





SOCIAL SECURITY **NEWS**

The month of July is one of the four months each year when so cial security tax returns must be filed by all employers in commerce and industry. These returns will report wages paid during April, May and June. The tax return should be mailed to the Collector of Internal Revenue, Dallas, Texas, and not to the Amarillo Social Security Office.

A social security tax return is not complete unless it shows the full name and social security account number of each employee. The employer can be sure of having this information if he will insist that each new employee show his social security card at the time he is hired. Any employer having difficulty getting social security numbers for all his employees is invited to contact the Amarillo office or the representative when he is in Clarendon.
