Sheriff Thompson also advised, Don't get out to sight-see. Catching a glimpse of the tornado may be exciting, but it is not worth your life.

Tomadoes can happen anywhere but occur most frequently east of the Rocky Mountains, and Donley Coun
has seen its share of these storms. According to the National Weather Service, Donley County had 28 tornado touch-downs from June of 1955 through May 1996.

Paula Lowrie, chief appraiser of e district, reminds property owners that the notice of appraised value is not a tax bill.
"Please do not pay this notice, it is not a bill," Lowrie said.

Lowrie emphasized the importance of the notice and the key information that A contains.
"A property owner has the right to appeal to the Donley County Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, ex-
emptions, ownership, and other aremptions, own
eas," she said.

The appraisal review board, more mmonly called the "ARB," is an independent panel of citizens responsible for hearing and settling protests from property owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district. The notice includes instructions on how and when to file a protest and a protest form. The notice shows the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current this year
