## Postmaster Estlack Urges Immediate Mailings On All Christmas Bundles

Postmaster J. C. Estlack opened the Christmas season officially this week, by issuing his annual appeal for early mailing of cards and packages.

Estlack expects the largest flood of Christmas mail in local history. He predicted it would exceed by a considerable margin the record breaking 1948 holiday season when 146,872 pieces of mail were cancelled.

"This year's deluge of Christmas mail will strain post office facilities severely," he stated. "But we'll get everything delivered by Christmas, if the public will cooperate wholeheartedly." Christmas packages for other states should be mailed by December 8, and all Christmas parcel post should be on its way by December 10. Christmas cards going to other states should be mailed by December 15. Greetings for local delivery should go through the stamp cancellation machines at least a week before Christmas, Estlack said.

To keep Christmas mail on schedule, the postmaster asks that you—

1. Stop at the post office next week to purchase the extra stamps you will need, thus avoiding last-minute crowds. When buying stamps for Christmas cards bear in mind the desirability of sending the cards as first class mail; and especially bear in mind the fact that the rate for unsealed cards has been increased from 1½ cents to 2 cents each.

2. Check and revise your Christmas card address list this week-end. Purchase your Christmas cards early and address and stamp them at once. Then stack

them in a convenient place for mailing at the proper time.

3. Lay in adequate supplies of heavy cardboard, sturdy outer paper, strong cord, and printed Fourth Class mail labels for wrapping parcel post. Packages are limited to 70 pounds in weight and must not measure more than 100 in length and girth combined. Repeat the address inside the outer wrapping, in case they are damaged in transit.

## CHAMBER OF COMMERCE BALLOTS MAILED THIS WEEK

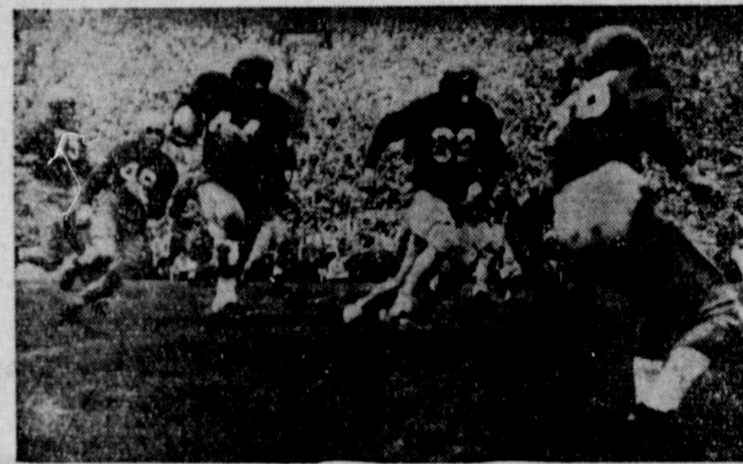

It was announced this week that the Lelia Lake Methodist Church was sponsoring the appearance of the Stamps Ozark Quartet at the Lelia Lake School auditorium at 7:30 Friday night of this week. The proceeds will go into the fund to put a new roof on the Methodist Church building at Lelia Lake.

The price of admission will be 50 and 25 cents. Those who wish to attend are urged to buy their tickets before the time of the program at the Webb Grocery or Seago Garage as the church will receive 40% from all the tickets sold before hand and only 20% of the proceeds of all admittances taken at the door. Every effort is being made to increase the Cotton Allotment given Donley County. Members of various interested organizations met in the P.M.A. Office November 29th to discuss the situation and to decide what could be done to give our county the most benefit possible.

It was decided to send a committee to meet with State Director, Mr. B. F. Vance, at the State Office in College Station, Texas. Making the trip were Roy Jewell, Claude Moore, and W. M. Pickering, Committeemen for Donley County; J. Holly Wood and Lee Shaller, members of the Donley County Farm Bureau; J. R. Porter, Chairman of the Soil Conservation Service; Odos Caraway, member of the Chamber of Commerce and Bowen DuLaney, member of the local Lions Club.

Roy Jewell, Claude Moore, J. Holly Wood, and Lee Shaller stopped at Waco and met with J. Walter Hammond, President of the Farm Bureau. They were able to see Mr. Hammond shortly after delegates from twenty-four counties had met to see if something could not be done about their cotton allotments. The conference lasted about two hours.

All of the representatives from Donley County met for about three hours Saturday morning with Mr. B. F. Vance, State Director, Fred Reynolds, Assistant State Director, Henry Marshall, State Statistician, Edd Rawlins, Marketing Quota Specialist. They were told that the State has used up its quota distributing it among the counties. Unless something can be done in congress, the county allotments will not be raised. Some plans have been made by which the acreage might be increased. The State Committee is doing all it can to help raise the allotments. Several plans were submitted to the delegation for the purpose of finding which one of the plans will benefit our county the most. The plans were being worked on in the county office, and as soon as they are all tried, and the best one for us is found, they will be sent to our congressman, and will be considered in Washington.

The delegation felt that the trip was not in vain, because by finding a plan for our county, and sending it to Washington, the farmers in Donley County might receive more cotton acreage. If not, they will feel that all possible was done. It is not up to the County or the State, only action by Congress will raise the 1950 allotments.

**Pineapple Date Bars**

1/2 cup canned, well drained crushed pineapple  
1 cup finely cut pitted dates  
1 cup finely cut nuts  
1/2 cup sifted, all-purpose flour

1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 eggs, separated  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/4 cup Pet Milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Turn on oven; set at slow (325° F.). Grease a shallow pan about 8x12 in. Mix pineapple, dates and nuts. Let stand. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Beat egg yolks until very light. Beat in gradually the sugar, milk and vanilla. Mix in flour until smooth. Fold in fruit mixture and stiffly beaten egg whites. Put into greased pan. Bake 35 min., or until firm. When cool, cut in bars 1x4 in. Makes about 2 doz.

COLLEGE STATION—Add another to the list to whom you will give a Christmas present this year and let this be a child in some overseas country which needs help in the form of daily food.

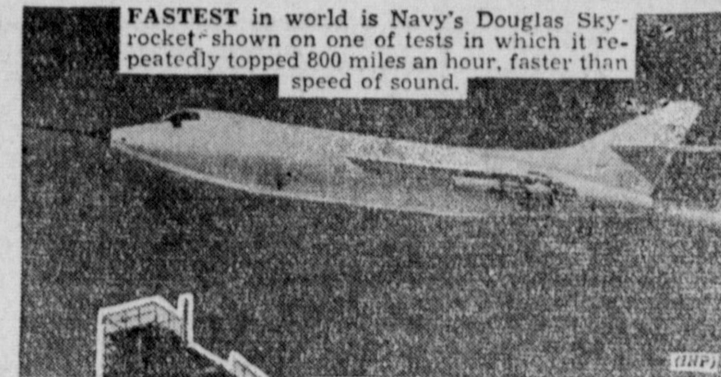

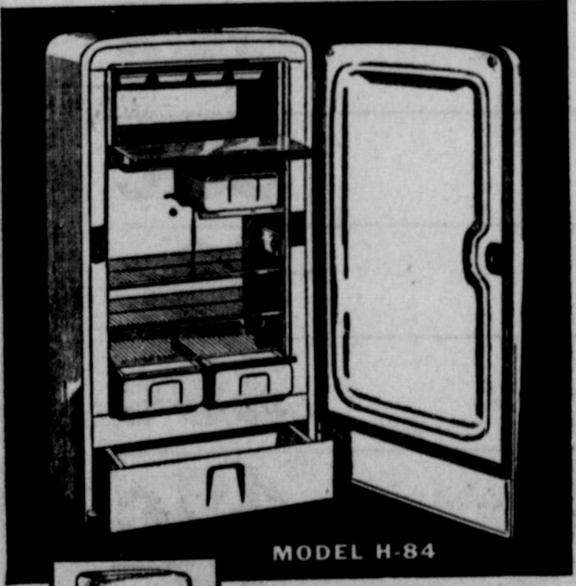

**Time To Prune Fruit Trees**

Pruning of fruit trees is a job that comes around regularly about this time of year and after the first of the year. H. M. Breedlove, county agent, says that this is one job that should not be neglected because next year's fruit crop depends a lot on the care you give the trees during the dormant season.

Fruit trees are pruned to stimulate new growth for next years fruit to grow on. Pruning also keeps the trees down to handling dimensions. In pruning of the trees give them a good frame work and good shape and also remove all dead wood in the tree. Breedlove says to remember that when you cut off a limb of a tree be sure to cut it off smooth with the tree and do not leave a stub because when cut off smooth it will heal over.

Farmers have been requesting the county agent to make up an order of fruit trees to be ordered after the first of the year. The trees come cheaper when the orders are pooled for the county and ordered in one lot. Breedlove said that any one wishing fruit trees to be set out in 1950 can turn in their orders to his office now and the order will go off after the first of the year. There will be only one shipment of fruit trees in 1950, so get in your order if you are interested.

**MEETING IS HELD TO PLAN 1950 ACP PROGRAM:**

**Yule Trees Can Be Kept Safe From Fire**

Be careful, home Santa Clauses, how you handle that Christmas tree. It takes just a spark to turn a beautiful spruce into a blazing torch in your living room. Christmas trees are full of flammable pitch and resins, and burn furiously even when fresh cut.

To help you keep Christmas merry, the National Board of Fire Underwriters offers these safety rules for installing and decorating your Christmas tree:

1. Choose a small tree, instead of a big one. It will be just as pretty and much less hazardous.
2. Keep your tree outdoors until just before Christmas. Install it in the coolest part of the room, away from fireplaces, heaters or radiators.
3. Do not, under any circumstances, use cotton or paper for decoration on the tree or around the tree.

4. Do not place electric trains around the tree.
5. Use electric lights for illumination. Never use candles. See that all wires are in good condition. Use Christmas tree lighting outfits which have been tested by Underwriters Laboratories, Inc. These can be identified by a tag bearing the name of Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. attached to the wires.
6. Do not plug or unplug the electric cords beneath the tree. Provide a switch some distance from the tree to turn the light off or on.
7. Do not leave lights burning when no one is in the house. From time to time inspect the tree to see whether any needles near the lights have started to turn brown. If so, change the position of the lights.
8. When needles start falling, take the tree down and discard it.

## Estlack Warns Of Insufficient Holiday Postage

Don't try to mail your Christmas cards this year with 1 1/2 stamps, Postmaster J. C. Estlack warned today!

By way of explanation he pointed out that the postage rate on unsealed greeting cards, which travel by third class mail, was raised to 2 cents last January.

So don't try to mail this year's Yule greetings with 1 1/2 stamps left over from last Christmas, he cautioned. All sorts of embarrassing things may happen.

Your mail carrier may return the cards to you stamped, "Insufficient Postage."

Or they may be held until the addressee supplies the additional postage required by the new law before the mysterious envelope—which turns out to be your "Merry Christmas" wish—may be delivered to him.

Or your cards may be shunted into the Dead Letter Office, if they're deposited at the peak of the Christmas mailing rush and they bear no return address.

To preserve your cheery Christmas cards from these in-sending them all by first class mail. That means with a 3 cent stamp—or two 1 1/2 stamps!

First class mail rates "directory service," by which skilled post office clerks try to trace down addresses who have moved. Your card may be forwarded from one address to another. If the addressee isn't located, the card will come back to you if the en-

velope bears your return address. Christmas cards carrying 2 cents stamps are third class mail. They must not be sealed and must not contain personal messages. Only one effort is made to deliver them. If the address proves incomplete or incorrect, your warm-hearted Christmas greetings land in the Dead Letter Office.

"Please address plainly and completely," Estlack emphasizes. "Give the full name, house number, street, name of city, zone number, and state."

And don't forget to write your return address on the envelope he added.

### SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

More than six out of every 10 who receive monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits are persons other than the worker.

The worker's social security card represents a family insurance policy that, under certain conditions, can pay insurance benefits to his wife, widow, children, or parents. Every worker who has ever had a social security card owes it to his family to let them know that they may be eligible for Federal insurance benefits in case he should die. Lack of this knowledge and failure to get in touch with a social security office at the death of a worker, may cost his survivors hundreds of dollars in insurance benefits.

Tell your family now that they should get in touch with the nearest social security office in the event of your death.
