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To My Father - On His 82nd Birthday, May 11, 1937:

You have probably forgotten the incident. It was s long ago-more than 40 years.

In the fields to the north of the old home you saw growing one of the finest crops of oats you had ever raised. The long days of hard work given to spring plowing, dragging, and seeding were over and now you looked over the level, ripening field with pride and satisfaction. The acre-and how proud you were of it!

Then one day a sudden storm came up which drove you to the house. The clouds were murky black—the kind the old side porch when the storm struck and I, a boy in

my early teens, was standing by you. You looked out over the field and watched as the heavy wind-driven rain pounded the best part of the ripening crop to the ground.

I remember what a tragedy it seemed to my youthful mind and I looked up to see how you were taking it. And there you stood with your thumbs tucked under your sweat-stained suspenders, and merely hummed the words of an ancient hymn of faith, "Rock of Ages."

Yes-you had an oat crop failure that year, but without realizing it you raised a far more valuable crop.

I can't tell you how many times in the years that have Falls Record-News. followed, when hopes have been blasted and disappointments have come, my mind has gone back to that oat crop failure, and in the memory of your courage I have found strength to carry on.

May the Supreme Court veto an

act of Congress? The Legislative Reference Service of the Library of Congress in a bulletin of September 12, 1936,

"If there is one thing fundamen tal to be remembered in connection with the function exercised by the courts of declaring acts unconstitutional, it is that the function itself is accounted as strictly judicial. Ed-mund Randolph's suggestion in the Constitutional Convention [of 1787] to include 'a convenient number of the national judiciary' in a council of revision which should have a negative upon laws passed by Con-

grees, was postponed."

The bulletin cites statements of the Supreme Court itself disclaiming such power, as for example (261 U. S. 525, 544): "The authority and duty of the Court to declare the Supreme law and reject an act of legis-lation transcending the Constitution is not the exercise of a substantive power to review and nullify acts of Congress, for no such sub-stantive power exists. It is simply a necessary concomitant of the power

to hear and dispose of a case or controversy properly before the Court, to the determination of which mus be brought the test and measure of the law."
