

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# Markets beat government on medical errors

WellPoint, Cigna, and a number of other major health insurance companies announced last month that they will no longer bear the extra costs of caring for patients harmed by any of nearly a dozen types of preventable medical errors. In other words, the doctors and hospitals that harm these patients will have to foot the bill themselves.

These errors occur all too frequently. The Institute of Medicine, a non-partisan research organization chartered by Congress, estimates that 50,000 to 100,000 hospital patients die in the United States each year as a result of preventable errors. That's almost three to six times the 18,000 Americans the IOM estimates die each year because they lack health insur-

Medical errors are pervasive in part because the way we pay doctors and hospitals leaves them with too little direct incentive to improve patient safety. For the most part, insurers pay providers on a "feefor-service" basis: for each service a doctor performs, he collects a fee. That creates an obvious incentive to recommend more tests and treatments, even if those services offer little or no benefit to the patient.

The problem goes beyond wasteful spending, however. If, through negligence, a healthcare provider causes a patient to require more services, he can often collect additional fees.

Medicare, the federal health care program for the elderly, provides an example. When Congress created Medicare in 1965, it assuaged doctors' fears about government-run medicine by agreeing to pay providers on a fee-for-service basis

When a hospital discharges a patient, Medicare cuts the hospital a check based on the patient's diagnosis, and cuts checks to the doctors who treated him. If, however, someone made a mistake that injured the patient and caused him to receive more services - if, say, he acquired a preventable infection, or received the wrong medication, or was injured in a fall, or developed bedsores, or underwent surgery on the wrong body part - then Medicare will send the doctors more checks, and might also increase the amount it pays the hospital.

Imagine remodeling your kitchen and paying the contractor extra to fix your garage door because he backed his truck into it. When Medicare and private insurers reward medical errors this way, Americans pay higher taxes and insurance premiums to cover the costs of other people's mistakes.

After forty years, Medicare has finally wised up to this perverse financial incentive. Medicare officials have announced that starting this October, they will no longer pay the added costs associated with a list of obvious medical errors. Private fee-for-service plans such as WellPoint and BlueCross/BlueShield are following Medicare's lead, as they usually do in matters of provider reimbursement.

Yet this is hardly a case of government beating the market. Markets developed an antidote to this perverse incentive decades ago by creating arrangements that force hospitals and insurers to bear the financial costs of their own errors.

In prepaid group practices like Kaiser Permanente, providers receive a fixed amount of money per patient. If an error leads to additional services, the added expense comes right out of Kaiser's bottom line. As Donald Berwick and Sachin Jain of Harvard Medical School write, "The prepaid group practice model is particularly conducive to improving safety...because the practice itself (and not the insurers or patients) must pay the costs of poor quality."

If anything, government prevents markets from improving patient safety. A raft of government interventions favor fee-for-service medicine and inhibit competition by plans with greater incentives to reduce errors. Medicare, the nation's largest purchaser of medical services, is almost entirely fee-for-service. Federal and state tax laws give larger tax breaks to people or groups that choose more costly care, and favor employer-based coverage, which usually denies workers the ability to choose their health plan.

To be sure, prepayment creates a troubling incentive of its own: providers who receive a fixed amount per patient can potentially increase their profits by skimping on care. Nevertheless, most research suggests that prepaid plans produce similar health outcomes at a lower cost.

We may disagree about how to achieve better medical results, but as we all know, you get what you pay for. The government pays for unnecessary and harmful medical care, and that means more money, more mistakes, and more casualties

# Our commitment to our servicemen

Texans honor our men and women in uniform every day of the year, but formal recognition is concentrated in

This year, we express our appreciation for military service on May 17, Armed Forces Day, and we honor the fallen on May 26, Memorial Day.

We especially remember the heroism and sacrifice of American troops who served in World War II, which ended in Europe on May 8, 1945, and in the Pacific three months later.

Our current military force is similar to its predecessors in its dedication and determination to preserve our freedom. But in contrast to the past, today's troops are all volunteers. If anything, their willingness to serve our country creates a greater obligation on our part to look after their long-term needs and goals.

Following World War II, the U.S. government created a G.I. Bill to provide educational benefits for the flood of military coming home from wartime duty. Many recipients were drafted immediately after high school, interrupting their education. The G.I. Bill allowed them an opportunity, upon returning from the war, to pick up where they might have been prior to their service.

The men and women who serve today do so by choice, and their circumstances are diverse. As a result, they require a broader range of options. So Congress is currently updating the G.I. Bill to meet the requirements of our modern-day soldiers, sailors, airmen, and marines.

I am proud to co-sponsor new legislation that recognizes the vital role that military families play in the support, well-being and careers of our troops. This legislation expands educational benefits for service members and, for the first time, allows benefits to be transferred to their dependents.

The Enhancement of Recruitment, Retention, and Readjustment Through Education Act, S. 2938 is aimed at two distinct groups of service members - those who have completed their enlistment, and those who have decided to make military service a career.

Our legislation is unique in allowing more service members to transfer education benefits to family members, either a spouse or dependent children.

"Our first objective is to strengthen the all-volunteer force. Accordingly, it is essential to permit transferability of unused education benefits from service members to family ... Transferability

supports military families, thereby enhancing retention," Defense Secretary Robert Gates said recently.

Secretary Gates also noted that competing plans might have unintended effects. "Any enhancement of the education benefit, whether used in service or after retirement, must serve to enhance recruiting and not undercut retention,"

S. 2938 also increases monthly education benefits for active duty personnel, allows more service members to access Department of Veterans Affairs programs, increases benefits for members of the National Guard and Reserve, allows use of benefits to repay student loans, and creates a matching program to help more veterans graduate debt-free.

While this legislation provides a significantly higher monthly payment, it also gives service members wider choices of educational benefits and the freedom to choose those that best meet

This new legislation is well timed. We can never do enough for those who, by their willingness to serve, help protect us and our way of life. But we can express our gratitude and strengthen our military by serving the needs of those who have defended our freedom.

# City sales tax revenue climbs again in April

Clarendon had its second consecutive month of growth in sales compared to the dramatic growth tax revenue in April despite a slight

downturn at the state level. Texas Comptroller Susan Combs last week sent the city up 6 percent compared to the previ-\$32,282.57 for its May allocation, an increase of 7.37 percent over last now stands at \$125,117.71, which is is translating into sales tax growth 1.98 percent higher than at the same below the double-digit pace of the point in 2007.

Aspirin May Reduce the Risk of Breast Cancer

Three years ago, the results of a study of approximately 3,000 women published in the Journal of the American Medical Association suggested that aspirin when taken as little as once a week for six months would lower the risk of breast cancer by a sizable percentage. However, some health experts who looked at that study recommended that it was too early to recommend aspirin for all women based strictly on that study.

Recently, the results of a new study conducted by researchers at the National Cancer Institute were published online in Breast Cancer Research. The study involved over 127,000 women ages 51 to 72. Those who took aspirin every day were moderately less likely to develop a specific type of breast cancer, referred to as estrogen receptor- positive breast cancer. This research group indicates that estrogen is thought to fuel this type of cancer and that aspirin may interfere with estrogen's effect in the body. They also add that any woman who is considering taking daily aspirin should first talk to her doctor to get a complete understanding of the pros and cons of aspirin therapy.
