Judge Havens goes to justice seminar

Donley County Justice of the Peace Connie Havens was certified at the recent Stage 3 Twenty-hour Justice of the Peace Seminar April 8-11 in San Antonio.

The seminar was sponsored by the Texas Justice Court Training Center, a division of Texas State University - San Marcos.

The seminar is one of three seminars held for newly appointed justices of the peace so they can fulfill their continuing judicial education requirements of 80 hours of training within the first year of taking office.

Topics addressed included "Where Are You Now?," "Introduction to Jurisdictional Increase," "Justice of the Peace and Constable Partnership," "Civil Law Round Table," "Traffic Law," and "Mock Trials."

Pre-K, Head Start applications sought

Always Remember *Holocaust survivor shares story of struggle*

A Jewish survivor of the Holocaust said the hope for a peaceful world is in the hands of Americans as he recounted his experiences in Nazi labor camps last Thursday.

Tibor Stern, an 83-year-old native of Transylvania, told Clarendon College students in the Harned Sisters Fine Arts Center that he was 17 when he tried to escape his homeland with the intention of joining the British Army and fighting the Germans.

"When you're young, you think you're invincible and nothing can hurt you," Stern said.

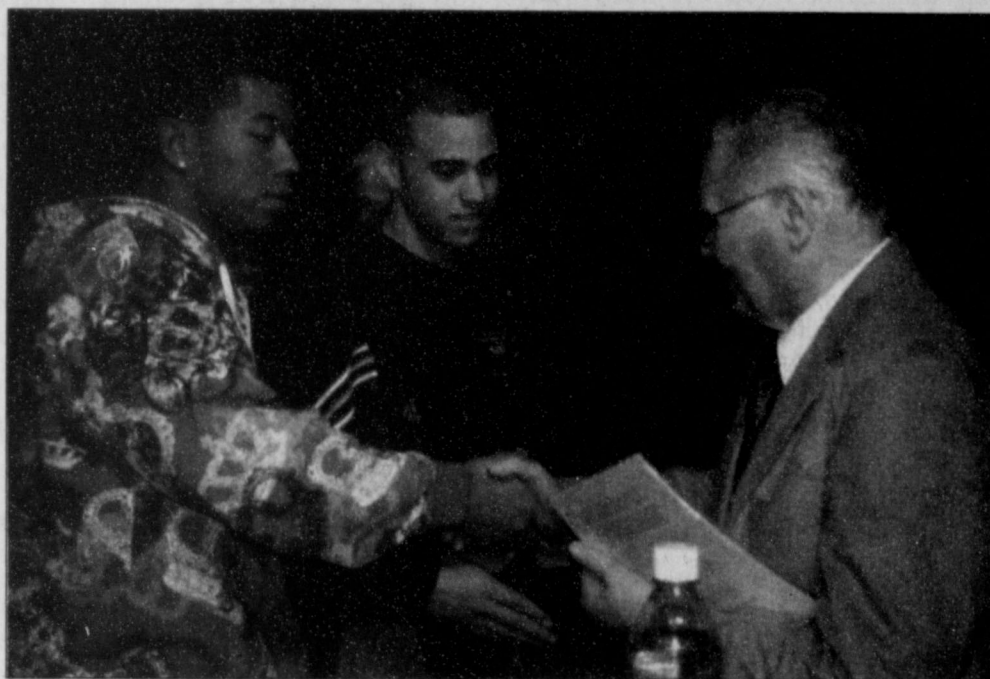
But he soon found out that he was not invincible when he was arrested trying to cross the border into Romania and taken by car to the headquarters of the Gestapo.

"They thought I was a spy," Stern said. "They laid me on a table and tied my hands and feet. They beat my legs, back, and buttocks with a steel rod, trying to get the answer they wanted. But I stuck to my story."

When they finally gave up, Stern could no longer stand and had to crawl on his hands and knees down the hall. He was sentenced to 90 days and then released back to Hungary. There he was sentenced to 10 years of hard labor and put in a boxcar with other Jews and gypsies to be taken to work in a German training camp.

After he helped build the camp, he was transferred to the custody of the SS and taken to Poland.

"The SS guards were really rough on us," Stern said. "I was hit in the face with a rifle butt and lost a tooth. I can't tell you how many of my friends I helped bury in shallow graves across the

country."

Those who couldn't work were killed with bayonets - to save bullets.

As World War II drew to a close, Stern and 48 of his fellow workers were transferred to another labor camp where they were liberated by Russian soldiers. He weighed only 88 pounds at the time. Two of the 48 who were liberated died within a day.

When he contacted his family, he learned that there were only five Jewish survivors of the Holocaust in his family.

"There were ten million victims of the Holocaust," Stern said, including Jews, gypsies, homosexuals, and political dissidents. "We are forever grateful to the thousands of Christians who risked their own lives to save the lives of Jews."

Stern was among the thousands who danced, sang, and cried in St. Peter's Square after the

creation of the State of Israel. In 1946, he immigrated to America under a student visa but did not enroll in school and did not have the proper paperwork to apply for legal status in the states.

"I was actually here illegally," he said. "I was arrested, and I thought I would be deported to Hungary and end up in a communist labor camp."

But the United States would not deport someone to a communist nation at the time. Later a law was passed by Congress that allowed Stern to naturalize here and become a citizen. He worked in New York for a time and eventually settled in Amarillo, where he lives today.

Stern said America is representative of the world because it includes people of every faith, religion, and creed; and Americans must show the world the way to live with respect for each other.

"If we cannot show the

world that Americans can live in harmony, then there is no hope for the world, and a future Holocaust is inevitable."

But Stern does not think that outcome is likely based on his experience in the USA.

"This is the best country in the world, and I can tell you from experience," he said. "There are wonderful people here. Very tolerant."

Stern's speech came as the world prepares for Holocaust Remembrance Day, which is May 1.

After he finished, college students and community members lined up to shake his hand or hug him, many with tears in their eyes.

With no formal education beyond eight grades, Tibor Stern taught those in attendance a valuable lesson about history from a first hand perspective and helped insure that the horror of the Holocaust will never be forgotten.

Voters in the Hedley Consolidated Independent School District can cast early ballots at the HISD Business Office between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Incumbents Kelly Patton, Blain Burton, and Rex Morris will be joined on the ballot by challengers James Potts, Bonnie Walsh, and Tonja Ruthardt. Three positions are available this year.

Applications for ballots by mail must be received by May 2 at the HISD Business Office.

Elections for city and school offices will be held Saturday, May 10.

Jobless rate down some

AUSTIN - Donley County's unemployment rate remained constant at 4.1 percent last month, according to seasonally unadjusted information released last week by the Texas Workforce Commission.

The TWC reported the county had 74 people unemployed out of a workforce of 1,735.

One year ago Donley County had a 4.4 percent unemployment rate.

Statewide, Texas seasonally adjusted nonagricultural employment grew by 13,500 jobs in March.

Texas employers now have added 213,700 jobs in the past 12 months for an annual job growth rate of 2.1 percent. After a record low of 4.1 percent in February, the statewide seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose slightly to 4.3 percent in March, down from 4.4 percent a year ago.

The U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.1 percent this month, up from 4.8 percent in February and 4.4 percent in March 2007.

"Our Texas economy continues to show significant underlying strength with gains of nearly 40,000 jobs during the last three months," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken. "Unemployment rates remain near record lows, and our annual job growth rate remains a strong 2.1 percent, well above the U.S. job growth rate of 0.4 percent."

"Texas employers continue to create jobs in virtually every industry sector, outpacing the nation as a whole," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Ron Lehman.

Education and Health Services grew by 2,200 positions in March, with 36,100 jobs added over the year.

CC offers free tuition to folks 65 and over

For those people age 65 and over who would like to go back to college, look no further than Clarendon College for a little help. CC offers two programs for tuition reduction geared toward senior citizens.

CC President Bill Auvenshine said the program has been in place for some time but said the college is making more of an effort to make seniors aware of what's available to them.

"We know that education is a lifelong experience," Auvenshine said, "and you're never too old to learn. Many of our programs would be very beneficial to senior citizens."

The first is the "65 And Over Free Tuition For Six Credit Hours Program" for those senior citizens who are Texas citizens, enroll at Clarendon College, and enroll in a class that is not already filled with students who are paying full price for the courses. This program is for those who want to take up to six hours and receive credit for the courses.

The second program is the "65 and Over Free Tuition for Auditing Classes Program." This is for senior citizens who are Texas citizens, enroll at Clarendon College, and enroll in a class that is not already filled with students who are paying full price for the courses. This program is for those students who would like to take a class but receive no credit.

Auvenshine specifically mentioned computer classes as being beneficial to senior citizens, and he also said CC offers classes for those who are interested in learning more about history, the fine arts, and many other topics. He also said seniors may enjoy being a part of the community choir at CC.

The senior citizens programs are meant to be expressions of appreciation for older residents, he said.

"Anyone who has paid taxes all their life deserves a break when they get to be 65, and this is our way of doing that," he said.

These programs only cover tuition and standard fees for academic courses. They do not cover additional fees charged for classes, such as lab fees. No funds may be used to pay tuition for continuing education classes.

Nothing succeeds like failure

Although plenty of questions are being asked about Secretary Paulson's plan granting sweeping new powers to the Federal Reserve, a crucial one is in danger of being overlooked. That question is: What use has the Fed made of past extensions of its powers? Is it reasonable, given the Fed's record, to expect it to use new powers responsibly?

The answer ought to give plan supporters second thoughts. It is that, whenever the Fed acquired new powers in the past, it abused them, often with dire consequences for the U.S. economy.

The Federal Reserve Act of 1913 charged the Federal Reserve System with protecting the gold standard by ending financial panics like those that racked the U.S. in 1884, 1893, and 1907. Those panics were stoked by laws that prevented national banks from issuing their own currency unless it was backed by U.S. government bonds. Because eligible bonds were becoming scarce, the Fed was allowed to swap its "emergency" currency — Federal Reserve notes — for banks' commercial IOUs. By taking those IOUs at above-market or "penalty" discounts, the Fed was supposed to prevent panics without ever fueling inflation.

How well did the Federal Reserve use its original powers? During World War I it abandoned penalty rates for "easy" money, and then began buying Liberty Bonds to support the government's war effort. Those actions helped hoist the inflation rate from close to zero in 1915 to almost 20 percent in 1920 — a level not seen since the Civil War. When the war ended the Fed reversed course, triggering the severe (though mercifully brief) plunge of 1920-1921.

Instead of learning a lesson, in the later 1920s the Fed turned to easy money again. But bankers had learned a lesson, and so refused to borrow from it even at low rates. Consequently the Fed, taking advantage of some fine print in the Federal Reserve Act, started buying large quantities of U.S. securities on the open market. The result was an unprecedented stock bubble, which the Fed only managed to prick, in late 1929, by choking-off normal business credit. During the ensuing panic the Fed, pleading impotence, stood by while the U.S. money stock lost a third of its pre-crash value. The "great contraction" — the worst credit-crunch in U.S. history — culminated in the national bank holiday of March 6th through March 12th, 1933, during which the domestic gold standard, which the Fed was supposed to preserve, was permanently disabled.

Although the 74th Congress held the Fed largely responsible for causing the worst boom-and-bust in U.S. history, it set a future pattern by choosing, not to clip the Fed's wings, but to give it more power through the Banking Act of 1935. That Act shifted power from the twelve Federal Reserve banks to the Federal Reserve Board in Washington, while granting the Board-dominated Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) practically unlimited discretion in buying and selling U.S. government securities on the open market. The Banking Act also allowed the Board to double member bank reserve requirements, which it proceeded to do in short order, during 1936 and 1937, in order, it said, to avoid inflation. In fact there was no inflation. Instead, the U.S. economy had just begun to crawl out of the Great depression. Thanks to the Fed's folly, it was driven right back into it.

Although the Banking Act was supposed to prevent the Fed from becoming a mere handmaiden to the Treasury, by denying the Secretary of the Treasury and the Comptroller of the Currency their former seats on the Federal Reserve Board, its failure to do so became clear during World War II, when the Fed devoted itself to "pegging" (that is, propping-up) the price of Treasury bills. Wartime price controls hid the inflationary consequences of this policy until after 1946. But by 1951 inflation had forced the Fed to reach an "Accord" with the Treasury freeing it, on paper at least, from Treasury dominance. But the Vietnam War saw the Fed once again accommodating the Treasury, and by the mid-1970s the inflation rate once again reached double digits.

Besides its other adverse effects, that inflation caused scores of banks to give up Fed membership, with its increasingly burdensome reserve requirements. Congress responded, at the Fed's urging, with the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (DIDMCA). Among other things DIDMCA allowed the Fed to set reserve requirements for, and lend to, all kinds of depository institutions, whether Fed members or not. It also let the Fed treat foreign government obligations as "collateral" for its notes.

Fed purchases of foreign obligations allowed it to assist the treasuries of third-world governments whose securities happened to figure prominently among the assets of some large U.S. banks. Although Federal Reserve Board member Charles Partee testified, in January 1983, that DIDMCA included "ample safeguards" to keep the Fed from stocking-up on the risky foreign debt, later that same year the Fed reported having lost \$456 million on holdings of devalued Mexican pesos.

Why does Congress keep rewarding the Fed for its failures? The paradoxical answer is that those failures are often so catastrophic as to send members scrambling for a quick fix.

Is there a way out? There is, but it requires action, not while turmoil reigns, but after the latest crisis has passed, and before the next can break out. That's when Congress needs to think seriously, at long last, not about strengthening the Fed, but about streamlining it, by assigning it the single, achievable, and difficult to abuse goal of stabilizing the dollar's purchasing power.

Free Trade boosts Texas' prosperity

From its beginning as a state, Texas has prospered through trade. Texans work hard and efficiently, and what we produce is highly valued around the globe.

In the early days of Texas statehood, cotton was king; and most of it was exported to mills abroad. Then came the Texas cowboy and cattle drive era, the beginning of our international beef industry.

Today, Texas leads all states in exports of goods, ranging from agricultural products to computer and electronic equipment; and we don't do badly in services — such as gas and oil technology. Exports are the difference between sustainability and prosperity for our agriculture sector — they've helped keep farms and ranches thriving across our state.

Some 23 percent of our agricultural production is sent abroad. That includes two-thirds of our cotton crop (it's still our biggest money-maker), two-thirds of our rice, one-third of our peanuts, and virtually every bushel of wheat. The Texas economy is outpacing the U.S. economy, and exports are a major reason.

That's why Texans should all be concerned when Washington politics stops a sound foreign trade agreement, as it did this spring. The U.S. House Democratic leadership found a procedural loophole to stall indefinitely an accord with Colombia, at least until after the election this fall.

One special interest group applauded this reckless decision — U.S. labor unions. Other groups with a broader view condemned it as shortsighted, particularly for U.S. foreign policy. Non-partisan experts all over the country, including in Texas, joined in the criticism.

Texas jobs are not the only interest at stake. Colombia, a large and important democracy in Latin America, has been a steadfast U.S. ally in the war against drugs and narco-terrorists. The House leadership's action gives the appearance that the U.S. is a fair-weather partner and does not honor its promises to those who help us. It indicates we are not trustworthy in trade negotiations.

The decision to kill the accord will also buttress Hugo Chavez, the authoritarian ruler of nearby Venezuela, who provides regular support to drug traffickers and terrorists targeting the

U.S. These are not idle threats. Some Chavez-backed leftist guerrillas in Ecuador were recently found with 66 pounds of uranium.

Chavez is assembling an anti-U.S. coalition in Latin America and beyond. Congress's shortsightedness will doubtless bolster his credibility.

It's impossible to measure precisely the damage from this episode on the Texas economy. Currently, most Colombian goods enter the U.S. without any tariff. But U.S. exports are now subject to substantial tariffs in Colombia.

Last year, Texas sold \$2.3 billion worth of products to Colombia, despite tariffs as high as 15 percent for computers and electronic equipment and 20 percent for machinery.

The situation is even more one-sided for some agriculture products. Texas beef producers now face an 80 percent tariff to sell in Colombia.

Wiping away those tariffs would increase Texas exports to Colombia significantly, a move that would lead to additional job opportunity and economic activity in Texas. I will do what I can to reverse the House decision and get an up-or-down vote on our proposed trade agreement with Colombia.



Education, innovation key to future

On Tuesday, I met with the presidents of some of America's most prestigious universities to discuss ways to improve our nation's global competitiveness. There is a growing consensus that America's future prosperity is threatened by an erosion in our educational capabilities. Compared to children in other countries, our nation's students are underperforming in the vitally important fields of science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM). These are the areas of expertise that spur creativity and new technologies, which are essential for economic growth. In fact, as much as 85 percent of the measured growth in per capita income is due to technological advancement.

As part of "Competitiveness Week," I joined my Senate colleagues to promote legislative ideas that will spur America's economy. Congress is taking appropriate measures to prevent a deep recession — including a \$155 billion stimulus package and a major housing reform plan — but it must also take the necessary steps to strengthen the founda-

tions of America's prosperity — namely, science and technology. There is a sense of urgency about this issue. As Norman Augustine, the former CEO of Lockheed Martin who headed the National Academies' groundbreaking report on competitiveness, "Rising Above the Gathering Storm" said: "I have never seen American business and academic leaders as concerned about this nation's future prosperity as they are today."

One of the best ways to recharge our prosperity is to make the Research and Development (R&D) tax credit permanent. This vital initiative, which serves as a crucial driver of R&D investment decisions, expired on December 31, 2007. With foreign governments actively recruiting U.S. companies to base research operations abroad, the

R&D tax credit is a proven, effective incentive for companies to increase their research and development activities in America. We also need to ensure that the best minds in the world have the opportunity to work in our country. Current visa restraints that limit the number of U.S.-educated foreign-born workers from staying here must be reformed. One large financial institution recently tried to hire 200 foreign-born students who had graduated from Ivy League schools and were seeking employment in the U.S.

These proactive measures will build upon the highly successful America Competes Act, which Congress passed last year. This legislation addresses several important goals.

Altogether, the America Competes Act is a major step forward in meeting the economic challenges of the future, but we can't rest on our laurels. Congress must use the attention drawn by "Competitiveness Week" to advance legislation that strengthens our long-term prosperity.

Nominate veterans for banquet

Once again it is springtime in the Panhandle, and plans are already being made for the annual Panhandle Veterans Hall of Honor Banquet.

This project was started in 1990 and was initiated to recognize and honor those outstanding Panhandle veterans who have distinguished themselves in the service of our country. Over the years, we have inducted individuals from Pampa, Amarillo, Canyon, Claude, Miami, Higgins, and other area towns. These honored inductees have been recipients of such awards as the Silver Star, Distinguished Flying Cross, and even three who received the Congressional Medal of Honor. We can never completely show our appreciation to these individuals for their bravery, love of country, and unselfish sacrifices.

To be eligible for induction into the Hall of Honor, the nominee needs to meet one of four criteria: born in the 26-county Texas Panhandle, raised here, went into the service while living here, or served at the Pampa Army Air Field

during WWII. The board has also elected to expand the eligibility to include those who were stationed in the 26 counties during their service, any individual who moved to the Panhandle after being discharged and made significant contributions in or to the military services, and individuals who served in the Merchant Marine, Coast Guard, or civilians such as those who fought beside Marines at Wake Island in WWII.

To nominate someone, give us a short narrative on their life, what branch of the service they were in, the awards they received, and, if possible, a copy of citations that accompanied the awards, plus any copies of newspaper clippings pertaining to the nominee. In the narrative, we are encouraging the writer to tell about the nominee's contributions to his or her community following his years of service in the military. This will give our selection committee a better idea as to the overall merit of the individual.

We need all nominations in no later than July 16. After the committee's

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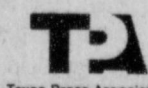
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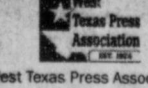

A workshop for managing small acreages for wildlife will be held at the Clarendon College Bairfield Activity Center on Thursday, May 8.

Wildlife management and recreation can be an integral part of a ranching operation. With proper management techniques, rangeland habitats can support a variety of wildlife species.

The workshop's morning session will be held at the Bairfield Center, and field exercises will be held at the Taylor Lakes Wildlife Management Area near Lelia Lake after lunch. Topics will include Farm Bill Programs, Invasive Brush

Management, Riparian Restoration, Prescribed Burning, White-tailed Deer Control, Plant Identification, Forage Inventories, and Grazing Management.

CISD Trustees accept project cost

The Clarendon CISD Board of Trustees approved the guaranteed maximum price of a construction project at the school when they met in called session April 7, 2008.

Construction Manager Wiley Hicks, Jr., presented the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) proposal for the construction of the new technology center.

The board voted to approve the cost of construction GMP of \$1,363,980 as presented.

The board also met in regular session April 14, and Tara Williams of Desert Communications and Rusty Bryan of CISCO made a presentation to the board on the wireless network and infrastructure improvements related to the new technology

center. The board accepted the scope of work for wireless network and infrastructure improvements by Desert Communications and CISCO as presented.

Trustees also accepted bids on tax delinquent property as presented by the Donley County Appraisal District.

The board acknowledged the resignations of Tisha Ham and Regina Wooten, and Hysinger presented the job postings to the board.

Drugs in the News

Facial Wrinkle Filler Approved by FDA

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently announced that it had approved a new facial wrinkle filler that is the first of its kind. The new drug, called *Prevelle Silk*, is the combination of *hyaluronic acid* and *lidocaine*. It comes as a gel that is injected into the skin of the face, to reduce wrinkles and facial lines, such as those around the nose and mouth. Lidocaine, a local anesthetic, is included to provide relief of pain at the site of the injections. Hyaluronic acid is described by skin specialists as a one of the building blocks in the skin. It occurs naturally in the skin between the collagen fibers. It can also be injected in different places to improve the appearance of the skin. Other facial fillers containing hyaluronic acid include *Restylane* and *Juvederm*.

Facial fillers approved by the FDA to be injected into the skin include collagen and botulinum (*Botox*). In addition to injections, other treatment types include chemical peels, laser resurfacing of the skin, and topical creams. Facial rejuvenation procedures employ such treatments to restore facial fullness.
