Her mother noticed by the child's movements that there was something the matter with her. She could hardly walk, and when ques. tioned by her mother, told of the outrage that had been committed upon her and said Barrett did it. A physician was called and he sald the girl was badly injured. <br> Barrett, whose home is at Baird, has a wife and two chuldren living there.
