YOUR CITY DELIVERY ...

BAIRD — The delivery of your mail in the City of Baird is a responsibility of the U. S. Postal Service. This service is daily, excluding Sunday and Holidays. Continuous good service depends also upon the customer to some degree.

All mail boxes should be visible from the street. This will enable the carrier to see your box and pick up out-going mail, even though you may not have in-coming mail.

House numbers should also be visible. This will greatly assist new carriers learning the routes.

Have mail boxes of sufficient size to handle the volume of mail expected. Some mail is lost, to the wind and to prowling dogs, if left lying loose on the floor.

The carrier will appreciate a clear path to the mail box. Obstacles on the walks can cause accidents. And accidents are unhappy experiences to all concerned.

Some Co. Farm & Ranch Owners To Be Honored by Agriculture Dept.

AUSTIN — Farmers and ranchers in Callahan County whose families have held the same land since 1874 or before will be honored by the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program according to Commissioner John C. White.

The program, which will be initiated July 1 "will pay tribute to those families who have proved their respect for and dedication of the land," White said.

This county has some of the oldest establishments in the state, with a long history of dedicated service to the agricultural community and I hope that every qualified family will take this opportunity to be recognized by the people they have served, White said.

Application and rules for the program may be obtained by writing Commissioner White, P. O. Box 12847, Austin 78711.

Any family who is certified by Judge A. E. Dyre Jr. will qualify for the honor. An applicant need only show a continuous family relationship between the founder of the homestead and the present owner.

The land must have been in

use for agriculture by the family since 1874 or before, must be at least 10 acres and produces \$50 or more from agricultural products.

Those who do qualify by Aug. 31, will be recognized in a special ceremony at the State Fair this year and short history of their family and land will be published in a land heritage directory. In addition, local recognition will be provided to the families for their long dedication to agriculture.

Independence Day - July Fourth

July 4, 1776 The Declaration of Independence was adopted by the Continental Congress. Founders of the new nation considered Independence Day an important occasion for rejoicing.

Independence Day was first celebrated in Philadelphia on July 8, 1776. The Declaration was read, bells were rung, bands played and people rejoiced. Independence Day has been celebrated since that time. It is also celebrated in territories of the United States. In 1941 Congress declared July 4th a legal public holiday.

Fireworks and the firing of guns and cannon caused hundreds of deaths and thousands of injuries each year. In the early 1900's many people began to plead for a "safe and sane Fourth." As a result many cities and states have passed laws forbidding the sale of fireworks, but hired trained men to explode them at a community celebration in the evening. Many communities celebrate the day with programs and fireworks displays and picnics.
