Researchers find reason to stop DST

It's that time of year again when the government, for your own good, decides you need to reset your

Americans will be springing forward Sunday in an effort to save daylight because sunshine is a terrible thing to waste.

Of course, it's not really daylight that we're supposed to be saving so much as it is energy. Ben Franklin proposed the idea of getting up earlier to save candlewicks, but the idea of Candlewick Savings Time never really caught on.

During World War I, the US and most of Europe

followed Germany's lead in adopting Daylight Savings Time to save energy. It's been largely used since that time; and most recently Congress, in its infinite wisdom, decided to expand it by moving the "spring forward" earlier in the year and the "fall back" later in the year.

It's all to save energy. We have to save energy to be energy independent; otherwise we might become addicted to foreign oil. Of course, we're already dependent on foreign oil; but that's neither here nor there. We've got to save that daylight.

But now comes the University of California at Santa Barbara and two researchers who say we're all just wasting our time with this springing and falling

"I've never had a paper with such a clear and unambiguous finding as this," researcher Matthew Kotchen told the Wall Street Journal.

Kotchen and his partner, Laura Grant, say they have proved that Daylight Savings Time actually increases energy costs!

In a nutshell, DST was enacted to save on lighting costs (I refer you to the candlesticks), but we've got all those silly compact fluorescent bulbs now, and the reality is that today much of our energy production in the summer goes to air-conditioning. And what's the first thing people do when they get home an hour earlier in the summer? Crank up the A/C.

They proved this by studying 77 Indiana counties that only recently succumbed to federal time meddling and adopted DST, and they found that the switch actually increased electric costs in those areas by \$8.6

The report on FoxNews.com says the increased power consumption is "one reason power companies worry about summer blackouts in the late afternoon and early evening on hot days, as schoolchildren and early risers get home even as office buildings continue to be occupied for several more hours."

So not only is Congress' DST scheme robbing me of a good night's sleep this weekend, but it is also costing me more in real dollars to cool my home, and it is giving us all cause to worry about the reliability of our national electric grid.

And if that weren't enough stress, we have to consider the very real possibility that all this extra energy consumption will just compound the global warming crisis the Democrats keep telling me about and hasten the end of life as polar bears know it and destroy any hope of a bright green future that our children might have.

The whole situation is insufferable and just adds to the indignity of Uncle Sam telling you what time to get out of bed.

Our beleaguered nation requires leadership on this crisis. We must urge our elected officials to end the DST threat. We must have action. Al Gore, where are you when we need you?

Another symbol of American civilization is threatened. This time it's the lowly penny, which is the occasional target for some who have nothing better to

And I think we need a treasury secretary who will stand up for the penny and speak out about the inherent value that every penny has. Every penny counts,

and every penny adds up. A penny saved is a penny earned, and the penny you scratch your lottery ticket with could be worth millions.

Who is Rep. Thornberry listening to?

I read your paper while staying at the Clarendon Best Western on Saturday, February 23, 2008.

I noticed and read the article, "Thornberry introduces civil service reform." As a 30-year Federal Civil Service employee, I thought that important information was left out pertaining to federal civil service reforms that have been taking place for the last couple of years. Therefore, the article does not present 100 percent accurate informa-

The info that was not included involves over 200,000 DoD Federal Civil Service employees who were recently converted from the old (General Schedule) system to NSPS (National Security Personnel System) between 2006 and now. Although only non-bargaining employees were converted, NSPS is a "pay for performance" system." I am one of the employees who were recently converted to NSPS. Not sure if Rep. Thornberry was aware of this; it seems like he was not. Was there another change that Rep. Thornberry had in mind, other than NSPS? NSPS is already in place, and other systems

similar to NSPS have been implemented already in other Federal agencies. I have been through a lot of changes in the system over the years- NSPS is certainly not the first change that has taken place in 100 years like the article states. Since I am dedicated to my profession, I stuck with it through all the changes. Some people may not be willing to do that- or to move to a lot of different stateside/ overseas locations to have a Federal Service career.

I am disappointed that Rep. Thornberry has a low opinion of those of us who are dedicated and hard working Feds. Does he realize that a lot of us have served overseas as civilians to help our military? Or had to change jobs several times because we were on a Reduction In Force? I know that I have made personal sacrifices to work overseas to serve our troops, and be far away from my family to serve the mission, just like the military. Not for one or two years, but for a large portion of my life. Still, I am not respected like someone who has been in the military- and resent being presented as "someone just biding their

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



Recipe: Skillet Herb Roasted Chicken: 1/4 teaspoon ground dried sage leaves, 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme leaves, crushed, 4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves, Vegetable cooking spray, 2 cloves garlic, minced, 1 can (10 3/4 oz) Condensed Cream of Chicken Soup, 1/2 cup water. Parslied rice.

Parslied Rice: Toss 4 cups of cooked long-grain white rice with 1 teaspoon of chopped fresh parsley. Directions: Mix the sage and thyme in a small bowl. Sprinkle over the chicken. Spray a 12-inch nonstick skillet with the cooking spray and heat over medium heat for 1 minute. Add the chicken and cook for 15 min. or until chicken is cooked through. Remove chicken and keep warm. ADD: the garlic to the skillet and cook until it's lightly browned. Add the soup and water and cook until the mixture is hot. Serve over the chicken with Parslied Rice. Prep: (5 min), Cook: 20 min. Serves-4.


Hommel new junior Angus group member

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Drugs in the News

Relapsing MS: Cancer Drug May Be Helpful A recent issue of the New England Journal of Medicine included

the results of a year long study of the effect of a well known cancer drug on relapsing forms of multiple sclerosis (MS). The drug is Rituxan (rituximab), which is approved for rheumatoid arthritis and a specific type of lymphoma. What is surprising is that Rituxan appeared to researchers to be more effective against existing relapsing MS than are the first-line drugs approved for this condition. In the study, two injections of Rituxan, given two weeks apart slowed the progression of MS for nearly a year. The drug was not as effective in preventing relapses.

MS is an inflammatory condition of the central nervous system. At sites in the brain and spinal cord where plaques (patches of damage) appear, the nerves affected lose an insulating material called myelin. The symptoms of MS vary widely, no two people are affected in exactly the same way. Symptoms may include muscle weakness and spasms, cramps, pain, loss of balance, fatigue and short term memory problems. It is estimated that as many as 350,000 people in the US are affected by MS.
