

matriculation beginning With last Monday in the Clarendon Schools it was disclosed today that enrollment in Clarendon Junior College had decreased considerably while the enrollment in high school, junior high school, and South Ward were approximately the same as last year.

Clarendon Junior College with an enrollment of 125 students last year has only 61 registerated thus far. Dean R. E. Drennan expects more registeration within the next week, however. Senior high school has a total enrollment of 197 thus far with 58 seniors, 67 juniors, and 72 Sophomores.

Mr. McHenry Lane, principal of junior high and South Ward submits the following enrollment

submits the following enrolment statistics for this year. At pres-ent there is a total of 158 en-rolled in junior high, 56 of whom are eighth graders, 53 seventh graders, and 49 sixth graders. In South ward are 31 fifth grade students, 54 fourth grade students, 52 third grade students, 41 sec-ond grade students, and 53 first grade pupils, making a total of, 231 students in South Ward.

The grand total for students enrolled in the Clarendon schools this year is 657 compared with 731 for last year. There are approximately 150 students coming in on school buses out of Memphis, Windy Valley, Midway, Sunnyview, Hudgins, Goldston, Mar-tin, and Ashtola. There are as yet, only five students riding the Memphis bus, three from Memphis and two from Hedley.

These enrollment figures are or the first three days of school, further registeration is expected by the last of the week.

WHY ADDITIONAL TAXES AT THIS TIME?

Just as the Texas taxpayer begins to feel the brunt of stepped-up federal security taxes, just as he takes the shock of last October's omnibus levy of millions more, there comes the warning of the Big Bertha of them all. There will be one, probably two, special sessions of the legislature this fall, on the sole topic of levying more taxes," writes Raymond Brooks, political observer for the Austin American-Statesman.

"Word of nine, or 12 or 16 millions of new taxes to be added to all the rest is freely circulated. Prophets say Gov. Allred will ask the lawmaking bodies to raise at least \$12,-000.000 more money a year, and maybe as much as \$16,000,-000.

'Mr. Texas has the job of figuring whether he can pay



is bringing in so much more revenue than was expected that no new levies are needed for 1937. "We need an economy session, not a tax session," he declared. He supported the stand of some of those working on the senate investigating committee's consolidation-efficiency-economy report, to the same practical effect.

Senator Albert Stone of Brenham, member of the senate economy and efficiency committee, has evolved a plan designed to provide without imposition of new taxes, millions of dollars of added revenues if such money is needed, a matter of which many people doubt. He advocates collection of delinquent taxes to meet the insatiable demand of the state's tax-eaters. Comptroller Sheppard has advised Senator Stone that more than \$14,000,000 are due the state in uncollected taxes, and the counties of the state have past

due taxes in the staggering sum of more than 150 million dollars. Furthermore, this delinquent tax collection does not penalize the poorer class of ownership. Undeniable annot penalize the poorer class of ownership. Undeniable an-alysis shows that large ownership owes more than 90 per tests for syphilis, affecting both cent of this tax to the state and counties.

The amount due constitutes a surplus of great proportions because it would be over and above present needs, to be taken care of by taxes already in effect or to become effective shortly. Based on this premise, it occurs to us that Governor Allred and the legislature could render no greater or lasting service to the people of Texas than to effect laws to collect taxes now assessed, including those delinquent, insist on economy through consolidation of departments, elimination of useless and inefficient state agencies and advise the people in general that that are to have a tax holiday .-- Gainesville Daily Register.


Syphilis Must Be **Controlled** Says **Health Department**

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 24 The eradication of syphilis is today's major health problem and our children will hold us incompetent if we fail to control syph-ilis within this generation," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.


Since inauguration of the na tional campaign, the public has been made aware of much of the truth about syphilis. While the vast importance of syphilis in general has been stressed, further emphasis needs to be placed on hereditary or prenatal syphilis, one of the most readily preventable types of the disease. Prenatal syphilis is an innocently contracted form, transmitted by an infected expectant mother to her unborn child. The disease in the child can be prevented in almost every instance, provided the mother receives proper treatment during pregnancy. Syphilis, in a sense, is chivalrous; it deals more kindly with women than with men. The early signs of infection are usually not manifest in women; this is especially true during preg-nancy. Blood tests, therefore, are all the more essential in the early recognition of syphilis in women. It has been determined that sylphilis affects approximately two to three and a half per cent of the white children attending hospital clinics. People should appreciate also the fact that many cases of syphilis are contracted innocently, in marriage and before birth. Syphilis in itself, is not a disgrace. Disgrace lies rather in the failure of people to take advantage of modern medical science and in failure to assure an equal chance in life for all of Texas' children.

To eradicate prenatal syphilis and thereby give the newborn child its rightful heritage of a sound mind and a sound body, health authorities urge observance of the parties who contemplate marriage; (2' a blood test for syphilis on

Labor generally in Texas is of high intelligence and capable of doing its own sound reasoning and it now realizes that federal, state and local tax demands constitute a lien against future wage payrolls. Industrial leaders and business men generally have a worried expression as they endeavor to keep the tax wolf from their doors.

Representative Jesse James of Cameron, one of the authors of the omnibus tax bill of 1936 insists that this law

strict the powers it grants our government?

Because human nature never is perfect, we must protect ourselves against its weaknesses.

To provide this safeguard was the great aim of the authors of our Constitution. By their experience in colonial government. by their trials under royal despotism and by their study of the great lessons of history, they learned that human nature could not resist the temptation to become all powerful. They knew this led to tyranny and despotism. They knew this was a weakness of human nature and that human nature changes but slightly in thousands of years. They knew these weaknesses wrecked most governments.

For this reason our Constitution divides our government into three separate branches - Congress, the President and the Courts-restricts the powers granted to each branch and makes these branches independent of each other.

Concerning this, Washington said, "The necessity of reciprocal checks in the exercise of political power,

Under this principle of our Constitution, no one branch of our government is all powerful. And by maintaining this principle, concludes Washington, we prevent despotism.
