Time for GOP to slice, dice federal budget

What ever happened to fiscal responsibility? In the last three years, federal spending has increased 23.7 percent, according to an Associated Press report this week. That's the biggest rate of increase in a decade, and it highlights the single biggest disappointment of the Bush

presidency.

The report also says discretionary spending had soared by 31.5 percent and that was before the Bush and the Republican Congress created a massive new entitlement in the form of a Medicare prescription benefit, which is expected to cost \$400 billion over the next ten years but by roger estlack will really cost much more.

True conservatives had high hopes that Bush and his merry band of Republicans would pare back the growth of government, keep a tight hold on the purse strings, and possibly even shut down some federal programs. Some really crazy optimists dared dream of seeing entire federal departments - namely the Department of Education - shut down and those responsibilities returned to the several states.

But what conservatives got - and even voted for in some cases - was bigger government, higher spending, and more regulations.

Now, the president is reportedly going to propose a budget that will set the stage to cut the deficit in half over the course of the next several years. He will do this, the AP says, by limiting the growth of nondefense discretionary spending to four percent.

In the language of Democrats, "limiting the growth of spending" is a cut. In other words, they believe that if we spend \$10 million on a project this year, initially plan to spend \$15 million next year, but ultimately spend \$12 million; then we cut \$3 million in funding (and probably starved a child in the process). In reality, however, the above example is a \$2 million increase in spending.

Limiting growth is not what Republicans should be considering. They ought to be working on real cuts (which, in the aforementioned example, would mean spending \$8 million the second year). Yes, dear readers, what Bush should propose and the Republicans should pass is nothing short of a Ginsu budget - one that slices and dices a bloated federal government and makes it bleed like a stuck pig.

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

Real spending cuts are rare in politics, but they are not unheard of. Just look at the Texas Legislature's last session. The boys and girls in Austin just went plumb nuts cutting everything under the sun, and they cut into the quick a few too many times. The problem in Austin was that they used a hatchet to make their cuts when what they really needed was a scalpel - or at least a Skill saw. They should have protected vital state services, such as education and health care, and acted to amputate wasteful expenditures, such as big giveaways so Toyota will come to San Antonio or such as... oh, let me think ... tens of millions of dollars for fancy roadside toilets.

President Bush and GOP House and Senate leaders need to go over the federal budget with a fine-toothed comb and finally admit that government cannot be all things to all people. The Founding Fathers clearly outlined the functions of the federal government. Following their guideline would erase the federal deficit and bring the budget into balance immediately

Would it be painful? Oh, yes. Pain like this country has never felt before. Like a crack addicted needing another hit or a smoker needing another cigarette, Americans would kick and holler at the notion of being weaned off the federal nipple. But it's something that needs to be done. Will it happen? Of course not.

Republicans could seek not to limit growth to four percent but to rather make real cuts in discretionary spending by one or two or three percent. Heck, just keeping spending even would be a good start. Just draw the line on spending for a couple of years. But that won't happen either.

The GOP used to be the party of balanced budgets and fiscal responsibility. They are not acting that way now, and the country is worse off for it. For the party and the country to prosper, Republicans need to return to their roots and stop the wasteful spending.

Cato Institute writer Radley Balko has released a list of libertarian heroes for 2003. The list is composed of five Americans, three of whom are members of the US Congress, and one of those is from Texas.

That person is US Rep. Ron Paul, whom Balko calls "the most consistent defender of freedom elected to federal office in about 200 years."

When Paul faces a decision in Congress, the Texas Republican asks first if the bill in question is authorized by the United States Constitution. The answer is almost always "no," and he votes accordingly. Balko says THE WASHINGTON POST once dubbed Paul "Congressman 'No.'"

That surely wasn't meant to be a compliment from the Post, but I'm sure Paul took it that way. We need more men like him in Congress. We need more "no" votes and more people who will stand up for freedom rather than just roll over for more regulations and more spending.

Government works to improve schools

Mother Goose tales, Big Chief writing tablets, Aesop's Fables, Dick and Jane books ... these classic schoolhouse mementos instantly conjure up images of childhoods long since past. For many of us, our first step toward success in life was through the doors of a public school where these classic tools helped us learn the three "R's" - reading, writing and 'rithmetic.

In 1980, the Department of Education was formed with the directive to "ensure that all have equal access to education and to promote excellence in our nation's schools." In my annual survey I posed the following question about the state of our nation's education system: "In January 2002, the president signed into law historic education reform, the 'No Child Left Behind Act.' The legislation encourages innovation, teaches students based on what works, and makes schools accountable for achievement. As we implement the reforms, it is important to ensure they continue to enhance our system of public education and meet the needs of our nation's children. In your opinion, what should we be doing to improve our public schools?"

That question provoked strong opinions, as Texans far and wide are clearly concerned with the education of their children. When it come to student testing, 63 percent of you felt we needed an increase, with the remainder thinking we needed a capitol

decrease. Equal numbers of you comment felt that, while we by sen. kay bailey hutchison

should pay teachers more, we should also require teacher testing in their field. And I received hearty support for the need to add creativity in curriculum and teaching methods as well as for the idea of giving performance bonuses to teachers and schools.

Below is a small sampling of the feedback I received on this important issue:

• There is a big difference between testing and teaching. Better pay encourages better teachers and more men to enter into and stay in the profession. Nancy, San Antonio

· Give each teacher more flexibility in the classroom. Each student is an individual and requires different ways of teaching. Most teachers should be more creative. Testing should be done, but it is not the most important thing. A great teacher once

told me that most important thing you can give any child is a love of learning. Vickie, Fredericksburg

As we begin our third year under No Child Left Behind, the Department of Education will continue to tackle the challenges facing our nation's education system. As with all legislation, this received some criticism, which I think is best reflected in the words of Texan and U.S. Secretary of Education Rod Paige.

He said, "There is no doubt No Child Left Behind is a tough law. True reform is never easy. But with the unprecedented levels of federal funding for education, new options for parents, historic amounts of flexibility for state and local leaders to target resources where they are needed most, and an emphasis on teaching methods and programs that have been scientifically proven to work, we're already off to a great start."

In December, the Department of Education announced that 26 Texas schools had been designated as "Blue Ribbon Award" honorees. We'll continue to work until all schools are Blue Ribbon Schools.

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

John W. Hinckley Jr., who in 1982 was acquitted by reason of insanity in his attempt to assassinate President Ronald Reagan, has been granted court permission to have unsupervised visits with his parents. Hinckley has been held in St. Elizabeth's Mental Hospital in Washington, D.C., for more than 20 years. He'd been previously granted only supervised visits.

The court's decision has angered many people, including the former first lady, Nancy Reagan, and James Brady, who was severely wounded in Hinckley's attack. (Two others were also injured.) Former Reagan aides, such as Patrick Buchanan, have expressed outrage.

Ad hoc outrage, however, is worth little. Unless the crux of the case - the insanity plea and verdict - is addressed, decisions such as this will continue.

Hinckley was found not guilty of shooting the president and the others because he was said to be insane; that is, at the time of the shooting he is supposed to have had a mental illness that prevented him from appreciating the nature of his act.

If one accepts such a disposition as a matter of principle, then one has no principled grounds to object when the government's psychiatrists say his illness is in remission and he is no longer a danger to others. After all, Hinckley was committed to a mental hospital ostensibly for treatment, not punishment. His confinement was contingent on his being ill and, as a result, dangerous. If the experts said he was no longer ill, there would be no further grounds under the law for holding him.


What is it about Hinckley's act that indicated insanity? He says he tried to kill the president of the United States to attract the attention of a movie actress, Jodie Foster. Is there any reason to think that Hinckley, who was 25 at the time, did not really know what he was doing? To ask the question is to answer it. Who can seriously doubt that he understood that firing a bullet

into Reagan's body could kill him? Who can seriously doubt that he knew this was wrong? That he did it for a screwy reason does not diminish his responsibility.

Could he have chosen otherwise? To answer no, one would have to believe that Hinckley had no choice but to purchase a gun, book a flight, board an airplane to Washington, ascertain the whereabouts of President Reagan on March 30, 1981, wait for him to exit the Washington Hilton, and pull the trigger several times. Are we to believe that an illness made him do this?

The insanity defense is not about compassion. It's about escaping responsibility for bad acts. It is the mark of a free society that people are to be left alone so long as they do not injure others, and they are to be accountable for their actions when they do. Thus the insanity defense strikes at the very heart of our most cherished principles.




The Clarendon Lions Club held their regular Tuesday noon meeting January 6, 2004, with Boss Lion Marvin Elam in charge.


