

WORTH THINKING ABOUT

In view of the recent talk about the business, profits, etc., of the meat packers, it's worth remembering the basic economics of all businesses in this country.

To be successful, any business must do four things

—1) it must purchase its raw materials at prices comparable to the prices paid by its competitors; 2) through know-how, efficiency, good operating, it must manufac-ture products of comparable quality at a manufacturing ture products of comparable quality at a manufacturing cost no higher than that of its competitors; 3) in doing this, it must pay its workers wage rates comparable to the going wage-scale paid by others; 4) and it must sell its product at prices that a large part of the public is willing and able to pay.

In the livestock-and-meat industry, this simply means that prices must be high enough to earn both cost and a decent profit for the livestock producer, the meat packer and the retail merchant—and low enough to keep the great masses of people eating meat.

Recognizing this need, U. S. Department of Agriculture scientists began developing such a breed from crosses between Rambouillet ewes (a fine wool type), and Lincoln rams (a mutton type).

Today, after more than 30 years of intense selection for desirable characteristics, the Columbia is widely used on better ranges of the West. Animals of this breed are large, rugged, vigorous, prolific and productive.

The war is over but Victory is not complete and will not be complete until the will not be complete until the wounds have been healed, the good earth is in full production again, and the starving victims of the war are earning regularly. You and I, fellow Callahanans, can help avert starvation and can help avert starvation and actual death for many people by growing a Victory Garden in 1946. Recognizing that most Callahan families learned a good deal abut successful gardening during the war years, here are a few points as refreshers.

1. There is still time for planting sweet corn in home gardens. The smart gardeners will plant one or two rows now and then

The smart gardeners will plant one or two rows now and then wait for thirty days and make a second planting. This will keep the supply of fresh roasting ears flowing onto the table over a long period of time. The Ioana or Golden Cross Bantam varieties are the best choice. DEPENDS UPON MEN

"Good Government" is something that everybody praises, desires and defends, but what various individuals mean by the term, "good Government," is not always the same thing.

Occasionally, a speaker comes out with the observation that "good Government" is impossible under existing forms, but we are inclined to believe that, in essence, 'good Government" depends upon an intelligent citizenship and officials who are efficient and incorruptible. In brief, "good Government" is a product of good men and women rather than of a particular framework of govern-

Theoretically, government justifies itself when it serves the interests of the governed. As it is impossible to have any form of government which pleases everybody, a government is considered good when it happens to suit a large majority of its citizens. It is bad when it acts contrary to the wishes of a distinct majority.

A government, however, cannot function properly by giving unrestrained expression to the wishes, desires and interests of a mere majority. There must be a recognition of the rights of the existing minority and a scrupulous regard for constitutional and legal principles designed to protect them from the tyranny of a majority.

One of the faults of modern political adminstrations is the tendency of majorities to ride roughshod over the legal rights of minorities. This is evident, we think, in the determined drive of various majorities to compel minorities to conform to the wishes of the majority. In some instances, of course, it is necessary if government is to function properly, but there is a wide field of human activity in which insistence upon too much uniformity amounts to an unjustified usurpation of minority rights.

HOW DOES THE EDITOR EDIT?

The editor of a newspaper is often hard pressed to select suitable subjects for the editorials that he must write for his journal. Contrary to popular opinion, the average editor does not sit in his office, thinking up something to Dallas, where Mrs. McGowen and denounce.

We have no idea that we are right on everything that we think. Very often, it happens that a given community over-emphasizes one phase of a proposition and an intelligent article can present other factors that should be considered.

Naturally, when selfish forces are trying to put something over, for their own profit, such an article causes feeling. While there are exceptions, in most cases, where one hears a citizen denouncing a writer, the cause is hidden in the selfishness of the critic.

simple that any schoolboy is able to understand them. You would hardly think anybody could get these facts mixed-up, but they are often used wrongly. Under them is hid the 1946 labor-management problem which is the most serious and the most dangerous one that has ever confronted this nation. What lies behind all the headlines telling about strikes?

Can't Get Together

In extreme brevity, union laborers are asking their employers for more pay-more wages than the employers (for some reason) are willing to lay out. Why not pay working men whatever they ask? All trades, especially farmers, want laborers to draw high wages because that's the key to good times. Farmers, whose fields feed the workers, have good markets and prosperity when labor prospers.

The answer is not hard: The workers' wages, just like the owners' profits come out of what John Public will pay for what he wants. If the price is too steep for John, then there's no sale and no profits and presently no wages. If the price is within reasonable range of John's pocketbook, he buys. That makes profits and wages - better jobs and more of them, and pros-

High Wages Popular

There is such a thing as oppression; I have seen it in China. There is such a thing as exploitation of labor-ignorant labor. But it's foolhardy to mistreat workers in a modern American factory. If an employer should try holding wages down to fatten his own bank account, his customers would all favor higher pay for his workers because (in such a case) it could be done without boosting prices.

In most cases, when wages advance prices have to advance to cover the expense. There is no other way to raise wages except by boosting prices unless the prices already in force are fictitious and unfair, which competition seldom permits. Customers object to wage increases only when they call for price increases to cover them. Even then, Mr. Public is not always right.

Who Can Say When? Many a wage increase is appropriate and economically sound even when prices have to be raised immediately to cover them. Boosting prices to pay better wages is good business, up to a point. But what point? Up to the point that John Q. Public gets slow about buying. So long as volume can stay large, the price is sound. When volume drops pay for the blunder, that's unsound.

There are experts in every business who can estimate with remarkable accuracy how many of thisor-that will sell for some stipulated price. They know long before the first one is made. This year, when steady jobs at good pay are so vital po everybody, prices should be set in advance to get volume sales. Labor, as well as industry, should be interested in the right prices.

In applying fertilizer, the proper rate is five pounds per 100 feet of row space. The fertilizer should be thoroughly mixed with the soil before the seed are planted. Where vegetables al-ready have been planted, fertilizer may be used as a side dressing. In side dressing, take the corner of the hoe and open the furrow three to four inches deep on either side of the young growing vegetables. 





SCREWWORM AND BLOWFLY CONDITIONS IN TEXAS

The overwintering area of the screwworm fly for the past winter was restricted to approximately 70 per cent of normal, or 50 per cent of last year's areas, acper cent of last years areas, according to the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, Uvalde, Texas. The area was south of a line from Comstock to Camp Wood, Thence to Kingsville on the Gulf Coast.

ville on the Gulf Coast.

The population for the adult fly in this restricted area was approximately 80 per cent of normal for the first half of March and was extremely spotted. A very restricted area in the West Nuces Valley had 160 per cent of exercise adults for the West Nueces Valley had 160 per cent of average adults for this period—a reflection of the exteremely high population of the fly in this area for November, 1945.

Prospects for late spring and early summer is that the fly will appear from two weeks to a month later in the eastern area than normal; from one to two

than normal; from one to two months later in the western area than normal; and in less num-

bers than usual.

Blowfly populations are developing rather rapidly and in local areas have built up extremely high populations. They are attacking dehorned cattle and long-wool sheep—mostly on the lower Rio Grande plain and Western Escarpment areas.


