



"No Texas member of Congress can have a more important mission than to act now on this farm bill; and failure to act may be little short of dereliction of duty."



THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

It seems to The News that all the amendments proposed to Texas voters in the election next Monday, are worthy of adoption with the exception of one. Of course, there are arguments for the one exception we choose to make, and there are arguments against those we prefer to accept, and it is up to the voter to consider and make his own choice. Here in brief, are the proposed amendments:


SJR-Proposing amendment to Section 16, Art 16, authorizing incorporation of banking bodies, etc. This proposal simply means that the voters of Texas are asked because the affair isn't pretentious, and because there is to give stockholders in state banks the same privileges no effort to commercialize it. The old settlers go there as enjoyed by stockholders of national banks, by reducing to meet their friends and comrades of former days, to their liability from double the amount of their stock, to the amount of their stock, only. This is just and fair, and to our mind it should be adopted.

SJR 16-To allow Harris County to build paved roads by levying taxes in advance and paying cash for such paving approved by the county. This is a private affair of Harris County, and we believe that it should be adopted.

HJR 23-Providing for assessment and collection of ad valorum taxes. This change would allow discounts for taxes paid before deadline date, with penalties for taxes taxes paid before deadline date, with penalties for taxes paid after said date. This is a fair law, and we believe will bring tax money in earlier, reduce and wipe out de-ficits. We believe it is worth trying out ficits. We believe it is worth trying out.

HJR 24-Providing or the abolishing of the salary method of paying district, county and precinct officers. This is the one proposal we think ought to be defeated, as we do not believe the salary system has been tried out sufficiently in two short years. It was the purpose of the proponents of the salary plan to work out certain rethe proponents of the salary plan to work out certain re-forms in county management, which will take away the objections to the salary plan, but which was lost in the shuffle of legislation. If we go back to the fee system with-out gaining such reforms, which all admit we need, it will be doubly hard to .chieve the reforms. The salary system is fairer and more economical. Let's keep it, and demand the legislature give us laws that will bring our county governments up to modern standards of business efficiency. There can be no gain in going backward.

HJR 26-HJR 26-A-These two amendmends provide that Texas shall comply with the social security program of the federal government, by giving the legislature power to provide assistance to the needy blind (HJR 26), and assistance to dependent children (HJR 26-A), by matching federal funds for that purpose. These two proposals, it seems to us, should have the approval of the voters simply as a matter of common humanity, and to bring needy unfortunates up on a plane of security, which will contribute to the general welfare, in a sum equal to the cost. We strongly advocate the passage of these two amendments.
