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Dad's wisdom still holds true

This weekend marks a year without my Dad, and it's a bittersweet time. My brother and I are left with lots of memories and for the first time do not have the pleasure of figuring out what to get Dad for Father's

But overshadowing this sadness is the joy of looking forward to my first Father's Day from the other side of the coin. I wonder what Benjamin's mother has planned for me and how many neckties and remote control holders await me in the

In pondering how to spend this unique holiday, I realized that my Dad has already given me a very special present related to fatherhood. I have been left with a wealth of knowledge and lessons that must be passed down to the next generation. And while I fully intend to more

vival to chance.

personally impart this knowledge as Ben gets older, it is still worth writing down. Besides, one never knows what the future holds, and I am therefore choosing to reveal this knowledge now rather than leave its sur-

Lesson 1: The one thing you should never take from a man is his time. This was handed down from my grandfather. Dad always remembered that his own father had taught him to try to be on time when he was expected to be places. "You don't have a right to waste another man's time because you can never give it back to him," he said. Show up at your meetings 10 minutes early; and if you're in charge, get there earlier. And also if you're in charge of a meeting, see that it is run efficiently so that it is over as soon as possible.

Lesson 2: Always do your best work even if no one knows about it. It used to make me wonder why we would spend so much time making sure wires were run and stapled straight and neat when they would eventually be covered up by insulation and drywall. But Dad said we did it because we would always know what it looked like and because someday the wall or ceiling might be opened up and he hoped that people would be able to say, "Oh, the Estlack boys did that." Today, a lot of work goes into every issue of the ENTERPRISE that perhaps only the skilled observer would note. But I know it, and so does our staff.

Lesson 3: Take pride in your work. Much like the previous lesson, this was instilled in Russell and me at an early age. People appreciate a job well done, and your hard work will always pay off in the end.

Lesson 4: People love a bargain - or the perception of it. This was more of an observation than a lesson to live by. My great grandfather Drennan used to own a grocery store; and Dad was a small boy when one of Papa Drennan's customers became incensed that he was selling a certain item for 12 cents a pound. He responded by saying that the lady was such a good customer he would sell her two pounds for a quarter, and she bought it.

Lesson 5: Kids tend to live up to your expectations of them. If you expect your son or daughter to behave and they know you expect it, they will likely behave. But if you expect them to act up, they will respond accordingly.

Lesson 6: Never underestimate the value of an 8x3/2" hex-head screw. My father could fix most anything with an eight-by-half screw that he would purchase by the thousands and always carry on his truck. With it you could put together ductwork, attach all manner of light fixtures and conduit straps, and install breaker boxes and other equipment. You could also screw the plastic on your dashboard back in place on your old truck; and if the trim was coming off Mom's Buick, an eight-by-half screw was a lot cheaper than a trip to the body shop.

Lesson 7: You can fix, repair, or mend most household items with J.B. Weld. Dad never said this, but it was made clear over the course of my lifetime that he believed it. My little red stool from my earliest days is held together with the gray goop that is the mysterious and wonderful J.B. Weld. I have a garden shovel whose handle is almost a solid coating of the stuff. On vacation to our family's cabin last summer, Ashlee noticed an old hole in the front door that had been filled in with a gray substance and said simply. "Your Dad fixed that, didn't be?" Later that fall after Ben's crib toy broke and I was pondering how to fix it, she knew what I was going to do about the same time I did. "Dad and I are going to fix this," I said.

Lesson 8: You get out of something what you put into it. Whether it's your lodge, your club, your church, or your community, get involved and become an active part if you really want to see it do well and feel fulfilled by it.

Lesson 9: Spend time with your kids and let them see you work. It will stay with them forever and make

These lessons could go on and on, and maybe a ture column will continue this topic. But these are the things that have been on my mind the last few months. I hope that Ben and his cousins will pass these bits of wisdom on to their kids; but more importantly, I hope they will live these lessons because in the end, all the things and possessions that we pass on cannot hold a candle to the morals and beliefs that we teach

My Dad never told me that, but I've come to believe it. And I hope that you, Ben, will realize the same thing in time. Because if you can one day remember any of this and tell your son. "You know, my Daddy always said ...", then that will be the best Pather's Duy gift I will ever receive.

New passport rules require planning ahead

As Texans prepare for family trips and summer vacutions, many are having diffaculty getting the passports they need to travel. Under new federal requirements, more Americans will need passports to re-enter the United States after traveling overseas. Therefore, it is important to know if you will need a passport for your trip, to most of which are be familiar with the application process, and to make your arrangements well in

To help prevent undocumented persons from entering our country, new travel guidelines within the western hemisphere are in place. Although well intentioned, the new passport requirements are proving inconvenient and cumbersome. Additionally, the U.S. Department of State's delay in processing passport applications has caused great frustration.

Traditionally, our hemisphere has neighbors. It is clear, though, that terrorists are anxious to infiltrate our nation through other countries. Further, a few rogue dictators in Central America have sought alliances with nations that harbor terrorists. As a result, a passport or other appropriate documentation is now mandatory for all air travelers reentering the U.S. from Canada, Mexico, Central and South America, the Caribbean, and Bermuds. Beginning January 1, 2008, land and sea travelers will also need a passport to

With these additional rements in place, the State Department has received applications and is experiencing a sizable processing backlog. In order to avoid delays, I encourage you to complete and submit your application with all proper documentation as soon as possible.

applying for your first passport, you must go in person to one of 384 Passport Acceptance Facilities in Texas, clerks' offices, or federal office build-

ings. Please take the following with you, and be prepared to pay the appropriate application fee: A completed "Application for Passport" (Form DS-11); Proof of citizenship (certified birth certificate, naturalization certificate, etc.); Proof of identity (such as a driver's license or government ID); and Two passport photos (commercially available).

A full list of acceptance facilities and offered safe travel destinations and friendly further details about the passport application process can be found online at http:

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Thravel state gov. Please remember that each traveler must have a passport, including children and infants. The process for passport renewal is similar and can also be found on the above website.

The State Department reports that routine applicants should receive their passports within 10 to 12 weeks of applying and can track the status of their request online within three to four weeks. However, my office has heard from people who have waited over four months for their application to be processed.

I recommend that you apply months before you are to leave the U.S., just to be sure. If you must have your passport in hand quickly, expedited service is available from the State Department for a fee.

Your passport identifies you as a United States citizen and will grant you entry into more than 140 nations worldwide. Safeguard it at all times, travel safely, and enjoy your vacation!



80th Legislature success for West Texas

Despite the usual - and some markedly unusual - political turmoil during the most recent legislative session, the West Texas legislative program was enormously successful in the 80th Legislature.

Several West Texas legislators held key positions during the appropriations process. Rep. Warren Chisum of Pampa was appointed by Speaker Tom Craddick to serve as chairman of the House Appropristions Committee. Rep. Carl Isett of Lubbock also served in a key role on that committee, along with Rep. Drew Durby of San Angelo. I was pleased to serve on the Senate Finance Committee and on the appropriations conference committee that negotiated the final state budget totaling

The state was fortunate to encounter a historic surplus this year, which enabled the Legislature to reduce school property taxes to \$1 as we promised in April 2006. We managed to maintain at least \$2 billion in the Rainy Day Fund, which may grow to benefit from that new partnership. more than \$4 billion by 2010, and reserve \$2.5 billion to support continuation of the property tax cuts for the 2010-2011 budget

The budget appropriated \$280 million for across-the-board teacher pay raises and an additional \$340 million in incentive funding. We recognize teachers are professionals, and it's critical that we treat them - and pay them - as professionals. To help out retired teachers, we shored up the Teacher Retirement System with \$635 milhow is new funding and mandated that the state's contribution shall not be less than the active teachers' contribution.

This step will help the TRS Board in providing a 13th month check to those ses in desperate need of assistance. new funding for public education salaries - tice reports criticizing the Lubbock State

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For higher education, we added significant funding to the basic formula and stipulated that no university or community college would receive less state money than they did in the last biennium. These mechanisms are important to all institutions of higher education, but especially at our community colleges where enrollment and associated formula support may have decreased because of our robust economy drawing more students into the workforce and temporarily away from higher educa-

For Texas Tech, we secured in excess of \$130 million in new appropriations. Included in that total is the long-awaited appropriation of \$48 million to secure faculty and begin operations at Tech's new four-year medical school in El Paso.

With astounding community support, the Legislature realigned Angelo State University with the Texas Tech system. We expect students at both campuses will

We used the surplus to benefit our state's health care services. We changed the enrollment deadlines in Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) to allow families to register once a year as opposed to twice a year for their children's health care benefits. This should ensure 100,000 eligible children will be added to the list of young Texans with health insurance. This change is especially important for West Texas as we have lost more enrollees than other parts of the state as a result of the 2003 budget shortfall decision to require six-mouth eligibility.

We allocated \$99 million for higher nursing home reimbursement rates and put \$57 million in our state schools to provide for enhanced quality and to address the other, these figures total \$1.2 billion in issues raised by recent Department of Jus-

School. And, we passed legislation to increase transparency in the many facets of our health care system so that consumers may better gauge the expected cost of their health care and understand the components of their insurance coverage.

Our matural resources are precious; and with Senate Bill 3 by Sen. Kip Averitt of Waco, the Legislature took an important step toward wise preservation and maintenance of our water supplies. SB 3 designated several reservoir sites throughout the state, including Marvin Nichols in North

The vision behind this reservoir is that it will provide water for thirsty cities, such as Dallas and Fort Worth, without dipping into our reserves in West Texas. Most importantly, we have funded the state's obligation for projects called for under the state water plan which is significant for infrastructure in our West Texas communi-

I'm proud of what we've been able to accomplish in these rather tumultuous times. The budget is a disciplined budget that addresses our state's critical needs, restores some of the painful cuts made necessary in 2003, and reserves funds to support our future obligations to hold the property tax cuts provided in 2005. Your delegation worked hard for you, and I must mention the extraordinary presence of our two "freshmen" members, Rep. Drew Durby of San Angelo and Rep. Joe Heffin of Crosbyton. Along with the experience of your more seasoned representatives, Sem. Kel Seliger of Amarillo and Reps. Delwin Jones and Carl Isett of Lubbock. John Smithee of Amarillo, and David Swinford of Dumes, we worked together to achieve the best possible session for the people of West Texas.

Best Aspirin Dose For Heart Problem Prevention

According to a report in *Journal of the American Medical Association* an estimated 50 million adults in the United States take aspirin every day for the prevention of heart problems. Aspirin prevents the sticking together of blood cells called platelets. How much aspirin is needed for this purpose is still controversial. Some feel that the amount of active ingredient in baby aspirin (81 milligrams) is so small that giving it to an adult may not achieve the desired result. Giving adults a dose that is larger than the dose given to children makes sense with many drugs and in many situations. That principle, however, does not apply to heart problem prevention and aspirin. Researchers from the University of Kentucky (Lexington) reviewed published data found that long-term doses above 75 to 81 mg per day did not increase aspirin's effectiveness as a heart protectant.

Aspirin is currently used as an effective antiflammatory medicine and pain reliever. Aspirin may also help treat and prevent cataracts, and a possible complication of pregnancy called preeclampsia.



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












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

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

A field tour at each site will show nearby contrasting playa management scenarios, such as heavily grazed vs. lightly grazed or ungrazed, cropland playa with buffer vs. without, fenced vs. unfenced, Cearley said.






Tax revenue drops some in May report

AUSTIN - Sales tax receipts in Clarendon fell less than one percent in May, but revenue for the year remains above last year's figures, according to information released Friday by Texas Comptroller Susan Combs.

City Hall received an allocation of \$22,087,45 for the month, which was down 0.89 percent. Revenue for the year to date remained strong with a total of \$144,774.24 collected, up 1.91 percent from the same period in 2006.

Howardwick's sales tax revenue continued to climb, up 23.24 percent this month for an allocation of \$1,140.61. That city's year-to-date figure is now 13.45 percent ahead at \$6,000.42.

Sales tax revenue in Hedley for May was down 42.77 percent to \$362.19, and the year-to-date figure stands at \$4,825.68, down 21.63 percent.

The state collected \$1.7 billion in sales tax revenue in May.

"Growth in sales tax revenue remains healthy," Combs said. "Sales tax collections reflect the current healthy state of the Texas economy-notably the oil and gas, manufacturing, and retail trade sectors."

Combs sent June sales tax allocations of \$283.6 million to Texas cities, up five percent compared to June 2006. So far this calendar year, city sales tax allocations are up seven percent compared to the same time period last year.

State sales tax collections in May and local sales tax allocations in June represent sales that occurred in April and were reported to the Comptroller in May.
