Drilling Operations Continue On Wildcat

The Lewis W. Welch R-G Ranch wildcat well is still making news for Donley County residents as the depth of the well is lowered around 40 to 50 feet each 24 hours. The drilling is very slow but the important point is that they haven't had to stop for granite yet. It is now around a thousand feet deeper than previous wells drilled in this area. Bob Fincher who is pinch-hitting for Karl Fink at the head tool pusher position reported the depth at 6,422 feet Wednesday morning and gave the formation as granite wash. Mr. Fink was called to Lovell, Wyoming due to illness of a brother there. Mr. Fincher is from Snyder, Texas.

BASKETBALL NOTES FROM CLARENDON COLLEGE

Clarendon College ended the pre-Christmas basketball season with a narrow win over a fine Meyers Motors AAU team from Amarillo. The Bulldogs took a quick 12-4 lead on 6 field goals in the first three minutes and were never behind. At the end of the rough first half, Clarendon led 32-30. Jerry English was high for the Bulldogs of Clarendon with 19 points. Second and third for the winners were Billy White and "Trigger" Wells with 14 and 10 respectively. But high scoring honors went to Jim Branom of Meyers, who rolled in 24 points.

Charles "Wild Horse" May, English, and White excelled in floor play for the Bulldogs. In eight games, Clarendon College has won 5, dropped 3; with a per-game average of 55 points. Billy White of Lelia Lake is leading in total points with 91. Following him in order are: English, 75 points; Sams, 65; Wells, 63; Gowdy, 53; Stavenhagen, 39; May, 38; and Saunders, 15.

Time To Think About Fertilizers Says County Agent

Commercial fertilizers are plentiful at this time and H. M. Breedlove, county agent says that now is the time to start thinking about how much fertilizer you will need for your 1951 crop. Fertilizers might become scarce in the spring and also the price might be higher, so the county agent advises that farmers who intend to use commercial fertilizers to buy it now and store in a dry place until planting time. The report from fertilizer houses is to the effect that plenty of fertilizer is available but when planting starts in the lower part of the state it could be short by time to plant in Donley County. If farmers buy fertilizers now it will also give the companies time to make more fertilizer and put in the ware houses.

Breedlove says that 16-20-0 fertilizer at the rate of 100 lbs. per acre and 6-12-0 fertilizer at the rate of 200 lbs. per acre are the best in this region for row crops. This is merely a reminder to avoid a shortage of fertilizer at a later date and possibly save some money on price advance. Materials used in the production of fertilizer are in some cases used by the war department and a shortage could develop.

ACRES THAT CAN TAKE IT

Stepping up farm production as a part of the overall defense effort is going to test the ability of our acres to produce. The first problem will be to produce enough of what is needed without too much of some commodities and not enough of others. Then there's the problem of producing what is needed without diminishing the productivity of the land.

The acres which will be able to meet this challenge are the acres which have been kept strong and productive by conservation farming. The "acres that can take it" in the production job are the ones which have been protected against erosion. The topsoil is still in place. The subsoil is not coming through. They are the acres with reserves of fertility in the soil. They are the acres where the organic matter has not all been worked out of the soil, where there is organic matter and the essential minerals.

Keeping our acres fit for production is just as important—actually more important as keeping the manufacturing plants and transportation facilities in condition. "Without the production from the farm, there wouldn't be the food for workers and many of the raw materials for the production plants."

This good condition of our agricultural plant, is due in large part to the cooperation of farmers in the Agricultural Conservation Program which helps farmers keep their production plants in readiness. The farms which are ready naturally will be able to make the greatest contribution to the defense effort.

Our economic strength is the real backbone of our military strength. We know we must keep our economy strong—and we know too, that we can't long maintain a strong economy without strength and stability in agriculture.

If we are going to farm efficiently, conserve the soil, and participate fully in civic, community, and public affairs that are a vital part of democracy, farmers must have a reasonable security in their tenure and equitable treatment in tenure relations.

Miss Glenna Deal, daughter of Mrs. Maggie Deal, has accepted an assignment with the Foreign Service, State Department, and is now working in Bonn, Germany. Bonn is the capital of the Federal Republic of Germany and is situated on the Rhine River in the British Zone of Germany. She is employed in the United States Liaison Office which provides liaison and coordination of contracts between the German Government and all elements of the Office of the U. S. High Commissioner for Germany, particularly the Office of Political Affairs. For this purpose, it maintains close relations with the German Government through daily visits, luncheons, and social functions. It is also one of the principle sources of information both for Frankfurt and Washington as to the activities of the German Government.

Of the many places of interest she has visited since going to Germany last June are Berlin, Garmisch and the Bavarian Alps, Koblenz, Frankfurt, and Oberammergau, where she attended the "Passion Play." She plans to visit Italy, Holland, France, Spain and many other places of interest before her return to the States.
