THERE'LL BE NO RUN-OFF, SAYS GOVERNOR

CROWD OF 2,500 GATHER ON COURTHOUSE LAWN TO HEAR HIM

Predicting that he will be reelected and there will be no runoff, Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel poured it on professional politicians here Wednesday afternoon speaking on the courthouse lawn amid the cheers of a crowd estimated at 2,500 people.

Long before the Governor and his party arrived in Clarendon, a large crowd had arrived in town, giving it a Saturday like appearance.

After a preliminary discourse on a straw vote which gave him 83 per cent of the votes cast, the governor launched into an attack on what he termed monopolized state government, declaring that it started 25 years ago when a joker was inserted into a bill to establish a board of control over the University of Texas.

He bitterly assailed the department of public safety, charging that the establishment of this board stripped the governor of all power to enforce the law.



PLANS BEING MADE TO MAKE IT A BIG AFFAIR


The tenth annual reunion of the Donley County Pioneers Association will be held at Tate Grove, near Hedely, on Friday, Aug. 16.
