REA Allotment Approved For Lines From Hedley To Goodnight

DONLEY TO HAVE ADDITIONAL REA **POWER LINES**

GREENBELT CO-OPERATIVE HAS \$100,000 ALLOTMENT HALL CO-OP GETS \$89,000

Allotment of funds for building additional rural electric lines in Donley County has definitely been approved, according to County Agent H. M. Breedlove who said today he had received this information from Orvil Couch superintendent of the Greenbelt Electric Cooperative.

The route of the lines will follow will include Hedley, Windy Valley, Naylor, Bray, Sunnyview north Clarendon, Martin and Good night, Breedlove said.

Wiring contracts will be mailed in the near future. The contracts should be signed and returned at once because the line cannot be started until the contracts are in, Breedlove stated.

The allotment reaches \$100,000 to construct lines of about 150

The Hall County Electric Cooperative has also secured an \$89,000 allotment to build about 126 miles of line in Hall, Childress and Donley Counties. This line is expected to serve approximately 302 members.



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DO LOCAL HOME-OWNERS WANT MORE STREET PAVING?

A suggestion has come to the city commission of Clarendon that some badly needed street paving here might be had at a very low cost to property owners, by utilizing a WPA project.

Any citizen can understand that the city commission hesitates to launch any program without the general wish and desire of the people, and The News is bringing the matter to the attention of our people, in the hope that they will discuss the plan and costs with the commission, that they may have a cross section on the views and desires of the

All of us will admit that our unpaved sections need the improvement of paving, and if a program covering a reasonable number of blocks could be worked out without hardship to any home-owner it would be a most beneficial movement for Clarendon.

Let the city commission know what you think about the matter, after you have had authentic details of cost and terms-our town needs the improvement program if we can stand the cost.

On top of this impression came an entire section of the Dallas News last Sunday, devoted to the general program as intimated above, and on its front page, Victor H. Schoffelmeyer, agricultural editor of the News wrote as follows:

RETURN TO CATTLE RANCHING MARKS SWING AWAY FROM COTTON FARMING

land owners are swinging back to cattle ranching and cattle feeding. This significant trend away from cotton, which in all its long history has not enriched its producers, is but a return to what nature originally intended for the vast grass prairies of our great state. Millions of acres of grain and feed crops must find a profitable market through cattle raising and feeding. World changes are hastening a return to basic principles. One of these is that no permanent farm prosperity can be based upon growing a single crop. The trend towards balanced farming is a healthy sign. Crops and livestock must go together.

"The coming to the State Fair of Texas of the National Hereford show constitutes another important milestone in Texas agricultural history. It is well merited recognition of the importance of Texas as the leading cattle state and its high quality breeding stock. From time immemorial Texas has been the greatest natural breeding ground of the country's stardiest cattle out of which developed logi cally the foremost ranching industry among all the states. To ranching, however, there now has been added scientific feeding, so that the finished beef of Texas ranches and feedlots now competes successfully with that of the Corn Belt.

"It is perhaps not too much to say that a more prosperous era for farmers and ranchmen will result from the recognition of their mutual interests and dependence."

To The News, then, is the immediate and urgent need for a new study of such proposals, and a general adaptation of feed crop utilization in intensive feeding in Donley in the decade to follow, in which our present conditions seem likely to continue. Since there is no county in all the Panhandle territory more suited to such a program than Donley, as proven by forward-looking farmers in the past two years, we would urge this step as among the most important possible for the general financial welfare of our county and her citizenship.

Here, briefly are a few observations which argue for the plan as roughly outlined above:

- 1. Cotton occupies a precarious position, with a huge carry-over very costly to the government. War conditions hold no promise of
- 2. We are experiencing a costly land exhaustion due to continued
- cotton production. 3. Meat and dairy products bring a fair price, considered, and
- seem likely to be stable for some years to come. 4. Feed crops planted on cotton land, restore its fertility.
- 5. Donley county should produce two or three times as many
- hogs, should have at least an average of five cows to the farm, and feed out as many hogs, sheep and calves as acreage will permit.
- 6. Feed lot manure scattered on the farm will enrich it and bring
- 7. Several feed mills in the county buy grains, and grind row crops into accredited and profit making feeds for the specific needs of the feeder of dairy and beef cattle, hogs, sheep and chickens. The new law will allow a discount on 1939 taxes if paid during October, November or December as follows:

3 per cent discount if paid in October 1939

2 per cent discount if paid in November, 1939

1 per cent discount if paid in December, 1939

No discount if paid in January 1940. Penalty and Interest added February 1st, 1940.

Above discount applies to State, County, Lelia Lake and Hedley School Taxes. No discount allowed on Poll Tax.

The split payment is still in effect whereby the first half of your taxes can be paid in October or November and the balance carried to June 30th, without penalty or interest. If

the taxes are divided as above no discount will be allowed on the First half payment. Another new law went into effect on the first day of October, 1939, The Certificate of Title Law. It is unlawful to offer for sale or trade any Motor Vehicle without first obtaining a Certificate of Title to same. Application for title is to be made at the office of the Tax Collector of the county of your residence.

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


