Cancer program begins this week

A "Look Good, Feel Better" session will take place at the American Cancer Society office, located at 3915 Bell at 10 a.m., on February 18, March 18, and April 15.

Each session is designed to help women undergoing cancer treatment feel good about their appearance by helping them cope with treatment-related side effects.

At a "Look Good, Feel Better" session, women will learn how to keep their makeup sterile. During chemotherapy, people are susceptible to almost anything. "Look Good, Feel Better" teaches women how to apply their lipstick and mascara without contaminating the rest of the product. They learn how to deal with dry skin, skin discoloration and hair loss. Women learn about wigs and wig care as well as alternatives to wigs, such as turbans and hats that can help them feel more comfortable.

CEDC awards sixth improvement grant

Osburn Appliance received the first cash award this year from the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation's Façade Grant Program.

The CEDC Board at its February 2 meeting approved Shirley Osburn's improvements to her storefront at 319 S. Kearney and the adjacent storefront at 321 S. Kearney.

The addresses share a common front and doing only one side would not have looked good, Osburn said.

"It would have been just awful not to do both sides, so I got permission from the owner and did her building also," Osburn said.

Both storefronts were constructed about 60 or 70 years ago to house Frank White's Clarendon Hatchery, which operated at that location for many years. Osburn said she can remember going in to see White's chicks as a girl and not

knowing until years later that he was not just selling chicks in Clarendon but actually shipping thousands of them out of Donley County.

After the Hatchery and feed business closed, Osburn and her husband, Rabbit, who passed away last year, opened their business in that location in 1988.

Work under this façade grant application included putting and patching deteriorating cement, caulking, priming, and painting both fronts. The project received \$506.24 from the CEDC, which is half of the amount of the improvements.

Osburn said she had wanted to get rid of the buildings' old green front for a long time and said the CEDC's Façade Grant Program really "kick started" the improvements.

"I got a couple of letters about the (grant) program, and then San

(Thompson) did his building next door, and June (Hinojosa) did hers across the street, and they both just looked so nice," she said.

Osburn said she likes the CEDC's program and believes improvement projects spur others to make improvements.

"I came in the other day and they were sweeping the street, so I got out there and started sweeping the sidewalk."

The CEDC has budgeted \$10,000 for this fiscal year's Façade Grant Program, which provides fifty-fifty matching grants up to a maximum of \$2,000 per project for properties on a three-block stretch of Kearney Street.

Projects eligible for consideration could be anything from a coat of paint to new signage to a complete rehabilitation of a storefront. Those interested in the grants are asked to

apply prior to beginning a project, and applications are available from CEDC Secretary Roger Estlack at THE CLARENDON ENTERPRISE.

To date the CEDC has awarded

more than \$5,500 in façade grants.

The CEDC Board will next meet to consider grant applications on Monday, March 2, at 6:00 p.m. in City Hall.

Sales tax revenue increases in city

AUSTIN — Christmas sales boosted tax revenues in Clarendon, according to Texas Comptroller Susan Combs.

In her monthly allocation to local cities last Friday, Clarendon posted a 4.32 percent gain for its February allocation with a rebate of \$34,492.64 to City Hall.

January state sales tax collections and February's local sales tax allocations represent sales made in December, but also include earlier sales by businesses that report sales tax to the Comptroller on a quarterly or annual basis.

The increased revenue almost brought Clarendon to the break-even point for the calendar year-to-date, but the city is still just slightly behind, down 0.44 percent at \$52,252.67.

Other local cities did not fair nearly as well for the current allocation. Hedley was down more than 16 percent to \$877.60, and Howardwick was down by almost 23 percent to \$1,063.77.

Both of those cities are down

more than 20 percent for the year-to-date.

Statewide Combs' office collected \$1.92 billion in sales tax revenue in January, up 3.9 percent compared to January 2008.

"Growth in state sales tax collections remains modest," Combs said. "While overall growth has continued for the first five months of fiscal 2009, collections from important sectors such as retail trade and construction have decreased."

The Comptroller sent \$445.2 million in sales tax to Texas cities, up 2.5 percent compared to February 2008 payments.

Bill calls for appointing judges

AUSTIN — Sen. Robert Duncan (R-Lubbock) last week filed Senate Bill 782 and Senate Joint Resolution 23 which would set up a system of appointment, followed by a retention election to put appellate judges on Texas benches.

All current justices would be grandfathered into the new system and subject to a retention election when their current terms expire.

"We need to take the money and politics out of our judicial system,"

Senator Duncan said. "For too long, Texas has been an easy target for anyone who disagrees with a judge's findings. No one should have to fear the justice system based on campaigns or contributions."

Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice Wallace Jefferson endorsed a merit selection plan during his biennial State of the Judiciary.

"I am concerned by the public's perception that money in judicial races influences outcomes. This

is an area where perception itself destroys public confidence," Jefferson said.

He noted a recent poll that showed 80 percent of the participants - four out of five people - believe contributions influence a judge's decision.

"Is our current judicial election system the best way to elect judges in Texas? The status quo is broken. It is time for Texas to set a high standard for judicial selection."

Hardin first to file for re-election

Only one candidate has signed up for local office after the first week of the filing period.

Clarendon School Trustee Wayne Hardin is seeking reelection to his position on the school board.

A total of 16 positions are up for election this year for citizens interested in any of six local governments.

The City of Clarendon will hold an election to choose the mayor and two aldermen for two-year terms. Those positions are currently held by Mayor Chris Ford and Aldermen Terry Noble and Ann Huey.

The City of Howardwick will elect the mayor and two aldermen.

The mayor's office has been vacant since Buster Baird resigned in June. The terms of Aldermen Pat Butler and Gene Rogers are also up for election this year. These officers each serve two-year terms.

Hedley's city election will select three members of the board of aldermen for two-year terms. Those seats are now held by Aldermen Bruce Howard, Collene Owens, and Travis Ruthardt (serving for Gaye Lollar).

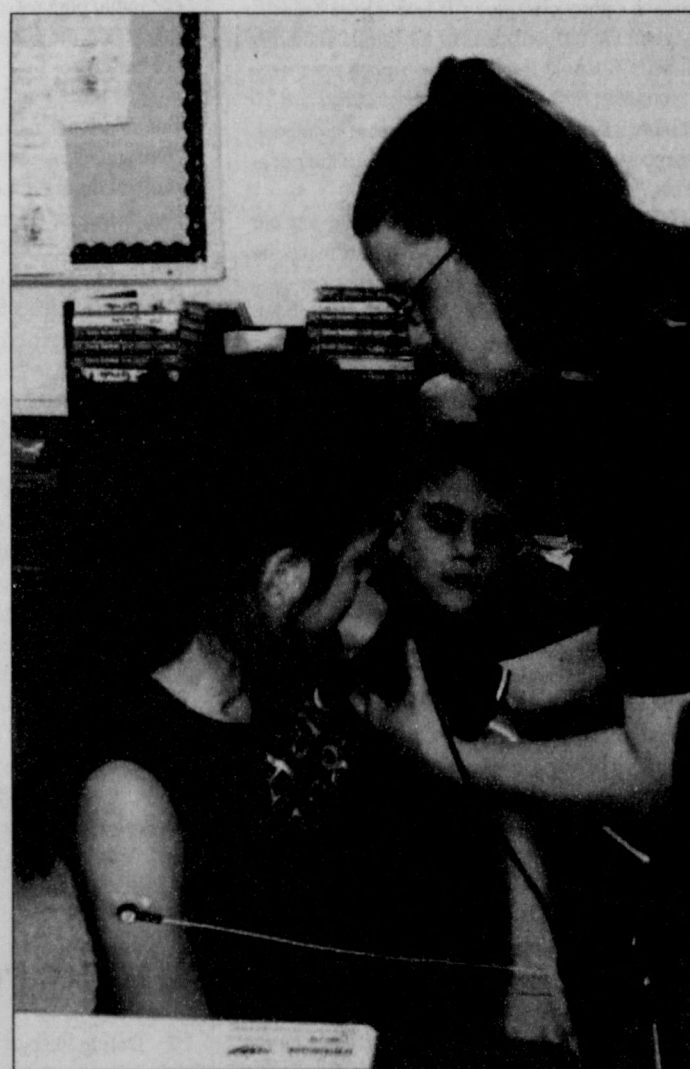
Two positions on the Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees are up this year. Those seats are currently held by Wayne Hardin and Joe Lemley and are three-year terms.

Two full terms are up for election this year on the Hedley ISD Board of Trustees. The three-year positions of Cary Don Neely and Blain Burton (serving for Jim Lollar) are expiring.

The Donley County Hospital District will select three two-year positions on its board, now held by Don Thornberry (Place 1), Alan Fletcher (Place 2), and Melinda McAnear (Place 3).

All local offices are elected at-large, but hospital board candidates must sign up for a specific place.

Sign up continues through March 9, 2009; and the elections will be held Saturday, May 9.

Producers may apply for crops not covered by federal insurance

Bruce Ferguson Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Donley County reminds agricultural producers of the need for insurance coverage for crops in order to be eligible for the agency's Disaster Assistance Programs.

Application closing dates for coverage in Donley County are March 16, 2009, for cantaloupes, beans, cucumbers, millet, hay crops, okra, cowpeas, blackeye peas, pumpkins, squash, sunflowers, tomatoes, watermelon, and soybeans.

Producers must purchase at least catastrophic (CAT) level of insurance for all insurable crops and/or FSA's Noninsured Crop Assistance Program (NAP) coverage for noninsurable crops to be eligible for the USDA Farm Service Agency Disaster Assistance Programs.

"Crop insurance is an important risk management tool for farmers, but it's not available for all crops. That's why NAP is so important," said Ferguson.

NAP is a federally funded program that provides coverage to producers for non-insurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory or prevented planting occurs due to natural disasters.

Crops eligible for NAP coverage are those for which crop insurance is not available, including but not limited to fruits and vegetables, aquaculture, pecans, turf grass and forage crops. However, crops that FCIC deems as ineligible due to practice or yield are not covered by NAP.

"Producers must apply for coverage before a disaster strikes," said Ferguson.

NAP applications for coverage must be filed using Form CCC-471 and service fees must be paid by the sales closing date. Application sales closing dates vary by crop. If you decide to plant a different crop make sure your landlord is insured.

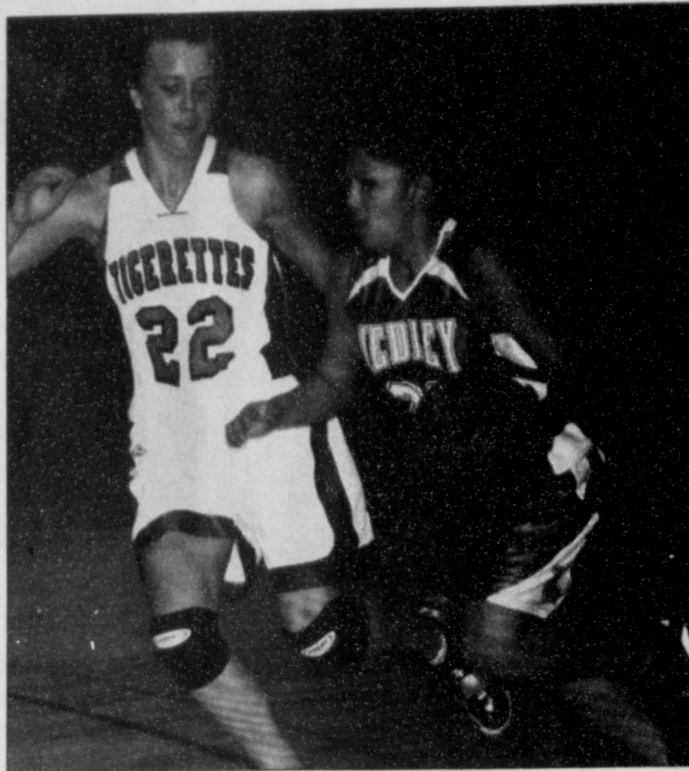
56.

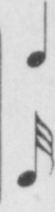
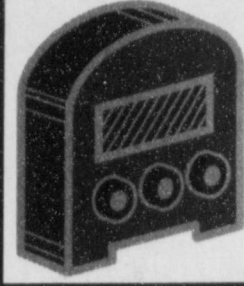
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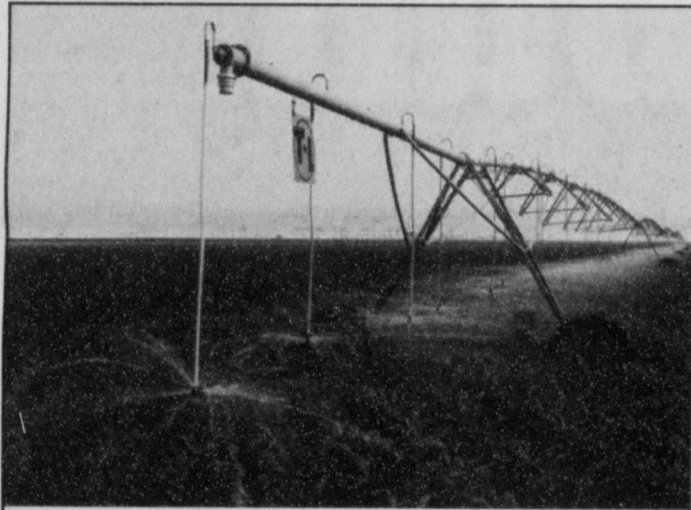
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Burn Ban Donley County

By order of the Donley County
Commissioners' Court, Monday, February 9, 2009.

Burn Ban enacted and enforced on days which meet the criteria determined by the National Weather Service and the Texas Forest Service to be critical fire weather conditions supporting a rapidly spreading wildfire.

Mandatory: All fires must be reported to the Sheriff's Office prior to ignition.

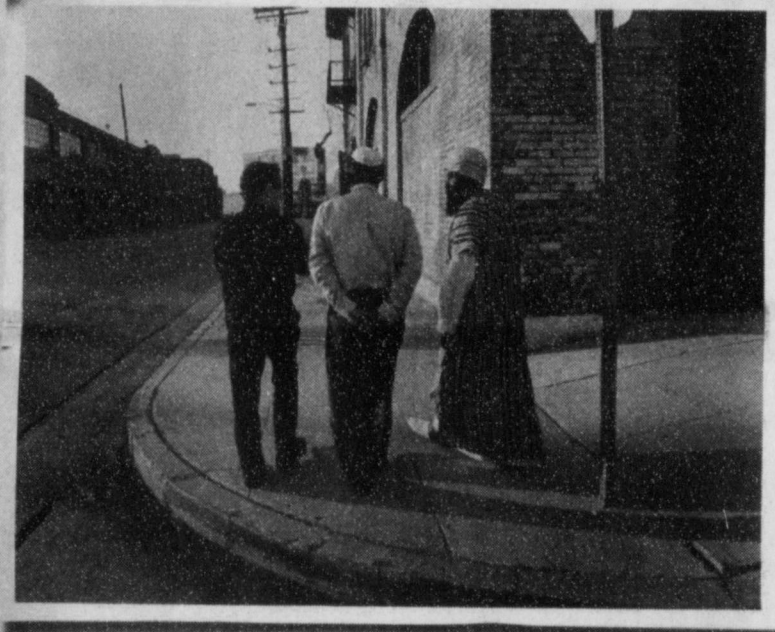
No burning of any kind on days that meet the following criteria:

FIRE WEATHER WATCH - Forecasted to Happen
A humidity of 15 percent or less with sustained 20 foot winds* of 20 mph or greater for the forecasted period.

RED FLAG WARNING - Occurring or Imminent
A humidity of 15 percent or less with sustained 20 foot winds* of 20 mph or greater and/or 20 foot winds* gusting to 35 mph. The National Fire Danger Rating** is in the "high" range or greater.

The Donley County Sheriff's Department is issued statements from the National Weather Service in Amarillo concerning fire weather, and they are updated as needed as fire weather conditions change. Dispatchers have at hand the above information to be relayed to the public as needed. This information is also available on the web at <http://www.srh.noaa.gov/ama>

Drugs in the News

Treatment Approved for Acute Bleeding Disorder

The first drug approved by the FDA for a rare bleeding disorder is called RiaSTAP. This drug was approved in January for persons born with a rare deficiency of fibrinogen, a protein the body needs in order for blood to clot properly. This rare condition is called Congenital Fibrinogen Deficiency. This drug is an intravenous concentrate made from the plasma of healthy human blood donors. The approval of RiaSTAP followed a small study in which the blood level of this protein prevented bleeding after a specific dose of the drug was administered based on the weight of the person getting the injection. Another marker used to confirm the therapeutic value of RiaSTAP was the firmness of the clot formed after the drug was given.

The word congenital refers to a genetic condition. Congenital fibrinogen deficiency affects an estimated 150 to 300 persons living in the US. It is usually diagnosed at the time birth from bleeding at the site of the umbilical cord. Children born with this disorder who are not treated are at risk of life-threatening bleeding, significant blood loss, and damage to organs.

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
