More of the same -- hot, dry, and now dusty; the forecast for the weekend, and the beginning of a new week in a continuing heat wave that is leaving the area parched.

A tropical depression has formed in the Central Gulf of Mexico, and such a depression usually produces some type of moisture. But that will not be the case now as dry weather along with record-breaking temperatures are expected to continue.

The National Weather New Coach, Teachers Hired At Lazbuddie

New teachers and auxiliary personnel headlined the agenda for the Lazbuddie Independent School District July 14.

Ricky Copp was hired as vocational agriculture teacher; Charles Cole was hired as science teacher and coach.

Also hired were Debra Hall as fifth grade teacher; Pat Seymour for migrant teacher in the elementary school and Leona Crenshaw as migrant aide. Betty Sherrill was employed as business teacher.

The board approved July 28 at 10 a.m. as meeting time for the Board of Equalization and board members decided to adopt the standards set for the State Board of Education and declared positions of four-aide I's and two-aide III's within the school system.

Members also paid routine bills.

School Board To Consider New Teachers

Resignations of school personnel and employment of replacement personnel will be the major items of business for the board members of the Muleshoe Independent School Board of Trustees when they meet Monday night.

In other action, the school board will approve payment of current bills; review budget balances and the bank balances. They will check the current tax collection report and accept the values of the 1980 Tax Roll.

Consideration will be given to increasing the price of school lunches for students and members will open the bids for the milk products for the 1980-81 school year. Also, they will consider bids on property insurance for the school district and set up a budget workshop.

Geothermal Energy To Supply Power

The 1980s are expected to witness the development of geothermal energy, a source that will provide 7 to 10 percent of the nation's electrical power needs.

Geothermal energy is stored in the earth's crust in the form of super heated steam which can be withdrawn at high pressures and used to operate conventional turbines for generating electricity.

According to a group of geothermal experts who met at Texas Tech University June 19-20, the major obstacles in the advancement of geothermal sources include the extremely high temperatures in the earth's crust, the nature of the hard geothermal forma-

tions and corrosion of drilling equipment.

Dr. Samuel Varnado, a geothermal expert at Sandia Laboratories in Albuquerque, said that "these problems are likely to be solved through research by the late 1980s and will result in the reduction of geothermal drilling costs."

Geothermal energy would then provide "an impressive" 7 to 10 percent of the nation's electrical power needs, Varnado said. That is enough power for a 100

cities like Lubbock, population 182,900.

Varnado's research time table expects to reduce drilling costs 25 percent by 1983 and 50 percent by 1987.

Part of the research that will ultimately reduce drilling costs is being conducted by Dr. Necip Guven, Texas Tech geosciences professor.

Guven is developing drill-

ing fluids that can survive the high temperature and pressure deep in the earth's crust. The fluids, among other things, need to act as coolants for the drilling bits.

The Texas Tech geoscientist hopes to complete his work by next summer.

Research at other institutions is aimed at reducing corrosion on drilling equipment by using nitrogen as a

drilling fluid and reducing corrosion-causing agents such as oxygen.

New drilling bits are also being studied to increase the speed of drilling geothermal wells.

Progress on these research projects was reviewed at the two-day meeting at Texas Tech.

Participants in the Geothermal Drilling Program Advisory Panel's meeting

came from the U.S. Department of Energy, Sandia Laboratories, major oil corporations and drilling companies, and university researchers.

Geothermal drilling technology has applications in the oil and gas industry for developing wells that are below conventional depths.

The meeting was sponsored by Texas Tech's Center for Energy Research.

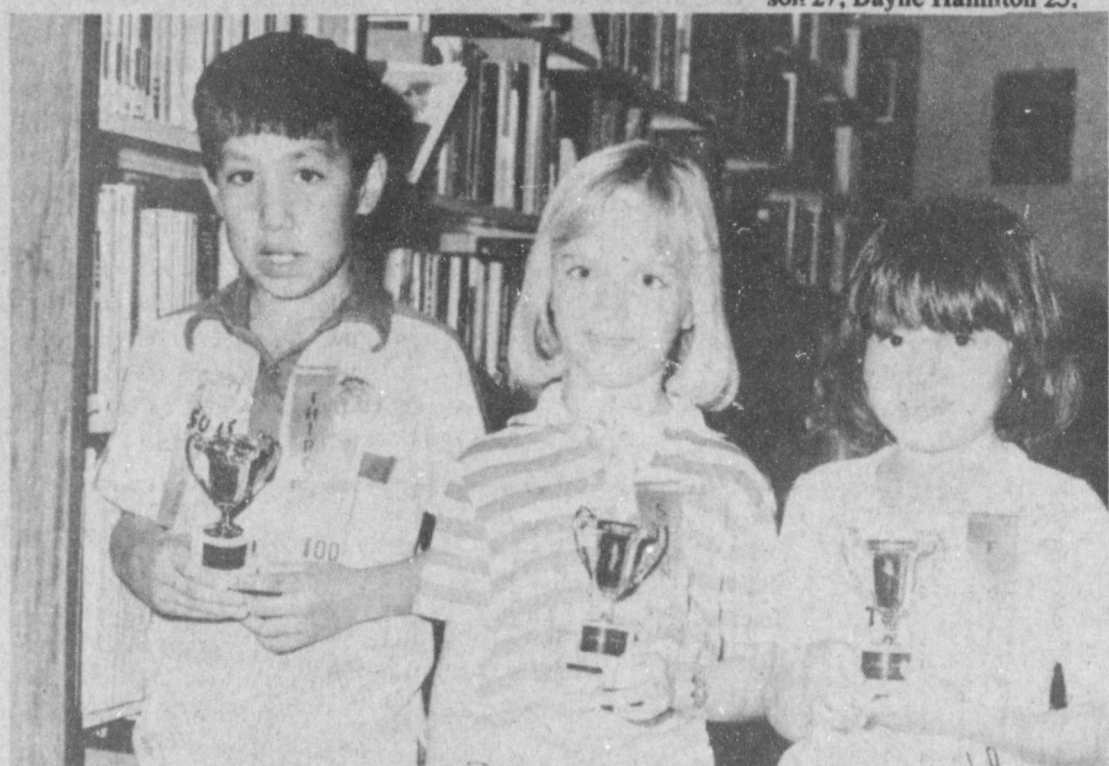

Ask About Airline Policies Before You Travel

Airline passengers have rights and need to know them, especially with the deregulation of the airline industry, says a family resource management specialist.

This is especially true of delayed and cancelled flights.

Here, your "fly rights" can really work for you, if you're aware of them, say Bonnie Piernot.

Mrs. Piernot is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

Airlines don't guarantee their schedules, so remember this when planning a trip.

Even though schedules aren't guaranteed, most airlines will pay for a telephone call or telegram to your destination to announce a delay.

They'll arrange and pay for hotel accommodations and food if you're stranded overnight, and they'll pay for transportation between the airport and hotel.

ferent policies.

If you are stranded by a long delay without help from the airlines staff, keep track of these out-of-pocket expenses and write to the airliner's consumer office for reimbursement when you get home.

Above all, remember that patience can work for you as effectively as your "fly rights".

In many cases, airlines have little control over some delay factors, such as bad weather, air-traffic delays and mechanical repairs. Sometimes the air-

line employees do not have the answer for a delay, such as problems that delay incoming flights. Patience can be a valuable resource in many cases.

Fuel prices can be expected to keep rising though supply will be adequate, predicts Texas A&M University energy expert Dr. Spencer Baen. But there is other bad news.

Researchers point to a slow-down in the economy, credit crack-down and increases in the travel industry's vacation price index as crimps on American vacation travel. The situation is causing people to hold back on plans, arrange trips closer to home or to plan to scrub vacations altogether.

County Taxes Too High?

If you are worried because your county taxes have been too low, you can quit worrying.

The Bailey County Commissioners Court is resolving your problem.

According to a recent letter to each tax payer from the Bailey County Tax Office, our county taxes could be increased by 50%.

Among the reasons given for the increase in taxes was \$50,000 to purchase right of way for a Farm to Market highway in Precinct 4. This is more than 10% of the County's 1979 tax collections.

If your commissioners would move the proposed highway one mile east, to a county road that was designated to be paved more than 15 years ago, most right of way would be donated, saving Bailey County taxpayers at least \$40,000.

Rudolph Moraw, Commissioner of Precinct 4 insists that the Texas Highway Department Engineers "moved the highway" but has produced no evidence to support his claim. Texas Highway Department Engineers state emphatically that their office did not "move the highway", that location of farm to market highways is the responsibility of the Commissioners Court.

The change of location of this Farm to Market road would not only save our County \$40,000 but would better serve more people.

The change of location would save the Texas Highway Dept. at least \$100,000 in construction costs. These are also tax dollars.

This is also a problem for the residents of Muleshoe since they also pay county taxes.

If you resent wasting county tax dollars in this manner, talk to your commissioner or to our County Judge about this problem.

It is not too late to change.

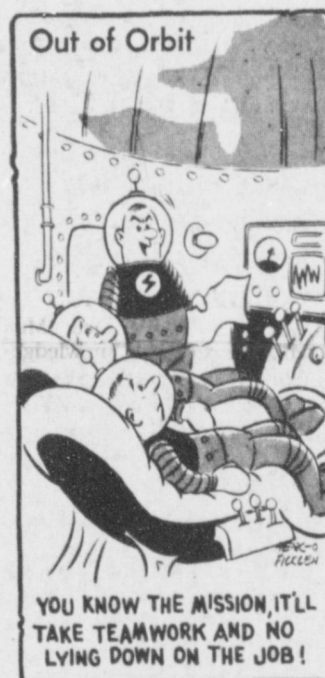

holic liquids.

No heat-related deaths have been reported in this area, and the hospital in Muleshoe has not reported treating any severe heat related problems, such as heat exhaustion or heat stroke.

It is now predicted by the National Weather Service that the current heat wave may not abate until late September or early October, and in the meantime, little to no moisture is expected throughout a wide section of the United States and especially through a band of states, including the southwestern states.

Crops continue to suffer and in many instances, farmers predict that moisture received now will be too late to be of any major benefit to fall crops.

Even irrigated corn is showing the continued effects of the heat. Some producers are saying row watered corn is soaking up the irrigation water before the water can reach the end of a row. Also, problems are also being experienced with the sprinkler type systems, as the extreme heat is causing evaporation and a lack of adequate moisture reaching the roots of the crops.

As the heat continues, along with the continued dry weather, many farmers predict minimum harvests for this fall.

Identification of poisonous snakes is best safety policy

COLLEGE STATION — When warm weather brings Texans out of their homes into the countryside, it also brings out the snakes.

Each year more than 2,400 people are bitten by snakes, both poisonous and nonpoisonous, explained Charles Ramsey, a Texas A&M University wildlife specialist.

Fortunately, the incidence of poisonous snakebites is rare and the death rate from snakebite is even lower — less than 1 percent of the snakebite victims, Ramsey said.

If bitten by any type of snake, try not to panic, Ramsey advised. The best advice is to learn to identify the poisonous snakes and leave them alone, says the Texas A&M specialist.

"If you encounter a snake, just walk away and leave it alone," he says.

Poisonous snakes in Texas considered to be dangerous to humans include species from two families: pit vipers such as rattlesnakes, copperheads and cottonmouths, and cobra-like snakes including the coral snake.

Texas is number one twister state

COLLEGE STATION — Although recent computer studies indicate that national centers of tornado activity are shifting or expanding, Texas along the Red River and in the Panhandle still live in the middle of Tornado Alley, according to two Texas A&M University meteorologists.

In fact, all Texans — particularly the 1.3 million newcomers — are potential victims of the killer storms, say Dr. A. H. Thompson and Jim Lynch, a graduate student.

According to the State Climatologist's Office headquartered at Texas A&M, an average of 109 "confirmed" twisters touch Texas soil each year. It is feared that many more form but are not counted because they go unseen by authorities or trained spotters.

Partly due to its size, more tornadoes have been recorded in Texas than any other state, although Texas ranks 11th among states in tornadoes per 10,000 square miles, with 3.9.
