

The golden eagles attain great size, the average wing-spread being seven and one-half feet and they have powerful talons and a habit, now duplicated in modern war, of "dive-bombing."

Their usual method of destroyng game, say veteran trans-Pecos Game Wardens, is to fly up about 3,000 feet, spot newly-born or very young antelope, mule deer, or other animals, fold their wings and dive upon the unsuspecting game, clutching the young in their talons and soaring aloft to some craggy retreat to enjoy a good meal.

Thousands of young antelope, mule deer and mountain sheep have been thus destroyed.





The gigantic Japanese-American sea engagement around Midway island is an example. The Japanese, after making their feint at Dutch Harbor with a few bombers and pursuit planes, apparently expected that American commanders would hysterically disperse their forces. In all probability, they definitely expected to take both Midway and Oahu. But the American commanders, working on extremely accurate information provided by the Intelligence services, were ready. The Navy, the Army and the Marines worked in perfect harmony. The result was the most serious setback Japan has yet taken in the Pacific war.

That battle, coming on top of the Coral Sea engagement, must be causing plenty of headaches among the moguls in Tokyo. They (See AMERICAN, Page 2, Sec. 2)

### **Youths Will Enter** Civilian Pilot **Training Course**

Literally hundreds of young men from Texas and Oklahoma vill enter the Civilian Pilot Training course on or about July 1 under the auspices of the United States Navy, Lieutenant Commander Barry Holton, senior member of the Naval Aviation Cadet Selection Board, Dallas, announced today, disclosing that only young men enlisted in the navy's V-5 program may be entitled to enrollment in the navysponsored CPT.

Explaining that the CPT instruction would include both ground school and actual flight training, Commander Holton said: 'The navy is providing these extensive courses for future naval aviators at no cost to the men. They will be furnished their meals and lodging throughout their entire training period."

Holton said that the object of the movement was two-fold. First,



Painful or difficult menstruation, scanty flow or absence of flow, as well as excessive bleeding, are sometimes caused by harmone imbalances, though some of these defects are often of emotional origin.

The cessation of menstruation occuring in women at about 45 to 50 years of age normally mark the termination of the reproductive ceases, and the uterus and mammary glands undergo atrophy.

Frequently, women experience untoward vaso-motor, neuromuscular, and psychic symptoms at this time. Also, sterility in women may conceivably occur even though ova are produced, through defects in the normal cyclic functioning of the uterus.

In what ways can our knowledge of the sex harmones and their functions be of service here? Unfortunately, we must conclude that, so far, attempts to alleviate all cases by substitution therapy have not been successful. One of the most serious difficulties lies in the fact that the one production of harmones by the ovaries is cyclic: the concentration of the follicular or luteal harmones in the blood varies in regular fashion but in a rather complicated
