Big government takes a big step
That's one small step for
giant leap for big government. In January, impeached president Billy Jeff Clinton told the nation he intended to sue America's tobacco industry. Last week, his administration did just that. In the lawsuit filed by the Justice Department last Wednesday, September 22, Attormey General Janet Reno said the federal govermment "alleges that for the past 45 years the companies that manufacture and sell tobacco fraud and deceit."

The federalies are now trying to recoup the approximately $\mathbf{S} 20$ billion the government allegedly spends each year to treat "smoking related illnesses.

The case could reportedly allow the feds to claim the profits from the tobacco industry dating back to the 1950s. An amount that one story says would be "larger than the total assets of the industry." But if that weren't enough, the government also wants B grams to help smers kick the habit and programs to help smokers kick the habit. erican industry. If sucking all the money out of those companies doesn't get the job done, the government will force the industry to commit suicide.

But wait a minute. The federal govermment subsidizes tobacco farmers, and the United States itself has been making money off tobacco. One source says the federalies take in about $\mathbf{S 1 1 0}$ billion in excise taxes. If the federal govermment is really spending $\mathbf{\$ 2 0}$ bilion per year on smoking related illnesses, then Medicare and other socialized medicine programs. No one forced the feds to do this. In fact, one could argue that the very existence of these programs is in violation of the United States Constitution. How is it now the fault of private industry that the goveroment spent all this
Keep in mind. the tobacco companies are making a legal product, which they sell to consumers who choose to smoke. Never lose sight of that.

In a continuing effort to "do what's best for you," the federal nannyism movement is urging our nation
closer and closer to a totalitarian regime - a nation where the central government will tell you what to eat and how to act because the ones in power know best and because you, the people, are too stupid to take care of yourselves.

The greatest danger associated with socialized medicine - aside from the fact that it is unconstitutional

- is that it allows the government to regulate your life by preventing you from engaging in activities some policy wonk declares to be unhealthy. Industries and activities that cause an undue burden on the system will be
regulated or litigated out of existence. Of course, the regulared or litigated out of existence. Of course, the
government hasn't really taken into consideration how much money smokers save America in Social Security payments by doing the government the favor of dying early. But I digress.

The anti-tobacco crowd is trying to win this war on tobacco through a destuction of personal and economic liberties in the court system. They know they cannot enact a prohibition of tobacco,
bury the industry in litigation.

This lawsuit is an abomination of everything this bility, independence and economic freedonal responsi industry giants in this case have vowed to fight and they will not settle. Let us hope they win. God help us if they lose.

Usenet: the world's largest bulletin board, part of 2

Last week I discussed the won-
derful world of "Usenet." Billed as
the planet's largest bulletin board, this
system allows anyone on the Internet
to view messages from anyone else.
As a litte review, remember that
the Usenet is divided into thousands
of "newsgroups," or subbbulletin
boards. Each newsgroup exists to dis--
cuss one particular topic. The organi-
zation of these newsgroups is hierar-
chical. In other words, a newsgroup
with the name of "rec" is for discus-
sions on all things recreational.
Rec.Humor, on the other hand would
be for joke-telling.
Think of a Usenet message (posst-
ing) as "public e-mail." Usenet mes-
sages look exacty like e-mail mes-
sages except they aren't "sent" to an
e-mail address; they are "posted" to a
newsgroup. Because of the danger of
viruses, only plain-text messages are
allowed on the Usenet. Since all vi-
ruses are binary, not plain text, this
seems pretty safe. After all, you can't
get a virus by reading a message.
That fear, though, prevanted the
exchange of legitimate programs and
other binary files, so someone in-
vented the process of ""uuencoding"
(Yes, the word begins with two U's).
Uuencoding allowed a binary file to

We were among the lucky ones. So far, our sturdy house has enabled us o stay alive, even after the first big earthquake on August 17, 1999, which was 7.4 on the Richter Scale and lasted 45 seconds with a force of 11 . If one considers that the biggest force is 12 , it is easy to understand the loss o between 15 -20 thousand lives and the ruin of a few cities where 80 percent of Turkey's industry was situated. We have had nearly 2,000 continuous
aftershocks for the last month. We had the last one last night with a strength aftershocks for the last month. We had the last one last night with a strengu of 5.00 on the Richt.
God help them too.
Earthquakes make the most damage on soil fundamental places and less damage on rock fundamental areas. One realizes after such a tragedy how little daily worries mean and how much belief in God prayer means and how long 45 seconds can last. We would like to thank all our friends, who have asked about us, al those who have wished us well, and all those who we know in Clarendon,
especially to those who prayed for us in your church. May God protect us all from such tragedies.
