Putnam Couple Injured In Wreck

Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Culwell of Putnam, were injured in a two-car accident about noon Wednesday, July 10, in Abilene. Mr. Culwell, 81, suffered head injuries and is reported to be in serious condition at Dyess AFB hospital. Mrs. Culwell, 68, suffered a fractured ankle but was in good condition at Dyess.

The accident occurred when the Culwell auto collided, nearly head-on, with a car driven by Shirley West of Abilene, at Ross and Russell. Mr. Culwell was apparently thrown from his auto before it crashed into a house at 2457 Russell. The other car also ended up in the yard with both vehicles being heavily damaged.

SCREWWORMS IN COUNTY; STERILE FLY DROP SLATED

The first 1968 case of screwworms in Callahan County has been confirmed by the Screwworm Laboratory in Mission, Texas, according to Jerry L. Lackey, County Agent.

The screwworms were found on a calf on the Buster Hatchett Ranch eight miles southeast of Baird on the Admiral Highway.

Lackey stated that the Texas Animal Health Department will drop 100,000 sterile screwworm flies in a 10 mile area surrounding the Hatchett ranch.

There has been approximately 1,000 reported case of screwworms in Texas in 1968, as compared with less than 100 this time last year. The Department of Animal Health has informed the County Agent's office that the screwworm eradication program is in more serious trouble now than it has been since the year of its initiation in 1963.

Lackey encourages all ranchers to treat all wounds on livestock with a recommended segeworm smear. The Department of Animal Health recommends that ranchers use Co-Ral

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



MIDLAND—"There is a golden opportunity awaiting qualified young men between 20 and 35 years of age at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin to further their education and at the same time prepare for a career in outstanding public service," said Major E. K. Browning, Commander of the Midland Region of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"We are making a special effort to obtain as many qualified young men as we can for a recruit school to begin July 30, 1968. Examinations will be conducted in Midland, Abilene, El Paso and San Angelo for interested men." Browning said. There are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited — Drivers License, License and weight, Highway Patrol and Motor Vehicle Inspection. Trainees are assigned to the service for which they are best suited.

Upon graduation from the 18 week training program at the modern DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, the trainee is commissioned into one of these services. At the Academy he will receive a salary of \$500, while in training. He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms, and many other subjects.

Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; modern liberal retirement privileges and travel expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

Major Browning urges interested young men to get their application today and take the examination for the July 30th school.

Weather Causes Big Cotton Loss

Weather in 1967 cost farmers 84,520 acres on the Rolling Plains, 11 per cent of the 766,960 acres originally planted, according to the report, leaving only 682,340 acres for harvest. In addition, weather severely reduced yields on that acreage not totally destroyed in many areas.

Again this year the Rolling Plains, as well as many other areas of the State, will record a high level of abandonment. Best estimates as of this writing set losses to hail, heavy rains and high winds at around 50,000 acres in the 32 Rolling Plains Cotton Growers counties.

In Callahan County, 3,790 acres were planted, and 2,380 acres harvested, as against 3,410 in 1966. Percentage of acreage lost was 37.3, and the county produced 540 bales in 1967.


