of the plan, which reorganized the Energy Department
and established the NNSA His appointment to the His appointment to the nuclear
ccurity oversight panel was made by

Floyd Spence, who commended "Mac Thornberry's expertise and Martisan workman-like apprach to this issue over the past several years makes him the perfect candidate to chair the panel." Spence stated. "I am confident that he will h the Armed Services Committee and the Congress ensure that the changes necessary to better manage and secure our nuclear programs are implemented."
