Mr. Bain, age 82 years, passed away at a Pampa hospital Sunday morning. He had been a resident of Donley and Hall counties since 1896. He was a teacher in the old Rowles school in 1904 and was a farmer, Donley County Judge, and a rancher. He was a member of the Methodist Church and the Masonic Lodge.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ethel Bain, Clarendon; two daughters, Mrs. C. S. Boston, Pampa; Mrs. Rex Howell, Munday; three sons, Gordon Bain, Clarendon; J. L. Bain, Pampa and Woodrow W. Bain, Brookhaven, Miss.; one brother, J. L. Bain, Hedley, and five grandchildren.

### Ocelot Killed Near Hedley Friday

Cotton pulling was disrupted on the farm of Mrs. H. Hoggard about 2 1/2 miles Northeast of Hedley last Friday when a four-footed prowler, described as an Ocelot, was discovered near the field where the cotton was being gathered. It was first thought that the animal was a Bobcat but upon closer inspection it had a long tail and was spotted like a Leopard.

The Ocelot was flushed out of tall weeds near the field by one of the boys pulling bales and the cat ran up a tree. Part of the group watched the cat while Arthur Wingate, 19 years old, ran and got a shot gun and shot the animal out of the tree. The Ocelot was believed to be about half grown as it weighed only 25 lbs. and a full grown cat weighs around 45 lbs.

Arthur was quite proud of this new addition to his big game hunting record. He downed a big Bobcat near Hedley about two years ago and has a sizeable scar on his right hand from the experience. His dogs had treed the cat in a briar patch and Arthur went in after it armed only with a 22 calibre pistol. The Bobcat still had enough life after six shots had struck him to tear a big gash in his hand.

He believed that the Ocelot was probably traveling through the country with a companion and stated his desire to meet up with this one and get it too.

### Route Mail Boxes Are Protected By Law

While investigating damage to mail boxes in this section the past week, a postal inspector called attention to the fact that many who damage mail boxes do so without knowing the penalty for so doing.

The law covering this matter is to be found in Title 13, Part 130, Paragraph 130.44 of the book known as the Postal Laws and Regulations which read as follows:

"Destruction of letter boxes or mail. Whoever willfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letter box or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or willfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than 3 years."

Tampering with mail boxes is a federal offense disposed of through a federal court, the nearest such court to Donley County being Amarillo.

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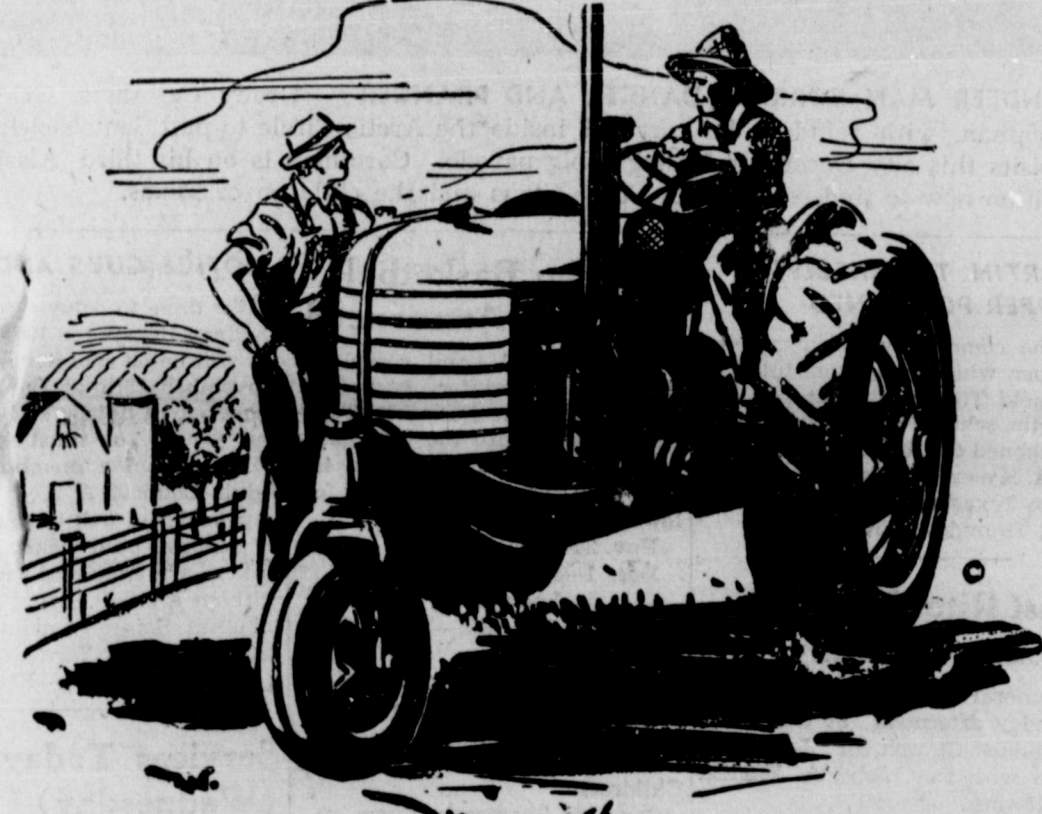

SANTA CLAUS...

(Continued from Front page) deer from Lapland in order that the Eskimos might have reindeer venison for food and the skins of the reindeer for clothing to protect them from the Arctic blasts. A herd of 1,200 reindeer was brought out of Siberia about 1892, and attendants who knew how to care for reindeer were imported from Norway and Finland to teach the Eskimos.

These attendants were allowed to settle on American soil. "Uncle Mike" Nilluka was one of these men. Nilluka settled on an island near Seattle, Wash., and when Carothers brought some reindeer out of Alaska to Seattle, Nilluka helped the Texan train these animals to pull a sleigh for Santa Claus.

On his third expedition to Alaska, Carothers took along Jack Allen of Borger, another ranchman, for a companion. They hope to corral some 15 reindeer—the pick of two large Alaskan herds.

The two Texans traveled by bus, boat, rail, plane, dogsled and deersled to an Eskimo village at Kotzebue, on the Arctic coast. With Eskimo guides they headed north from there by sled to a frozen river inside the Arctic Circle where a large herd of reindeer grazes. They'll be gone seven weeks on this trip.

Reindeer ranching has taught Carothers many things. He has learned that the miracle drug, penicillin, protects reindeer from pneumonia, a disease to which they are subject in the Texas climate.

Every year the reindeer grows a new set of antlers. Bucks, females and fawns alike grow antlers. Some reindeer have antlers with a three-foot spread and 30

to 40 points. When a reindeer walks he pants with his tongue out, like a dog. That doesn't mean he is too warm; it's his way of doing things. And the popping of his ankles when he walks is another reindeer peculiarity.

Deprived of his natural food—reindeer moss—the Santa sleigh animal thrives on the same thing many children have for breakfast—oatmeal. Carothers supplements the diet of rolled oats with mixed grain and a small amount of peanut hay for a balanced ration.

When we discover that a book selected for our reading shelf is later chosen for a fiction award it gives us a feeling of pride. The Fourth Westminster award for Fiction is "Prince of Egypt" by Dorothy Clark Wilson. This book

**Social Security News**

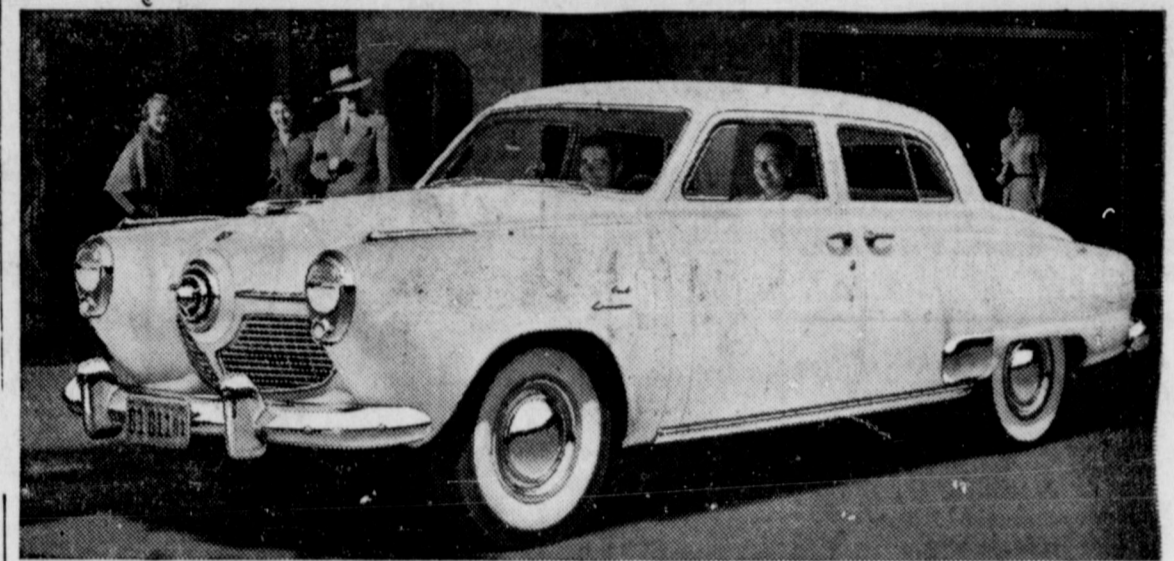
Do you employ a domestic worker in your home, such as a maid, butler, cook, gardener, or chauffeur? If so, you may soon be an employer under social security. The amended Social Security Act brings regularly employed domestic workers under this insurance system effective January 1, 1951. A domestic worker is considered to be regularly employed if he works for one person or 24 separate days in a calendar quarter and earns at least \$50 in cash wages during the quarter. Generally speaking, this

would mean that the domestic who works for one person on the average of two days per week would be covered under the amended law. Further, it means that you will not be concerned with this new provision if you have a person who works for you only one day a week, or less than 24 days per calendar quarter.

Does all this sound complicat-

ed Well, it really isn't. The Treasury Department and the Social Security Administration, working jointly, have just issued a brief booklet telling the few simple steps for you and your household worker to take. It includes a postal card for getting instructions about the easy-to-fill-out report form. The title of this booklet is "Do You Have a

Maid?" Copies of this booklet have been mailed to your local postmaster. If he has not received his supply, you can obtain a copy by writing the social security office, Amarillo, and asking for the booklet, "Do You Have a Maid?" A representative from this office will be in Clarendon at the County Court House, Tuesday, November 28, at 9:15 a. m.

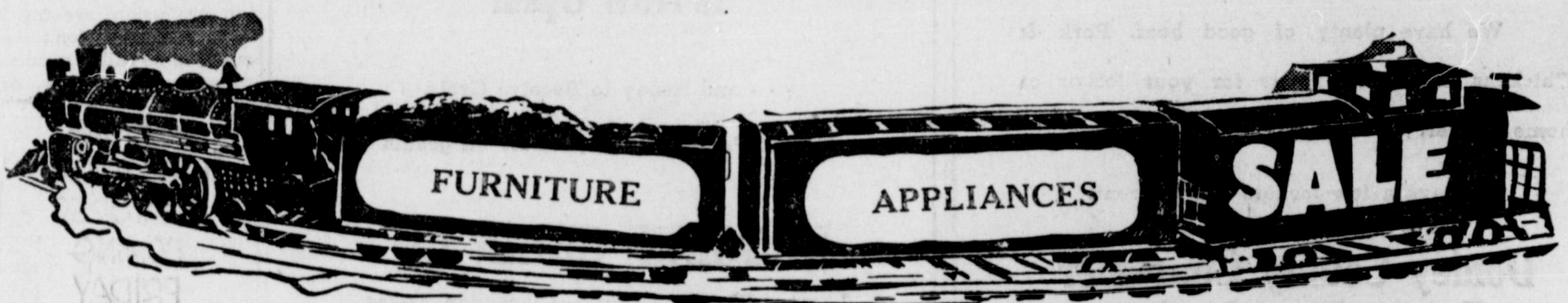

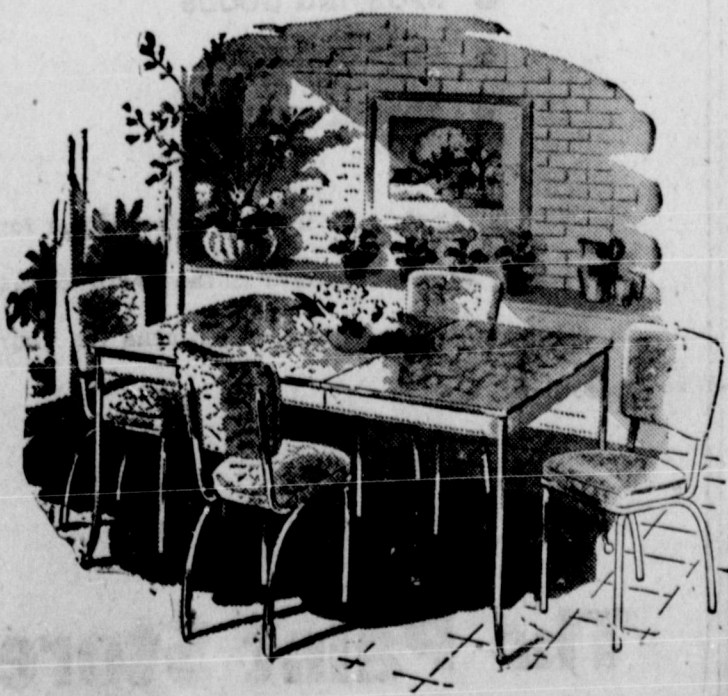

**NEW COAL FEEDER DEVELOPED**  
AUSTIN—A food manufacturer's cereal-shot-from-guns idea has provided the working principle for a new coal feeder developed by University of Texas Graduate Student W. K. Griffis for power furnaces.  
The coal feeder is based on the puffed wheat or rice axiom by which the ingredient is cooked at high pressure and shot suddenly into a low-pressure area. The quick pressure change causes the grains to puff up.  
In Griffis' mechanism, lignite lumps are mixed with 500-degree steam in a high pressure cham-

ber. When the mixture is shot from pipes into a furnace's lower pressure, the steam expands in the porous coal, pulverizing it for burning. The system increases furnace efficiency 10 per cent.
