



As Mr. Anderson said, "This is not an optimistic picture, and yet it is not much different from what the people of this country have been experiencing during recent months. True, the measures we are taking to improve distribution and choke off Black Markets will bring some relief from shortages, but they cannot increase the total volume of food that will be available for the rest of this year. This can only be done through increased production as long as the present high

demand for food continues." But with it all, he pointed out that all of us will be eating at least as well as we did in recent months. I was particularly pleased to hear him say that with the help of the consuming public, we will get more equitable sharing of scarce foods. And the fact some important foods will still be unavailable in the amounts that we would like means that our meals will have to be somewhat differ-

ent than they have been. "Yet," as Mr. Anderson said, "with all this outpouring of food for our military needs, to relief feeding, to suffering people in the wake of battle and to those allies whose cause is common with our own, the people of America find themselves reasonably well-fed and know that their sacrifices of food have not been greater than they counted on nor more than they could bear. Knowing that, we can face our future in food without, alarm."

CONDITIONS

Texas range cattle held up well during June, according to the monthly survey of conditions by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics at Austin. Range feed conditions declined slightly with continuing lack of moisture in the northwestern districts, However, rain in early July relieved the critical situation in the Trans-Pecos area; but rainfall of lasting value still was lacking in parts of the Edwards Plateau, south Texas, the low rolling plains and most of the northwestern high plains.


No distress sales of cattle were in evidence, the BAE reported. and ranchmen were not inclined to become excited as long as they were able to maintain their cattle in fairly good condition. Old grass still was furnishing some grazing in the dry areas, but the eastern half of the state generally was in very good condition. The improvement in the eastern half of the state almost offset the decline in range feed conditions over the western areas. Indicating this, the overall condition of ranges on July 1 was reported at 81 per cent, or only one point below the reported condition on

Marketings of cattle during June were orderly, and no heavy distress movement was expected unless there was not sufficient rainfall within the next thirty or sixty days to furnish sufficient moisture. The condition of cattle on July 1 was reported at eighty four per cent, which was only one point below the reported condition on the same date one year

The BAE survey revealed that sheep were beginning to show the effects of the dry, hot weather, and had commenced to register a decline in condition on July 1. But rains after July 1 in the Trans-Pecos and some of the Edwards'Plateau counties were expected to relieve the situation considerably in the favored counties. The condition of sheep on July I was reported at eighty two per cent, compared with eighty five per cent on July 1.






