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

## Rural Youth Day At State Fair of Texas Set For Oct. 15th

Post-war rural youth activity in the state will reach its high point this year when the largest single gathering of farm boys and girls in the nation's history will be honored by the State Fair of Texas on Rural Youth Day, Oct. 15th, James W. Aston, chairman of the Fair's rural youth day committee, has announced.

"At least 75,000 4-H Club boys and girls, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers from farms and ranches in every corner of the state, will make the trip to the Fair." Aston said. "Last year's attendance of 60,000 was considered phenomenal, but all indications point to a 25 per cent increase for this year."

The youngsters are traditionally given free admission to the Fair, and a free lunch which is provided by Dallas business lead-

"Purpose of Rural Youth Day is primarily to help youngsters become better citizens," Aston said. "The sights they see and the information they obtain on this day broaden their vision, and their knowledge of trends in agriculture, livestock, poultry, and modern life in general. They find out what is going on, gain valuable from the experience of others and, as a result, they become better business men, homemakers, farmers, ranchers, and citizens." Rural Youth Day was inaugurated at the Fair in 1946. Through the cooperation of the Texas A&M College Extension Service state Vocational Agriculture and Homemaking departments, the event has grown from an initial attendance of 30,000 to 75,000 which is the goal for 1949.

Attendance prizes of \$100 each will be awarded the county 4-H Club delegation and the Future Farmer and Future Homemaker chapters which have the highest score, based on the number of members present multiplied by the number of miles traveled to the Fair.

A banquet honoring the 50 outstanding Future Farmers, Future Homemakers, and 4-H Club boys and girls in the state during 1949, will be held in the Texas Room of the Baker Hotel at 7 p. m. October 14th.






