BIG BUS CRASHES INTO TRUCK MILE **EAST OF CITY**

FRED DARBY, DRIVER, IS IN HOSPITAL HERE IN SERIOUS CONDITION

A Bowen bus company driver, Fred Darby of Wichita Falls, was critically injured and five of eight passengers received minor injuries or bruises when an Amarillo bound bus from Wichita Falls crashed into the rear of a heavy truck, loaded with watermelons, 1 1-2 miles east of Clarendon about 4:10 this mor-






