Two winter cover crop practices have been approved for Texas under the 1950 A.C.P. Program. They are: 1. Establishing a satisfactory cover of Winter Legumes and Ryegrass seeded in the fall of 1949. Payment on this practice will be made according to type of seed used. 2. Turning under or Leaving on the land a satisfactory stand and growth of rye seeded in the fall of 1949. The payment on this practice is \$1.50 per acre. If you are interested in these practices, come to the office and discuss the matter with us. You might like to know that B. R. Mears, Manager of Merit Feed Stores here in Clarendon, will handle Austrian Winter Peas, Hairy Vetch, and 20% Superphosphate.

Budget Is Low


