The Donley County Sheriff's Department is searching for possible clues to identify those responsible for the weekend burglary of &W Lumber.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said someone broke the glass on the lumberyard's east door and apparently hauled merchandise to the back of the business in a wheelbarrow

Lumberyard owner Earl Hartman said a passerby noticed the broken glass about 7 a.m. on Saturday.


Old cellular phones can pose a problem for emergency personnel when children get their hands on them.

Panhandle Regional 911 Network Program Director Richard G. Green said the problem stems from an FCC rule that requires wireless carriers to accept 911 calls from any wireless phone, even those that are not subscribed to a wireless service.

As a result, any cell phone with any battery power can call the 911 emergency system. If parents give their old cell phone to their kids as a toy and don't remove the battery, it is possible to call 911.

Green said the problem is not unique to Donley County.

"It became a big problem over Christmas in Dalhart," he said. "A girl called 911 and claimed she was being abducted from the Payless shoe store in Westgate Mall. Such a store does not exist but has to be treated as real."

Some unintentional calls can also be generated thanks to handsets with a onebutton 911 calling feature, which can be activated when the phone is placed in a purse, bag, or back pocket; but the bigger problem remains children playing games with old phones.

"The 911 system is really being compromised when resources are used to respond to false claims," Green said.

Phillips said local officials haven't had the problem of crank 911 calls to this extent before, but she said that it can be considered a criminal offense.

"We have arrested people before on the charge of Misuse of the Emergency or 911 System, which is a Class A misdemeanor," Phillips said. "People don't understand that when 911 rings, we drop everything and go into emergency mode here."

Green said the problem is a double-edge sword because society teaches kids to dial 911, and some do so just out of curiosity.

The best thing for parents to do, Green said, is take the battery out of cell phones that kids are using as toys.

Yesterday, I did something so stupid, I





accurate temperatures.

Any one who has studied geology knows that over the billions of years that Earth has been around, the planet's temperature has fluctuated. Sometimes it gets hotter; sometimes it gets pretty chilly. These changes take place over thousands of years, and to precisely say that a one-degree change over a mere 100 years is directly attributable to Republican American humans is a bit of a stretch.

Secondly, who died and made Nancy Pelosi the arbiter of the Earth's climate? What authorizes her to say that the climate is at its optimal point right now. Maybe a degree or two warmer or cooler would be better suited for some folks. Do we really want to put humans in charge of the planet's thermostat? Just put six or seven specimens of homo sapiens in one room and see if they all agree whether it's too hot or too cold.

And as far as the dire predictions go, just take a look around. Certainly last year parts of Donley County did look like a desert after a long dry period and terrible wildfires. But now we have had unseasonably cooler weather, and the rain has been coming along pretty steady, too. (Thank you, God.) The whole countryside looks like a flower garden with green grass everywhere you look.

Climate change? I like this year better than last year. That's a change for you. Who's to say next year won't be better? Controlling the climate on this planet is not something that is really within man's grasp just yet. Maybe some day, but not today.

And yes, there have been some instances of severe weather this year. But that's nothing new. There have always been tornadoes and hurricanes and all manner of examples of nature's fury. The difference is that we now have it beamed into our living rooms on 24-hour news channels.

Will Pelosi's Greenland investigation sway the president to support policies that do nothing but punish American companies and diminish our way of life? Probably not. Bush is unlikely to do an about face on this issue, and he's not alone.

Just this week the Communist Chinese rejected calls for them to adopt mandatory caps on the emissions of gases that are thought to contribute to global warming. Even the commies realize that such measures will only do one thing - hinder their economy.

Of course Pelosi and her party don't really care about what the consequences of the policies are except for the fact that it means more power for them, and they like it that way - no matter what the weekend forecast is.

GASB 45 requires Texas state and local governments to recognize and record retiree health insurance benefit costs as a financial obligation, even if there is no such legal obligation. On the surface this appears to be a fairly innocuous and ministerial requirement. However, because the rule requires these costs to be measured and reported for a period up to 50 years in the future, the requirement has a far-reaching and potentially damaging affect.

Consider your own individual health care costs and those of your family for this year alone. Now try to predict how your health may change during the next 50 years and project the associated cost. It's an impossible figure to determine or to guess. Despite this fact, now contemplate opening a trust account and depositing that total amount today. For most people, attempting to do this would be financially impossible or would at least cause serious fiscal hardship. GASB 45 has put state and local governments around the country in this untenable position.

Retirement health benefits for the state of Texas and most Texas governmental entities are not constitutionally mandated or contracted programs. Instead, the programs are reviewed and renewed during the regular budgeting process.

Accounting experts tell us GASB 45 - this nationally developed, voluntary accounting standard --- conflicts with Texas law. We explored this issue fully during the recently concluded legislative session. There was healthy debate in both the House and the Senate.

We learned the American Academy of Actuaries believes the rule would damage the credibility of a balance sheet and add unwarranted volatility. Many actuaries recommend predicting liabilities for no more than five to ten years into the future.

The rule didn't pass the GASB board animously. One dissenter, Paul Riley Wood, indicated it would mean governments should pre-fund or book items that

Johnson, a main author of the GASB 45 statement, during our legislative discussions. We asked how this principle was developed and requested an explanation of the rule's underlying theory.

His response was that it's what the board concluded based on "all of the facts and communications."

Contrary to the GASB board's outof-state hearing process, our facts and communications are laid out in full view. Texas retiree health benefits are budget - not contract - based, and that process is clearly visible every budget cycle when the Legislature and other local governmental entities draft their budgets.

Texas budgets within available revenue; however, what we can afford as a state changes each biennium. For example, in 2003 the Legislature faced a \$10 billion shortfall. Consequently, benefits were reduced.

Texas is a pay-as-you-go state, and there is no way to accurately report that changing figure on a balance sheet. Susan Spataro, an accounting expert and Travis County, Texas, auditor for the past 18 years, investigated what GASB 45 would mean for her county.

She obtained two opinions from professional accounting firms on the cost of pre-funding retirees' health insurance benefits based on the requirement of projecting the cost of the program. One firm suggested a price tag of \$89 million; the other projection was \$320 million. This disparate range illustrates the flaw in GASB 45's measurement of the cost of the benefits.

It's true. GASB doesn't specifically say these amounts must be paid immediately. Instead, they require calculation and reporting of an "Annual Required Contribution.'

Travis County would be required to front an annual required contribution of \$46 million. To obtain those extra millions, property taxes would have to increase 16 percent, the proceeds of which would be devoted exclusively to the GASB contribution. If that price went unpaid, it would compound, eventually showing these fictional liabilities as exceeding assets. The county would be insolvent on paper.

Ms. Spataro concluded GASB 45 does not meet the two-prong test necessary for an accounting transaction to be booked: it does not meet the accounting definition of an obligation, nor is it measurable.

Some suggest that the county or the state could simply book this as a liability without pre-funding. But accounting rules should not require a governmental entity to measure its solvency by liabilities it does not legally bear.

Those who want Texas to comply with this mandate also ignore the human and social cost of complying with the rule. To pre-pay retiree benefits as though we had no control over them would cost the state of Texas billions of dollars or unnecessarily force significant adjustments to retiree benefits. Even worse, other important areas of appropriation such as public education, transportation, criminal justice and Medicaid could also be adversely affected. This is a problem.

Consider what happened when the private sector equivalent of GASB, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB), imposed a similar rule on private companies. No fewer than 70 percent cf Fortune 500 companies cut or eliminated retiree health insurance benefits.

Texas' Attorney General has clarified there is no legal obligation. House Bill 2365 simply creates an "other comprehensive basis of accounting (OCBOA)" that allows government retiree health plans to continue to be accounted for as they have been for years - on an annual, pay-asyou-go basis. In addition, the bill calls for long-term retiree health cost data to be made available for informational purposes. as part of the supplemental information submitted with a financial statement. This is a fair and balanced approach.

Texas funds OPEB obligations for two-year periods because the state Constitution generally prohibits the Legislature from creating a debt or obligation beyond two years. As elected officials, we have an obligation to uphold the Constitution and take into account the implications of implementing GASB 45 for those who have devoted their professional lives to the state of Texas.

And that is exactly what we are doing.

## **IRS warns taxpayers** of new e-mail scams

WASHINGTON - The Internal Revenue Service today alerted taxpayers to the latest versions of an e-mail scam intended to fool people into believing they are under investigation by the agency's Criminal Investigation division.

The e-mail purporting to be from **IRS** Criminal Investigation falsely states that the person is under a criminal probe for submitting a false tax return to the California Franchise Board. The e-mail seeks to entice people to click on a link or open an attachment to learn more information about the complaint against them. The IRS warned people that the e-mail link and attachment is a Trojan Horse that can take over the person's computer hard drive and allow someone to have remote access to the computer.

The IRS urged people not to click the link in the e-mail or open the attachment.

Similar e-mail variations suggest a customer has filed a complaint against a company and the IRS can act as an arbitrator. The latest versions appear aimed at business taxpayers as well as individual tax-

## **Best Aspirin Dose For Heart Problem Prevention**

According to a report in Journal of the American Medical Association an estimated 50 million adults in the United States take aspirin every day for the prevention of heart problems. Aspirin prevents the sticking together of blood cells called platelets. How much aspirin is needed for this purpose is still controversial. Some feel that the amount of active ingredient in baby aspirin (81 milligrams) is so small that giving it to an adult may not achieve the desired result. Giving adults a dose that is larger than the dose given to children makes sense with many drugs and in many situations. That principle, however, does not apply to heart problem prevention and aspirin. Researchers from the University of Kentucky (Lexington) reviewed published data found that long-term doses above 75 to 81 mg per day did not increase aspirin's effectiveness as a heart protectant

Aspirin is currently used as an effective antiflammatory medicine and pain reliever. Aspirin may also help treat and prevent cataracts, and a possible complication of pregnancy called preeclampsia.
