MIXED GREENS AND SALADS

April is here and from the warm days that we have been enjoying, spring must actually be here. With spring the dull brown hillsides become a beautiful green, but not all the green is on the trees, on the hillside, but in many gardens. The 4-H girls have reported that they were eating turnip greens, mustard, lettuce and radishes out of their gardens.

Greens were considered good-spring tonic in grandmother's day. Today they are recognized as tonics for any season because of their natural richness in important vitamins and minerals, particularly vitamin A and C and iron and calcium.

A greater variety of greens in home gardens and on family dinner tables will help prevent monotony in meals and provide more nutritive value. If you haven't already planted some in your garden do it today. Savory mixed greens, cooked together or served raw in mixed green salads, often will be more appetizing than the same kind of greens served day after day. Why not plant a variety in your garden now.

Better preparation and cooking will improve the popularity of greens. To make them most appetizing and to obtain the most nutritive value of greens, cook in as little water as possible. Cook covered and until just tender. Serve as soon as possible after being cooked.

Remember if you have not already planted a variety of greens do so now. Greens help to vary the menu and certainly add nutrition to any meal.

FRONTIER TIMES COMING TO BAIRD

The following editorial appeared in last week's Bandera Bulletin to announce the removal of Frontier Times publication headquarters to Baird. We reprint it here that all readers of The Baird Star may know the plan as set out therein by our father:

Beginning with next issue (May) my son, J. Marvin Hunter, Jr., of Baird, Texas, becomes associated with me in the publication of Frontier Times. Publication headquarters will be moved to Baird, where facilities and a modernly equipped printing plant will enable us to issue a larger and more attractive magazine, and assure its permanency. For the past four years I have endeavored to do all the mechanical work in my Baird print shop, and carry on my museum work and other work, too, but as the years grow upon me I feel the burden of work is too great to carry it on alone. My son has been trained in the work from infancy, and it is his aim to carry on along the same lines I have followed, and in time when my call comes to quit the walks of men, he will step into my place and keep Frontier Times going. I know my friends everywhere, who have stayed with me through the years, will not be disappointed by this arrangement. It will certainly relieve me of great responsibility, and result in a very much improved Frontier Times. This arrangement has been contemplated for some time, and a final decision was when the people of Baird, through their Junior Chamber of Commerce and

civic organizations, extended to me an invitation to move the magazine's publication headquarters to that city. A delegation from the Junior Chamber of Commerce came to Bandera on March 27th and solicited me to establish an office in their city, and this visit was followed by numerous petitions and letters from the Fire Department, the City Officials, the American Legion Post, the Ladies Auxiliary of the American Legion, the County Officials, the High School Faculty, the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the City Employees, the Baird Lumber Co., and its employees, the Citizens National Farm Loan Association, the Corinne Blackburn Wednesday Club, the Old Fashioned Garden Club, pastors of churches, individual business men, and private citizens generally, cordially inviting me to establish Frontier Times in Baird. This fine spirit of friendliness and offer of co-operation and good will, has advanced our plans by several months, and so, next month our subscribers to Frontier Times will receive their magazine from Baird, Texas. Correspondence should still be addressed to me at Bandera, for my editorial headquarters will remain here. Subscription orders and articles for publication in the magazine may be addressed to Baird or Bandera and will receive attention. It will probably take two or three months to transfer our mailing lists and records to publication headquarters, but this will be done as rapidly as possible.

My son, Marvin Hunter, Jr., will be a full partner in the publication of the magazine, and will be its publisher. A year ago he placed an order for a new high-speed automatic press, on which the magazine will be printed, and delivery of this press will be made soon. With its installation, the format of Frontier Times may be slightly changed, but the same face of type will be kept, and its appearance will be in keeping with the period it represents. It is our plan to place Frontier Times on newsstands throughout the country, which we have not done heretofore because we lacked the facilities for printing several thousand copies monthly for newsstand demands.

I will continue to reside in Bandera, where I will operate Frontier Times Museum and publish the Bandera Bulletin, a weekly newspaper. As soon as additional mechanical help in my Bandera office is secured I expect to spend a part of my time in Baird in the future, and hope to get acquainted with all those progressive citizens. For the time being, while this change is being effected, we ask your patience and indulgence, and rejoice with us that the little magazine which

we have nourished for almost twenty-three years will soon blossom into the full fruition of our hopes.

To the Baird Junior Chamber of Commerce and to the people of Baird and Callahan county we extend our thanks and appreciation for the fine interest they have shown by so cordially inviting us to make Baird our publication headquarters.

INCREASED GRAIN PLANTING URGED

Texas farmers are being urged to increase their planting of grains especially corn and sorghums, in order to help alleviate the critical feed shortage. Prospective acreage reports, based on intentions to plant as of March, indicate that Texas farmers are falling far short of reaching the acreage set for corn and grain sorghums, according to B. F. Vance, State PMA Director.

The corn planting goal for 1946 is 4,950,000 acres, while prospective acreage is only 3,521,000 acres. 79 per cent of the goal. For sorghums the goal is 7,800,000, and indicated acreage is 7,045,000 acres, 90 per cent of the goal. The Texas record for wheat

and oats planting is much better, Vance said, with 5,994,000 acres of wheat planted, 115 per cent of the 5,200,000 acre goal. The oats acreage is 1,849,000 slightly more than the 1,830,000 acre goal. With feed supplies short and with great amounts of wheat being exported to starvation areas, the demand for all grains will continue, Vance said. He called upon Texas farmers to go over their plans and to increase production of grain this year if at all possible.

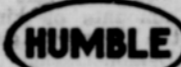

"DUST OFF THE HOE AND THE RAKE"
 Gardening time for 1946 is at the doorstep of the Callahan homes. During the war every person in the county was glad to help in some way produce a victory garden. The war is over but Victory is not complete and will not be complete until the wounds have been healed, the good earth is in full production again, and the starving victims of the war are earning regularly. You and I, fellow Callahanians, can help avert starvation and actual death for many people by growing a Victory Garden in 1946. Won't you start your garden today, if you haven't already? The challenge is here. As in the past, you will meet it won't you?
 Recognizing that most Callahan families learned a good deal about successful gardening during the war years, here are a few points as refreshers.
 1. There is still time for planting sweet corn in home gardens. The smart gardeners will plant one or two rows now and then wait for thirty days and make a second planting. This will keep the supply of fresh roasting ears flowing onto the table over a long period of time. The Iowa or Golden Cross Bantam varieties are the best choice. When the plants have reached knee-high, start removing the suckers to give the main stalk all the plant food, and increase the size of the one to three ears that will develop on it.
 2. Some gardeners plant vegetables in the same spot every year. It is a good idea to rotate all vegetables to different rows each year and where ever possible a different garden spot, particularly in cases of root rot trouble. All vegetable seed before planting should be treated with one of the seed treatment materials. For amounts or kinds to use write the County Agent or the Home Demonstration Agent.
 3. Tomatoes: Don't rush the season with small, spindly plants. Wait until you can get plants seven or eight inches in height, with large stocky bodies. When the plants are set out, put two tablespoonsful of a 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer in a gallon of water and pour a number 2 tomato can full of this solution around each plant as it is being set out or soon thereafter. The Rutgers, Margode, or Prichard varieties are good because they are resistant to wilt. Do not put the plants this year in the same rows where they grew last season. Go to the opposite side of the garden if possible.

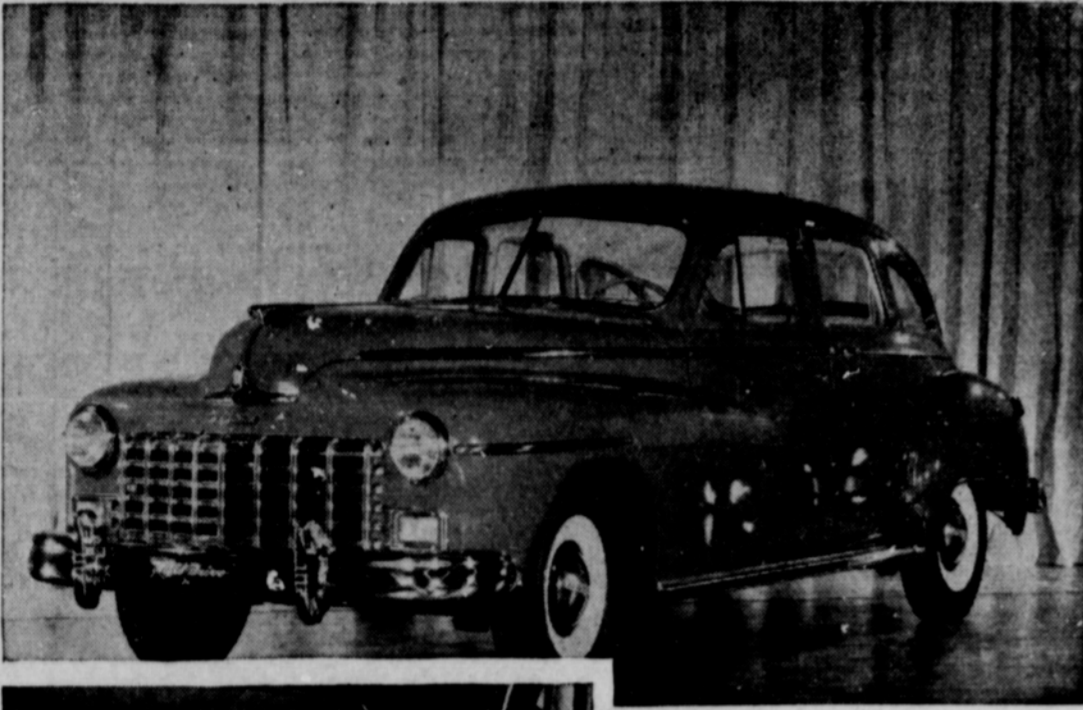

Herbert Hoover, now in Europe, says that "slow famine" is already killing children on the continent, with 20,000,000 from the Russian frontier to the English channel "badly undernourished" and "steadily developing tuberculosis, rickets, anemia and other diseases of subnormal feeding."

Mr. Hoover assures us that widespread famine is inevitable unless the United States and other wheat growing countries ship all available supplies and that the few months, until the next harvest, "are the most critical food period in all modern history."

MAXIMUM PRODUCTION OF PEANUTS URGED

In view of the present food situation special efforts should be made to increase peanut yields per acre, according to E. A. Miller, agronomist for the A. and M. College Extension Service. Peanuts rank high in food value and there is a big need for full production.

Several things are necessary for maximum production: At least 25 to 30 pounds of shelled seed or 45 to 60 pounds of unshelled seed should be planted per acre. A good stand is necessary for good production, and it doesn't pay to economize on seed.

The shelled seed should be chemically treated to insure good germination. The treatment protects the seed against molds and fungi in the soil. At the Stephenville Experiment Sub-Station shelled seed treated with three ounces of two per cent cerasan gave a three year average stand of 73.8 per cent as compared with 22.9 per cent stand from untreated seed. Arsan and spergon also increased germination considerably and may be used at the same rate as two per cent cerasan, but cerasan gave the most outstanding results. Five per cent cerasan should not be used as it has seriously injured the seed in previous experiments.

At the Stephenville station 200 pounds of 4-12-4 produced the highest average yield of nuts and hay and gave the highest net profit over cost of fertilizer—\$13.88 per acre. The next results were obtained from 180 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate—\$12.32 increased profit per acre.

LEAGUE DIES; IDEA LIVES

The League of Nations, championed by the late President Woodrow Wilson after the first World War, is about ready to close up its affairs and bequeath it to the new-founded United Nations Organization. The world situation is somewhat different from what it was. Now the United States vigorously supports the principle of international cooperation, with President Truman pledging unlimited faith and fullest support to the new world organization. In 1918, President Wilson gave voice to the same sentiments but his efforts were bushwhacked by politicians in this country, including some who have given notable lip-service to the cause of a League organization. The failure of the League may have been inevitable, inasmuch as it was the initial effort of modern nations to set up something of a world order, but the failure of the United States to give its active support and powerful strength to the League cut the ground from under its feet.

**THE QUESTION OF
PLANT FOOD**

Since the problem of what commercial fertilizer to use on which vegetables often raised, J. F. Rosbrough, horticulturist for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, offers the following suggestions on the subject.

Commercial fertilizer that are available from most seed stores are 4-12-4, 5-10-5, and 6-8-4. For the leafy vegetables such as lettuce, mustard, kale and spinach, Mr. Rosbrough advises 6-8-4 because the higher percentage of nitrogen will stimulate rapid growth of the foliage. For root crops such as beets, carrots, radishes and turnips, a 4-12-4 mixture is probably best. For tomatoes and peppers as well as eggplant, 5-10-5 mixture is recommended. If only one fertilizer is to be used for all vegetables, a 5-10-5 will do the best choice.

In applying fertilizer, the proper rate is five pounds per 100 feet of row space. The fertilizer should be thoroughly mixed with the soil before the seed are planted. Where vegetables already have been planted, fertilizer may be used as a side dressing. In side dressing, take the corner of the hoe and open the furrow three to four inches deep on either side of the young growing vegetables. Sprinkle the fertilizer in the furrow, then mix it with the soil and refill the furrow. To make cucumbers "grow like magic," a side dressing of 5-10-5 will do the job.

After the plants have begun to grow and have reached the height of 12 to 18 inches, a second furrow toward the ends of the runners with an application of three to four pounds additional fertilizer will keep them coming.

THE FIGHT ON CANCER

A campaign to raise \$12,000,000 for an organized attack on cancer, the second most formidable natural killer of mankind, has been launched by the American Cancer Society and President Truman has designated the month of April as Cancer Control Month. It is pointed out that forty per cent of the money raised will go to the national program, mostly for coordinated research, while sixty per cent will be used for local programs of education, service and research. The fact that cancer kills 175,000 Americans every year, or one each three minutes, and that the disease took the lives of 607,000 Americans during the war, as compared with the 294,000 dead or missing in combat, illustrates the necessity for some concerted campaign.

The national chairman of the campaign, Eric A. Johnston, says that the American people should understand that thirty to fifty per cent of all cancer cases can be cured, on the basis of present-day knowledge, if the disease is established in its early stages. Surgery and radiation, or a combination of the two, effects a cure of at least thirty per cent of the cancer cases that are detected in the early curable stage. He points out, however, that even when people seek aid at the first sign of cancer, they cannot be saved "unless there are adequate facilities for diagnosis and treatment."

ON THE DOORSTEP?

The United States is on the doorstep of an era, with the highest standard of living ever dreamed of, declares President Truman, who says that this means "good returns for business, for workers and for farmers."

The Chief Executive warns, however, that unless we restrain inflationary forces which threaten the stability of our national economy, "we will never pass the threshold of that bright future." The presidential optimism is based upon the belief that full production, full employment, mass market economy, the maintenance of a high standard of living will bring the desired goal to the American people.

**VETERANS MAY GET FARM
ADVICE LOCALLY**

Veterans who wish to catch up on wartime farming developments or to obtain assistance on their first entry into some farming activity will find local representatives of the U. S. D. A. and cooperating state agencies ready to help them, according to J. L. Matthew, assistant in agricultural planning for the A. & M. College Extension Service. First stop for the farm-bound veterans should be the county agricultural agent. His job is to help all farmers and he has been designated to work with returning servicemen. The county agent, whose office is generally at the court house, can answer almost any question relating to agriculture or will refer the veteran to farm agencies working in special fields.

In most agricultural counties, veterans can obtain the practical and valuable counsel of working farms serving on the county veterans advisory committee. This committee may be approached through the county agent.

County AAA committees are ready to give assistance available under the AAA conservation program, either in the form of cash payments or in conservation of materials and services.

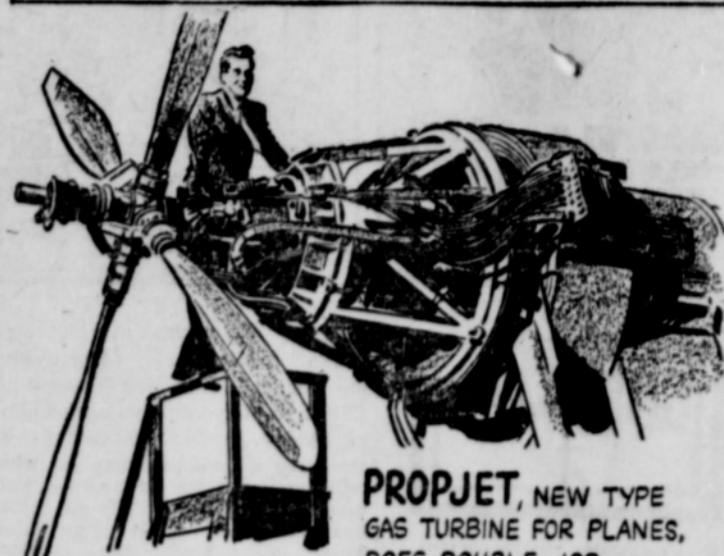
Farm Security Administration long term loans can be arranged through county FSA personnel. The National Farm Loan Association or the Production Credit Association also provide assistance in obtaining loans.

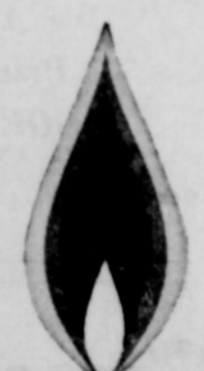

THE ANCIENT BOUNDRIES

Landmarks for farms are no more important than landmarks in religion. Example: The religion of the Jews had its boundaries as plain as a stake or stone in the earth. To go beyond was to remove God's landmark: "Ye shall not add unto the word which I commanded you, neither shall ye diminish from it." Deut. 4:2. Nadab and Abihu, two priests of God, were guilty of removing God's landmark: "... took each of them his censor, and put fire therein, and laid incense thereon, and offered strange fire before Jehovah, which he had not commanded them." Lev. 10:1. These priests stayed within the boundary except in one point and were cremated.

What is the boundary today? Not the Old Testament laws because Christ took them out of the way nailing them to His cross, Col. 2:14. Christ has given the New Testament boundaries, called, "law of the Spirit" Rom. 8:2, "the law of Christ" Gal. 6:2; "the perfect law of liberty" James 1:25.

God affirms unmistakable landmarks in religion today, "Who-soever goeth onward and abideth in the teaching of Christ, HATH NOT GOD: he that abideth in the teaching, the same hath both the Father and the Son. If any cometh unto you, and bringeth not this teaching, receive him not into your house, and give him no greeting: for he that giveth him

greeting partaketh in his evil works." 2 John 9:11. Any teaching not found in the Gospel of Christ is beyond God's boundary of today. No matter how scholarly a preacher may be who tells you not to be narrow but broad-minded and flaunt the boundaries, God will curse him when he extends the ancient landmarks. Gal. 1:8, 9. Men who love and abide by the Truth do NOT "go beyond the things which are written" in the New Testament, 1 Cor. 4:6.

The ancient landmark on marriage is that adultery is the ONLY cause giving the innocent person the right to remarry, Matt. 19:3, 9. State legislatures have by their own authority moved that divine marker.

Regarding boundaries of the Lord's Supper, Jesus said, "and I appoint unto you a kingdom, even as my Father appointed unto me, that ye may eat and drink at my table in the kingdom." Luke 22:29, 30; Paul said, "For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye proclaim the Lord's death till he come." 1 Cor. 11:26. Some churches rule out together the bread and fruit of the vine, showing disrespect for the bleeding body of Christ, others fail to partake steadfastly on the first day of the week, which is a removal of the ancient landmark.

Music in the worship is laid out by divine markers. Use of pianos, organs or orchestras in the worship is to go beyond that which is written. To say, "Mechanical music is a little thing to preach against," is as if to say, "Where Nadab and Abihu got the fire was a little matter." God does not see it that way or He would not have given us the New Testament for a guide.

Baptism, a burial in a watery grave, and a resurrection, is an

ancient landmark, Rom. 6:3-7. Priests and preachers, NOT GOD, have moved that marker, saying a burial is unnecessary, that sprinkling will do, and some saying that a sinner is saved without even sprinkling. "He that saith, I know him, and keepeth not his commandments, is a liar and the truth is not in him." 1 John 2:4.

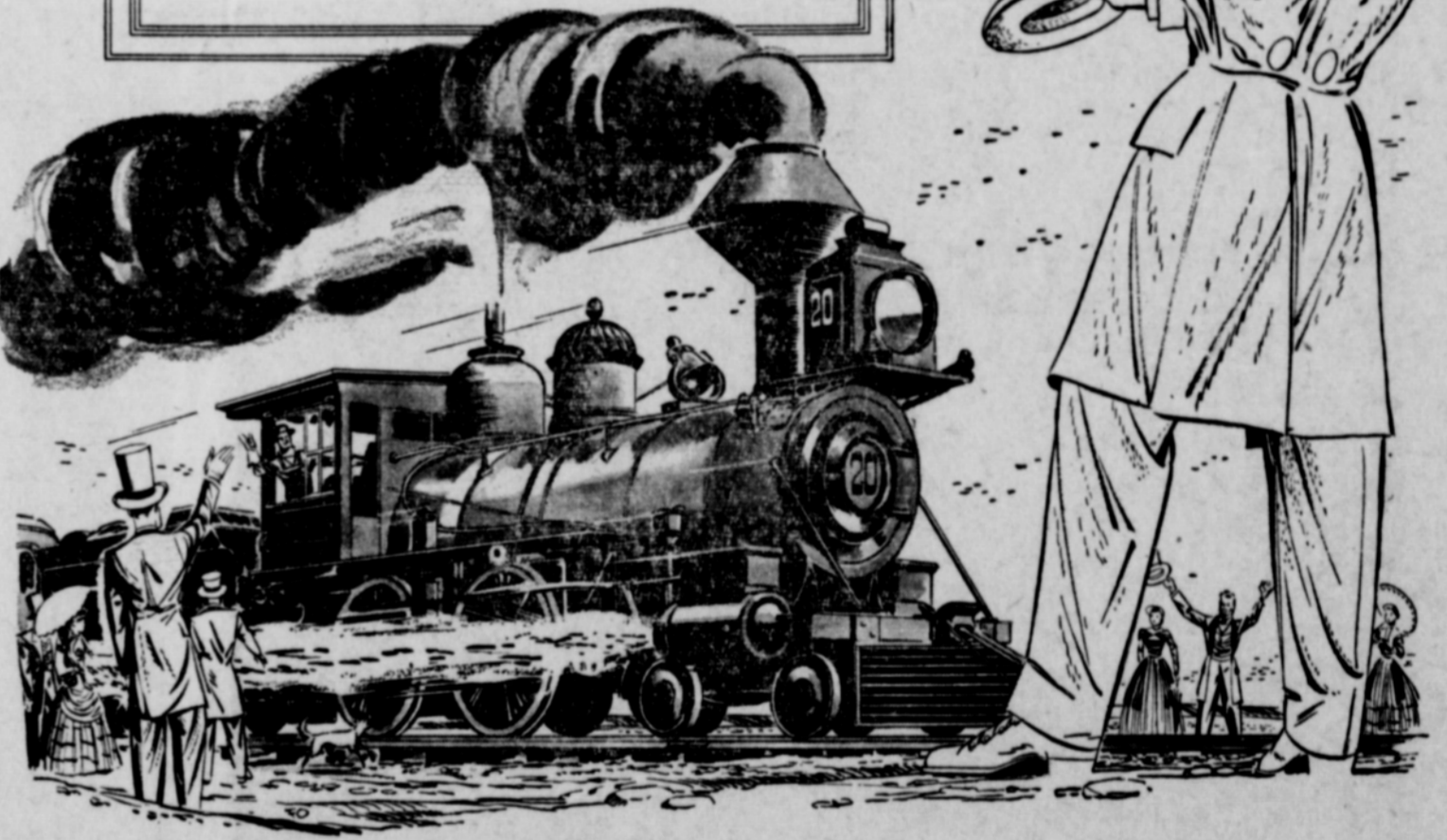
