PATRICK RESIGNS AS MAYOR TODAY

TOM F. CONNALLY, FORMER CITY COMMISSIONER IS APPOINTED MAYOR

W. H. Patrick, president of the First National Bank, and mayor of Clarendon since July 1, 1937, tendered his resignation as mayor, effective today, to City Commissioners W. B. Haile and Homer McElvany at a recent council

The act came as a great surprise to Mr. Patrick's many friends and the citizenship of Clarendon. Press of business in his duties as president of the Forst National Bank motivated his resignation, Mr. Patrick said

Tom F. Connally, former city commissioner, was named by the commissioners as mayor to succeed Mr. Patrick, Mr. Connally began his duties today.

Having been cognizant of the affairs of the city for several years, Mayor Connally is expected to co-operate fully with the commissioners in administering civic problems.

When urged by his friends to continue in office at least until the April election, Mr. Patrick said that with a busy fall period for the bank approaching it would be a hard matter to give proper Railroad Commissioner-Sadler time to handling the administrative duties.




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HOW LONG WILL WE DELAY?

MEXICAN OIL SITUATION Still tied up at Houston at the week-end was the 100,000 barrel of Mexican oil seized by Federal customs authorities, after the vigilance of the Railroad Commission had prevented the shipment being entered as crude oil, when an analysis showd it to be crude tope, with a 60 per cent gasoline content. Crude takes a customs duty of one-half cent a gallon, Crude tops takes a duty of 2 1-2 cents a gallon. The custom authorities had already passed the shipment, when the railroad com-mission called their attention to the "error" which would have lost the customs about \$85,000 in duties.
