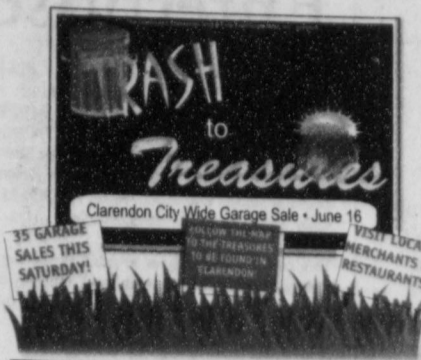

Drowning leads to six-day search for boy

A six-day search for an Amarillo boy who drowned at Greenbelt Lake ended Monday night after his body was discovered by Game Wardens.

Four-year-old Ethan Veale had been missing since he fell off an inflatable water mattress last Wednesday night. Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn said preliminary results of an autopsy performed Tuesday in Lubbock confirmed drowning as the cause of Veale's death.

The accident has local officials reminding everyone of the importance of having lifejackets for children when going to the lake.

"No one has ever drowned in Greenbelt Lake who was wearing a true life preserver," Blackburn said.

Greenbelt Water Authority requires lifejackets for people on watercrafts, and general manager Bobbie Kidd said there was no way that Veale's air mattress qualified as a watercraft or as a life preserver. He also urges people to put lifejackets on children when playing near the water and asks people to observe high wind advisories.

Blackburn said Veale's family

had been at Jet Ski Beach between Lakeside Marina and the dam for about 30 or 45 minutes when the boy's twin brother and seven-year-old sister alerted their mother, Aja Bree Foster, that Veale was on the mattress in the water.

According to statements given to Blackburn's office, Foster saw the boy floating off and attempted to get him back to shore. She also alerted her boyfriend, Christopher Paul Kindred, who tried to swim to the boy but returned to shore when he could not swim far enough to reach

the child.

Blackburn said Kindred went to the marina to try to find someone with a boat and then drove to Sandy Beach to try to find help. At some point, he activated the OnStar system in his car, which put him in touch with the dispatcher in the sheriff's office at 7:26 p.m.

The sheriff said the National Weather Service reported the wind speed at Greenbelt at that time was 28 mph. It is not clear exactly when Veale fell off the blow-up mattress, but his family thought he was about

120 yards from shore although they were unsure exactly where.

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department's Dive Team was on the scene by 7:40 p.m. and began diving in the area around the Morning Glory, a concrete structure near the dam. They dove until 1:00 a.m. when they ran out of air. Game wardens ran boats with sonar over the area, and other personnel drove and walked the dam.

"We've been spoiled," Blackburn said Monday. "We've been able to see 'Drowning' on page three."

Accident sends six to Amarillo hospital

Two Clarendon residents were in serious condition in an Amarillo hospital following a two-vehicle accident east of Giles Monday.

DPS Trooper Chad Simpson said Judy Perkins, age 52, of Clarendon was northbound in the outside lane of US 287 when her 1994 Buick Roadmaster was struck in the left rear corner by a 2003

Freightliner driven by Robert Jenkins, 49, of Aurora, Neb.

The Buick slid into the east ditch, impacted a guardrail, and came to rest on its wheels, Simpson reported.

Passengers in Perkins' car included Charlene Harris, 13, of Clarendon; Kaleb King, 6, of Amarillo; Karen Layton, 5, of Clarendon;

Haven Phillips, 8, of Amarillo; and Sidney Franklin, 12, of Arlington.

Perkins was lifelifted to Northwest Texas Hospital, and the five children were transported to the hospital by ambulance. Both Perkins and Harris remained in serious condition Tuesday, Simpson said.

No citations had been issued at press time. The accident is still

under investigation.

Responding to the accident were personnel with the DPS, Donley and Hall County sheriffs' departments, Associated Ambulance Authority, Hall County EMS, Clarendon and Memphis fire departments, Memphis Police Department, and the Texas Department of Transportation.

35 garage sales registered for this Saturday

"I'm interested in the whole ecology of the idea and encouraging recycling of old items," Clifford said.

Shelton resigns from CC

Dr. W. Myles Shelton is stepping down as president of Clarendon College to take a position in Galveston.

The CC Board of Regents accepted Shelton's resignation during a called meeting last Thursday. His last day on the job will be June 28.

"It's a lot of mixed emotions," Shelton said of his resignation Monday. "Clarendon College has been very good for us personally."

The board last week praised Shelton for the accomplishments CC has achieved under his leadership, most significantly the successful completion of the school's accreditation process last year.

Shelton lists the construction and opening of the college's new Vera Dial Dickey Library and the M.K. Brown Academic Center in Pampa among CC's top achievements since he took the helm in 1999.

The president also said he is proud of the college successfully completing the goals outlined in the "New Horizons" master plan from 1999 to 2003 and in the "Opening Doors; Changing Lives" plan scheduled to be completed this year.

"The 'New Horizons' plan had 44 individual goals, and all of them were met," Shelton said. "I expect we'll see the same results when the 'Opening Doors' plan ends this year. All of these little accomplishments add up to really great things when taken as a whole."

Shelton said he will miss the community and the people of Clarendon, but he looks forward to the new challenges he will face as president of Galveston College.

"They have had declining enrollment, and then there are issues lingering because of allegations of misrepresenting enrollment numbers, which impacts their state funding," Shelton said. "I think overall the institution is strong."

Clarendon College's next step will be to hire an interim president. Shelton says he hopes the board will make that decision this month.

The interim president will then guide the college in its selection of a new president. That process is expected to take between nine and 12 months.

In other business, the board of regents last week approved the hiring of Steve Williams as an English instructor at the CC Pampa Center and voted to extend the contract of acting dean of students Tex Buckhaults by 12 months.

The board also accepted the resignation of Enrollment Services Counselor Kelly Vonner, who is leaving to teach math at Memphis.

to find anyone within an hour in the last several years, but we've always had better reference points."

Kidd agreed with that statement.

"Our local dive team has retrieved four bodies in less than an hour," he said. "They have been really successful."

Involved in the initial search with the sheriff's office and fire department were Greenbelt Lake personnel, the Associated Ambulance Authority, the Howardwick Volunteer Fire Department, the Department of Public Safety, and the Texas Parks & Wildlife Game Wardens.

The DPS brought in a search helicopter the next morning, and the Lake Meredith Underwater Rescue Team also joined the search Thursday. On Friday, Clarendon divers were joined by a DPS dive team from Austin, and divers from the Amarillo Police Department were on the scene

over the weekend.

"None of these people could have worked as long or as hard without the support of the Clarendon Firebelles," Blackburn noted.

Throughout the search, divers were hindered by poor visibility and thick moss that in a few areas was reported to be 20 feet deep, Blackburn said.

"Those state divers were coming up, and you could have filled a bushel basket with the moss that was covering them," the sheriff said.

Greenbelt officials twice stopped pumping water from the lake - once Wednesday night for the divers' safety and again Friday so divers could check the area around the intake pipe.

Emergency officials met Sunday night and made the decision to drain the lake, an action which hasn't been necessary in over 25 years, Blackburn

said. Dragging commenced Monday morning and continued through most of the day with the hope that if the drag did not find Veale's body, it would at least disturb the moss or whatever might be holding him beneath the water's surface.

At 7:40 p.m. Monday, Game Wardens Gary Hunt and Robert Greenwalt discovered Veale near the dam about 200 feet north of the Morning Glory, Blackburn said.

Justice of the Peace Connie Havens pronounced the boy dead at 8:20 p.m. and ordered the autopsy.

"I'm just glad this is finally over," Blackburn said.

No charges had been filed in Veale's death at press time. Blackburn said Monday the case would be turned over to the district attorney when the investigation is complete.

Veale is the 16th person to drown at Greenbelt since it opened in 1968.

Researchers see decline in milk consumption

United States Department of Agriculture analyzed four food consumption surveys administered between 1965 and 1996, the researchers looked at how food intake trends have changed for teens ages 11 to 18.

Over the 30-year period, milk consumption has decreased by 36 percent while soft drink and non-citrus juice consumption has steadily increased.

The researchers also note that this decline in milk consumption has not been made up for by an increase in other calcium-rich dairy products, which could put teens at serious risk for developing the bone crippling disease, osteoporosis, later in life.

"During your teens, nearly half of all bone is formed, and about 15 percent of adult height is added,

making these years the once in a lifetime opportunity to reach full bone mass and height potential," said Jean Ragalie, R.D., National Dairy Council.

"Milk is one of the best natural sources of calcium, not to mention one of the best tasting ways for teens to get it."

According to current dietary recommendations, teenagers need 1,300 mg of calcium a day, or the equivalent of about four 8-ounce glasses of milk.

Milk also contains vitamin D, which helps the body absorb calcium, and seven other essential nutrients important for growth and development.

In addition to the decrease in calcium-rich milk consumption, the study found that teen consumption of fruits and non-potato sources of

vegetables has decreased over the 30-year time period as well.

Teen Tips for Crammin' in the Calcium

The Milky Way - On your way out the door, can the can of diet soda and grab a single-serving carton of milk. Any flavor will do...it's nutrient-packed!

Shake It, Don't Break It - A milkshake makes the cut any day - use fat free milk and lowfat ice cream to cut the calories.

Instant Bliss - Whip up some instant pudding with milk, it's ready in seconds!

Fruit for Thought - Try one of the new milk or yogurt drinks - they come in fun flavors like banana, strawberry, or even peanut butter!

Java Junkie - If you're a java junkie, make sure to lap up a latte instead of a regular old black coffee.

The National Family Caregivers Association estimated that more than 50 million caregivers across the country provide services to their family members valued at \$257 bil-

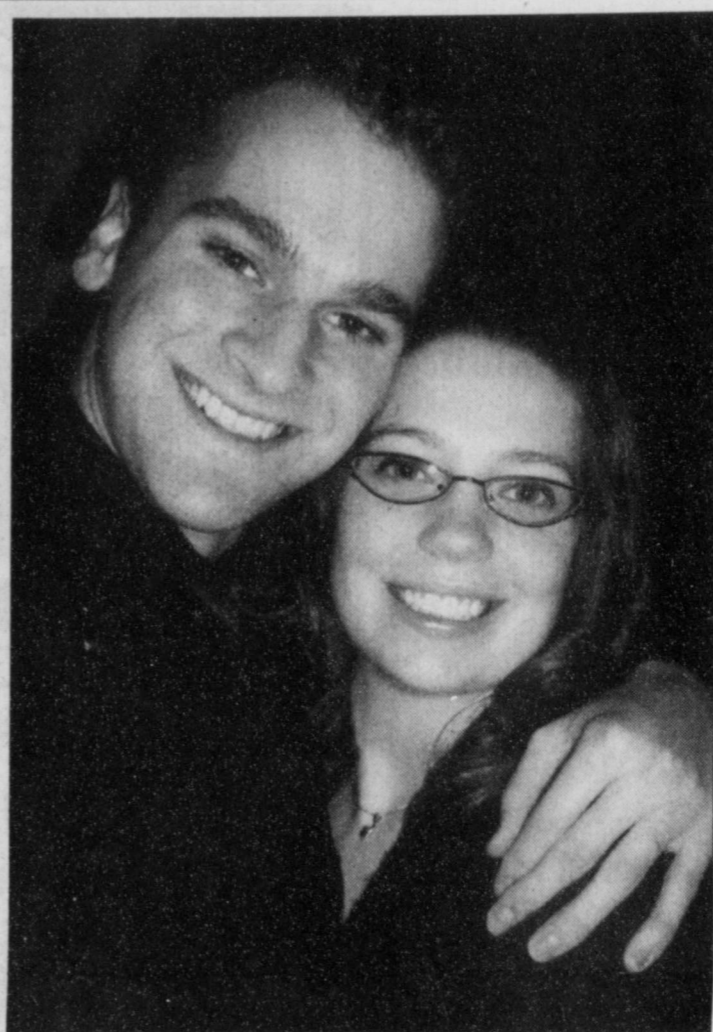

Best Aspirin Dose For Heart Problem Prevention

According to a report in *Journal of the American Medical Association* an estimated 50 million adults in the United States take aspirin every day for the prevention of heart problems. Aspirin prevents the sticking together of blood cells called platelets. How much aspirin is needed for this purpose is still controversial. Some feel that the amount of active ingredient in baby aspirin (81 milligrams) is so small that giving it to an adult may not achieve the desired result. Giving adults a dose that is larger than the dose given to children makes sense with many drugs and in many situations. That principle, however, does not apply to heart problem prevention and aspirin. Researchers from the University of Kentucky (Lexington) reviewed published data found that long-term doses above 75 to 81 mg per day did not increase aspirin's effectiveness as a heart protectant.

Aspirin is currently used as an effective anti-inflammatory medicine and pain reliever. Aspirin may also help treat and prevent cataracts, and a possible complication of pregnancy called preeclampsia.



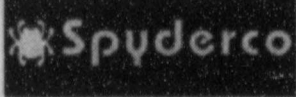
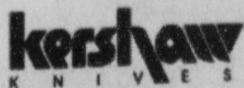

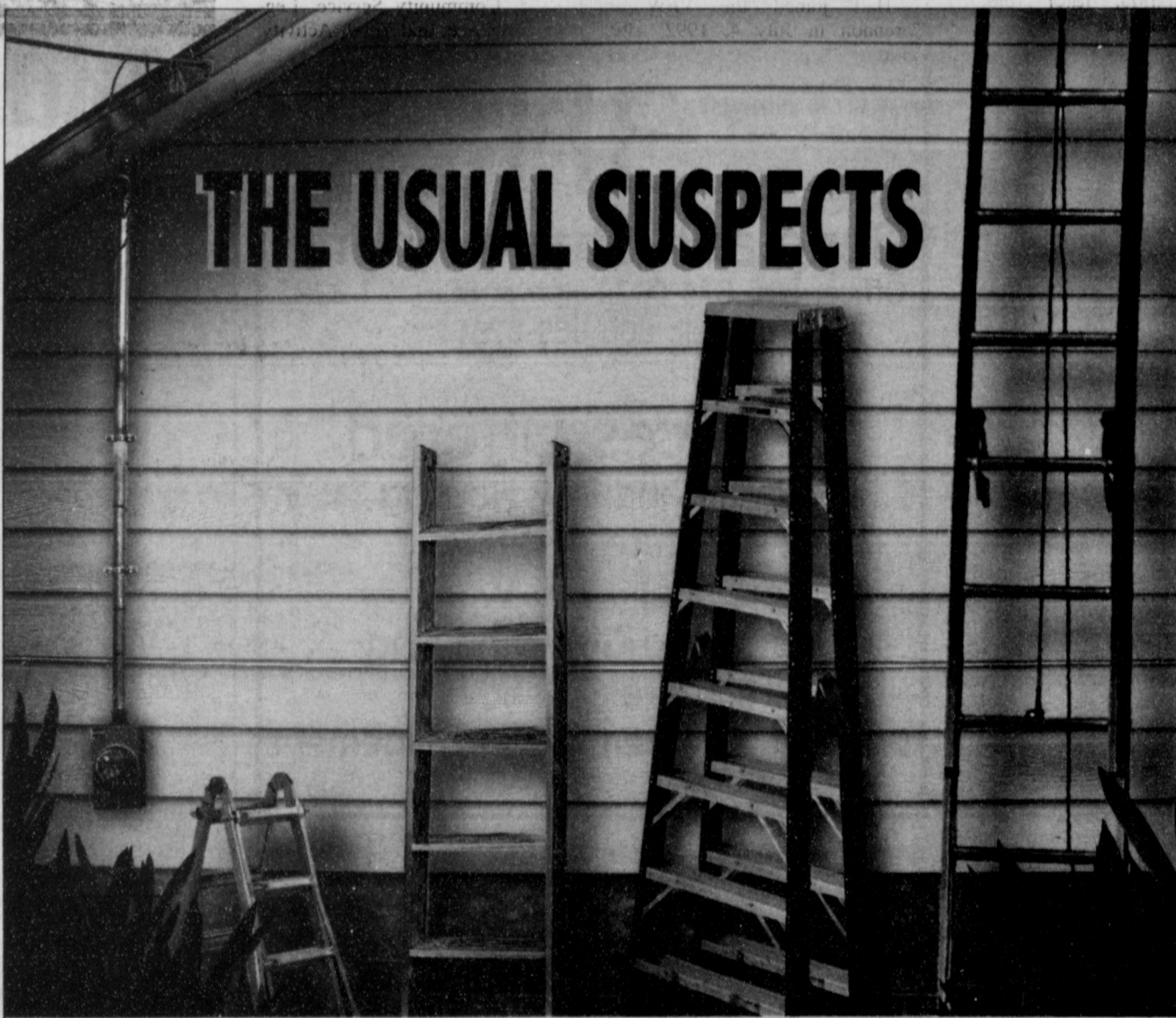

Playas to be topic of June meetings

To help promote management planning, two Playa Appreciation Days will be held this month, said Ken Cearley, Extension wildlife specialist in Canyon.

Both meetings will begin at 8:30 a.m. The first is scheduled for June 25 at the Home Mercantile Building in Nazareth, and the second will be on June 27 at the Floyd County Friends Unity Center in Muncy.

The meetings will include sessions on the identification of important playa plants, form and function of playas, ways to manage playas for pheasants and waterfowl, and available assistance programs, Cearley said.

Special programs will be presented on the MossyOak / Ducks Unlimited Ochiltree County playa restoration project and the Ogallala Commons, he said. Other programs will cover hunting, leasing, and other recreational opportunities, as well as agencies that offer management assistance.

A field tour at each site will show nearby contrasting playa management scenarios, such as heavily grazed vs. lightly grazed or ungrazed, cropland playa with buffer vs. without, fenced vs. unfenced, Cearley said.

A \$10 fee will cover the cost of a noon meal at each meeting.

Tax revenue drops some in May report

AUSTIN - Sales tax receipts in Clarendon fell less than one percent in May, but revenue for the year remains above last year's figures, according to information released Friday by Texas Comptroller Susan Combs.

City Hall received an allocation of \$22,087.45 for the month, which was down 0.89 percent. Revenue for the year to date remained strong with a total of \$144,774.24 collected, up 1.91 percent from the same period in 2006.

Howardwick's sales tax revenue continued to climb, up 23.24 percent this month for an allocation of \$1,140.61. That city's year-to-date figure is now 13.45 percent ahead at \$6,000.42.

Sales tax revenue in Hedley for May was down 42.77 percent to \$362.19, and the year-to-date figure stands at \$4,825.68, down 21.63 percent.

The state collected \$1.7 billion in sales tax revenue in May.

"Growth in sales tax revenue remains healthy," Combs said. "Sales tax collections reflect the current healthy state of the Texas economy—notably the oil and gas, manufacturing, and retail trade sectors."

Combs sent June sales tax allocations of \$283.6 million to Texas cities, up five percent compared to June 2006. So far this calendar year, city sales tax allocations are up seven percent compared to the same time period last year.

State sales tax collections in May and local sales tax allocations in June represent sales that occurred in April and were reported to the Comptroller in May.
