The slush pit was dug the first of the week and it was understood that the rig had been moved in Wednesday. The drilling contractor is said to be Doswell and Associated, the same parties that drilled the well on the C. T. McMurtry ranch. This well will be an offset to the old AT well that was supposed to have had a gas showing a number of years ago. It is believed that the purpose of the new well is to try and hit this same gas formation.
