## Economies Growing Stronger

By all indications, the economy of Texas is getting more robust, and the economy of Donley County is improving, too.

"The economic climate in Texas continues to show improvement," said State Comptroller John Sharp when he released the figures. "The total tax rebates to Texas cities are up by 16.2 percent."

Employment is following expanded sales. "Our state's total employment has risen an impressive 2.2 percent in the past year," Sharp said.

Out of 241 counties getting receipts, 85 indicated growth in double digits YTD (although some of these had sales tax increases that inflated the figures some). Unadjusted rough county averages appear to be up 11.41 percent for the year.

The figures are for September sales and for quarterly payments due in that month. That represents August purchases.

Donley County sales were up 3.88 percent for the year-to-date, and up 18.95 for the month.

Clarendon was up 3.71 YTD, and up 18.95 percent for the month. Hedley was off -1.47 for the year but up 16.18 September. Howardwick was +7.97 percent and +17.51 percent.

Armstrong (Claude) posted +13.25 YTD and +6.59 for the month. Briscoe grew 10.6 and 2.72. Carson (Groom, Panhandle, Skellytown and White Deer) turned in curious figures: +17.68 for the longer period, but off -2.47 for the shorter.

Childress was up 7.68 percent and 14.41 percent. Collingsworth's figures were skewed by a local sales tax increase, and Pampa's tax hike raised Gray County figures. Memphis raised its sales tax during the period, so Hall County's figures were not comparable, either. Nevertheless, it appeared all three enjoyed some growth.

Hemphill (Canadian) was up 3.80 YTD, down 3.68 on the month. Motley had odd results, too. +11.14 YTD and -20.22. Weirid.

Potter County (Amarillo) gained respectable 8.72 percent YTD and 12.13 percent on the month. Randall chalked up similar results: +5.74 and +13.35. Wheeler scored 5.59 and 22.94.

There doesn't appear to have been much pattern to the counties that chalked up double digits during this part of the year. Many were rural counties, some near metro areas, but many "in the middle of nowhere."

Among Texas' large cities, Travis County (Austin) took in a nice 15.03 percent YTD increase, followed by Dallas and Bexar (San Antonio) with 11.83 and 11.84. Neither Austin nor San Antonio had significant sales tax increases to influence their figures. El Paso chalked up 9.27 YTD with n.i. and Harris County had 6.05.

Medium sized towns like Amarillo, Waco or Port Arthur reported similar mixed results.

Generally the economy seems to be rebounding. The YTD figures were good, the September figures generally even better.

The Austree hybrid (Salix Matsudana X Alba) is a steril

male hybrid clone and comes as a result of over 30 years of selective breeding by the Department of Science & Industrial Research of New Zealand. This deciduous hybrid will not produce a seed or send out suckers or runners. The Austree is widely used for soil conservation, shade trees, noise and dust barriers as well as windbreaks. This tree can flourish in the heat of Texas, the humidity of Florida or the cold of Montana.

The Amazing Austree grows 6' to 8' per year and tops out at 50' to 70' depending on the soil, weather and water conditions. Because of the popularity of this tree, orders cannot be taken after December 15th.

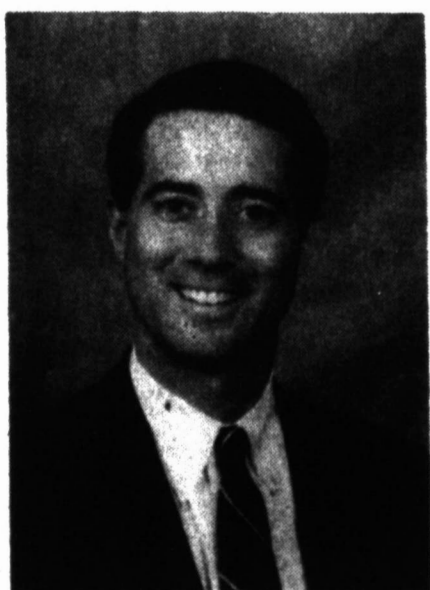

Funeral services for Troy Franklin "Grandpa", age 88, were held at 11:00 a.m. on Tuesday, November 23, 1993 in the First Baptist Church in Clarendon with Rev. Truman Ledbetter, Pastor and Dan Welty, grandson, officiating. Interment was at 2:00 p.m. at Shamrock Cemetery in Shamrock by Robertson Funeral Directors, Inc. of Clarendon.

Mr. Welty died at 1:40 p.m. on Sunday, November 21, 1993 at his son's residence on Lake Greenbelt near Clarendon. He was born October 3, 1905 in Leuters, Texas and was a long time resident of Wheeler County before moving to Clarendon in 1970. He married Frankie Thomas Pollard on June 3, 1927 at Shamrock and she preceded him in death on October 6, 1993. 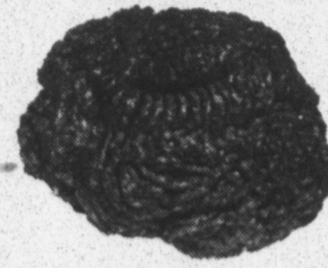

- \* Do not oven-roast meats at temperatures below 325 degrees. Temperatures below 325 degrees are not high enough to destroy bacteria that may develop in large cuts of meat or turkey during long cooking periods;
- \* Cooked food should never be left at room temperature for more than 2 hours, including preparation time. Refrigerate promptly;
- \* Refrigerate cream, custard, or meringue pies and any food with a custard filling, such as cakes, cream puffs or eclairs, just as soon as they have cooled slightly. Follow the same precautions for salads and sandwiches made with salad dressings containing eggs or milk products;
- \* Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Hot foods should be kept at 140 degrees until served. Cooked cold foods should be kept at 45 degrees or lower.

By planning ahead and following these food safety tips you can help ensure your families' health during the holidays and the rest of the year. Remember to stop by WTU for your free cookbook.

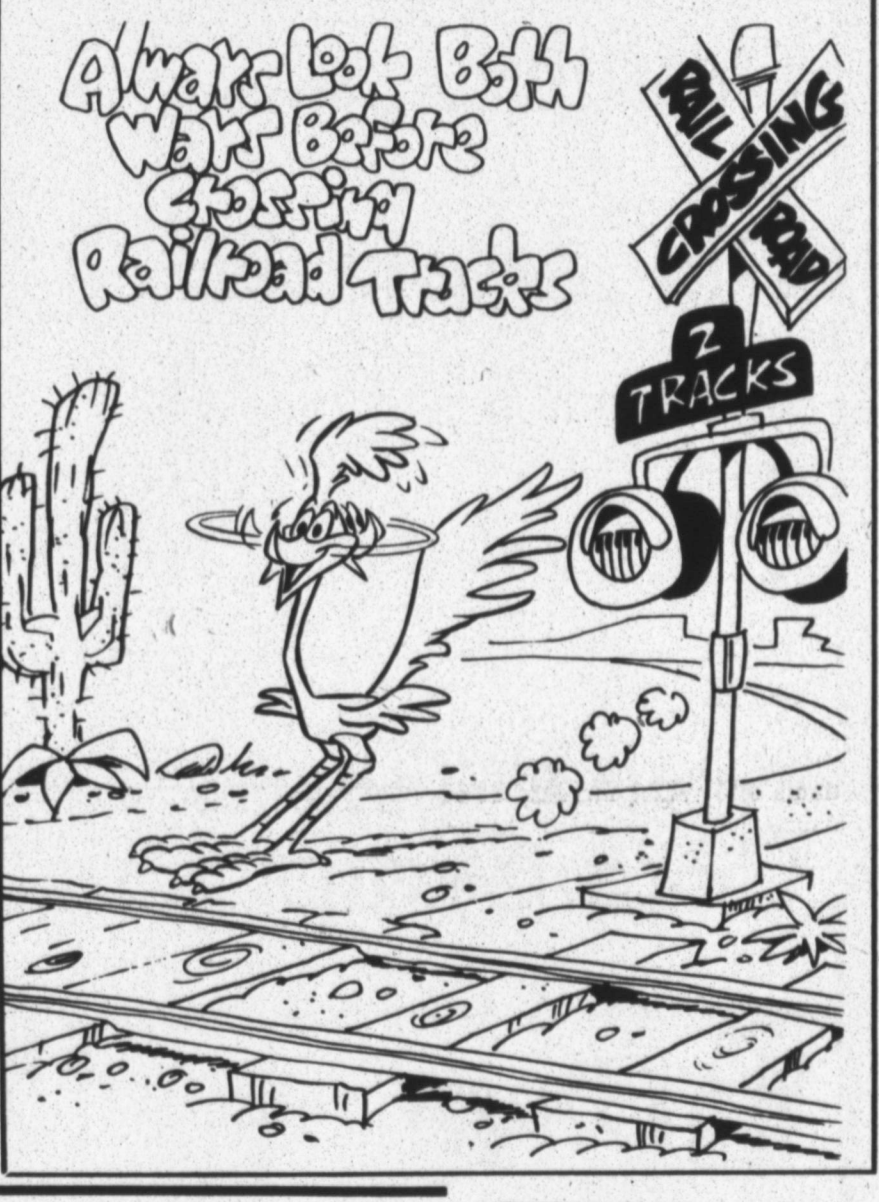

Motion by Phil Fletcher, seconded by Wayne Hardin to approve the minutes as clarified: Open Forum: Board was requested by two individuals, not in attendance, to refrain from restoring the old gym until all school debts are retired. The school has no bonded indebtedness at this time. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0. The financial statement for the month of October was approved by board action.

Bills incurred by the Clarendon Public School and the Business Office were presented. Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Phil Fletcher that bills allowed and ordered paid. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0.

Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Dan Hall to approve the 1992-93 school budget audit. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0.

Open Forum: No issues presented. Motion by Elmonette Bivens, seconded by Wayne Hardin to amend the school calendar to reflect an early release date from school November 24, 1993, at 2:00 p.m. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0.

Mr. Barefield presented information relating to a hazardous bus route for students north of Highway 287. The Texas Education Agency will finance up to 10% of the regular transportation allotment. He proposed a route to provide additional safety for our students and might increase attendance. We have adequate resources to provide this service. Motion by Lynne Williams, seconded by Elmonette Bivens to establish a hazardous bus route north of Highway 287 within a two-mile radius of the school with three pick up points to be designated by Mr. Barefield. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0.

Phil Barefield introduced a proposal to provide student meals at out of district events in UIL, athletic events, or other school sponsored activities on an equitable basis. The board requested a proposal to implement this policy during this school year be developed for consideration at the December regular meeting.

Motion by Dan Hall, seconded by Wayne Hardin to cast all 1,070 Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District votes for Phil Fletcher as a member of the Board of Directors for the Donley County Appraisal District 1994-95. Motion carried Lynne Williams, Wayne Hardin, Derlene Graham, Elmonette Bivens, and Dan Hall for; no noes; Phil Fletcher abstained.

Motion by Phil Fletcher, seconded by Elmonette Bivens to accept a bid from Noel Patts on delinquent property submitted from the Donley County Appraisal District. The bid was in the amount of \$901.00 for Lots 68-69, Country Club Central, City of Howardwick, Donley County. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0.

Enrollment report: Elementary-Junior High, 365, and High School, 155, for a total of 520.

Administrative reports: \$24,776.72 was left from Texas Successful School Awards Systems (TSSAS) received by Clarendon Elementary-Junior High for the 1992-93 school year. An additional \$650.00 is needed to purchase additional dyslexia training tapes for older students as well as the \$12,500 previously approved. Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Dan Hall to increase the budget to \$13,150.00 for the dyslexia program, and \$24,776.72 to create a line item for the elementary TSSAS. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0.

Kent Hargiss stated report cards are out, basketball season has begun, and a special committee has been selected to decide on how to spend high school TSSAS money. The parenting class is progressing. Saturday school will begin on November 13th.

Mike Word reported the DuPont Leadership Training days are complete. Six students attended Gifted and Talented seminar. Extended time for special education aide has been required. Playground committee is progressing. March 22 and 24 have been set for the UIL meet.

Phil Barefield presented information for consideration of a contract with a sports medicine

center for training and professional medical care during games or at other times next year. Plans are to host an invitational literary meet again this year. Mr. Barefield dis-

cussed completed and needed repairs.

We will have 9th grade, junior varsity, and varsity basketball teams. Personnel will be discussed

in executive session at the next board meeting.

### THORNBERRY - from p. 1

Noting that current Congressman Bill Sarpalius represented President Clinton rather than his district in voting for the largest tax increase in history, Thornberry called upon all of those who are dissatisfied with the current direction of government to make a change. "The only way to turn things around is to get involved," Thornberry said, "that is why I decided to make this race."

"It is time - indeed it is past time - for the people of this district to be represented in Washington by someone who will listen to the people of this district, not Bill Clinton, not Speaker Foley, not the host of special interests that infest our nation's capital," Thornberry said.

Thornberry also noted that "People are tired of deception: Tired of budgets that call social security tax increases 'budget cuts' and that call less of an increase than they had planned a 'cut.'"

Raised on the family ranch near Clarendon, Thornberry attended public schools in Clarendon and is a graduate of Texas Tech University and the University of Texas Law School. He served in Washington as legislative counsel to former Congressman Tom Loeffler and as chief of staff to Congressman Larry Combest. He was also Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Legislative Affairs during the Reagan Administration. The Thornberry family moved to Donley County from the Wichita Falls area.

Thornberry is currently a defense litigation attorney with the Amarillo firm of Peterson, Farris, Doores & Jones and is also involved in the family cattle business in Donley County.

In pointing out that Representative Sarpalius could have stopped the tax bill if he had not voted for it, Thornberry emphasized that six Congressional Democrats from Texas voted against the measure. "They heard their constituents and voted 'no' Thornberry said. "Sarpalius and many of the people in Washington don't understand that the people are fed up with government as usual and tax increase after tax increase. Well it's time to make them understand."

Thornberry is a member of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, the Board of Directors of the Children's Rehabilitation Center, and a former board member of the High Plains Food Bank. He and his family are members of the First Presbyterian Church of Amarillo.

William M. (Mac) Thornberry is married to Sally, a graduate of Mary Baldwin College, who also served as a legislative assistant in the Congress and was appointed by former Secretary William Bennett as a Special Assistant for Legislative Affairs in the U.S. Department of Education. Mac and Sally have two children, Will and Mary Kemp.

## Flavius Smith Makes Congressional Bid Official

Republican Flavius Smith launched his campaign for the U.S. House of Representatives 13th Congressional District this week. Calling for changes in the imperial congress by limiting the size of government envisioned by our founding fathers.

Smith stated he has a new vision for the Republican party. "I seek a government of and for the people, a government responsive to the needs of the common citizen, a government which is accountable to the people", Smith said during his kickoff address in Wichita Falls on Monday.

Citing his distrust and dissatisfaction with the Good 'ol Boy Congressional country club Smith declared, "I am not running to be a member of Congress, I'm running to change Congress. Bill Sarpalius has become a part of the problem, not a solution. It's time we had a Republican Candidate who is part of the working class, who understands the daily burden of the increasingly oppressive and ever-expanding Federal Government."

While working to rebuild the trust between citizens and lawmakers, Smith said he would push for: 1. A Federal Open Meeting law to open the halls of Congress; 2. Legislation to make all laws apply equally to Congress; 3. A "Balanced Budget Amendment" to force a balanced Federal budget; 4. A reduction in Taxes and Deficit Spending; 5. Term limits for Congressional committee chairs.

The 35 year old Amarillo Businessman is the father of two children and married to Melanic Arrington Smith the great granddaughter of Texas Ranger G.W. "Cap" Arrington of Hemphill and Wheeler counties. Melanic is a public school teacher in Amarillo.

Flavius Smith was raised on the family farm in rural middle Tennessee. He received an appointment in the Naval Academy from Congressman Joe L. Evans and Senator Howard Baker of Tennessee, however he attended Vanderbilt University on a football scholarship. While at Vanderbilt, Smith a four year letterman, earned Academic All-SEC honors and was named Middle Tennessee Scholar Athlete by the National Football Foundation. Smith signed a professional football contract with the Denver Broncos Football Club. Smith earned his law degree from Oklahoma City University School of Law.

Flavius Smith owns a wholesale hardware builders supply business and is an independent oil and gas operator. He is a certified professional landman and current chairman of the Panhandle Chapter of the American Petroleum Institute.

## Public Notice

**The Cost Of Dog Impound Goes Up**

The City of Clarendon has an ordinance concerning animal control. It is unlawful for any person who owns, possesses, or has the duty of caring for any animal, to permit any such animal to run at large on any public place or private property.

Any person who willingly or negligently fail to restrain any animal shall be guilty of maintaining a nuisance.

It is the duty of the animal control officer to seize or impound dogs running at large. The animal control officer is authorized to hold a licensed dog for five days, or a non-licensed dog for three days.

The owner of any dog impounded may redeem such dog prior to destruction by having the dog licensed, vaccinated against rabies and payment of Fifty dollars (\$50.00) impound fee.

Any person who shall interfere with or attempt to prevent the animal control officer from catching or impounding any dog running at large, whether on public or private property, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon are giving two weeks notice before they begin impounding dogs and charging the \$50.00 impound fee. If you do not want your animal picked up, then you better get them put up. 46-2tc
