DA reports **2003 stats**

District Attorney Stuart Messer released his annual report for 2003 this week.

Messer prosecuted 330 felony cases involving 279 defendants in the 100th Judicial District, which includes Donley, Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, and Hall counties.

David McCoy fines in these cases totaling \$666,866 and ordered court costs of \$91,630.25. The DA's office reports that McCoy also ordered restitution to be paid to a variety of victims in the total amount of \$858,543,23.

In addition to the fines and restitution, 83 people - thirty percent of all defendants prosecuted in 2003 - were sent to prison for a total term of imprisonment of 834 years.

"2003 was a busy year for law enforcement in the district," Messer said. "Without all the hard work every law enforcement official gives this district, we could not have successfully solved and prosecuted such a large number of cases."

In Donley County, the total fines assessed against 50 defendants totaled \$93,000, and restitution orders in those cases totaled \$764,042.52. Sixty felony cases were resolved in Donley County in 2003, resulting in successful prosecution on all matters. Twenty-four of those cases involved drug prosecutions.

"I know Sheriff Blackburn is having a positive impact on the possession and use of illegal drugs in our community," Messer said. "Drug use continues to be a major factor in nearly all the criminal cases I see, and it is gratifying to play a small part in the eradication of drugs in Donley County."

GOP justified in exposing **Kerry's record**

Democratic presidential hopeful John Kerry this week is doing what liberals do best - whine.

Kerry, in case you haven't heard, is a decorated Vietnam War hero; and that, his campaign might say, is all you really need to know. His record as a veteran

makes the senator from Massachusetts an ironclad, red-blooded American patriot who knows more about foreign policy and national defense than Einstein knew about physics.

But then along come those mean old Republicans and their unfair tactics of bringing up the facts. This, the Kerry camp says, is questioning the senator's

patriotism. Just where do the Bushies get off looking at Kerry's voting record in the US Senate? Heck, that doesn't matter. The guy's a decorated Vietnam War hero, for crying out loud.

After Bush supporters recently raised issues about Kerry's voting record, the senator struck back at "Republicans who didn't serve in any war" and said, "No one is going to question my commitment to the defense of our nation."

Kerry's not so subtle dismissal of George W. Bush's service in the National Guard makes one really wonder who is questioning whose patriotism. It's all quite a turn around from eight years ago when liberals preferred the draft-dodging, pot-smoking, hippie-loving Billy Jeff Clinton to Sen. Bob Dole, who literally gave his right arm in defense of freedom.

While Kerry's service in Vietnam is admirable, that alone does not qualify him as the best candidate to be president. Is he a patriot? Maybe or maybe not. No one really knows what's in the man's heart. He probably loves his country, but his actions and his record over the last few decades show that he is most definitely not in favor of a strong defense or a strong foreign policy.

In 1970, Kerry told the HARVARD CRIMSON, "I'm an internationalist. I'd like to see our troops dispersed through the world only at the directive of the United Nations." He also said he wanted "to almost eliminate

But perhaps the young Kerry's comments were just youthful ramblings of a recently returned decorated Vietnam War hero turned peacenik. He no doubt changed his tune and evolved into an ardent supporter of a stronger America. No, not really.

Will writes that Kerry voted to cut \$1 billion from counterterrorism activities in 1994, the year after the first attack on the World Trade Center; and in 1995 he also proposed a \$1.5 billion cut in intelligence fund-

THE WASHINGTON POST, hardly a bastion of the right-wing, reported earlier this month that in his first senate campaign 20 years ago, Kerry was "denouncing President Ronald Reagan's military buildup and calling for cuts of about \$50 billion in the Pentagon budget, including the cancellation of a long list of weapons systems, from the B-1 bomber to the Patriot antimissile system to F-14A, F-14D, and F-15 fighter

The Post article by Helen Dewar and Dan Balz goes on to point out Kerry's dual positions of voting in favor of authorizing the current President Bush to use force in Iraq but voting against using force in 1991 after Saddam Hussein invaded Kuwait.

"...aides said that the 1991 vote was not one in opposition to the use of force, just as Kerry has said his 2002 vote was not in support of the use of force," the reporters wrote. "Kerry later said he was voting not for the use of force but for the threat of force."

Yes, that makes perfect sense. Kerry wants to have a foreign policy that goes around bluffing but never doing anything unless it's okay with the French.

Kerry has also been a vocal critic of the current president's "failure" to build a "real" international coalition in Iraq. (A "real coalition" being one that includes France, Germany, and Russia, I assume.) But Dewar and Balz write that Kerry was also critical of the coalition built by Bush's father, calling it "too much like the many flags policy of the old order in

The senator's world outlook has been undeniably influenced by experience in Vietnam and more especially by his post-war role as a peace activist. Kerry's record is one that is unmistakably dovish. He doesn't support a strong military, and he doesn't think America should lead the way in acting to protect its

The last Democratic president held a "Can't we all just get along?" foreign policy, and the result was repeated terrorist attacks on this nation abroad and, ultimately, 3,000 casualties at home.

Kerry may be a patriot at heart, but his ideas will do little to protect America at this time. As Republicans point that out, it should not be considered meanspirited. The senator's record is fair game, and it needs to be exposed to the American electorate.



Among the items of business considered, the board passed a resolution ordering an election to be held May 15 for the purpose of electing three regents.


A bid on delinquent taxes on property in the City of Howardwick was presented and accepted.


The Clarendon College Lady Bulldogs defeated South Plains February 19 and in doing so qualified for the Region V Tournament to be held March 5-8 in Plano.
