A THUNDER STORM TO CLEAR THE ATMOSPHERE

That impending appointment of Congressman Marvin Jones to a federal judgeship in the District of Columbia, or some federal plum. is reported to be about ready to break, and while the Panhandle cannot but feel that the administration owes Marvin Jones some such settlement for his services, the big thought now in the minds of the voters of the district is, "where do we go from here"? who will fill Mar-

Over this district, as in every other district since federal spending became such a big item, there is a very definite feeling that certain populous counties have had the breaks in getting federal construction projects, and other plums, the small counties are in a very definite demand for the next congressman to hail from one of the sections out from the populous centers. Whether this condition is justified or not, that's the way people feel and that's the way most of them will vote in any special election to fill the Marvin Jones vacancy when it ap-


Reducing the matter to plain language in the big district, it means that a huge proportion of the people feel that they must elect a congressman from some other county except Potter if they are to get what they feel belongs to them as a fair share of federal spending.

However, this must be kept in mind, if the smaller counties divide their votes among several "favorite sons," then the candidate that gets the bulk of the heavy Potter county vote, plus the struggling vote over the district is the man who will go to Washington. Granting that the wise voters of Potter will likely center upon one local candidacy, there is absolutely no hope for a candidate hailing from some of the less populous counties, if he is to be check mated in a half dozen instances by other small county candidates.

Good citizenship will argue that this situation should not existthat the voters should vote for the most capable man, without regard to his place of residence. This is true, but when there is a number of good men in the field, which now appears most likely, there is hardly an escape from the situation as outlined above. Conditions such as we have experienced in the last six years bring out the selfish, grasping elements in human character-a penalty that cannot be evaded and one of the regrettable features of so much governmental gravy.

Regardless of the outcome, the passing of Marvin Jones and the election of a new congressman, will bring on a thunder-storm which will clear the political atmosphere in the 18th Congressional District.

Sales Tax Fight Seen If Gov. O'Daniel summons the legislators he is expected to submit social security financing as the only major subject. He likewise is expected to make a drive for a statuatory sales tax, as embodied in his bill which he calls a "consumer's tax bill." Opponents of the sales tax, headed by Senator Joe Hill of Henderson in the upper house, are expected to make a strong effort to substitute an omnibus tax bill, including substantially increased levies on natural resources, as the means of financing pensions.

Political strategists here regard O'Daniel's decision to call session - if he makes it -as of distinct advantage to him in the forthcoming campaign for reelection. If the session raises revenue, he can claim credit for calling the solons; if it fails, he can claim he was thwarted by a recalcitrant legislature in carrying out his extravagant promises to the old folks. If he should fail to call a session, observers here point out, he would be open to considerable criticism by he gave the legislature no opportunity to consider anything but the notorious SJR No. 12, at the regular session, and then refused to let the Legislature meet to consider other methods, when that failed.







Rusty sputum, usually a sign of inflamation in the lungs. naturally gives rise to the question as to the cause of sickness. Examination of the sputum in a hospital or public health laboratory which serves as a pneu monia typing center, frequently shows the presence and type of the pneumonia germ, and makes clear the exact nature of illness

Science has found effective means of combatting pneumonia, through the use of proper serum and medicine. To be most effective, these treatments must be given early and after the exact cause of the inflamation has been determined.

During 1938, deaths numbering 4,129 were recorded in Texas and it is necessary for all people to arm themselves with knowledge and to cooperate in measures to de crease the pneumonia death toll.
